We understand that three subjects will be on the agenda: (1) Status of the IAEA inspection/discussions with the DPRK as it relates to the question of defueling. (2) The issue of North-South contacts as they relate to the third round. If time permits (unlikely), (3) our vision of U.S.-DPRK relations after the third round.

(1) IAEA—At this writing, IAEA has indicated it will send inspectors into Yongbyon to complete the February inspections and to perform maintenance on safeguards equipment.





North Korea

- begin informally circulating a draft resolution in the next day or so. We are consulting allies and Security Council members on the substance of possible sanctions and their timing.
- -- Our approach is a phased, step-by-step approach to resolve the situation. It is important not only to act with regard to past actions/behavior but also to create leverage for possible future actions by the North, such as further actions to impede the activity of the IAEA or withdrawal from the Nuclear Non-Proliferation treaty (NPT).
- -- Our goals remain constant: achieving a nuclear free Korean peninsula and promoting a strong non-proliferation regime.
- -- The statement on Monday by the North Koreans that they intend to withdraw from the IAEA makes a serious situation even more so. The draft resolution will address such further actions.

If asked:

- -- Consultations with allies: We are working closely with Japan and South Korea and we continue to consult on the language for a draft resolution.
 - -- We have made real progress with the Russians.
 - -- The Chinese share our goals; but we cannot predict China's position at the UN. (FYI: They have not told us that they would veto a sanctions resolution.)
- -- <u>Carter mission:</u> President Carter is travelling at his own initiative in an unofficial capacity. We have briefed him on the situation and our policy. (Tony Lake and other USG officials briefed him on Friday.)
- -- International conference: We believe that President Yeltsin's proposal for an international conference can be useful at some point but our first focus is on pursuing sanctions at the UNSC.
- Korean threats of war: There is nothing new in North Korea's threats that sanctions would be an act of war. We do not, of course, believe that they would be an act of war. Neither we nor the world community will be intimidated by such statements.
- -- Troop deployments: We have taken those prudent measures necessary for the defense of our forces in South Korea and to assist in the defense of that nation.
 - -- We will keep under review any further measures necessary.

KOREA: MESSAGE OF THE DAY, JUNE 14, 1994

Key Points:

- -- We are resolved to meet the North Korean nuclear challenge with firmness and steadiness.
- -- We are building an international consensus to meet this challenge and must work to sustain it as we move toward UN sanctions.
 - There is no daylight between us and our treaty allies, South Korea and Japan. Coordination with Russia has been good. Like Russia, China shares our interests in a nonnuclear Korean peninsula and peace and stability in the region; we have consulted extensively with the Chinese and urge them to join the international community in a firm response to the North Korean challenge.
- The purpose of UN sanctions is to demonstrate to <u>all</u> nations that flouting international nonproliferation norms carries penalties, and to increase the pressure on North Korea to return to compliance with those norms.
 - -- The door remains open to North Korea to better relations with the outside world, but only if it acts to restore the basis of dialoge. That begins with resuming cooperation with the IAEA.
- -- Our security commitment to South Korea and Japan is unshakeable. We are taking prudent measures to increase our defensive capability in Korea.
 - -- We will not provoke an attack from the North, but we must not invite it by lack of resolve or readiness.





1630 Meeting

The meeting at 1630 is to be a discussion with outside experts. (Included are Arnie Kanter (RAND, former Under Sec of State in Bush Admin.), Spector (Brookings nonpoliferation expert), Dick Solomon (RAND, Bush-era Asst. Sec. of State for Asia), Don Gregg (FSO, former amb. to Korea), Lilley (Cheney's ASD/ISA), Janne Nolan (Brookings), Mike Ocksenberg (FSO, old Asia hand), Romberg, Scalapino (academic expert on Asia), Selig Harrison (Carneige nonproliferation expert), and probably others.)

