

Dear De Hamre:

I hate to bother you with a contracting matter, but I have exercised every angle at this point. 1 want to call your personal attention to a concern I have with the Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS).

As you know from your previous life with Senator Nunn, Gulfstream is a reputable company located in my Congressional District (Savannah). Gulfstream manufactures small executive aircraft, almost 50 of which have been purchased by the U.S. Government over the years. In the FY99 Defense Appropriations Bill, a C-37A (Gulfstream V) was appropriated for the Air Force and went to contract on December 30, 1998. As of today, Gulfstream still has not received their down-payment of \$2 million, but has received another form of payment separate from the down-payment.

After several contacts with DFAS here in Washington, I was told on Friday, February 5, 1999, by DFAS that Gulfstream would receive a \$3.8 million payment, again separate from the down-payment. Today, Gulfstream received a \$1.65 million payment with a \$2.1 million "authorized recoupment." I contacted DFAS again to inquire as to what happened, and I was fed a bunch of technical language.


In my seven years in Congress, this is the first unfortunate incident I have experienced with the Department of Defense. I would appreciate any immediate assistance on your part to resolve this situation.

The contract number is F33657-C-0037-P00014. I have attached two previous correspondences, one from the Air Force and one sent to DFAS from my assistant.

Dear Dr. Hanne:

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Last month you were instrumental in resolving the down payment matter on a C-37A aircraft for the CINC's. Thank you for your support and timely letters of explanation. Your efforts are greatly appreciated.

It is with reluctance that I turn to you again on an issue involving C-37A's for the FBI and FEMA. The FY 99 Omnibus Supplemental Bill provides funding for two crisis response aircraft in the general provisions section under Air Force procurement. Recent international incidents and our nation's deep commitment to Central America in the wake of Hurricane Mitch, clearly validates the need for these aircraft.

1 am aware that interagency differences have, thus far, precluded going to contract on these two C-37A's by March 31, 1999. The C-37A contract the Air Force negotiated with the aircraft manufacturer, Gulfstream, is effective until December 31, 2003, and contains quarterly escalations. Like most long-term contracts, the best advantage to the customer is to sign the contract sooner rather than later. If the Air Force delays the execution of this contract until after March 31, 1999, it will result in a cost escalation of nearly \$1 million. I have attached a matrix that quantifies this potentail cost increase. As you know a cost savings of this scale will buy a lot of spare parts for the Air Force or the Army at installations like Fort Stewart which is in my District.

With a recognition that interagency differences exist that must be resolved, the most prudent approach would appear to be getting these aircraft on contract and continue a dialogue which leads to a resolution. The aircraft will be in the manufacturing and completion process for approximately 18 months. The intent of Congress was to get these aircraft into the hands of the users as soon as possible. The Source Sought Document has been published in CBD and the 30 day for comment period has been satisfied. It appears that all parties concerned understand the savings associated with execution of the contracts by March 31, 1999.

#### IN RE: Economic Order Quantity (EOQ) Offer for C-130Js

Dear Secretary Cohen:

As you know, our military has continued to stress readiness needs for our tactical airlift workhorse, the C-130J. An increase in operational activities by our military forces, coupled with an aging tactical airlift fleet, makes keeping the C-130J line open essential for maintaining our national security interests.

The Air Force and the C-130J producer Lockheed-Martin, are in agreement that keeping the C-130J production line open must be a top priority for FY01 and beyond. This is a challenge our country <u>must</u> meet.

Earlier this year, Lockheed-Martin presented an offer to the Air Force which includes a pre-determined number of C-130Js to be delivered under a multi-year commercial contract. By agreeing to allocate \$150 million for C-130Js in FY01, the Air Force will receive a highly favorable price and delivery schedule for planes in the FY02-FY06 budgets. Lockheed-Martin will absorb the short-term loss and maintain the C-130J production line.

If the details of this agreement are not finalized for the FY01 budget submission, Lockheed-Martin would be forced to shut down the C-130J line, and could only reopen it at a significantly higher price due to the estimated \$600 million in restart costs. These costs would inevitably be passed on to the American taxpayer.

We urgently ask your favorable consideration of the EOQ offer. This is an economically sound business solution, and one that clearly benefits the government by offering set production rates, lower overall costs, and price stability for the government's C-130J aircraft needs.

Stewart, GA, about the conversion of four Trident-Class Ballistic Missile submarines (SSBNs) to Nuclear-Powered Guided-Missile Submarines (SSGNs). 

Re: Rep. Kingston - Host Represention - 1<sup>st</sup> Annual Small Farmers' Resource Conference

Thank you for your interest in assisting Georgia minority farmers. As we enter this new century, it is essential that we make every effort to support African American farm families grow and sustain themselves throughout Georgia.

Over the past four years I have made it my mission to provide technical assistance to minority farmers. Initially, it was simply a few farmers from towns in Glenville, Reidsville and Vidalia. I began to get calls from farmers seeking business development assistance in Statesboro, Brooklet and surrounding towns. The farmers were seeking bank loans for equipment and planting sources for the next season. Irrigation problems due to drought seasons, inefficient farm equipment and an array of other problems were rampant.

The more I met with farmers, the more I saw farmers fall by the way side. Many farmers within Georgia communities had given up the hope of successfully "working the land". Many chose to simply obtain jobs in the private and public sectors as prison guards at Reidsville and Fort Stewart civil service positions.

GBFMA began identifying avenues to assist them with loans and the marketing of their seasonal crops. In 1996 our office submitted an application with the Department of Defense for the Blanket Purchase Agreement Program. We received our federal contract that provided the opportunity to sell our produce to commissaries, USDA schools, military hospitals and federal prisons WORLDWIDE (i.e. wherever our military personnel exist throughout the world). We are also registered with Dunn & Bradstreet as a minority organization.

To date we have delivered small loads of produce to commissaries at Fort Stewart and Parris Island, South Carolina. Additionally, we have had one delivery of collard greens to the Jacksonville DSO with a load in December of 1998 that was delivered to commissaries in Frankfurt, West Germany.

#### **Examples of the lack of Farm Resources and Information:**

#### Department of Defense's Blanket Purchase Agreement (BPA) See Copy

The BPA federal contract has never provided Georgia minority farmers with the full capacity of resources the program offers. Since the beginning of the contract to present - we have had to "scrape" for information on the programs within the contract, as well as our non-inclusion in a variety of field purchase opportunities by buyers in the Orlando, Florida office during the peak Vidalia onion season. In fact, in 1998, the Florida buyers, at our request, came on site to view our fields with the opportunity to purchase our onion fields. After riding our fields, they commended our farmers on the quality of onions. Unfortunately, the buyers informed us they were unable to purchase any of our onions during the months of April and May. The buyers stated they were in a "special program" with two large farmers in Glenville who had passed a "sweet onion" certification tested by a laboratory. Local onion growers, to include our minority farmers lost hundred of pounds of onions that Spring. We had to hustle the onions to buyers wherever we could find a buyer. After research by my office, we found that the lab was owned by one of the two large farmers that the DOD buyers were in a "special May & June Project" with. (By the way – May & June are peak seasons for Vidalia sales.)

