Dear Secretary Rumsfeld,

We are writing to ask that the Department of Defense implement the recommendations made by the Defense Business Board's Military Postal Service Task Group regarding the Military Postal Service Agency (MPSA), as reported in December 2005.

As you know, the Board recommended that the Department immediately issue an open-ended Request for Proposal (RFP) to allow the private sector to provide an innovative, comprehensive solution for the processing and delivery of military mail. Additionally, the Board recommended that the Department seek to achieve the most efficient business model that capitalizes on economies of scale and organizational efficiencies, as well as develop a coordinated implementation strategy to address current management, budget, organizational, and policy issues.

In the year 2003 alone, the MPSA delivered more than 65 million pounds of letters and parcels to troops serving in Operation Iraqi Freedom at a cost of nearly \$150 million. The Board estimates that a private-sector solution to military mail would achieve economies of scale, efficiencies, and cost savings of 30 percent.

Mail delivery is not the core business of our troops. The Department should minimize the use of troops handling the mail so they are able to focus on their primary function: fighting the war on terror. Most importantly, the Government Accountability Office found that more than half of service members reported they were dissatisfied with the quality of mail delivery, underscoring the negative impact it can have on troop morale. We can do better.

Issuing an RFP will fix the broken MPSA, save American taxpayers millions of dollars, and increase the morale of our troops. It ought to be earried out immediately.

Dear Secretary Rumsfeld:

We are greatly concerned about possible actions at the upcoming Department of Defense (DoD) Pharmacy and Therapeutics (P&T) Committee meeting on May 9-11, 2006. As you may know, the Committee plans to review the Plan B morning-after pill as part of the "contraceptives" drug class. We urge the Committee not to mandate DOD coverage of the morning-after pill.

Although approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), the medical literature shows and many Americans believe that Plan B is not simply another form of contraception. Contraception by definition prevents conception, whereas Plan B and other morning-after pills may take effect after conception has occurred, affecting and aborting the life of a tiny embryo. One of the ways the drug works, according to its manufacturer, the FDA, and various scientific studies, is by altering the endometrium (the lining of the womb), which could inhibit implantation of a conceived human embryo. Unfortunately, many women are unaware of this when they are given Plan B. The military should not be in the abortion business and this drug should not be required to be on the shelves of military medical facilities.

As you know, there are many minors covered in the TRICARE system. Adding Plan B to the required coverage list means that thousands of teens will be able to go to a military health facility (MTF), many without their parents' knowledge, get the morningafter pill, and possibly abort their unborn children. This is unacceptable.

While the morning-after pill is a controversial topic over which many Americans and many members of the Armed Forces disagree, it would be unconscionable for the U.S. military to force pharmacy personnel to stock and dispense it, forcing many to violate their consciences. When President Clinton required abortion in the military, no military doctor was willing to perform them. Similarly, many pharmacists in the military do not want to be complicit with a drug that can abort a human embryo. DoD medical personnel should be focused on saving lives during a time of war, not responding to the pressures of being forced or coerced into dispensing a drug that may end lives.



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For these reasons, we strongly urge you to carefully monitor the upcoming DoD P&T meeting, and to ensure that the military does not mandate the morning-after pill in its MTF's.

Thank you for your attention to this serious matter and for your service to all Americans.

This letter is to request that your office initiate an immediate re-investigation into the circumstance surrounding the untimely death of Private First Class LaVena Johnson. Pfc. Johnson was a member of the 129th Corps Support Battalion based out of Fort Campbell, Kentucky. She died on July 19, 2005, in Balad, Iraq. In April 2006, the Military Criminal Investigation Command concluded its investigation into her death and reported that Pfc. Johnson died (b)(6)

After numerous conversations with Army officials, the Johnson family strongly believes the military investigation into their daughter's death was flawed and that officials failed to address many questions surrounding her death. The evidence presented by her remains, as well as family members' knowledge and communications with Pfc. Johnson prior to her death, cause her family to doubt the cause of death reported by military officials.

