

# Regional Defense Combating Terrorism Fellowship Program

Fiscal Year 2011

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## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report is presented by the Department of Defense (DoD) in accordance with Title 10 of the United States Code, Section 2249c (10 U.S.C. Section 2249c). The Regional Defense Combating Terrorism Fellowship Program (CTFP) was established to meet an emerging and urgent defense requirement to build partnerships in the struggle against violent extremism through targeted, non-lethal, combating terrorism (CbT) education and training. The CTFP directly supports DoD's efforts by providing CbT education and training for mid- to senior-level international military officers, ministry of defense civilians, and security officials.

The Assistant Secretary of Defense for Special Operations/Low Intensity Conflict (SO/LIC) provides policy oversight. The Defense Security Cooperation Agency (DSCA) provides program and financial management. The CTFP requires approval from the Chiefs of Missions and Leahy Amendment vetting prior to any event or engagement.

The CTFP's goals are:

- Develop and strengthen human and intellectual capital to understand the ideologies and mechanisms of terrorism and the ways and means of countering them;
- Build CbT capabilities and capacities of partner nations;
- Build and strengthen a global network of CbT experts and practitioners committed to participation in support of U.S. efforts against terrorists and terrorist organizations;
- Counter ideological support for terrorism and violent extremism;
- Harmonize views about the threat of terrorism and its evolution; and
- Develop CbT and Counter Insurgency (COIN) mutual understandings.

CTFP programs are designed to address key CbT challenges globally, regionally, and in specific countries through a tailored program of educational and training activities. The CTFP provides a unique and flexible tool to focus efforts toward building partner capacity to meet a specific Combatant Command (COCOM) objective.

As detailed in the remainder of this report and the table below, the CTFP sponsored multiple CbT educational events in Fiscal Year 2011 (FY 2011). These events involved 3,026 security personnel from 138 countries, with the goal of meeting the needs identified by the regional combatant commanders.

This report accounts for the expenditure of appropriated funds during FY 2011 for the CTFP, including the countries which received CTFP funding, the total amount of funding provided for each country, and the educational courses attended by the foreign officers and officials. The report also includes an assessment of the effectiveness of the program and a review of efforts to improve it.

The contents of this report are unclassified and reflect data gathered from multiple sources, including security assistance officers, COCOMs, and other DoD entities. Questions about the contents of this report or the program should be directed to the CTFP manager at 703-602-2023.

## **I. CTFP CONTRIBUTIONS**

### **A. OVERVIEW**

Created in 2002, the Combating Terrorism Fellowship Program (CTFP) was established to meet Department of Defense (DoD) requirements to build partnerships in the struggle against violent extremism through targeted, non-lethal, combating terrorism (CbT) education and training. The CTFP directly supports DoD efforts by providing CbT education and training for mid- to senior-level international military officers, ministry of defense civilians, and security officials. The CTFP provides unique relationship and capacity-building opportunities which enable partner countries to address threats of terrorism within their borders and regions and strengthens collaboration with, and support for, U.S. and partner nation efforts to defeat terrorism.

The CTFP's goals are to:

- Develop and strengthen human and intellectual capital to understand the ideologies and mechanisms of terrorism and the ways and means of countering them;
- Build the CbT capabilities and capacities of partner nations;
- Build and strengthen a global network of CbT experts and practitioners committed to participation in support of U.S. efforts against terrorists and terrorist organizations;
- Counter ideological support for terrorism and violent extremism;
- Harmonize views about the threat of terrorism and its evolution; and
- Develop CbT and Counter Insurgency (COIN) mutual understandings.

CTFP programs are designed to address key CbT challenges globally, regionally, and in specific countries through tailored education programs. The CTFP is a flexible tool to can focus efforts toward building partner capacity to meet a specific Combatant Command (COCOM) objective.

The CTFP works hand-in-hand with the COCOMs to identify candidates for programs and to develop CbT programs specifically tailored to partner nations and their regional and global relationships. COCOMs recommend participants to the Office of the Secretary of Defense (OSD) for approval. Potential candidates include senior and mid-level military officials, ministry of defense civilians, and other foreign government security officials who could have an impact on their country's ability and willingness to cooperate with the United States in the struggle against violent extremism. CTFP funds these participants to attend DoD programs in the United States and abroad. All candidates are verified and vetted for human rights abuses as required by annual DoD appropriations acts (in a provision also referred to as the Leahy Amendment).

