SECTION C Descriptions and Specifications

PROJECT #1
SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL SPECIFICATIONS
JUNE 26, 2000

1. **SCOPE OF WORK:** The Contractor shall provide all supervision, labor, materials, supplies and equipment necessary to remove snow and treat for ice on all pavement associated with the Pentagon Building. This includes, but is not limited to, all entrances, stairways, sidewalks, pathways, parking lots, roadways, ramps and bridges. The heliport pad is to be plowed only, with no chemical treatments, with prior approval through the Government. The Contractor is required to use equipment (rubber edged plow) on the heliport pad that will not damage the protective treatment covering the pavement.

2. **WORK AREAS:** The Pentagon grounds will be divided into three (3) areas of responsibility, with work being performed simultaneously:

2.1 **AREA 1:** This area will consist of all pavement associated with the River Terrace, Parade Field, Mall Terrace, Remote Delivery Facility (RDF) and the Heliport.

2.2 **AREA 2:** This area will consist of all pavement associated with the South Parking, South Terrace, A&E Drive, Center Courtyard, East Loading, River Annex Parking, Eads Street Parking, and Fern Street Parking.

2.3 **AREA 3:** This area will consist of all pavement associated with the Pentagon Heating and Refrigeration Plant (applications of ice melt chemicals and/or abrasives only), E-1 Parking, Boundary Channel Drive, North Parking and Pentagon Renovation Support Complex (including the Grounds Facilities).

2.4 **EXCLUSIONS:** The following areas are excluded from this contract: Federal Office Building Number 2, Metro Bus Terminal and all pay parking lots. There is no shoveling, plowing or hauling of snow and ice, required at the Pentagon Heating and Refrigeration Plant.

3. **TASKS:** The three work areas will be divided into two (2) tasks to be addressed, in order of priority, as follows:

3.1 **TASK 1:** This work includes all entrances, stairways, sidewalks and pathways.

3.2 **TASK 2:** This work includes all parking lots, roadways, ramps and bridges.

4. **SERVICE:**

4.1 **SUPERVISION:** The Contractor shall designate an on-site supervisor who shall be present at all times on the job while work is in progress. The on-site supervisor shall be on the premises to manage snow and ice removal operations through completion of work and until released by the Government. The supervisor shall direct the operations being performed simultaneously in the three (3) above mentioned areas of responsibility. The on-site supervisor shall redirect work as necessary to meet the Government's needs, as requested by the Government duty officer.

4.2 **SNOW STAKES:** The Contractor shall furnish, install and maintain snow stakes, as required, at all locations to identify edges of roads and sidewalks, curbs, fire hydrants, catch basins, etc. Snow stakes shall be two (2) inches by two (2) inches by five (5) feet wood stakes and shall be painted (full length) yellow, red and silver to identify curbs, fire hydrants and catch basins, respectively. Each specific color of paint

shall be of the same shade and uniform in appearance. Snow stakes shall be painted prior to installation (off-site) and installed (no less than one (1) foot below ground level) and maintained at a uniform height (no less than three (3) feet above the ground) and shall be perpendicular to the ground at all times. Upon completing the installation of snow stakes, the Contractor shall provide to the Government a site plan, indicating the number of stakes installed in each respective area. Biweekly, the Contractor shall inspect all snow stakes to ensure compliance with the contract requirements. Broken snow stakes shall be removed immediately from the premises and replacement stakes shall be furnished, installed and maintained by the Contractor at no additional cost to the Government. The Contractor will be paid $\frac{1}{2}$ the unit price after installation of the snow stakes is completed in the fall and the remainder upon removal of the snow stakes in the spring, but only after final cleanup has been performed. Snow stakes shall be installed by November 1st and removed no later than April 1st.

4.3 DEICING COMPOUNDS AND ABRASIVES: The Contractor shall furnish and apply all chemicals, abrasives and any other product used for the melting of snow and ice or for traction. The Government shall determine when abrasives are to be applied. Salt (sodium chloride) shall only be used at the discretion and with the written approval of the COR. All chemicals and abrasives shall be approved by the COR prior to application, otherwise the Government will not be responsible for cost reimbursement to the Contractor. In addition, the Contractor shall also be considered to be in noncompliance with the contract specifications if such applications are made. All materials shall be maintained by the Contractor at his/her expense in a dry location, kept in usable condition at all times and shall only be used in support of this contract. The Contractor shall ensure that sufficient quantities of chemical are available, to adequately treat the entire compound a minimum of two (2) times. The Government will furnish a location on-site to be utilized by the Contractor, for the placement of a Government approved trailer, to be used for the storage of environmentally safe ice melt materials only, in direct support of this contract. Fuel, equipment, abrasives, etc. shall not be stored on site.

4.4 SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL: Once it is determined that snow and ice removal services are required and the Government notifies the Contractor to start, the Contractor has two (2) hours to report to the Pentagon and begin performing with a full complement of personnel, equipment, materials and supplies necessary to address the prevailing conditions in all areas. The Contractor shall remain on site until the Government gives notification to stop work.