According to her family the wounds displayed on the body of Pfc. Johnson, and her missing personal effects, suggest that she was a murder victim. It appears to the Johnson family, and we share their concern, that military investigators may have drawn an immediate conclusion that Pfc. Johnson died $^{(b)(6)}$ and then proceeded to conduct an investigation intended to support this assumption. The family has questioned why there was no medical test conducted to determine whether Pfc. Johnson may have been the victim of a sexual assault. They have also questioned whether there were any medical or psychological records, or even anecdotal reports, to support the notion that Pfc. Johnson may have been suffering from stress, depression or any other mental condition that might have led her to take her own life.

Prior to her death, Pfc. Johnson did not give any indication that she might act ^{(b)(6)} She was by all accounts known to be a strong individual and a committed soldier. She was by all accounts known to be a strong, hard working, well-adjusted individual and a committed solider with a very bright future. The known facts about her life and her passing suggest that she was more likely the victim of a violent death than the assertion that she was actually responsible for ^{(b)(6)}

The Johnson family believes that military officials did not conduct a complete and through investigation into the true circumstances of her death and that she may have been a homicide victim. We share their concerns and hope that you will immediately take action to re-open the investigation to ensure that all of the questions raised by Pfc. Johnson's family be thoroughly investigated and reported.

Dear Secretary Rumsfeld:

We are writing to you in regard to the study the Department of Defense is undertaking to examine the impact windmill farms have on our nation's military readiness. We believe the report should not only detail the impacts that wind projects have on military radar systems, but also thoroughly examine the effective technologies that are available to mitigate any potential interference problems.

As you know, Senator John Warner (R-VA) added a provision to the FY06 National Defense Authorization Act that required the Department of Defense (DOD) to study and report on the effects of wind projects on military readiness. Subsequently, the DOD issued a joint interim policy with the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), which officially created the "DOD Wind Farm Action Team" and tasked it with the responsibility of preparing and submitting a final report to Congress. While the language in the Defense Authorization Act directs the DOD to submit the final report no later than 120 days after its enactment on January 6, 2006, it is our understanding that your team may delay issuing it until sometime later this summer.

It also is our understanding that technologies exist to successfully mitigate interference that wind turbines may have on military radar systems. We certainly agree that Senator Warner's provision clearly requires you to assess "...technologies that could mitigate any adverse effects on military operations...", but we want to stress the importance of analyzing the technologies that developers have used – and are using – in the U.S. and abroad.

More specifically, we would find it extremely useful to learn from your report what mitigation technologies and practices are currently available, how and where some have been used, their successes and limitations, what types of new mitigation technologies are being developed, and an analysis of the potential costs to developers or federal departments to deploy them.

No U.S. wind project has ever been cancelled solely because of its impact on civilian or military radar systems. This is largely because developers, the DOD, and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), have historically worked closely together on proposed wind projects to utilize technologies and practices that mitigate any interference problems. We believe these mitigation efforts have worked well and will continue to do so as long as the DOD continues its good faith effort to work with developers - not against them. It is our hope that your report will discuss the importance of continuing this cooperative relationship between the DOD, FAA and wind project developers when examining the use of mitigation technologies.



Developing clean, renewable resources is a priority for many Members of Congress and wind power will undoubtedly be a large part of our energy future. Therefore, we also encourage you to hold a Congressional briefing on this issue prior to submitting the report so that Members and PRINTED ON RECYCLED PAPER

staff can provide you with additional insight about what is occurring in their congressional districts to develop more renewable sources of energy. Additional input from Congress will help improve the quality of the final product and provide us with a blueprint for developing future wind projects in a manner that addresses DOD concerns.