After Lake briefs on the Carter trip and Christopher talks about diplomatic developments, you will be asked to say a few words on the security situation. I should think the key points are (familiarly):

- -- High degree of conventional threat
- -- Dangers from expansion of NK nuclear weapons program
- -- Need for military readiness, to protect against NK threats and to deter them
- -- Necessity for solidarity with ROK, Japan, and Chinese support.

STATEMENT BY SECRETARY PERRY BEFORE THE SENATE ARMED SERVICES COMMITTEE ON KOREAN DEVELOPMENTS JUNE 17, 1994

BACKGROUND--

Mr. Chairman, thank you for this opportunity to speak to you on the North Korea nuclear issue and the related question of military readiness on the Korean peninsula.

For more than 15 months, since North Korea first announced its intention to withdraw from the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty, the United States has sought a diplomatic solution to the prevailing impasse on the Korean peninsula. Our goal has been very clear: to contain, and ultimately, to eliminate the nuclear weapons program that has been initiated by the North Koreans as well as to ensure a strong nonproliferation regime. To achieve that goal, we have announced our willingness to sit down with North Korea and offer them incentives in the political, economic, and security fields under the rubric of what we have termed the "broad and thorough approach." But the start of such talks was contingent on the North refraining from taking actions that would foreclose the option of fully accounting for its past nuclear activities.

Unfortunately, the North disregarded our calls for restraint and recently took measures that seriously eroded the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) efforts to account for past nuclear activities. Specifically, the North discharged spent fuel rods from its 25 MWt reactor without allowing the IAEA to segregate rods for future historical analysis. In IAEA's words, they stated that North Korea's actions had seriously eroded the organization's ability to reconstruct the historical record of the reactor and thereby determine how much plutonium might have been previously diverted for potential weapons-making. No technical or scientific necessity dictated the defueling of the reactor at this time; only a willful intent to obstruct the international community's efforts animated the North Koreans.

Having told the North Koreans that defueling outside satisfactory arrangements with the IAEA would undermine the basis for any further high-level bilateral negotiations and would prompt us to return to the UN Security Council for further action, we are now in the process of consultations with the PermFive and the ROK and Japan on a sanctions resolution.

As you know, there were developments yesterday which indicate that North Korea may have offered new steps to resolve the international community's concerns, saying that the IAEA inspectors and monitoring equipment will be left in place, and that it wishes to convert its reactor system to light water reactors. If North Korea means by this also that it is willing to freeze its nuclear program if we conduct talks with the North, this could be a promising development. If this means that North Korea is genuinely and verifiably prepared to freeze its nuclear program while talks are going on—and we hope this is the case—then the President has stated that we would be willing


to resume high-level talks. In the meantime, we will pursue our consultations on sanctions at the United Nations.

The resolution is a means of signalling the seriousness of our intent and our determination to pursue the nuclear question unwaveringly to its conclusion. We understand, and I have stated in the past, that a move toward sanctions will increase tensions on the peninsula and will correspondingly increase our responsibility for ensuring the continued readiness of U.S. and ROK forces tasked to meet any military forays from the North. The stakes involved, from defense of our allies, to the safeguarding of regional stability, to the preservation of the global nonproliferation regime demand that we stay the course and take the necessary measures to prevail in this situation.

Although there are continuing developments as we sit here, and although Round three may eventually prove to be fruitful, I would like to cover two topics today:

1) our current approach to sanctions; and 2) our approach to enhancing force readiness as tensions increase with the move toward sanctions.

FORCE ENHANCEMENTS-


Since last fall, when tensions began to rise over North Korea's refusal to meet its obligations under the NPT and the North-South Denuclearization agreement, the U.S. and ROK governments have taken steps to enhance the capabilities of forces assigned to the Combined Forces Command. Our efforts to enhance the capabilities of CFC's forces have focused on addressing those aspects of North Korea's military posture that are of greatest concern. Chief among these are:

- North Korea forward posture and its ability to initiate large-scale offensive operations with little warning;
- The North's overwhelming advantage in numbers of artillery pieces;
- Threats to airbases, ports, and other rear area assets from SOF, TBMs, and other sources.