As the need for farm survival continues- we see a need to connect Georgia's farmers with resources on a local, state, national and international level. As a member of the U.S. Congress and U. S.Representative for the 1<sup>st</sup> District, we would like you to host the first annual Small Farmers' Resource Conference.

We have had the opportunity to meet with your staff in both the Savannah and Statesboro offices over the past few years. We feel your office can serve as the best liaison to bring state and federal farm agencies, agricultural university officials and corporations to a resource conference to aid farmers.

Our offices believe this annual conference will bring positive results to strengthen growth and "staying power" of small and minority farmers. We are writing to express our serious concerns regarding continued attempts to extend the federal government's demilitarization authority to lawfully possessed surplus military equipment. Last year, the Senate version of the FY02 National Defense Authorization bill included a Section 1062, which would have allowed government seizure of any "significant military equipment" ever owned by the Department of Defense (DoD).

Under such a broadly defined new authority, the DoD would have been able to require the seizure and demilitarization of aircraft, vehicles, radios, and firearms formerly owned by the Department. Besides raising serious property rights issues regarding fair compensation and due process in seizing private property, this provision could readily have become grounds for bureaucratic over-reach.

For obvious reasons, this provision was met with vigorous opposition from law-abiding firearms collectors, re-enactors, military parts suppliers and surplus vendors, as well as military museums and private property rights advocates. As a result, many of us heard more from our constituents on this issue than any other issue under discussion in the Defense Authorization bill.

Currently, the DoD already enjoys the authority to demilitarize its surplus military equipment before sale. Consequently, we consider it inappropriate to burden law-abiding citizens after sale with a new authority to confiscate and destroy lawfully possessed firearms, aircraft, vehicles, and other military memorabilia held by private individuals. For this reason, an overwhelming number of us in the House have opposed requests for a new demilitarization authority each year and have defeated the provision in conference. We would appreciate your assurances that this provision will not resurface this year in the Administration's proposals for the Department of Defense.

According to several General Accounting Office (GAO) reports, it seems apparent the source of the problem with surplus equipment sales originates within the Department. We appreciate that the DoD has acknowledged the erroneous classification of items, resulting in surplus sales being finalized before proper demilitarization. We are also concerned with mistakes resulting in the unlawful destruction of non-sensitive government property as an

overreaction to this problem. Many of these items are of historical value and have been destroyed as a result of the uneven application of demilitarization regulations. As Members of Congress, we seek a long-term solution to these problems and would be happy to discuss any reasonable actions we could take to assist the DoD in improving those processes or correcting errors that pose a serious threat to national security.

We appreciate your leadership in protecting our national security and thank you for your time and attention to this issue of great importance to our constituents and military history.

As you finalize adjustments to the Fiscal Year 2005 budget, we ask that you pay close attention to the C-5M modernization programs - the Avionics Modernization Program (AMP) and Reliability Enhancement and Re-engining Programs (RERP). We strongly support these programs, as they are vital to improving the safety and performance of our airlift fleet and to dramatically increasing our airlift capability in an economically sound manner. We hope that both programs will be funded to modernize the entire fleet of 112 C-5s as quickly as possible.

Operation Iraqi Freedom once again focused attention on the nation's strategic airlift fleet's ability to quickly respond to far reaches of the world and to support our troops in the field. The C-5 was the backbone of airlift operations and demonstrated once again why modernization of the C-5 fleet makes sense. The C-5 fleet flew only 23% of the Iraqi Freedom airlift missions, but moved 48% of the cargo. The same ratio was true of airlift operations in support of Enduring Freedom. No other aircraft in the USAF airlift fleet now, or in the future, matches the cargo capacity of the C-5s; it is truly a national asset. As the global war against terrorism continues and we address other national security threats around the world, our strategic airlift fleet must be diverse and modernized to move and sustain the various cargo requirements of our forces. It is essential to the success of both our military and humanitarian missions.

The AMP upgrades to the C-5 cockpit feature traffic and terrain warning and avoidance systems that will greatly enhance crew safety and increase mission reliability. These systems will also allow for compliance with the new Global Air Traffic Management systems, allowing C-5s to use advantageous flight paths to rapidly reach their destinations quickly while reducing fuel consumption. We are pleased to hear that the AMP flight test program is proceeding on schedule and within budget, with the installation of modification kits on operational aircraft to begin later this year.

The RERP will replace difficult to maintain parts and the systems that are most prone to breaking. In their place will be modern, state-of-the-art equipment that will substantially improve fleet reliability. The centerpiece of RERP is replacing the old engines with very reliable GE commercial engines - the same as those now used on Air Force One. The new engines feature increased thrust and reduced fuel consumption. In their over 90 million accumulated flight hours in commercial operations they have demonstrated an exceptional 99.97% departure reliability rate. The new propulsion system and over 50 subsystem improvements will combine to sharply increase the C-5's take-off, climb, and cruise rates, while also increasing mission payload. In addition, fleet operating costs will be reduced by one million dollars a day, easing pressure on operations and maintenance accounts.

It is our understanding that funding shortfalls and stretched production schedules will slow the fielding of a modernized C-5M fleet. Current funding through the Future Years Defense Plan (FYDP) for AMP modifies 49 aircraft of the 112 aircraft C-5 fleet. Approximately \$253.8 million would be needed to complete all 112 aircraft, as planned, by Fiscal Year 2007. We urge you to consider whether additional funds to modernize more C-5's over the FYDP might be in line with the Department's long-range requirements for air mobility assets.

We hope that as you finalize the adjustments to the Fiscal Year 2005 budget plan, you will fully fund both C-5M modernization programs and consider increasing funds for AMP procurement to create a more robust, capable air mobility fleet. We are concerned that the current plan, which modernizes the C-5s at a slow rate, is less prudent fiscally over the long term and delays critical crew safety and mission capability improvements that our strategic airlift fleet needs to meet today's national security challenges.

As always, we appreciate your willingness to work with us on this and other national security concerns.

As a 37-year veteran of Active Duty and Guard service and by virtue of his outstanding professional qualifications, we sincerely believe that General Poythress would make an outstanding member of the newly created Commission on the National Guard and Reserves.

General Poythress has had a long and distinguished career encompassing military scrvice, public scrvice, and private law practice. It has come to our attention that senior acquisition officials in the Army and at OSD have recently been notified of aircraft issues associated with the Army Aerial Common Sensor (ACS) program. The Army briefed our delegation regarding a series of problems with the Embraer 145 aircraft that was previously selected to be the platform for Army ACS. You may recall that the Georgia delegation has a keen interest in this program, specifically, ensuring the acquisition stays on course. Please see previous attached letters to General Schoomaker dated September 22, 2004 and the reply by Lieutenant General Melcher dated November 19, 2004.

We are aware from our Army briefing that a Request for Information (RFI) has been issued to various aircraft manufacturers for a replacement aircraft. Seven months ago we were briefed that the ACS program was on track and low risk. It is now clear that this is not the case. Specifically, requirements related to weight, cooling, and power are in flux and are driving subsequent delays and cost increases. We would appreciate you defining for us what has changed in the mission payload requirements, performance parameters, and delivery milestones that has led to a termination of the awarded aircraft and has started the platform selection process anew? Who is paying the costs for these changes and what are the expected costs in dollars and schedule? Finally, how are you ensuring the selection process for the new platform will result in an aircraft capable of meeting all key performance parameters for both the Army and Navy missions?