We certainly recognize and respect the paramount importance of any concern relating to national security, but we strongly encourage you to submit a report that not only thoroughly details the impacts of wind projects on military radar systems, but also presents workable solutions. Efforts to increase our energy security through the development of domestic, renewable resources only complement efforts to increase our national security and sustain our military's readiness. Thank you in advance for your attention to the requests detailed above and we look forward to a prompt response.

This initiative will preserve the production capabilities of this National Resource/Asset, and the Defense Infrastructure for future potential USAF buys, while enabling the establishment of a new all-cargo carrier within the US Commercial Airline Industry. We as a nation must currently rely on Russian and other AN-124 aircraft if the DoD Assets are over tasked or if Commercial Industry must move Oversized and overweight cargo by air. There should be a US Commercial Airlift alternative. This is in our National Security and Economic Security Interests.

I appeal to all of the decision makers at all levels within the Boeing Company, and within the Department of Defense and US Air Force, to promote this move. This well developed proposal encompasses several vital areas of national interest, both economic and strategic. Boeing has the opportunity to sell aircraft and to preserve options for their Stockholders. It will continue to provide countless jobs throughout their supply chain. We are writing to express our deep concern over the Joint Common Missile (JCM) program. It has come to our attention that the Department of Defense is withholding spending authority for both fiscal year 2006 and 2007 funding. Furthermore, recent reports indicate that the Department is considering recompeting the program, even though the program continues to support the needs of the warfighter and remains on budget.

The Joint Common Missile fills a critical capability gap in both Army and Navy missile technology. Moreover, JCM will eliminate current missile shortfalls in the moving target, day/night, adverse weather, and countermeasure environments. It represents a leap in warfighting potential and is a prime example of the Department of Defense's transformational and jointness goals.

While Program Budget Decision 753 terminated the Joint Common Missile in December 2004, Congress restored \$30 million for the program in both fiscal years 2006 and 2007. The JCM is a viable and executable program that Congress clearly believes should remain intact. With the JCM requirement being recently revalidated by the Joint Requirements Oversight Council in July, the program has consistently and continuously proven itself.

It appears to us that the Department is ignoring the cost and performance benefits of an advanced missile system that meets current and future requirements for multiple Services. The JCM program remains on budget and if funded adequately and in a timely manner, on schedule. It must be continued. Further delaying or recompeting the program does not make sense for either the warfighter or the taxpayer.

We respectfully request you promptly act to fulfill congressional intent in maintaining the Joint Common Missile program. Our sole objective must be to provide

the warfighter with the best equipment possible. The JCM represents the future in

I was recently made aware of an issue regarding the potential mobilization and deployment of several Air National Guard RC-26 aircraft in support of Special Operations Command missions in the Middle East and thought it important to share my concerns with you. As you know, these highly capable aircraft are currently being used to provide law enforcement officials with valuable information during counter-narcotic missions along our nation's border. As such, the demand for the nation's eleven RC-26s is very high.

While I can fully appreciate how useful these aircraft might be to the important missions that Special Operations Command (SOCOM) performs overseas, I wanted to share my concerns about the potential for diminished law enforcement capability along our nation's border. The RC-26 has proven itself to be an essential asset in defeating drug smugglers, assisting in disaster relief operations and aiding our first responders in the execution of their duties. Other aircraft such as the P-3 Orion aircraft may be able to meet the demands that SOCOM has for aerial reconnaissance in the Middle East.

I am hopeful that you and your staff will consider the critical homeland security missions that the RC-26 performs for our nation when weighing a decision to deploy these aircraft overseas. With other airborne reconnaissance assets available to SOCOM, I am confident that we can work together to keep the RC-26 focused on the important role of defending our nation's borders.

Veterans and members of the armed services from our districts and across the country have expressed to us their concerns about the increased incidence of Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (Lou Gehrig's disease, or ALS) occurring in those who have served in the military. On behalf of these brave men and women, we the undersigned Members of Congress urge you to increase the Department's support for ALS research and request that you consider establishing a more coordinated approach to advancing ALS research at the Department of Defense.

