The Chamber has created a new Education Steering Committee to support the HREGI strategy which addresses the special needs of local K-12 school systems. Don Nalley will chair this new Chamber committee.

Madison County's total labor force has increased by 6.85% to 171,327 during the past 12 months. We continue to conduct workforce recruitment efforts focused on engineering and technical talent, with upcoming events in Huntsville, Atlanta and St. Louis.

The Chamber's new Technology Committee, chaired by John Gully, has established six subcommittees. State Representative Phil Williams, who heads the new House of Representatives Science and Technology Committee, recently met with the Chamber's Technology Committee. The Chamber has also provided support to Representative Williams' "Business First" roundtable event at UAHuntsville.

SES recently cut the ribbon on its new Huntsville International Aviation Hangar Facility in Jetplex Industrial Park. Willbrook Solutions, a provider of systems analysis and test and evaluation services, cut the ribbon on its new office facility in Cummings Research Park. Upcoming Chamber economic development marketing events include participation in the National Space Symposium in Colorado Springs, the Army Aviation Association of America annual convention in Nashville, and the International Council of Shopping Centers Gulf South Retail Conference.

The Chamber's industrial prospect activity has increased. Projects and inquiries we are working now include such industry sectors as automotive, solar, robotics and aerospace.

Member companies set a record this year with 152 participating in the Chamber's annual Wage Survey.

The Chamber's annual Montgomery trip will take place March 22-23. The 2011 State Agenda has been submitted to the board of directors and will be discussed at tomorrow's board meeting. Our annual Washington, D.C. trip will be May 22-24, and our 2011 Federal Agenda has also been submitted to the board and will be discussed tomorrow. Over 1,000 people are registered to attend our annual Washington Update breakfast with Senator Shelby, scheduled for March 7 at the VBC.

The February issue of Business Alabama magazine included a focus on Huntsville's increasing role as a U.S leader in the world of international weapons sales. The 2011 Alabama Economic Development Guide includes numerous articles about Huntsville, including such topics as Marshall Space Flight Center's 50 years of space exploration, robotics manufacturing research and training, the North Alabama International Trade Association, biotechnology, aerospace, automotive, and information technology. Huntsville will be named to a top 10 list of pro-business communities in the March/April issue of Southern Business & Development magazine.

Recent and upcoming Chamber events include a Business After Hours on February 24 at The Zone in Bridge Street, and a new member lunch, which is being rescheduled to next month. Our March Breakfast & Biz meeting will take place on March 30 at 7:00 a.m. at the Four Points Sheraton Hotel.

Spending Cuts Set to Start Rolling

The Republican effort to roll back non-security discretionary spending to 2008 levels officially gets started this week with the return of House lawmakers from their one-week recess.

House Republicans on Tuesday will set their new, enforceable spending limits for fiscal 2011, and later in the week unveil their package to cut spending for the remainder of the year. House Budget Chairman Paul D. Ryan, R-Wis., last week announced the new discretionary spending cap he will enter into the Congressional Record — \$1.055 trillion, a \$32 billion reduction from the annualized spending level under the stopgap resolution currently funding the government. Ryan's cap assumes a \$41 billion reduction in non-security spending (i.e., programs other than defense, homeland security and veterans), while providing a nominal increase for security spending. The new cap is intended to reduce non-security spending to 2008 levels for the final seven months of the fiscal year. The current CR expires March 4.

House Appropriations that same day will adopt spending allocations for each of the 12 individual bills, which determine the level of cuts each domestic spending bill will incur. Panel Chairman Harold Rogers, R-Ky., last week previewed those so-called 302(b) allocations, and GOP appropriators have been working for weeks to identify specific program cuts for each bill. Rogers later this week expects to release a draft of the CR extension that will reflect those spending cuts, in preparation for House floor action on the measure next week. No committee markup of the legislation is expected, and GOP leaders haven't yet announced whether a full Defense spending will be considered. The Center on Budget and Policy Priorities on Friday released an analysis of the proposed spending caps, noting that while on average non-security spending for the remainder of the fiscal year would be cut by more than 15 percent, discretionary spending for some bills would be cut much more deeply. Transportation-HUD programs, for instance, face a 26 percent cut, with Agriculture to be cut 24 percent, and Energy-Water cut 20 percent.