From our discussion with the Army it became apparent that significant engineering work has already been done on a larger alternative airliner as an ACS replacement. This indicates that problems with the EMB 145 were known and the contractor was studying alternatives as early as last fall. Under these circumstances, how is the Army going to insure a proven platform like the Gulfstream 550 will be given serious consideration as a replacement aircraft for the Army? You may not be aware that Gulfstream already has four special variant programs similar to ACS operating world-wide. Gulfstream has 63 aircraft in the U.S. Government inventory, all of which have been delivered on budget, on time, and with an impeccable product support record. The Army C-37 program, which is supported by Gulfstream Contractor Logistics Support, has the highest operational readiness rate in the Army.

We understand that the Army is pleased with and committed to the electronic mission solution offered by the winning contractor. However, if the payload has been allowed to grow unconstrained with no attention to the aircraft operational performance parameters spelled out for in the original ACS competition, then we feel the ACS program needs a close look by the Army's senior leadership. You may be crossing the threshold from an agile, tactical asset to a strategic platform similar to those operated by the Air Force. We questioned in the past whether a regional jet such as the EMB 145 had robust enough performance to support the Army's operational requirements. Events seem to have proven our concern to be valid. We urge the Army to take decisive action and determine the proper relationship between sensor and platform performance that will lead to the operational capability originally envisioned. While the platform is indeed only one part of the system, the airplane will be flying for decades while the payload will be changed many times. We must get the right airplane for this mission this time.

We look forward to your timely response.

As you may know, the Mighty Eighth Air Force Museum was established under the vision and guidance of Major General Lewis E. Lyle, USAF Retired, and a B-17 veteran of 70 combat missions during World War II. This museum honors the men and women who supported these efforts, 26,000 of whom were killed in action and 28,000 of whom became prisoners of war.

However, we think that purpose could be much better served if it were assigned to the Mighty Eighth Museum. As members of the Georgia Congressional Delegation, we ask for your help in this matter.

We write to express our strong support for the E-10 Technology Development Program and its critical Multi-Platform – Radar Technology Insertion Program (MP-RTIP). This large radar will provide unique capabilities in the Global War on Terrorism and against threats for decades to come. Congress has long supported Joint STARS operations and the information it provides to the warfighter. MP-RTIP will provide a quantum increase in capability over the current Joint STARS radar, and is required to increase our forces' ability to detect, track and identify ground moving targets, as well as providing a key link in cruise missile defense capability.

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Congress has supported the development of the MP-RTIP radar with the commitment of over a billion dollars to date for the development of this vital program. We believe that it would be unwise and represent significant waste for the Department of Defense to abandon this program after years of successful development, especially when DoD is on the verge of actually characterizing and demonstrating the radar's expected capability. Congress supports the plan to fly the large radar on an E-10, or on an E-8 as originally envisioned, thereby validating the significant investment in developing this critical technology.

We seek your assurance that the Department remains committed to fully fund this critical capability in the budget for fiscal year 2008 as stated in your recent Quadrennial Defense Review report that was submitted to Congress. The Department must continue to demonstrate and characterize the MP-RTIP radar and validate, via live flight, the capability to complete the kill chain against both air and ground moving targets.

We would like to solicit your help in gaining a better understanding of the Department of Defense's plans for future acquisition of the C/KC-130J aircraft. The C/KC-130J is the crown jewel in today's tactical air mobility fleet. It is being flown by our Air Force and Marines, as well as by our Allies, and is providing exceptional service in support of the Global War on Terrorism.

We are concerned that the current Department of Defense C/KC-130J multi-year procurement plan expires in FY 2008. As you are aware, more than half of the combat delivery C-130s are 30 years old or older, with some of the fleet now hampered by significant operational restrictions. Although their longevity is clearly a testament to the value of these critical aircraft, we are very concerned that the existing fleet continues to age at an alarming rate without an apparent long-term solution. The Department has clearly articulated the need for recapitalization, yet we see no indication of an integrated plan to bridge the existing C/KC-130J multi-year procurement to emerging requirements of the future.

We understand that the USMC and USAF have requirements for C/KC-130J replacement beyond those currently being met by the multi-year. We would like to hear from you regarding the Department's efforts to ensure our tactical airlift and tanker fleets in the USAF and USMC remain viable for the future.

Our airmen and marines clearly deserve the best equipment that we can offer them. The C/KC-130J is the right solution for these emerging tactical air mobility requirements.

We look forward to hearing from you.





**Provincial Iraqi Control:** 7 of 18 Provinces. The process of returning the responsibility for security in Iraq to the Iraqi security forces in each province is at the heart of the country's journey to full nationhood. Three Kurdish Provinces, Dahuk, Irbil and Sulaymaniyah, transferred to Provincial Iraqi Control on May 30. The other provinces under Iraqi security control are: Al-Muthanna, Dhi Qar, An-Najaf, and Maysan. Complete transfer of all 18 Provinces to Provincial Iraqi Control is expected by March 2008.




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# Iraql Security Forces Killed Monthly








Measuring Stability and Security in Iraq, March 2007











I have recently returned from my third trip to Iraq. Many members of Congress have been there more and some not at all. Despite the number of visits all members learn a tremendous amount when they go. Regardless of their pre-trip philosophy on the war, their views get tempered with the increased knowledge.

Since 2003, 397 members have traveled to Iraq. However, many members are unable to make the trip because of the limited number of congressional delegations ("codels") and the fact that codels are capped at six members. While I understand this is a logistically optimal numbers, I believe it is a harmful policy.

Most of us find that members who have been there not only have more knowledge but less partisanship. Meeting the troops, seeing the theater, and getting a front-line view inspires Democrats and Republicans alike. With the tremendous philosophical divisions we have in Congress and in America, opening up access would be healthy to the debate and decisions ahead.

I urge you to remove the 6 member cap and increase the number of codels.

We understand that the Department of Defense is considering ceasing production of the F-22A Raptor following completion of the current multi-year procurement contract. We believe such a decision would be ill-advised and premature, given the recapitalization shortfalls facing our US Air Force and the rapidly emerging airborne and surface-to-air threats facing our nation's military.

The F-22A Raptor is exceeding all expectations in operational performance as well as production schedule and quality. The USAF urgently needs to replace approximately 500 1970-80's vintage F-15A-D Eagles. Despite the AF's oft-stated minimum requirement for 381, we note that DoD's program of record 183 total is not supported by any rigorous campaign-based analysis assessing the twost stressing scenarios and rapidly growing threats. Rather, it has been reported that at least three independent studies commissioned by DoD recommended procuring significantly more than 220 Raptors because of its singularly unique capability to overwhelm all air and surfaceto-air threats.