As you may know, studies repeatedly have shown that military veterans are at a greater risk of dying from ALS than those with no history of military service. In fact, studies supported by the DOD and the Department of Veterans Affairs have found that veterans of the 1991 Persian Gulf War are approximately twice as likely to develop ALS as those who did not serve in the war, while another study conducted by researchers at Harvard University in 2005 found that people with any history of military service are at a 60% greater risk of developing ALS than those in the general population. The Institute of Medicine (IOM) recently reviewed these and other studies and reported in November 2006 that existing evidence supports the increased risk of ALS for veterans. According to the IOM, "[T]he implication is that military service in general - not confined to exposures specific to the Gulf War - is related to the development of ALS. The findings, if validated in other studies, suggest that exposures during military service, even among those with no wartime service, might be responsible."

Despite this evidence, only about \$2 million in funding per year is focused on ALS research - a small amount given the direct impact this disease has on our heroes who serve in the military. Therefore, we urge the Department to allocate additional resources for ALS research within the funds Congress provides to the Defense Health Program.

We are aware that the Department has funded ALS research through the Peer Reviewed Medical Research Program, the Military Operational Medicine Program and the Neurotoxin Exposure Treatment Research Program. These programs have enabled important ALS research to move forward. However, we believe the Department should consider establishing a more focused and coordinated approach to studying ALS so that it can effectively direct ALS research initiatives. We also encourage the Department to partner on ALS research with other federal agencies, including the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke and the Department of Veterans Affairs, which has established a Veterans ALS Registry that has identified nearly 2,000 veterans with ALS.

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We strongly believe that this collaboration, combined with increased support from funds available to the Department, can help to determine why our veterans are more likely to die from ALS. As a result, we can help ensure that our nation takes appropriate action to protect the health and lives of our military men and women who each day risk their own lives in defense of this country. Importantly, research supported by the DOD, also will yield information and data about ALS that will benefit all people suffering from the disease and will help us make progress in finding a treatment and cure.

On behalf of our constituents and veterans with ALS across the country, we urge you to support this important research and look forward to working with you in support of our nation's servicemen and women and the greater ALS community.

I want to call to your attention a problem of the referenced veteran getting paid what he is owed. My initial inquiry to Defense Finance and Accounting Service on his behalf was in March, 2006. I am enclosing the response from DFAS dated May 19, 2006, to that initial inquiry, and their response to the followup inquiry over a year later, dated June 5, 2007.

I must admit that my concern is how many other disabled retirees are not getting paid. I do not want another response from DFAS, but rather a response from you on how this problem is going to be addressed. Their second response that "due to the complexity of CPT is retroactive DVA account, we are unable to provide him with any specific information for it at this time," is unacceptable. What is so different about his situation than hundreds of others with the same scenario?

Secretary Gates, over a year is much longer than these veterans/retirees should expect to have to wait because the agency charged with making the payments have not been able to work out the problems. If there is something that Congress needs to address, please let us know.

We applaud the recent commitment the Department of Defense (DoD) made in reprogramming the funds to deploy to the field as many Mine Resistant Ambush Protected (MRAP) vehicles as quickly as possible. As evidenced by the successful deployment of the Cougar, these vehicles are crucial to protecting the members of our Armed Forces. We encourage you to take advantage of the opportunity you now have and award a contract that will allow for able companies to maximize their production capabilities.

Two companies with a presence in South Carolina stand ready to produce as many vehicles as the Department needs to protect our men and women in the field. Since April, Force Protection, manufacturer of the Cougar, has been producing 100 MRAPs per month. To date they have sent approximately 600 MRAPs to theatre. Recently, Protected Vehicles Inc. (PVI), manufacturer of the GOLAN, passed four Electronic Force Penetrator (EFP) tests at Aberdeen Proving Ground and have proven that they should be given every opportunity to receive a long term contract to produce these vehicles that are so desperately needed by our brave men and women currently deployed in Iraq and Afghanistan.