The CTFP builds interagency cooperation among partners by training a broad range of foreign CbT military officers and government security officials, and provides specialized programs to address individual country needs. CTFP programs engage military, national police, gendarmerie, internal security, border security, and other security officials. The program enables DoD to implement the President's National Counterterrorism Strategy more effectively by providing resources targeted toward integrating instruments of national power, traditionally

expressed as diplomatic, economic, informational, and military. In addition, the CTFP seeks to integrate military instruments with other security-sector elements, such as financial, intelligence, and law enforcement.

In FY 2011, 3,026 foreign military, and security officials attended CTFP-funded programs throughout the six regional COCOMs. This included CbT education and training support to emerging regional and sub-regional organizations and alliances. Regional training events are particularly effective in developing personal and professional relationships among security officials from many countries within a given geographic area, and are extremely cost effective. Additionally, the CTFP provides a series of globally oriented courses which enhance mutual understanding and facilitates cooperation across the globe.

Regional and global events are crucial in building a robust network of CbT officials who share a common understanding of CbT issues and are able to reach out to other organizations and countries to coordinate effectively. However, in helping to build this network, the CTFP recognizes 10 U.S.C. Section 2249c restricts payment of costs only to those associated with the education and training of individuals who are currently foreign military officers, ministry of defense officials, and security officials. Therefore, all foreign participants in CTFP events are screened to ensure their current eligibility under the law. In most classrooms, U.S. personnel are learning alongside CTFP-funded participants, developing and reinforcing relationships between partner countries and the United States. Only an empowered network of CbT practitioners will defeat the networks of our adversaries. The CTFP catalyzes networks and actively sustains and facilitates these connections through continuing education and training activities that reinforce relationships. The network, as it grows, will become increasingly self-reinforcing and less reliant on the United States for support.

## **B. REPORT REQUIREMENTS**

Pursuant to 10 U.S.C. Section 2249c, "not later than December 1 of each year, the Secretary of Defense shall submit to Congress a report on the administration of this section during the fiscal year ended in such year."

This report is submitted by DoD in accordance with 10 U.S.C. Section 2249c and provides:

- A complete accounting of the expenditure of appropriated funds for authorized purposes, including:
  - The countries of the foreign officers and officials for whom costs were paid; and
  - For each such country, the total amount of the costs paid.
- The training courses attended by the foreign officers and officials, including a specification of which, if any, courses were conducted in foreign countries.
- An assessment of the effectiveness of the CTFP in increasing the cooperation of the governments of foreign countries with the United States National Counterterrorism Strategy.
- A discussion of any actions being taken to improve the program.

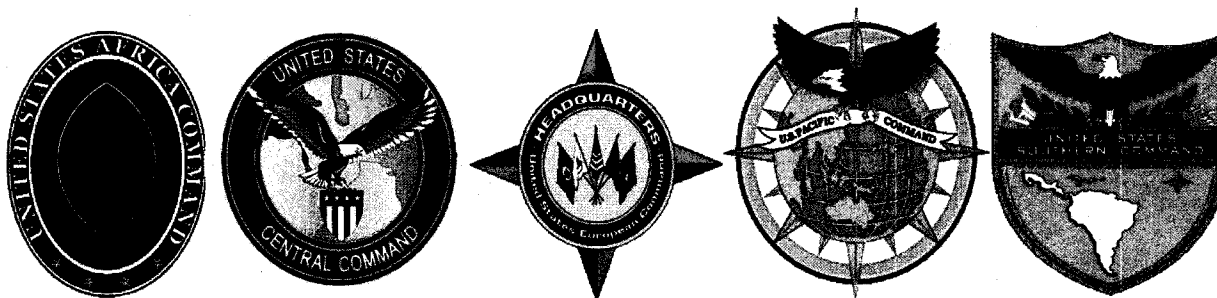
## C. PROGRAM ASSESSMENT

Since the CTFP's establishment in 2002, graduates of the program have continued to advance professionally, and in many cases have entered into senior-level positions in their respective countries. The CTFP works with eleven institutions to provide resident courses of various lengths and CbT focus. These are the five Regional Centers: Near East South Asia Center for Strategic Studies (NESA), Center for Hemispheric Defense Studies (CHDS), Asia Pacific Center for Security Studies (APCSS), Africa Center for Strategic Studies (ACSS), and George C. Marshall European Center for Security Studies (GCMC). The other six are DoD academic institutions: The Defense Institute for International Legal Studies (DIILS), Defense Intelligence Agency/National Defense Intelligence College (DIA/NDIC), the Naval Post Graduate School/Defense Analysis Department (NPS/DA), the National Defense University/College of International Security Affairs (NDU/CISA), the Joint Special Operations University (JSOU), and the Center for Civil-Military Relations (CCMR).