Meanwhile, it has recently been reported that three near-peer potential adversaries are busy co-developing two different stealth, twin-engine, high-altitude, Raptor-like fighters. Terminating the Raptor program at such a crucial and uncertain time only further encourages our potential adversaries to continue down this path. It also risks abandoning our AF's unique ability to deter aggressive actions and when called upon, dominate the airspace over our global allies, interests and deployed troops.

Furthermore, the F-22A Raptor is the world's only 5<sup>th</sup> Generation Fighter line currently in full-rate production. Over 25,000 Americans working for 1000 suppliers in 44 states manufacture this unique national asset. These are highly technical jobs that represent the leading edge of our nation's aerospace industry. Additionally, it is estimated another 70,000+ Americans owe their jobs indirectly to this program.


We urge you to continue procurement of the F-22A Raptor by including sufficient funds in the FY09 budget request to procure long-lead items for an additional lot of planes, beyond the current multi-year contract. We believe any decision to terminate production of this aircraft at such an early stage is more appropriately deferred until completion of the 2009 Quadrennial Defense Review which will assess current and future threats and recommend the necessary procurement strategies to fully support our national security requirements. 
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
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

We are writing to urge your consideration of a partnership between the Department of Defense (DoD), the Department of Veterans' Affairs (VA), and the Medical College of Georgia (MCG) School of Nursing to create a new national training site for Recovery Coordinators. Wounded Warriors returning from overseas with combat-related illnesses and injuries have a tremendous need for expert, continuing, and coordinated health care and timely delivery of benefits. In spite of the tremendous efforts by the DoD and VA to care for wounded warriors and their families, the *President's Commission on the Care for Returning Wounded Warriors* (2007) reported that the services need transformation to serve, support, and simplify the delivery of health care and other benefits. Recovery planning and coordination across services are critically needed to prevent serious gaps in care. The Medical College of Georgia School of Nursing is in a unique position to be able to take a leading role in this effort.

The MCG School of Nursing, Augusta VA Medical Center, and Eisenhower Medical Center (EAMC) have a history of collaboration in educating MCG BSN, MSN, and PhD nursing students, including Army Nurse Corps officers stationed at Fort Gordon. We believe that collaboration among these institutions to enhance efficient and effective health care to our injured and ill service members is an approach that warrants consideration, particularly for wounded warriors in the region. This history is particularly important because Eisenhower Army Medical Center is second only to Walter Reed AMC in receiving and treating wounded from Iraq and Afghanistan.

We believe that the need for this collaboration is clear and immediate, and we therefore respectfully request that you consider MCG's proposal as soon as possible. Enclosed, we have included a copy of the proposal, "Wounded Warriors and their Families: A Collaborative Proposal."

As you are well aware, the Department of Defense is considering several locations in the Continental United States (CONUS) as headquarters for Africa Command (AFRICOM). The Governor and members of the Georgia Delegation have previously written you regarding the potential use of Forts McPherson and Gillem for the AFRICOM Headquarters. While we understand that these installations are still under consideration, we also understand that Dobbins Air Reserve Base in Marietta is also being considered. In addition to the reasons previously stated for locating AFRICOM at either Fort McPherson or Fort Gillem, we would like to take this opportunity to explain why Dobbins would also be an attractive location.

Dobbins has a substantial runway network as well as rail infrastructure that connects it with the Port of Savannah — already a point of shipment for a significant amount of cargo bound for Africa. Further, given that the facilities in Marietta are presently shared by Dobbins Air Reserve Base, Naval Air Station Atlanta, the Georgia National Guard, and Lockheed Martin, they have long been a model for joint-ness within the Department of Defense, an important and unique characteristic given that AFRICOM will be a joint command and require coordination with many international partners and across numerous government agencies. With 52 acres of available property adjoining the base, any needed expansion of existing or construction of new facilities would also be unencumbered.

Whether you choose Dobbins, Fort McPherson or Fort Gillem, Georgia provides a compelling location for the AFRICOM facility. Each is in close proximity to Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport. Being the world's busiest airport there is frequent and direct access to the African continent. With one of the nation's highest concentrations of Fortune 500 companies and Non-Governmental Organizations, coupled with a very low cost of doing business, the greater Atlanta area is uniquely qualified to accommodate additional consulates and businesses that may be necessary if such an important command is established.

Thank you for your attention to this critical issue and for your leadership of the Department of Defense. We would welcome the opportunity to discuss this matter further with you at any time. Please know that we share your commitment to ensuring



the success of our brave men and women in uniform, as well as the safety and security of the American people.

In deciding how to allocate the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act's funding, please give consideration to the research conducted by Bell BioEnergy, Inc of Tifton, Georgia, which is studying how to use bioengineered bacteria to convert biomass to biofuels.

Bell BioEnergy is producing renewable, domestically-produced, high-quality transportation fuels. The process it has developed will enhance America's independence from foreign oil in an environmentally sound manner through the successful conversion of non-food biomass to biofuels. Such efforts will also result in the creation of a significant number of new, green jobs.

Bell BioEnergy is presently conducting research through pilot projects conducted in collaboration with the Department of Defense (DOD) and the Defense Energy Support Center (DESC) at seven military installations around the nation. The projects are located at Fort Benning, Fort Stewart, Fort Bragg, Fort Lewis, Fort Drum, Fort A.P. Hill, and the DESC facility at San Pedro, California. At each site, Bell BioEnergy is working to:

1) Perfect the waste biomass to hydrocarbon fuels process;

2) Further refine the unique bacteria used in the process;

3) Produce sufficient amounts of usable hydrocarbon fuels (natural gas, gasoline, diesel and jet) for laboratory testing;

4) Test and certify the fuels generated by the process as a "drop in fuel" that is fit for its intended purpose; and

5) Gather the engineering and scientific data necessary to design full scale production facilities.

Bell BioEnergy is seeking additional funding to complete these pilot projects. The funds would be used to 1) complete construction of the seven pilot projects, 2) perform university-level research to determine the most viable bacteria for converting biomass to hydrocarbon fuels, and 3) construct the first research laboratory dedicated to the segregation and propagation of the bacteria required to convert non-food waste biomass to biofuels.

It is estimated that each test facility will employ five technicians. The research laboratory would employ 25 to 50 scientists and technicians, with secondary employment of up to 400 people. These efforts would support the underlying goals of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, which is to create jobs and help transition our economy toward clean, renewable energy.

We are writing to convey our support for the Army plan to assign an additional Brigade Combat Team (BCT) to the 3<sup>rd</sup> Infantry Division at Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Air Field, Georgia. We share your expressed concern for the great hardship endured by the soldiers and their families and agree with your guiding principle to prevent the under-manning of units for combat while changing the policy on stop-loss. We believe the plan to bring the 5<sup>th</sup> BCT to Fort Stewart is in concert with the guiding principle of your statement on April 6<sup>th</sup> and will continue the progress made in revitalizing our armed forces.

Unquestionably, Fort Stewart is, for numerous strategic reasons, an ideal location for the Army to grow. But just as important it is imperative that the Army and the Department of Defense not lose sight of the issue of reliance—that state and local governments and the civic and business leaders relied on the request of the Army and the Department to be ready to accommodate these soldiers and their families. Accordingly, they have already invested about \$450 million dollars in anticipation of the arrival of the BCT.