We encourage you to capitalize on the potential of these companies to produce vehicles for theatre by awarding a larger procurement contract. The lack of a larger MRAP contract not only delays the number of vehicles that are deployed to the field, but also poses significant problems for the companies that produce them. For example, if PVI does not receive word on a contract soon, they will be forced to layoff workers and potentially close their doors. A loss like this would be detrimental to those dependent on MRAP vehicles in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Again, we encourage you to provide some certainty to our men and women in the field and those producing the vehicles for their protection. We look forward to working with you to ensure that these vehicles arrive in theatre as soon as possible.

The Alabama Congressional Delegation is deeply concerned with the July 16, 2007, recommendation made by the Joint Requirements Oversight Council Memorandum (JROCM) that the Air Force be named as the Executive Agent for Medium and High Altitude Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS).

If implemented, this recommendation will have dire consequences on the military's ability to meet the warfighter's unmanned aviation requirements and it would jeopardize the Army's rapidly emerging manned/unmanned combat teaming efforts that are proving so successful in Iraq.

The Army is the established service leader in the evolutionary development and deployment of UASs. Any changes to the military's unmanned aviation programs would slow this evolutionary process and would ultimately harm the warfighter. To place the Air Force as the Executive Agent of UAS management and acquisition would significantly slow down the rapid growth of this field while wasting the over \$2.28 billion dollars that has already been invested in these programs. Additionally, an Air Force Executive Agency would negate the past successes of the Army's PEO for Aviation, located at Redstone Arsenal, which has become the primary location for the procurement of UAS air vehicles, ground control stations and logistical support for members of the Navy, Marines, and Special Operations Command (SOCOM).

Currently in Iraq, the Army is flying the majority of all UAS missions, and the success of these combined air and ground operations has proven highly effective in protecting the lives of our soldiers. The Army has over 1,200 UASs operating in Iraq, with 350 in the skies at any one time providing surveillance to our ground forces. The Air Force argues that their Executive Agency would create successful interoperability between the service branches. However, successful interoperability already exists. The Army has already flown over 350,000 highly successful flight hours and currently maintains high levels of interoperability with the Navy and Marines in Iraq.

Ultimately, the decision to establish the Air Force as the Executive Agent of Medium and High Altitude Unmanned Aerial Systems (MHA UAS) will limit the future growth of UAS programs and impact the warfighter's ability to perform operations in the Global War on Terror. We appreciate your involvement in this important matter and we look forward to hearing from you in the future.

monetary reward that is supposed to accompany such an award upon retirement from active duty. I find this very disturbing.

SECNAV INSTRUCTION 1650.32 (attached), dated 23 June 1969 and signed by Senator John Warner while he was Under Secretary of the Navy, under item <u>3. Authority</u>, states: "10 U.S.C. 6330 provides that each enlisted member of the Regular Navy or Regular Marine Corps who is transferred to the Fleet Reserve or Fleet Marine Corps Reserve under this section and who has been credited by the Secretary of the Navy with extraordinary heroism in line of duty, is entitled to an increase of 10 percent in his retainer pay". It continues, "Reference (a) further states that the determination of extraordinary heroism by the Secretary of the Navy is final and conclusive for all purposes."

Under item <u>4. Discussion</u>, it states "An affirmative determination that extraordinary heroism was involved will now be made by the Secretary of the Navy at the time the award is processed". Secretary England, it appears that was done as indicated in the citation from you. The rest of that paragraph appears to deal with "Awards approved by delegated authorities." Since the citation was not signed by a delegated authority, I believe that the action recently taken by the Board (NDBDM) was a misinterpretation of this Instruction. I can see nothing in the law or SECNAV Instruction that gives anyone authority to deny the recipient the monetary reward once the Secretary certifies extraordinary heroism. I will find it difficult to believe there could be any other reason to deny such a small reward, established by law, to such a deserving person.