## D. KEY PROGRAM ACCOMPLISHMENTS

In FY 2011, the CTFP continued to build individual and institutional capacity in key countries to combat terrorism. Highlighted below are a few of the major accomplishments:



- **USAFRICOM:** Responding to an urgent request from an African CTFP graduate, USAFRICOM sponsored a mobile education team to bring together countries affected by the Lord's Resistance Army (LRA). Uganda, South Sudan, Cameroon, Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC), and Central African Republic met for four days in Kampala, Uganda, to discuss previous successes and failures in the battle against the LRA. Invaluable lessons from the Ugandan-South Sudan combined campaign were shared with the group. More importantly, the DRC agreed to reopen joint intelligence and operational centers with Uganda, centers which were previously closed due to political differences.
- **USCENTCOM:** Dushanbe, Tajikistan, was the venue for a Joint Special Operations University (JSOU) regional seminar to Central and South Asian States. This highly successful event concentrated on border security and terrorist sanctuary denial and featured simultaneous translation in Dari, Russian, and English. Fifteen senior military officers from Tajikistan, Afghanistan, Kazakhstan, and Kyrgyzstan participated in the academic seminar in advance of, and in coordination with, the Joint Chiefs of Staff exercise on regional cooperation. Pairing this event with a related exercise acts as a force multiplier for achieving COCOM goals and objectives in the region.
- **USEUCOM:** Bratislava, Slovakia hosted a regional seminar to Eastern Europe conducted by CCMR. This very successful event concentrated on transnational threats and homeland defense. Thirty-five senior military officers and government security officials from Bulgaria, Czech Republic, Poland, Romania, and Slovakia participated in this academic seminar. All participating countries have similar challenges in homeland defense and, consequently, benefited from sharing lessons learned in a non-attribution environment. Additionally, the CTFP sponsored a four-day workshop in Macedonia on cyber terror and computer-based crimes. DIILS led the workshop, and it was attended by officials from Bulgaria, Croatia, Czech Republic, Kosovo, Macedonia, Montenegro, Serbia, and Slovenia.
- **USNORTHCOM:** CTFP funded three U.S. Coast Guard mobile training teams (MTTs) to conduct training in Mexico in support of USNORTHCOM goals and objectives to assist the Mexican security forces in understanding the basic principles and strategies involved with protecting a maritime-port complex. These MTTs provided key expertise and tools to the host-nation forces, which exercise jurisdiction at Mexican ports and in Mexican territorial waters. The program addressed specific issues and problems encountered by port security forces as they conduct port surveillance and ship-boarding operations. Additional topics included fostering global cooperation against transnational threats and the prevention of the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction (WMD).
- **USPACOM:** The CTFP funded the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) Annual National Academy Associates (FBINAA), Asia-Pacific Re-Trainer Conference held May 22-27, 2011 in the Philippines. The FBINAA is a non-profit, international organization globally recognized by government leaders, law enforcement, intelligence agencies, and counter-terrorism communities as a premier provider of law enforcement and security expertise, training, education, and information. FBINAA is the strongest law enforcement and security leadership network in the world with nearly 17,000 senior security professionals dedicated to strengthening the rule of law. More than 100 counter-terrorism and law enforcement personnel from New Delhi, Beijing, Bangkok, Manila, Jakarta, Kuala Lumpur, Seoul, Tokyo, Phnom Penh, Singapore, Hong Kong,



Manila, and several other island nations participated in the conference. The conference agenda included discussions on intelligence-led policing, international task-force cooperation, biometrics, and information sharing. U.S. instructors included officials from DoD, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), and the FBI. USPACOM considers the FBINAA to be an immensely valuable network that has the ability to anticipate and respond effectively to global, regional, and community law enforcement, public safety, and counter-terrorism challenges.

