	You asked, by Saturday, a status report on the SAIC contract and a plan for moving forward.
	Today, I met with senior vice-presidents and attorneys for SAIC and officials of the Defense Contracting Command, Washington.
	After lengthy discussions, we issued what is know as a "cure letter" - the first step in the process of formally declaring SAIC in default of the contract.
	SAIC has agreed to:
	1. Absorb any additional costs to the government for its mishandling of transmission in Kurdistan. Specifically, it has proposed a temporary solution, at a cost of \$250,000, until a permanent solution can be in place in approximately six months.
	2. Withdraw any charges to the government for two employees in Erbil whom, I suspect, did no work that benefitted IMN. They were the ones who falsely claimed the transmissions would start by November 28. Cost: in excess of \$200,000.
	The company has promised to deliver a curative plan by next Wednesday. After evaluating it, we will decide whether to declare SAIC in default and formally terminate the contract.
	We are trying to determine a legal strategy that will at least salvage part of the \$20 million that remains unspent in the contract.
	SAIC has already raised the idea of a "contribution" to the government to make up for its performance, including working without charge to DOD from January 1 until we can get a new contractor to replace them.
	If you find this course satisfactory, please forward this e-mail to Dr. Rice, who asked to be kept informed on the SAIC situation.