We are writing to express concern over the Joint Air-to-Ground Missile (JAOM) program. It has come to our attention that the follow-on program to the terminated Joint Common Missile (JCM) is delayed, keeping this vital capability out of the hands of our warfighters.

On March 1, 2007, we met with you and Secretary Ken Krieg to discuss the JCM program. During the meeting, you indicated your intent to cancel JCM even though the program was on cost, on schedule, and performing well. To fill the critical capability gap in both Army and Navy missile technology left by the delayed and then terminated JCM, it was announced that JAGM would be the follow-on program and a competition would immediately commence.

It is our understanding that the JAGM program is now delayed due to issues with the joint acquisition strategy. The Office of the Secretary of Defense (OSD) Acquisition Technology and Logistics (AT&L) apparently wants to downselect to at least two contractors, adding significant cost and delay to a program that is immediately needed. It is also our understanding that the Army and Navy disagree with this strategy. We do not leel this would be the best course of action and urge you to quickly release the JAGM Request for Proposal based on the parameters outlined to us by OSD AT&L earlier this year.

Our global commitments continue to expand to meet an ever-increasing and diverse threat. Having adequate equipment to combat the threat is not sufficient for our Armed Forces. Because we never want to have a fair fight, we know you will agree that our military needs the best equipment that the U.S. can produce. This replacement missile will make the warfighter infinitely more capable than he is today.

We respectfully request that you act quickly on the aforementioned request as the Department of Defense proceeds with the competition on the Joint Air-to-Ground Missile program. We thank you for your time and look forward to hearing from you soon.

On August 24, 2007, you received a memo from John Young, Director of Defense Research and Engineering. We support the views expressed by Mr. Young in his memo and urge you to take those views into account when considering your budget request for Fiscal Year 2009.

As Mr. Young notes, investments in Department of Defense (DoD) Science & Technology (S&T) programs, and particularly in foundational or basic science programs, are most often the investments that lead to groundbreaking advancements in our warfighting capabilities. DoD support for these programs is also vital to training U.S. students in science and engineering fields critical to our future national defense. Despite its importance, the DoD S&T budget has increased at a far slower rate than the DoD RDT&E budget. Furthermore, foundational science has been reduced to less than 15 percent of the total S&T budget in recent years, a level which historically exceeded 20 percent of the S&T budget.

The concerns described by Mr. Young echo the concerns laid out by yourself and other members of the Augustine Commission in the 2005 report *Rising Above the Gathering Storm*. In his memo, Mr. Young states that "The last decade of growth in acquisition and advanced research and development has drawn upon a reservoir of knowledge and technology developed by S&T investment - analogous to draining a pool. In the rest of the world, there has been a resurgence of S&T investment." Accelerated investments in S&T programs in other countries require us to redouble our own efforts in this area.

We agree with Mr. Young's conclusion that "some increase in the Defense Department's early phase S&T program is merited by the combination of technology opportunities, the diversification of the threat, and the decline in corporate research investment." Although we recognize that the specific program funding levels suggested

We understand that the Department of Defense is considering ceasing production of the F-22A Raptor following completion of the current multi-year procurement contract. We believe such a decision would be ill-advised and premature, given the recapitalization shortfalls facing our US Air Force and the rapidly emerging airborne and surface-to-air threats facing our nation's military.

The F-22A Raptor is exceeding all expectations in operational performance as well as production schedule and quality. The USAF urgently needs to replace approximately 500 1970-80's vintage F-15A-D Eagles. Despite the AF's oft-stated minimum requirement for 381, we note that DoD's program of record 183 total is not supported by any rigorous campaign-based analysis assessing the tuost stressing scenarios and rapidly growing threats. Rather, it has been reported that at least three independent studies commissioned by DoD recommended procuring significantly more than 220 Raptors because of its singularly unique capability to overwhelm all air and surfaceto-air threats.