- **USSOUTHCOM:** — USSOUTHCOM funded six Mobile Education Training (MET) and MTTs for Colombia through the CTFP. These METs contributed directly to the success of several operations by the Colombian government and their armed forces against the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia (FARC).

## **E. CONTINUING ENGAGEMENT STRATEGY**

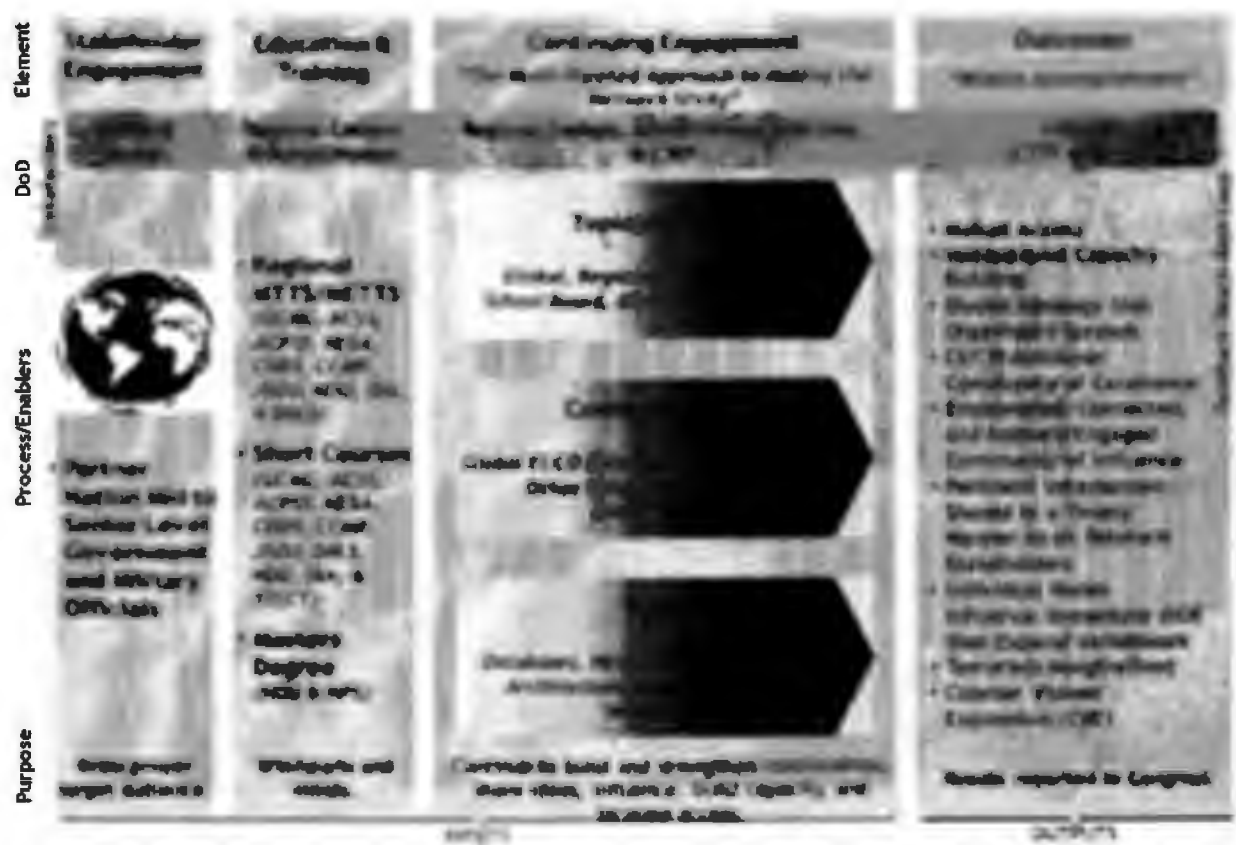
In FY 2011, the CTFP continued efforts to expand individual and institutional capacity-building programs for developing a networked, global CbT capacity. Since its establishment in 2002, the CTFP has educated more than 21,000 people (see Exhibit A). As explained in previous annual reports, “phase one” of the program focused on building a comprehensive strategic-level CbT education curriculum. This was accomplished through a combination of short, certificate programs at specialized DoD academic institutions and full-scale masters degree programs at National Defense University (NDU) and Naval Post Graduate School (NPS). Each of these courses or degrees was designed to address relevant and emerging CbT issues proactively. Starting in FY 2008, NDU and NPS had the opportunity to reengage alumni through short symposiums, which set the tone for a formalized CTFP continuing engagement strategy.