The Contractor shall perform continuously throughout the duration of the storm, providing a clear and safe passage for both pedestrians and vehicular traffic alike, in all areas until released by the Government. Special attention shall be given to all ramps, walkways and parking areas that are designated for the handicap. Pavement shall be cleared to full widths to prevent melting runoff and refreezing. Fire hydrants and catch basins shall be kept clear of snow accumulations. During excessive snow (four (4) inches of accumulation or more), if requested by the Government or when pedestrian or vehicular ingress or egress is impeded, the Contractor shall be required to haul snow. The Contractor will be permitted to haul to an on-site area designated by the Government. The Contractor shall only enter and exit the designated area when hauling snow, by a route approved by the Government. Hauled snow shall be dumped and not plowed onto the designated area. Track loaders are not permitted on the grounds. Snow is not to be plowed, dumped or piled on or near ornamental plantings and flower beds. Snow shall be hauled from the River and Mall Terraces regardless of how much snow has fallen. The Contractor shall not block or barricade pedestrian or vehicular ingress or egress and the dumping of snow in any parking space is not acceptable.

As determined by the Government duty officer, the application of ice melt chemicals and/or abrasives can be ordered as one complete treatment or for specific areas. The Contractor shall ensure that each specific product being used is applied uniformly and only at rates prescribed by the manufacturer. Only directional spreaders shall be used on pavement bordered by ornamental plantings. The Contractor shall not allow chemicals or abrasives to be broadcast or dumped onto planted areas. The Government reserves the right to order spot treatments, as needed, for small areas of snow or ice that still need to be addressed, at no additional cost.

4.5 CLEANUP: After each storm, when the snow and ice has melted, the Contractor shall perform a complete and all inclusive cleanup, including but not limited to, grounds repair, the removal of all associated debris, and the removal of all remaining chemicals and abrasives used during performance, at no additional cost to the Government. Chemicals and abrasives shall not be swept or blown off pavement and onto the grounds. The Contractor shall be required to repair damaged turf with certified sod approved by the Government Horticulturist. Damaged areas shall be prepared to accept only full standard widths of sod. Likewise, all damaged ornamentals shall be replaced by the Contractor, with each plant being the same variety and size, specimen quality and approved by the Government Horticulturist.

5. PERFORMANCE: The Contractor's performance shall be evaluated on meeting the snow and ice removal and/or treatment schedule time frame(s), while complying with the work requirements. For acceptable performance, the Contractor shall provide a clean, clear, non-slippery pavement surface, free of snow and ice accumulations at the completion of work. The schedules are as follows:

6. QUALITY CONTROL: The Contractor shall be required to establish a complete quality control program to ensure compliance with the contract work requirements. A critical aspect of this program is an inspection system, that shall enable the Contractor to evaluate contract performance and identify deficiencies in the quality of service, before the level of performance is unacceptable. The on-site supervisor is required to personally inspect the entire compound and correct any deficiencies prior to the final inspection with the Government.

HOLIDAYS: A minimum of ten paid holidays per year: New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Jr.'s Birthday, Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Columbus Day, Veterans' Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day. (A contractor may substitute for any of the named holidays another day off with pay in accordance with a plan communicated to the employees involved.) (See 29 CFR 4.174)

THE OCCUPATIONS WHICH HAVE PARENTHESES AFTER THEM RECEIVE THE FOLLOWING BENEFITS (as numbered):

- 1) Does not apply to employees employed in a bona fide executive, administrative, or professional capacity as defined and delineated in 29 CFR 541. (See CFR 4.156)
- 2) APPLICABLE TO AIR TRAFFIC CONTROLLERS ONLY - NIGHT DIFFERENTIAL: An employee is entitled to pay for all work performed between the hours of 6:00 P.M. and 6:00 A.M. at the rate of basic pay plus a night pay differential amounting to 10 percent of the rate of basic pay.
- 3) WEATHER OBSERVERS - NIGHT PAY & SUNDAY PAY: If you work at night as part of a regular tour of duty, you will earn a night differential and receive an additional 10% of basic pay for any hours worked between 6pm and 6am. If you are a full-time employed (40 hours a week) and Sunday is part of your regularly scheduled workweek, you are paid at your rate of basic pay plus a Sunday premium of 25% of your basic rate for each hour of Sunday work which is not overtime (i.e. occasional work on Sunday outside the normal tour of duty is considered overtime work).

**** UNIFORM ALLOWANCE ****

If employees are required to wear uniforms in the performance of this contract (either by the terms of the Government contract, by the employer, by the state or local law, etc.), the cost of furnishing such uniforms and maintaining (by laundering or dry cleaning) such uniforms is an expense that may not be borne by an employee where such cost reduces the hourly rate below that required by the wage determination. The Department of Labor will accept payment in accordance with the following standards as compliance:

The contractor or subcontractor is required to furnish all employees with an adequate number of uniforms without cost or to reimburse employees for the actual cost of the uniforms. In addition, where uniform cleaning and maintenance is made the responsibility of the employee, all contractors and subcontractors subject to this wage determination shall (in the absence of a bona fide collective bargaining agreement providing for a different amount, or the furnishing of contrary affirmative proof as to the actual cost), reimburse all employees for such cleaning and maintenance at a rate of \$3.35 per week (or \$.67 cents per day). However, in those instances where the uniforms furnished are made of "wash and wear" materials, may be routinely washed and dried with other personal garments, and do not require any special treatment such as dry cleaning, daily washing, or commercial laundering in order to meet the cleanliness or appearance standards set by the terms of the Government contract, by the contractor, by law, or by the nature of the work, there is no

requirement that employees be reimbursed for uniform maintenance costs.