The eventuality of an initial House-Senate stalemate over spending cuts was evident last week in the reactions of Senate Democrats and Republicans to the House GOP proposal. Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., called the GOP plans "unworkable" while Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., said in a radio interview that all Senate Republicans would support whatever cuts the House passes. Conservative House Republicans will be trying to cut non-security spending further when the bill is considered by the House, arguing that Republicans should cut the full \$100 billion below the president's request as they pledged in last year's elections (the House caps would reduce spending to \$58 billion below the request). A group of GOP senators last week called for the House to go further still, writing to Speaker John A. Boehner, R-Ohio, that total spending cuts for the current year should be "no less than \$100 billion" — significantly deeper than the \$32 billion reduction set by Ryan's cap. "Since the Democrats still control the Senate, we need the House-passed CR to be as bold as possible in order to strengthen the hand of Senate conservatives in increasing or maintaining spending reductions," wrote the 11 GOP senators.

Senate Majority Whip Richard J. Durbin, D-Ill., last week admitted some cuts would occur, and a vote on repealing a tax-reporting requirement appeared to show a willingness among many Senate Democrats to cut spending. In that instance, the Senate last week voted 81-17 to waive a budget point of order against a Debbie Stabenow, D-Mich., amendment to the FAA reauthorization bill to remove the unpopular "1099" tax-reporting requirement from the 2010 health care overhaul — an amendment whose costs were offset by \$44 billion in rescissions of unobligated discretionary funds. Democrats voted 34-17 to waive the point of order (signaling their support for the amendment), despite opposition from Appropriations Chairman Daniel K. Inouye, D-Hawaii, who objected in part because OMB would decide the cuts. "How can anyone stand here and claim that we can cut \$44 billion and not have it hurt our states and our constituents?" Inouye said, noting that it was equal to total funding for the Homeland Security Department. McConnell in his radio interview said that in seeking support for the House GOP cuts, the question was "how many of the 23 Democrats up [for re-election in 2012] are going to crack and come over and join us to significantly reduce spending."

EDGING NEAR DANGEROUS POLITICAL WATERS?: High deficits and growing debt have nearly all lawmakers saying that Congress must soon take action to address the problem, but most so far appear reluctant to take any action involving the primary drivers of future fiscal imbalances — the major entitlements.

Republicans are largely waiting to see whether President Obama will take the lead in working on a long-term fiscal solution, starting with his fiscal 2012 budget proposal. A growing number of senators on both sides of the aisle are discussing the issue, led by the four senators who served on the president's fiscal commission, and Virginia Democrat Mark Warner and Georgia Republican Saxby Chambliss are drafting legislation to implement the recommendations of the fiscal commission. But Obama said little regarding the subject in his State of the Union, leading top Senate Budget Republican Jeff Sessions of Alabama to say, "There is zero chance of entitlement reform if the president is not for it. If he's not in the game, we might as well quit." The new GOP majority in the House also has been largely silent on the issue, even though tackling the growth of entitlement spending has long been a conservative

mantra. There is growing talk, however, that the fiscal 2012 budget resolution that will be put together by House Budget Chairman Ryan will call for overhauling Medicare to convert it largely into a voucher system. Democrats also remain uneasy regarding any need to modify entitlements, with many liberals rallying to fight possible cuts.

While most the current focus of budget-cutting has been on non-security discretionary spending, lawmakers have indicated that two high-priority areas could soon face the budget knife: intelligence and veterans' programs. Both of those areas have seen dramatic increases in spending over the past decade after the 9/11 terrorist attacks, as the nation engaged in two wars. Leaders of the Senate Intelligence Committee last week warned that cuts were likely for the intelligence budget, which increased from around \$30 billion prior to 9/11 to \$80.1 billion in fiscal 2010. And despite the two wars, lawmakers have made it clear that the Veterans Affairs Department will be lucky to hold its budget near current levels, with some key players saying the VA could see painful cuts in coming years. Florida Republican Jeff Miller, the new chairman of the House Veterans' Affairs Committee, noted that veterans' programs are not part of current efforts to cut discretionary spending, "But I believe that as we move forward, everything needs to be on the table." America's veterans, Miller argues, "are willing to sacrifice again as long as everybody else does the same."

BUDGET DEADLINE? YES, BUT ...: This being the first Monday in February, today is the deadline by which President Obama is legally required to submit his budget plan to Congress for the next fiscal year. But the administration, of course, has already said that the budget won't be released until next Monday, Feb. 14. Not to worry about that legal deadline, however. Since there is no sanction for missing it, presidents in the past have occasionally missed that target date (with new presidents in their initial couple months in office almost always submitting their first budgets much later). But that doesn't mean the administration won't submit something to Congress today regarding its budget. Past presidents who missed the first-Monday-in-February deadline often submitted instead a message regarding their budget — messages that both act as a "placeholder" for the budget and allow the administration to technically comply with the legal deadline. OMB on Friday did not respond to inquiries as to whether such a message would be sent to Congress today.