The program's success and maturity have resulted in the development of a Continuing Engagement strategy. Implementation began through providing resources and enabling partner institutions to maintain and grow their educational relationships with past participants. This "phase two" of the CTFP allows DoD to realize the value of its investment more fully. The graphic below (Exhibit B) outlines how the Continuing Engagement strategy builds on the first seven years of the program. Continuing Engagement has three main facets: events, communication, and tools. Each of these categories of effort is aimed at accomplishing the original program intent of creating a global network of CbT practitioners working together to counter violent extremism.

As a result of the Continuing Engagement program's success, many U.S. Government agencies have begun to request access to the network, including: U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), Defense Threat Reduction Agency (DTRA), Department of State (DOS), U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command (TRADOC), and Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA). Additionally, the reputation of CTFP symposiums has become so strong that in FY 2011 some countries requested out-of-sector invitations and funded participation themselves. As indicated in Exhibit C, Continuing Engagement events, expenditures, and participation have grown significantly since 2008. In FY 2011 the program realized a significant increase in participation due to an augmented budget and additional institutions hosting symposiums.

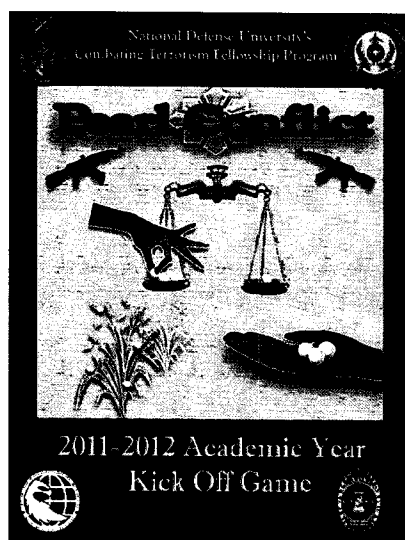

The following sections provide a summary of the events and past participant accomplishments in each of the COCOM areas of responsibility.

### **F. Global Engagement**

The CTFP works with the five Regional Centers (NESA, CHDS, APCSS, ACSS, and GCMC), as well as six academic institutions (NPS/DA, DIA/NDIC, NDU/CISA, JSOU, CCMR, and DIILS), to hold resident CbT courses. The academic institutions, by curriculum design and mission, educate students from all regions of the world (as opposed to the more limited focus of the Regional Centers). Each institution's program is unique based on its expertise and area of focus (e.g., special operations, intelligence, civil-military relations, legal, etc.). This global classroom design logically translates into global network activities. In FY 2011, most of the Continuing Engagement funding was allotted to global or multi-regional initiatives, summaries of which follow:



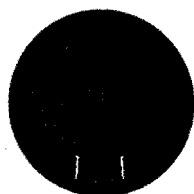
#### **NDU/CISA Pearl Conflict CbT Kick-Off Exercise (September)**

Fifty-seven international and U.S. military and interagency fellows, as well as a delegation from the Philippines and CISA alumni, participated in Pearl Conflict to begin their 10-month Counter-Terrorism Fellows (CTF) Program. Set in a Philippines of 2012 scenario, the exercise explored the government of the Philippines's options to combat terrorism and insurgency within its borders. The four-moves game walked the students through an annual strategic-planning process to develop strategy, policy, and a resourcing plan.

Pearl Conflict was designed around seven main objectives for student learning:

- Objective 1: Gain an understanding of key dynamics of insurgency and terrorism in a real-world, near-future setting.
- Objective 2: Consider the effects of regional and global phenomenon on national conflicts.

- Objective 3: Develop a strategy to address threats using all instruments of national power, and adapt the plan to unfolding events.
- Objective 4: Implement national strategy using realistically available resources.
- Objective 5: Develop and brief policy options suitable for senior leaders at the national level.
- Objective 6: Evaluate areas for personal concentration to be pursued while at CISA.
- Objective 7: Grapple with the challenges of an intense, time-constrained environment that demands teamwork and production of final products for higher authority.