Throughout this period, the Department of Defense has provided CINCCFC with the forces and assets he has requested and feels are needed to accomplish his missions. The judgments of the CINC and the Department regarding force enhancements have been tempered by considerations of the impact of our moves on North Korean perceptions and possible reactions. Obviously, we will do whatever is necessary and prudent to protect South Korea and our forces there. However, we also seek to avoid provoking the North into precipitate action.

- Agreement to a North-South Summit and a third round of U.S.-DPRK talks seems to have intensified rather than lessened the "vilifying and seditious" broadcast from the DPRK according to sources. At the center of <u>current propaganda</u> are U.S. "ill-boding military operations" (including ship names/type) in Japan, our nuclear subs threatening the NK coast and shipping, large amounts of ammunition in Japan for use against the DPRK, and "U.S. imperialists frantically running amuck on the eve of war."
- <u>Kim Il-Sung criticized the military supply industry this week for failing to prepare for war</u> while urging quick completion of construction on tunnels, including a relocation site tunnel, for wartime use that had been excavated, but lacked finishing materials.



ISSUE: (6) With the foreseeable obstacles to a Third Round of high-level U.S.-DPRK talks now cleared away, we must begin seriously and quickly reviewing our negotiating strategy for this session. Such a relook should draw on past negotiating strategies and initiatives and incorporate those measures that have been relatively productive over the past two years. We will discover that our negotiating perspective must also be broadened so that Third Round accomplishments are framed in such way as to serve as a springboard to the accomplishment of our longer-term objectives of peace and stability on the peninsula and in the region. DoD is writing a paper on U.S. strategy, beginning with an analysis of the DPRK's negotiating priorities and its willingness to close a deal.

BACKGROUND: (6) Following up on the slight opening provided by Carter's trip to Pyongyang, we have secured the DPRK's commitment to a freeze on the most important parts of its nuclear program (no refueling, no reprocessing, IAEA personnel monitoring of nuclear sites) during the course of negotiations. The North has also agreed to unconditional meetings with the ROK to plan for a bilateral presidential summit. The cooperative tone adopted by the DPRK in the near-term provides at least a narrow window of opportunity through which we can move to establish momentum behind a

PANMUNIOM

• As noted in my earlier memo to you, the North and South reached agreement on the dates for the initial <u>Presidential Summit to be held in Pyongyang 25-27 July.</u> There will be a follow-on summit in Seoul in August as envisioned by the ROK.

There seems to be a sense of euphoria in the ROK press "over the fact that both sides "dramatically and completely" agreed to hold the summit.

SEOUL

- Sunday papers carried a detailed story of the proposed Nunn-Lugar trip (according to a USG official) as a "secret delegation to sound out North Korea" since we had decided that the New York channel of Gallucci-Kang was "seriously flawed, having tried and failed to find a short cut to Kim Il-sung." The trip is alleged to have been nixed by Kim.
- A ROKG official told the news services that the South will, as part of its agenda for the N-S Summit, propose a peace treaty to replace the Armistice Agreement of 1956. **PYONGYANG**
- Food, and in some cases water, shortages persist in provinces outside of Pyongyang. "Preferential Goods" such as sewing machines, bicycles, fans, furniture, notebook paper, wallpaper, and cardboard are being produced and given to those who donate "reserve grain" to the government for redistribution. Hail and frost damage as well as shortages of insecticide are adding to the problems of foodstuffs production. Chinese rice, corn, and other grains arriving by truck and rail remain the primary source of daily rations.
- After gaining access to the <u>reprocessing facility</u> on 27 June, an IAEA inspector serviced the safeguards equipment including the cameras, but did not report any changes in the status of construction on the second line which still requires instrumentation. Two new inspectors will assume the watch in Yongbyon this week.