While we recognize the extensive military analysis and fiscal constraints required in determining the location of a BCT, we firmly believe that it is in the best interest of the Department of Defense to take into full account the investment at Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Air Field made by local communities long ago. The communities made these decisions by taking to heart the clear assurance from Department leaders that the BCT was coming. They responded to the Department's requests to provide the essential private sector support in advance of the arrival of the Brigade. In deciding this issue, we believe the Army and the Department must consider the extensive, good faith reliance of its partner community. The Department must live up to its commitments. It must not break its word.

The City of Hinesville, the surrounding communities, and the State of Georgia have demonstrated unwavering support for soldiers and families over many years. The area now is clearly recognized as one of the most Army-friendly installation in the U.S. Community

leaders have faithfully and diligently worked with the Department and the private sector to ensure that the facilities and infrastructure is ready to receive the additional brigade. To date the community's investment of about \$450 million in preparation for the expected growth to include \$72 million in public school projects and other public sector infrastructure investment. The State of Georgia has again expanded its acclaimed HOPE Scholarship program to further extend the access to military families for full tuition, room and board to any Georgia public college or university for students who graduate from high school with a B average.

We believe adding the 46<sup>th</sup> BCT in the Army to Fort Stewart would enhance the immediate operational effectiveness of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Infantry Division at the Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Air Field. When taking into consideration the emerging Center of Maneuver Excellence at Fort Benning and the growing presence of the BCTs at Fort Stewart, the Army has an exceptional home base in the state of Georgia to meet all mission challenges for our nation's defense. Resources are already either in place or pending final construction to swiftly accommodate the arrival of the new Brigade and their families. No other U.S installation can so effectively and quickly meet these needs. Commanders would have an Army unit with maximum adaptability and capability to meet combat requirements. Soldiers would be able to focus on their training, knowing that their families are settling into an installation and community that continues to welcome and accommodate them.

Fort Stewart's strategic location in southeast Georgia makes it easily accessible by road, rail and sea. Hunter Army Air Field provides a strategic Airborne Point of Entry for unit deployment. Movement to ports takes place in hours vice days and weeks. At 280,000 acres, Fort Stewart is the largest military installation east of the Mississippi River. The Army has invested some \$670 million at Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Air Field in the past three years making it one of the most modern and efficient installations in the nation with additional construction pending for increased capacity. Training is efficient and cost effective due to the installation's digital multipurpose range training complex and other facilities located within minutes of the cantonment areas. Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Air Field also has no significant environmental impact or encroachment issues. Just this month Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Air Field won its fourth Army Community of Excellence installation award.

Accordingly, it is our request that the Department continue as originally planned to expand growth at Fort Stewart through the assignment of the additional BCT without adversely affecting the alignment of the current forces stationed at Fort Stewart and Fort Benning. We urge you to meet with Fort Stewart community leaders in the near future and permit them the opportunity to directly share their views and additional information on this issue.

In response to your announced plans on July 20, 2009 to grow the Army by 22,000 personnel over the next few years, we would like to recommend you give strong consideration toward stationing a significant number of these personnel within the 3<sup>rd</sup> Infantry Division at Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Air Field, Georgia. Fort Stewart will be deploying two of its four brigade combat teams to Iraq for advisory and assistance missions within the next year as well as the headquarters unit for the 3<sup>rd</sup> Infantry Division. Stationing additional troops at Fort Stewart meets the intent of your vision to ensure that deploying units are properly manned.

The state and local governments and the civic and business leaders surrounding Fort Stewart have been preparing and are ready for more troops. We believe it makes sense to take advantage of the significant investment the community has already committed in anticipation of the arrival of the now-postponed 46<sup>th</sup> Brigade Combat Team. Hinesville and surrounding communities have invested an estimated \$450Million to ensure the base and community are well prepared for growth and can quickly accommodate new personnel at minimum expense to the Army. These communities have been deeply affected by the decision not to locate an additional brigade at Fort Stewart. Stationing these troops to Fort Stewart will go far in assuring the local communities that the Army is making good on their commitment over the past few years to increase forces in southeast Georgia.

We also remain supportive of adding the Army's 46<sup>th</sup> BCT to Fort Stewart to further enhance the operational effectiveness of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Infantry Division. Resources are either in place or pending final construction to swiftly accommodate the new Brigade's arrival, as well as the associated families. No other U.S installation can meet these needs as effectively and quickly. Fort Stewart's strategic location in southeast Georgia supports easy movement of the two brigade combat teams for their upcoming deployment, and Hunter Army Air Field also provides a strategic Airborne Point of Entry for unit deployment. Just this month Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Air Field will receive its fourth Commander's-in-Chief Award for Installation Excellence.

Accordingly, it is our request that the Department look to Fort Stewart as a location for increased manning. This will ensure that existing BCTs are fulfilled with the additional troops needed in order to be fully ready for their upcoming overseas deployment certification and operations. Dear Secretary Gates:

We are writing to request that you review the Department of Defense's continued application of congressionally authorized exceptions to the Berry Amendment relating to the procurement of para-aramid fibers and yarns, as well the procurement of fire-resistant rayon fiber, from foreign sources. The materials are used in the manufacture of body armor and fire-resistant uniforms, respectively.

The Berry Amendment requires the Department of Defense (DOD) to give preference in procurements to domestically produced, manufactured, or home-grown products—notably food, clothing, fabrics, and specialty metals. We believe that exceptions to this amendment allowing DOD purchases of para-aramid fibers and yarns, as well the procurement of fire-resistant rayon fiber, from foreign sources are no longer warranted owing to the availability of suitable materials in today's U.S. marketplace. The recent use of these exceptions is having an adverse impact on U.S. manufacturers and has undercut our policy of maintaining a strong and viable defense industrial base.

In 1998, partially due to limited domestic competition and a reliance on solesource contracts, a statutory exception was created to the Berry Amendment to allow for purchases of para-aramid fibers and yarns from foreign sources. The statutory exception is only applicable when the Department makes a determination that procurement of paraaramid fibers and yarns from domestic sources will result in sole-source contracts or subcontracts. As a result of the exemption, the Department's purchases of para-aramid fibers and yarns have become increasingly dependent on foreign suppliers over the last decade. The marketplace has changed significantly in the last decade, however, and a variety of suitable materials now exist domestically.

Similarly, in 2008 a statutory exception was created for fire-resistant rayon fiber for the production of uniforms. This exception allowed the Department to procure fireresistant rayon fiber for uniforms from foreign suppliers if a determination was made that either fire-resistant rayon fiber was not available domestically, or procuring such fiber domestically would result in sole-source contracts.


In the short period during which this provision has been in effect, foreign suppliers have dramatically increased their market share. Currently, 90 percent of the fielded Flame Resistant Army Combat Uniforms are constructed of imported fiber.



While environmental and other concerns have caused domestic sources to forego production of fire-resistant rayon fiber for uniforms, there are a variety of other fireresistant fibers in today's domestic marketplace—some of which have out-performed rayon in evaluations for Army uniforms. As a result, the "rayon" exception is not relevant and should not apply to future procurements.