#### **CCMR Chad/Sahel Regional (April).**

This regional seminar for governments in the Sahel focused on developing border security and fighting terrorism. Civilian and military officials from six countries shared challenges, best practices, and lessons learned during a week-long series of presentations and workshops. The success of this seminar led USAFRICOM to pursue a follow-on program for additional discussion on these topics in FY 2012.

#### **Sri Lanka/South Asia Regional (July).**

This program focused on irregular maritime challenges in South Asia. It was attended by participants from Sri Lanka, Maldives, and Bangladesh, with India noticeably absent. Topics included maritime terrorism, piracy, maritime criminal activities, and port security, all discussed thoroughly by the diverse audience. The program featured a presentation by the Australian Border Protection Command. Additional highlights included a presentation by the Director of the International Maritime Bureau (IMB). This seminar was a continuation of a training program started in the Maldives in 2010.

#### **Latin America Regional Seminar (June 2011).**

This program focused on regional civil-military responses to terrorism. Fifty-two military, civilian, and police participants from Colombia, Peru, Paraguay, Mexico, and Brazil attended. Participants discussed maritime threats and emerging terrorist trends, and identified and evaluated national and regional threats. Participants went on to develop regional strategies to counter identified threats and means to evaluate the effectiveness of those strategies.

#### **Bangladesh (March and July 2011)**

These two working groups were a collaborative effort among the CTFP, the Defense Institution Reform Initiative, and the government of Bangladesh. The intent of these workshops was to develop a national counter-terrorism strategy for the country. As of this report, the draft strategy developed in these sessions was being reviewed by the Bangladeshi Prime Minister's office, and it is expected to be adopted in early 2012. The production of this strategy is a significant accomplishment for Bangladesh, and will help pave the way for the development of other national strategies. There will be additional workshops in 2012 designed to assist Bangladesh in implementing its new strategy.



### **NESA Center Yemen Bilateral, National Security Strategy Workshop and Alumni Program (February)**

The Arab Spring has highlighted the fact that Yemen is experiencing violent political changes that have been exacerbated by the presence of al-Qa'ida in the Arabian Peninsula (AQAP). AQAP is based in Yemen's vast under-governed spaces, and it has become a major threat to U.S.

Government interests both regionally and globally.

The NESA Center addressed these issues in a five-day program conducted in Sana'a, Yemen. Seminar speakers included Yemen's Prime Minister, the Minister of Foreign Affairs, the Chief of the Defense Staff, the President's Office Director for the National Security Bureau (National Security Council equivalent), the U.S. Ambassador to Yemen, and U.S. Congresswoman Betty McCollum. The Seminar focused on benefits of a whole-of-a-government approach to national security strategy. Participants included more than 600 military and civilian officials drawn from the Council of Ministers, Al-Shura Council (U.S. Senate equivalent), Yemeni House of Representatives, members of civil society, U.S. Embassy representatives, students from the host High Military Academy, NESA participants, and Yemeni alumni.

#### **Participant Feedback:**

- A senior Yemeni Ministry of Planning official said: *"This is the first time that senior officials representing many agencies have ever met to discuss a whole of government approach to the future."*



### **NDU International Alumni Continuing Education Seminar, Dubai, UAE, (January)**

The NDU International Student Management Office (ISMO) Continuing Education Seminar provided a unique opportunity for integration of previously segregated alumni from all five of NDU's colleges in this combined alumni event. The Dubai event, a shorter duration continuing education symposium, was co-hosted by the Near East South Asia Regional center and held in conjunction with the Information Resource Management College (IRMC). NDU international alumni (including International Counter-Terrorism Fellows alumni) and NESA CbT alumni participated in this unique forum that provided a basis for discussions and renewal of regional continuing education seminars and more emphasis on life-long learning and professional development. An additional goal of reinforcing connections between various NDU alumni and catalyzing networks for more effective collaboration was initiated. The participants included thirty-one international alumni from the NESA area, Gulf Coordination Council (GCC) countries, as well as Nigeria and Poland. Among the thirty-one participants, twenty attendees were at the general officer, ambassadorial, or minister level.

As the first collaborative continuing engagement multi-organizational event between NDU and NESA, it proved to be exceptionally productive. International collaboration and network building among alumni was greatly enhanced, both in the region and globally.