REQUEST FOR AUTHORIZATION OF ADDITIONAL CLASSIFICATION AND WAGE RATE {Standard Form 1444

(SF 1444)}

Conformance Process:

The contracting officer shall require that any class of service employee which is not listed herein and which is to be employed under the contract (i.e., the work to be performed is not performed by any classification listed in the wage determination), be classified by the contractor so as to provide a reasonable relationship (i.e., appropriate level of skill comparison) between such unlisted classifications and the classifications listed in the wage determination. Such conformed classes of employees shall be paid the monetary wages and furnished the fringe benefits as are determined. Such conforming process shall be initiated by the contractor prior to the performance of contract work by such unlisted class(es) of employees. The conformed classification, wage rate, and/or fringe benefits shall be retroactive to the commencement date of the contract. {See Section 4.6 (C)(vi)} When multiple wage determinations are included in a contract, a separate SF 1444 should be prepared for each wage determination to which a class(es) is to be conformed.

The process for preparing a conformance request is as follows:

- 1) When preparing the bid, the contractor identifies the need for a conformed occupation(s) and computes a proposed rate(s).
- 2) After contract award, the contractor prepares a written report listing in order proposed classification title(s), a Federal grade equivalency (FGE) for each proposed classification(s), job description(s), and rationale for proposed wage rate(s), including information regarding the agreement or disagreement of the authorized representative of the employees involved, or where there is no authorized representative, the employees themselves. This report should be submitted to the contracting officer no later than 30 days after such unlisted class(es) of employees performs any contract work.
- 3) The contracting officer reviews the proposed action and promptly submits a report of the action, together with the agency's recommendations and pertinent information including the position of the contractor and the employees, to the Wage and Hour Division, Employment Standards Administration, U.S. Department of Labor, for review. (See section 4.6(b)(2) of Regulations 29 CFR Part 4).
- 4) Within 30 days of receipt, the Wage and Hour Division approves, modifies, or disapproves the action via transmittal to the agency contracting officer, or notifies the contracting officer that additional time will be required to process the request.
- 5) The contracting officer transmits the Wage and Hour decision to the contractor.
- 6) The contractor informs the affected employees.

Information required by the Regulations must be submitted on SF 1444 or bond paper.

When preparing a conformance request, the "Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations" (the Directory) should be used to compare job definitions to insure that duties requested are not performed by a classification already listed in the wage determination. Remember, it is not the job title, but the required tasks that determine whether a class is included in an established wage determination. Conformances may not be used to artificially split, combine, or subdivide classifications listed in the wage determination.

H.2 SECURITY CLEARANCE

Prior to commencement, the contractor shall submit names, social security number, date of birth, height, weight, place of birth, race and sex of all personnel who will be involved in the project requiring access to the building. Employees from other countries must also submit information relating to their eligibility to work in the United States. In addition, any vehicle to be directly used in relation to this project must submit to the Contracting Officer the model, make, tag number, State of registration and appointed driver. Note: this process takes 3 to 5 working days for a temporary clearance for personnel and a minimum of 90 days for a permanent clearance. Contractors will be given access for the period of performance of the contract. Contracts with a performance period of one year or more will be given access for a period not to exceed one year.

H.3 CONTRACTOR EMPLOYEES

Employees involved with this contract must be a United States or a Legal Alien who has been admitted for permanent residence by the Immigration and Naturalization Service. The contractor shall prohibit his employee from disturbing papers or desks, opening desk drawers or cabinets, or using the telephone or other office equipment while performing on this project. Contract employees shall comply with the instructions pertaining to conduct and building regulations as issued by duly appointed officials. The contractor employees will be permitted access to toilet and eating facilities within the building.

52.216-18 ORDERING. (OCT 1995)

(a) Any supplies and services to be furnished under this contract shall be ordered by issuance of delivery orders or task orders by the individuals or activities designated in the Schedule. Such orders may be issued from date of award through September 30, 2001.

(b) All delivery orders or task orders are subject to the terms and conditions of this contract. In the event of conflict between a delivery order or task order and this contract, the contract shall control.

(c) If mailed, a delivery order or task order is considered "issued" when the Government deposits the order in the mail. Orders may be issued orally, by facsimile, or by electronic commerce methods only if authorized in the Schedule.

52.216-19 ORDER LIMITATIONS. (OCT 1995)

(a) Minimum order. When the Government requires supplies or services covered by this contract in an amount of less than 1 frequency, the Government is not obligated to purchase, nor is the Contractor obligated to furnish, those supplies or services under the contract.

(b) Maximum order. The Contractor is not obligated to honor:

(1) Any order for a single item in excess of 1 frequency;

(2) Any order for a combination of items in excess of 140 frequencies; or