Congress has given the Secretary of Defense discretion to determine whether either exception should be used. However, current law <u>mandates</u> an annual review by the Secretary of Defense. We believe that a departmental review will clearly document why these exceptions to the Berry amendment should no longer be applied for defense-related procurements. It is our strongly held view that the para-aramid fibers and yarns exception is no longer valid, and that the fire-resistant rayon fiber exception is no longer useful. For the reasons noted above, we urge you not to apply either Berry amendment exception to future procurements involving these items.

We look forward to working with you to advance a more balanced policy that both promotes competition and preserves our ability to maintain and grow our domestic defense capabilities. Thank you for your consideration of this request.



Dear Congressman Kingston,

I am a fireman at the Kings Bay Naval Submarine Base in St Marys, GA. I'm sure Kings Bay needs no introduction to you and having said that I'm sure you are aware that there is a Base Operating Services Contractor (BOSC) out there and I believe you may even know the company I work for, VT Group. You may know Walt Yourstone, President of VT Milcom which now comes under our umbrella of VT Group.

The reason I am writing this letter is I need your help. As a fireman at the KBFD we just found out that the government has decided to make our department civil service. KBFD has been a contract fire department from the very beginnings of this base with over thirty years of dedicated service to the navy mission. Many of my guys, (I am also the union president), myself included, have been with this fire department for twenty, twenty five, even thirty years. Many chose service to the navy and its mission in the fire department over military service believing serving in the FD was service enough. Now we are being told that it was not enough. The reason for the letter is that as many as fifty people are going to be out of a job, a job that most have been doing for more than two decades. It's not like the work is going away, like a factory or mill shutting down, the work is still going to be there but done by a different class of citizen. We are being told through "unofficial channels" that unless we are under the age of 37 and have prior military service we won't be picked up, we will be displaced.

There is a real sense of urgency here and the window of opportunity is very narrow. If we can't get this turned around or at least reviewed by February 2<sup>nd</sup> 2011 we will be forever changed. The reason I say that is this: The BOSC contract Is up for a re-bid by big and small business with a deadline for proposals being Feb 2, 2011 with an implementation date of Oct 1, 2011. We only found out about this by virtue of seeing that the Fire and EMS departments were longer in the solicitation. That can only mean that the rumors we have been hearing that this was going civil service were true. William Casey, the Southeast Regional Fire Chief has been telling us off the record that the government was looking at taking the work in house, insourcing is what he called it. I have asked him what is behind the desire to change and he said it was all about money and he believes he can do it cheaper than the contractor.

Mr. Casey stated that an Efficiency and Effectiveness study was done to determine that cost of running the fire department with a comparison of contractor vs. civil service being the outcome followed by recommendations as to keeping it contract or insourcing the work. They chose to insource. I need a copy of that study. There is no way civil service can do the work cheaper than a contactor if you just consider the legacy costs alone. Civil service would be responsible to a retiring employee for the rest of his or her life where with a contractor the government would not. In other words, the government would be responsible for pensions, cost of living increases, possibly even medical care where if the work was done by a contractor when that same employee retired the government would not be beholding to that employee in any way whatsoever. The salaries associated with civil service and compared to the wages the contractor pays are not even close. If this study done by William Casey and his crew (it was a 2006 study updates FEB 20, 2010 by William Casey) and presented to whomever made the final decision says that the government can do the same work cheaper than a contractor then I believe the study is wrong or even a flat out lie. I need a copy of that study to do a real comparison of the work and its cost. These employees have been here for close to three decades and deserve better than they are being given right now. And in the end, if that study proves to be accurate and a fair comparison then we owe it to those who are doing the job right now the right to keep on doing that job and not be cast aside. I know the government can't do the job better than we do, they may in the end show they can do it cheaper but our fire department won the best fire department in the navy award for a small department so how can you do it better than the best? You can't!

There are things and powers going on behind the scenes that we can't see or are unaware of and I need your help sir to wade through this mess and discover what the real motivations are and who the powers that are making these decisions are. Again, we need a copy of the study, the persons for whom that study was made for, the person or organization that made the final decision and the criteria used to come to the decision to take the work in house and the overall cost comparison for the change.

Religious freedom is an integral component of America's greatness and has been a vital pillar of our nation from the very beginning. Unfortunately, it has come to our attention that the United States Air Force (USAF) has taken a series of steps signaling hostility towards religious freedom. We ask that you investigate this matter and issue clear guidance in writing to formally assure active duty servicemembers and those considering future service that they need not leave their faith at home when they volunteer to serve.

In recent months, the USAF has made various changes regarding the religious freedom of individuals bravely serving in the military. Most of these changes occurred following a September 1, 2011 memorandum issued by General Norton Schwartz, Chief of Staff of the USAF, imposing a stringent policy with regards to religion. The memo stated that Gen. Schwartz expected "chaplains, not commanders, to notify Airmen of Chaplain Corps programs," suggesting that the mere mention of these programs is impermissible. We believe this statement exemplifies the troubling "complete separation" approach that is creating a chilling effect down the chain of command as airmen attempt to comply.

While we agree that leaders should not use their positions to impose their religious beliefs or to extend preferential treatment to those who share their beliefs, the decisions that have been made in reliance upon this policy go beyond what is required by the U.S. Constitution. The First Amendment prohibits the establishment of religion; however, the mere discussion of religion or reference to God certainly does not rise to that level. Censorship is not required for compliance with the Constitution, and should not be required for compliance with military directives.

The USAF repeatedly has succumbed to demands from organizations that seek to remove all references to God and faith in our military. Recent USAF capitulations in this area include:

- Suspending an ethics briefing for nuclear missile officers, due to its discussion of Bible references and St. Augustine's "Just War" theory;
- Removing a Latin reference to "God" from the Rapid Capabilities Office motto;
- Removing an article from a Squadron Officer School distance-learning curriculum because it referenced chapel attendance;
- Removing Bibles from Air Force Inn checklists; and
- Modifying the presentation of the Air Force Academy's involvement with the charity "Operation Christmas Child."



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These modifications go beyond the requirements of the Constitution, and appear to have been influenced by the more stringent guidance issued by Gen. Schwartz in September 2011. The changes lend credence to the notion that the Air Force will remove any reference to God or faith that an outside organization brings to its attention.

Mr. Secretary, the combination of events mentioned above raises concerns that the Air Force is developing a culture that is hostile towards religion. We request that you investigate what may have led to this series of incidents and issue clear Department of Defense policy guidance, consistent with our Constitution, to preserve the place of religious expression in the military at large. We trust that you will ensure that all analysis of these sensitive issues is being conducted in a deliberative and thoughtful manner, with special respect given to our military's legacy of honoring the place of faith among its members. We appreciate your attention to this matter and look forward to receiving your prompt response.

It has come to our attention that during your recent trip to Vietnam, Vietnamese Defense Minister Phung Quang Thanh pledged to open three new areas to American teams searching for missing war-time soldiers. The new excavation sites are to include two aircraft crash sites in central Vietnam and an area where a US soldier went missing in Kon Tum province bordering Cambodia and Laos.