SENATE APPROPRIATIONS ANNOUNCES SUBCOMMITTEE LINEUPS: The Senate Appropriations Committee on Friday announced subcommittee memberships for the 112th Congress, including the chairmen and ranking Republicans on each of the 12 spending panels.

On the Democratic side, California's Dianne Feinstein as expected gave up her gavel on Interior-Environment to take the chairmanship of the Energy-Water Subcommittee, a post that opened because of the retirement of North Dakota's Byron L. Dorgan. That allowed Rhode Island's Jack Reed to snag the Interior chairmanship, while Louisiana's Mary L. Landrieu took over the helm of the Homeland Security Subcommittee, replacing Frank R. Lautenberg of New Jersey. Lautenberg served as interim chairman of that panel after the death of Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va. All other returning subcommittee chairmen retained their posts. In a statement announcing her new position on Energy-Water, Feinstein noted the panel's importance to her home state of California, highlighting Energy Department funding for national labs and universities, climate change research, and renewable energy development, and Bureau of Reclamation and Army Corps of Engineers activities focused water supply issues, levee safety and ecosystem restoration.

The departure of five Republicans from Appropriations resulted in massive shuffling on the GOP side, with five returning senators shifting to the top Republican spots on other subcommittees and just one sticking with his existing post — top GOP appropriator Thad Cochran of Mississippi, who will remain ranking Republican on Defense. The five who switched to new ranking posts, in order of seniority, are: Alabama's Richard C. Shelby, who is now the top Republican on Labor-HHS-Education (vacating the Commerce-Justice-Science post); Texan Kay Bailey Hutchison, who moved to C-J-S (leaving Military Construction-VA); Tennessee's Lamar Alexander, who took the top spot on Energy-Water (moving from Interior); Maine's Susan Collins, who is now ranking on Transportation-HUD (leaving Financial Services); and Alaska's Lisa Murkowski, who moved to Interior (vacating Legislative Branch). Alexander's move from Interior to Energy-Water means he will remain paired up with California's Dianne Feinstein as panel leaders.

Six of the seven GOP senators who are new on Appropriations also assumed ranking positions on subcommittees, including five of the freshman senators. South Carolina's Lindsey Graham, the only new appropriator who was in the Senate in the last Congress, is now the ranking member on State-Foreign Operations. Meanwhile, Mark Steven Kirk of Illinois, who sat on the Appropriations Committee in the House, takes the top spot on MilCon-VA; Indiana's Dan Coats becomes ranking on Homeland Security; Roy Blunt of Missouri becomes top Republican on Agriculture; Kansan Jerry Moran takes the top spot on Financial Services; and North Dakota's John Hoeven is ranking on Legislative Branch. Freshman Ron Johnson of Wisconsin is the lone GOP newcomer not to receive a ranking member position.

SUBJECT: Back ground information on Raytheon's ground breaking ceremony scheduled for March 7 at 10 a.m.

BACKGROUND: In July of last year, Raytheon announced they planned to build a production facility on Redstone Arsenal. They got Senator Shelby and Governor Riley's interest and support, and there were incentives for them to build the facility here on Redstone. The Garrison is in the process of getting the final approval by the Army office of DA Installation and Housing Office, and they expect that approval to occur shortly, and thus they can support a ground breaking ceremony on March 7.

The facility will cost in excess of \$70M (use of robotics) and probably employ about 150 to 300 employees. Raytheon will manufacture SM-3's and SM-6's. They expect to have phase I of the facility ready to go by the end of this calendar year. It will be located near Gate 3.

(b)(6) is the top Raytheon VIP that will be hosting the ground breaking ceremony. The Garrison will have their Commander and their AMCOM General as part of the ceremony. The ceremony is expected to be about 30 minutes long. It will be near the site of where the building is to be constructed, and there will be an estimated crowd of about 75 to 100. No invites have been issued as first the Army has to approve the deal.

This is a 50 year lease. After that the facility will be given to the Army. The building will be about 70,000 square feet.

Phase 1 will be built to produce SM-6s and SM-3s. They see this as a long term production facility.

OTHER INFORMATION:

Senator Shelby has committed to being here on March 7th. He has a Town Hall meeting in Huntsville that morning.

Raytheon is working on who they should invite from the Navy for the SM-6 program.

Raytheon wants to web cast the event for their companies and for the trade media. This may be available to our MDA Team and employees.