Meanwhile, it has recently been reported that three near-peer potential adversaries are busy co-developing two different stealth, twin-engine, high-altitude, Raptor-like fighters. Terminating the Raptor program at such a crucial and uncertain time only further encourages our potential adversaries to continue down this path. It also risks abandoning our AF's unique ability to deter aggressive actions and when called upon, dominate the airspace over our global allies, interests and deployed troops.

Furthermore, the F-22A Raptor is the world's only 5th Generation Fighter line currently in full-rate production. Over 25,000 Americans working for 1000 suppliers in 44 states manufacture this unique national asset. These are highly technical jobs that represent the leading edge of our nation's acrospace industry. Additionally, it is estimated another 70,000+ Americans owe their jobs indirectly to this program.

We urge you to continue procurement of the F-22A Raptor by including sufficient funds in the FY09 budget request to procure long-lead items for an additional lot of planes, beyond the current multi-year contract. We believe any decision to terminate production of this aircraft at such an early stage is more appropriately deferred until completion of the 2009 Quadrennial Defense Review which will assess surrent and former threats and meanmend the parameters.

For each of the last two years, the United States Air Force (USAF) has not funded any C-17s in the President's budget submission. USAF leaders have expressed concerns during recent Congressional hearings regarding their inability to procure additional C-17s and have asked the House of Representative to add funding for C-17s during the appropriations process. While this approach was successful last year and may work again this year, there is widespread dissatisfaction in the House with this strategy. We instead are strongly urging that the USAF and DoD fully fund C-17 production in their FY 09 budget submission.

Failure to fund the C-17 will mean the loss of over 30,000 jobs in the U.S., loss of the nation's large military airplane industrial base, and will result in our loss of leadership in this area to Europe. Reopening the C-17 production line, if the DoD discovers it needs additional C-17s in the future, will cost billions and take years.

The USAF and DoD must continue to fund C-17s until all of the Department's on-going and planned airlift studies are complete and requirements are understood. We strongly urge you to fully fund 15 C-17s in the FY 09 budget submission. The approach used in the last two years – no funds but a last minute appeal to the Congress – will result in a strong negative response.

We need your commitment that you will do all you can to find C-17 in the FY09 budget. We also request that if you cannot fully fund C-17s, additional aircraft must at least be at the top of your unfunded priority list at number one. The C-17 line is truly on the verge of shutting down – this would be a terrible outcome for the DoD and the nation.

The Congressional Rotorcraft Caucus is concerned about the lack of a strategic plan for improving the state of vertical lift aircraft in the United States. We understand that several studies conducted within the Department of Defense (ORCA, NFWA, JVATF), as well as the most recent Defense Science Board study on the Future Need for VTOL/STOL aircraft, have pointed to the need for a strategic plan and increased investment. At a time when vertical lift aircraft are increasingly committed and challenged throughout the world in the Global War on Terror, particularly in Iraq and Afghanistan, the level of investment and innovation still does not match pressing national security needs.

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Accordingly, we request that the Secretary of Defense and the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff conduct and provide the House Armed Services Committee (HASC), the Senate Armed Services Committee (SASC), the House Defense Appropriations Subcommittee (HACD) and the Senate Defense Appropriations Subcommittee (SACD) with the results of a Capabilities-Based Assessment (CBA) that outlines a joint approach to the future development of vertical lift aircraft for all of the military services. The CBA should include the development of a strategic plan that covers the following:

(1) an emphasis on the development of common service requirements;

(2) a technology roadmap;

- (3) a detailed science and technology investment and implementation plan and the resources required to implement it; and
- (4) a detailed plan to establish a Joint Vertical Lift Aircraft Office based on lessons learned from the Joint Advanced Strike Technology (JAST) Office.

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It is our hope that the results of the report will be used by the authorization and appropriations committees to develop a national investment strategy for vertical lift aviation that capitalizes on the best practices of the TACAIR community and funds the development of the next generation of vertical lift aviation.