As you may know, the acidic soil in Vietnam accelerates the decay of buried remains, necessitating timely action in exploring and excavating the formerly-restricted areas. The remains of more than 900 Americans killed in the Vietnam War have been recovered since 1973, but more than 1,200 Americans remain missing. Access to the formerly restricted areas allows us a chance to recover more of our brave soldiers before the soil deteriorates the bodies beyond identification.

Vietnam's decision to permit access to previously restricted sites provides the chance to bring closure to relatives of those that are still missing in action. We applaud this important step in recovering the remains of our missing soldiers, and we encourage you to use your position as Secretary of Defense to ensure the availability of these sites and access to them.

As you may know, Vietnam has not always lived up to previous commitments to renew and increase their own efforts to locate and return the remains of our soldiers. The recent exchange of artifacts taken from soldiers during the war demonstrates an important and symbolic milestone, but we urge you to ensure that tangible results stem from the symbolism. We must call upon Vietnam to continue permitting our recovery teams to have access to restricted areas to conduct our recovery operations.

We believe that those brave men and women who served in the past for our present freedoms deserve our fullest support. Our nation's servicemen and women represent the best our country has to offer, and we must not falter in our commitment to them. As we ask these brave soldiers, sailors, airmen, and marines—and their families—to do more and more, it's only right we continue doing all we can for them.

We write to express our deep concern over the Department of Defense's reported decision to purchase ten additional Mi-17 helicopters for the Afghan Security Forces from the Russian state-owned arms dealer Rosoboronexport, a firm that is enabling mass atrocities in Syria. We find this practice completely unacceptable and strongly urge you to reconsider your department's dealings with the firm.

For more than a year now Syrian President Bashar al-Assad has responded to peaceful demonstrations by his own people with a brutal crackdown, which has resulted in gross human rights violations, the use of force against civilians, torture, extrajudicial killings, arbitrary executions, sexual violence, and interference with access to medical treatment. According to U.N. estimates, at least 10,000 people in Syria have been killed since the violence began in March 2011, with some estimating as many as 15,000 have been killed. In the past several weeks the murder of civilians in Syria has sharply escalated, including the massacre of more than 108 people in Houla and at least 78 in Qubair, most of them women and children.

Last year alone, Syria's top arms supplier, Russia, reportedly sold Damascus \$1 billion in weapons thereby greatly enabling the Assad regime's murder of innocent men, women and children. On June 12, 2012, Secretary of State Clinton expressed concern that Russia is sending attack helicopters to Syria.

Yet, your department at the same time has procured 21 Mi-17 helicopters for the Afghan Security Forces through a no-bid contract with Rosoboronexport and is now reportedly planning on purchasing ten more helicopters from the firm this year. This has created an untenable situation in which the U.S. Government is criticizing Russia for selling helicopters to Syria while at the same time purchasing helicopters from Russia.

As you know, the Fiscal Year 2013 National Defense Authorization Act recently passed by the House includes a provision that would prohibit the Defense Department from awarding a future contract to supply helicopters to the Afghan Security Forces, directly or indirectly, to any entity controlled, directed or influenced by a state that has supplied weapons to Syria or a statesponsor of terrorism. It would also require any such contract to be competitively bid.

Members of Congress have raised concerns over the Department of Defense's purchase of Mi-17 helicopters for a number of years and the consistent response from your department is



that the Mi-17s are the only helicopters Afghan pilots know how to fly, are the ones they want and are the only helicopters capable of meeting mission requirements. We find this position completely unacceptable, particularly in the current environment.

The Department of Defense has not pursued a requirements-based competition to supply helicopters to the Afghan Security Forces. Instead, it has always been dictated that the Mi-17 was the only solution for the mission. We firmly believe there should be an open competition, particularly when there are other available American-made aircraft that have the capability to operate in Afghanistan. The use of such U.S. helicopters would increase interoperability with both U.S. and NATO forces in the region. Moreover, it is our understanding that the Department of Defense recently purchased U.S. made helicopters as new pilot training vehicles and that Afghan pilots are learning to fly and maintain U.S. made helicopters.

We firmly believe that the Department of Defense should not engage in contracts with companies arming the Assad regime in Syria and enabling his mass atrocities against his own people. Moreover, if we are going to spend U.S. taxpayer dollars to provide helicopters to the Afghan Security Forces, U.S. manufacturers should be able to compete for the opportunity to provide such helicopters. We therefore strongly urge you to ban any future contracts with Rosoboronexport, reconsider any future purchase of Mi-17s for Afghanistan or any country, and hold an open competition for the procurement of helicopters based upon valid requirements whereby U.S. manufacturers can compete.

We appreciate your prompt attention and look forward to working with you on this critical matter.

As you are aware, the House recently voted to allow the Department of Defense to continue to utilize professional sports sponsorships. However, we still have major concerns regarding the effectiveness of professional sports sponsorships to meet the goals outlined in the 2001 National Defense Authorization Act that authorized the pilot program specifically "to improve the overall effectiveness and efficiency of Army recruiting activities."

The data that we have been provided regarding the effectiveness of professional sports sponsorships continues to cite the vast number of 'leads' or 'potential recruits', but very few *actual* recruits to show for such a large investment. In 2003, the U.S. General Accounting Office report GAO-03-1005 stated that "DOD cannot show that its increased advertising efforts have been a key reason for its overall recruiting success." We are concerned that nearly 10 years later, this is still the case and have the following questions:

- 1. Has DOD developed a joint-service model that allows trade-off analyses to determine relative cost-effectiveness?
- 2. Another factor cited in the GAO report was the lack of DOD-wide guidance. What steps have been taken to ensure that effective coordination occurs between the services when and where appropriate? What are DOD's objectives for its advertising programs?

Our nation is facing unprecedented fiscal challenges, and we know that you share our concern and understand the need to scrutinize every taxpayer dollar spent. We look forward to your response.

Dear Secretary Panetta:

It has recently come to my attention that language in the 2007 National Defense Authorization Act could be imposing increased costs on the Department of Defense as relates to the transportation of remains of casualties that have died in a theater of combat operations.

Section 562 of the 2007 NDAA mandates that air transportation of remains are made by military aircraft or military-contracted aircraft, whose primary mission must be the transportation of the remains. While the first and foremost consideration is, and should continue to be, maintaining dignity and respect for the deceased as well as the surviving family, I have been informed that this language may prohibit DoD from considering a more cost-effective approach that would still guarantee the proper treatment of our deceased.

I would welcome any information the Department has regarding the costs associated with the transportation of remains, as well as an assessment on whether cost savings could be achieved if other methods that would keep with our extremely high standards of treatment and respect were to be authorized by law.

We are very concerned with DoD's apparent non-compliance with the 2009 Military and Overseas Voter Empowerment (MOVE) Act. We agree with the Senate letter dated September 7, 2012 on the same subject, and are troubled by the fact that DoD's own Inspector General (IG) found that Installation Voting Assistance Offices (IVAOs) either did not exist or were not reasonably accessible "...about 50 percent of the time." Yet, in hearing testimony given to the Subcommittee on Military Personnel on September 13, 2012, a DoD witness stated that all of the IVAOs were in place and functioning.