Raytheon may bring their exhibit people from the DC area for a show and tell of their models of the SM-6 and SM-3.

Raytheon will prepare and issue Media Advisory and News Release; will also developed a press kit

Raytheon has committed to hiring initially about 150 people and could grow that to 300 people and that depends on contracts, and this is also the basis for building Phase II

NASA has to keep defunct Ares rocket program going

The agency will spend nearly \$500 million on the canceled program because Congress chose to extend the 2010 budget, which requires such funding.

Thanks to congressional inaction, NASA must continue to fund its defunct Ares I rocket program until March, a requirement that will cost the agency nearly \$500 million at a time when it is struggling with the expensive task of replacing the space shuttle.

About a third of that money, \$165 million, will go to Alliant Techsystems, or ATK, which has a \$2-billion contract to build the solid-rocket first stage for the Ares I, which was supposed to fill the shuttle's role of transporting astronauts to the International Space Station.

But under a new NASA plan signed into law by President Obama in October, there's no guarantee that the new rocket required by that plan will use solid-fuel propulsion. And many in the agency say a liquid-fueled rocket would be cheaper, more powerful — and safer.

The money to ATK is part of the \$1.2 billion NASA will spend on its canceled Constellation program from Oct. 1 through March. Most of the rest will go to Lockheed Martin Corp., which is building the Orion capsule intended to take astronauts into space aboard whatever rocket NASA selects. That program was largely spared by the new NASA plan.

What's more, constraints on NASA spending resulting from congressional budget gridlock will delay the scheduled start this year of a program to modernize aging facilities at Kennedy Space Center in Florida to transform it into a "21st century spaceport." It's now unclear when the program will begin.

The odd scenario, in which NASA is throwing money at a canceled rocket program but can't fund a modernization program, is because of several twists in the legislative process that started a year ago and came to a head this month.

At the root of the problem is a 70-word sentence inserted into the 2010 budget by lawmakers seeking to protect Ares I jobs in their home states that bars NASA from shutting down the program until Congress passed a new budget a year later.

That should have happened before the Oct. 1 start of the federal fiscal year.

But Congress never passed a 2011 budget and instead voted this month to extend the 2010 budget until March, so NASA still must abide by the 2010 language.

That means NASA and its contractors are required to keep building Ares I, even though Obama in effect killed it when he signed the new NASA plan that canceled the Constellation moon program begun under President George W. Bush.

"It would be nice if Congress did its work," said John Logsdon, a space expert at George Washington University. "I would not be surprised if there was a combination of frustration and anger [at NASA]. They want to get on carrying out a good space program."

According to NASA, the agency has been spending an average of \$95 million a month on Ares I. At that rate, it will spend about \$475 million from Oct. 1 to March 4, the period covered by the current budget extension.

The language that keeps Constellation going was inserted into the 2010 budget last year by Sen. Richard C. Shelby (R-Ala.), who sought to protect the program and Ares jobs at Marshall Space Flight Center in his home state.

His office confirmed that the language was still in effect but did not respond to e-mails seeking details.

NASA officials, however, said the Ares I money wouldn't necessarily be wasted.

The new space plan approved by Congress calls for the construction of a new so-called heavy-lift rocket that would use solid-rocket engineering.

"Much of the Ares I work likely will be directly applicable to a heavy-lift vehicle if a shuttle-derived architecture is selected, including five-segment boosters, tank structures, upper-stage engine and avionics," said Michael Cabbage, a NASA spokesman.

Indeed, ATK plans to continue work at its Utah plant.

"To the best of our understanding, there has been no change in direction and we are aligning our resources and capabilities to support NASA in the development of a new heavy-lift capability," said Bryce Hallowell, spokesman for ATK of Minnesota.

The new NASA plan — developed after months of debate between Congress and the White House — favors an Ares I-type design by requiring use of "shuttle-derived" components, including solid-rocket motors. But some NASA engineers — and, reportedly, Shelby, reflecting the preferences of engineers at Marshall — favor a liquid-fueled rocket.

Such a rocket, they say, would be cheaper, more powerful and safer. A 2009 Air Force report warned that astronauts "will not survive" an explosion of the Ares I rocket during launch because flaming chunks of solid fuel would melt the parachutes of the escape system.

In November, NASA asked ATK and 12 other companies to come up with proposals for a new heavy-lift system, opening the door to other possibilities.

"These trade studies will provide a look at innovative launch vehicle concepts, propulsion technologies

and processes that should make human exploration missions more affordable," said Doug Cooke, associate administrator of NASA's exploration division, in a statement.