The data from DoD's fiscal year 2012 budget request reflects a request of \$32.4 million for the Federal Voting Assistance Program (FVAP). This is a decrease of more than \$14 million from last years' request. In light of these facts, we have the following questions:

- 1. Why, in a presidential election year, would DoD decrease the FVAP budget request by over 30%? Understanding that voter assistance is not an 'election-year only' proposition, it stands to reason that the workload would be greatest at that time.
- 2. The IG concluded that one of the reasons the Services had not established IAVOs was because funding was not available, and officials estimated that an additional \$15-20 million per year would be required to do so. Why were additional funds not requested?
- 3. DoD's own facts, as stated in the Administration's budget request, show that the military voter participation rate was 54% (compared to 63.6% for the general electorate). What was DoD's plan to address this issue?

The Department of Defense must take action to ensure that our military service members and their families have an equal opportunity to have their votes counted. We look forward to your prompt response and thank you for your service to our nation.



Dear Secretary Hagel,

The National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2013, signed into law on January 2, 2013, provided specific religious freedom protections for servicemembers generally and chaplains specifically. The provisions require the Armed Forces to accommodate servicemembers' moral and religious convictions, as long as they do not "threaten good order and discipline." The language also prohibits the military from using an individual's beliefs as the basis for adverse personnel action and ensures that chaplains will not be forced "to perform any rite, ritual, or ceremony that is contrary to [their] conscience, moral principles, or religious beliefs."

When President Obama signed the NDAA into law he contemporaneously issued a statement criticizing several provisions of the bill, including the religious freedom protections. The President called the protections "unnecessary and ill-advised" and said "The Secretary of Defense will ensure that the implementing regulations do not permit or condone discriminatory actions that compromise good order and discipline or otherwise violate military codes of conduct. My Administration remains fully committed to continuing the successful implementation of the repeal of Don't Ask, Don't Tell, and to protecting the rights of gay and lesbian service members; Section 533 will not alter that."

It is offensive for the President to suggest that protecting the free exercise of religion safeguarded by the Constitution will result in discriminatory actions that compromise good order and discipline. Labeling servicemembers of faith as discriminatory does a disservice to the countless individuals who bravely serve alongside people of diverse political, religious, and cultural backgrounds. Despite the President's insinuation to the contrary, we are confident that the implementation of the religious freedom protections will not hamper the respect and professionalism displayed by men and women in uniform.

Our primary concern lies with the regulations the Department of Defense (DoD) will issue to implement the NDAA religious freedom protections. The constitutional separation of powers requires that DoD issue implementing regulations that exemplify congressional intent, not the President's personal opinion on the merit of the measure. DoD is responsible for executing the law as written.

Congress included religious freedom protections in the NDAA to ensure that servicemembers of faith are not singled out for intimidation and adverse personnel action because of their religious beliefs; and that chaplains are not forced to participate in actions that violate their consciences. Our request is simply that DoD employ safeguards to ensure that it does not trample these



constitutionally protected religious freedoms in its pursuit of other objectives. We call on DoD to enthusiastically accommodate servicemembers' moral and religious convictions and refrain from using servicemembers' beliefs as the basis for adverse personnel action.

Amidst the aggressive changes made by the Administration, servicemembers of faith must not be demeaned or overlooked. These individuals do not leave their faith at home when they volunteer to serve. We remain committed to ensuring that they are never forced to do so.

We write to oppose any continuation of the Department of Defense's (DoD) business relationship with Rosoboronexport, Russia's primary arms exporter and an enabler of the ongoing mass atrocities in Syria. In January, Section 1277 of the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2013 (FY13 NDAA; P.L. 112-239), which expressly prohibits the use of funds to enter into any contracts or agreements with Rosoboronexport, was enacted into law. Further, during consideration of the Department of Defense Appropriations Act for Fiscal Year 2013, the House of Representatives overwhelmingly approved an amendment prohibiting further contracts with Rosoboronexport by a vote of 407-5. We urge you to uphold this law and clear expression of Congressional intent by ensuring that any further DoD procurement of helicopters for the Afghan National Security Forces is not conducted through Rosoboronexport.

Russia continues to transfer weapons through Rosoboronexport to the regime of Bashar al-Assad in Syria. Since the Syrian uprising began, Russia has continued to serve as the Assad regime's chief supplier of weapons, enabling the mass murder of Syrian citizens at the hands of their own government. According to the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights, approximately 70,000 Syrians have been killed since the Syrian conflict began two years ago. Despite the ongoing atrocities, Russia's special envoy to the Middle East, Mikhail Bogdanov, announced on February 13 that Russia would continue to supply weapons to Assad's regime. In addition, Rosoboronexport Director Anatoly Isaikin told reporters that "in the absence of sanctions, we are continuing to fulfill our contract obligations." As you know, it is Russia's veto power as a permanent member of the United Nations Security Council that has blocked the imposition of international sanctions on the Syrian regime to this point.

Last summer, DoD notified Congress of plans to exercise an option in an existing contract to purchase additional Mi-17s from Rosoboronexport – plans that Members of Congress on both sides of the aisle and human rights groups opposed. Despite these clear objections, DOD proceeded, and in response Congress enacted Section 1277 of the FY13 NDAA.

Despite this new law, we learned that the Army intends to enter into a new contract with Rosoboronexport in the coming weeks to procure 20 additional helicopters for the Afghan National Security Forces. This plan runs in direct contravention to both the spirit of the FY13 NDAA and the clear legislative intent of Congress – to ban further business dealings with



Rosoboronexport. In our view, any attempt by DoD to utilize prior-year funds would constitute a direct subversion of existing law.

The United States Government has imposed punishing sanctions on Syria and invested precious diplomatic resources to end the conflict there. The NDAA provision is intended to bolster U.S. policy and ensure that U.S. contracts with Syria's primary arms dealer do not undermine it. In order to make certain that U.S. policy on Syria is clear, consistent, and effective, we strongly urge you to certify that no new contracts are concluded or options acted upon between DoD and Rosoboronexport. Moreover, we urge you to hold an open competition for any further purchases of helicopters for the Afghan National Security Forces.

Accordingly, we request that your Department prepare a detailed briefing focusing on the following questions and present it to us before the Army takes any action on the pending contract.

- What steps has DoD taken to ensure compliance with Section 1277 of the FY13 NDAA and to consider alternative suppliers of helicopters for the Afghan National Security Forces?
- Section 1277 requires DoD, in order to exercise its waiver authority, to certify to Congress that conducting further business with Rosoboronexport is "in the national security interests of the United States." What is the national security justification of continuing business with Rosoboronexport? Relatedly, last year, DoD notified Congress of plans to purchase 33 Mi-17s from Rosoboronexport for the Afghan National Security Forces. What is the national security justification for the *additional* 20 helicopters this year?
- The Government Accountability Office and the Defense Contract Audit Agency are undertaking a Congressionally mandated examination of the Army's existing contract with Rosoboronexport. How is DoD planning to address and incorporate the review's findings into its practices and protocols?
- What steps is DoD taking to ensure that it does not support financially or otherwise enablers of mass atrocities?

Thank you for your serious attention to this request. We appreciate your prompt response.