#### **JSOU Joint Mobile Education Team, Dushanbe, Tajikistan (September)**

The Tajik Government requested this seminar on international cooperation and border security. The objectives were to improve crisis response and border security and to assist in developing a strategic methodology for CbT. The program used a whole-of-government and regional approach in developing solutions for greater regional cooperation in CbT. The participants agreed, collectively, there is a need to explore legislation in their respective countries to authorize their military and security ministries in providing assistance to the local population.

#### **NPS CORE LAB Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia (FARC) Workshop Network (September)**

The CORE Lab hosted a FARC Workshop in Monterey, California, with key Colombian government officials which resulted in the initiation of a detailed systems-analysis study of the FARC. The study is designed to determine the FARC's current strengths, weaknesses, and critical vulnerabilities across a wide range of disciplinary aspects. By employing systems and network analytical methodologies, the workshop introduced participants to cutting-edge irregular-warfare analytical methodology used to illuminate networked adversaries. The outcome of the workshop was a recommended research design to identify requirements for a data collection plan to support a detailed FARC systems analysis.



#### **NDU/CHDS "Key Aspects of 21<sup>st</sup> Century warfare" Santiago, Chile (July)**

CISA hosted an alumni event in cooperation with the Center for Hemispheric Defense Studies' Annual Sub-Regional Conference (SRC) in Santiago, Chile. Twelve CTFP alumni from the USSOUTHCOM region were given the opportunity to participate in the SRC conference. The substantive topics of the conference focused on regional and multilateral defense and security issues with a particular focus on how South American governments were responding to new developments in strategic thinking on 21st century security issues. To promote this objective, four CISA faculty members were invited to prepare presentations as part of a panel on "Key Aspects of the 21st Century Security Landscape," in which they briefed the roughly 300 participants at the event. In addition, the Academia Nacional de Estudios Políticos y Estratégicos (ANEPE), the leading Chilean defense and security policy institution, hosted a roundtable for CISA faculty to discuss curriculum, faculty research, and areas of mutually beneficial cooperation. CISA also hosted a small roundtable event for alumni to discuss the impact of their educational experience on their professional careers and personal development. Graduates shared various anecdotes that highlighted their influence within their respective organizations in shaping the national security debate on subjects related to their theses and their education at CISA.



#### **APCSS: "Northeast and Central Asia: Transnational Security Challenges in Ungoverned Spaces – Physical and Virtual"**

##### **Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia (September)**

Following coordination with the CTFP, USPACOM, U.S. Embassy Mongolia, the Ministry of Defense of Mongolia, and the Mongolian Institute for Strategic

Studies, APCSS partnered with the GCMC to conduct this continuing engagement event. The dialogue for this event focused on the challenges of “Ungoverned Spaces” in a North Asian context, including countries from both Northeast and Central Asia, specifically addressing the following areas developed from assessment of the most relevant issues, as well as consideration for the areas of greatest potential for impact in combating terrorism:

- Physical “Ungoverned Spaces,” the geographic challenges of porous borders, including governance and corruption conducive to transnational trafficking in goods (drugs, weapons, commercial and counterfeit products, etc.) and trafficking in persons (TIP), and the resultant enabling environment (financial and logistical) that contributes to terrorism.
- Virtual “Ungoverned Spaces,” specifically focused on challenges of cyber security issues which impact state capacity to secure critical infrastructure protection (CIP) against the vulnerability to terrorist attack.

The symposium was co-hosted by the Mongolian Institute for Strategic Studies and the Mongolian APCSS Alumni Association. The opening was attended by the Mongolian National Security Policy Advisor to the President of Mongolia, Vice Minister of Defense of Mongolia, and the Deputy Director Mongolia Institute for Strategic Studies. Both the Ambassador and the Defense Attaché represented U.S. Embassy Mongolia. The keynote address was provided by the Mongolian national Security Policy Advisor on behalf of the President of Mongolia, and the U.S. Ambassador, as well as remarks by the listed distinguished guests. Approximately 60 participants attended from Mongolia, Japan, Republic of Korea, Peoples Republic of China, Hong Kong, Russian Federation, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, and Tajikistan.

This workshop provided an opportunity to reach across two geo-politically defined yet historically, culturally, and economically linked regions of Northeast and Central Asia identifying common concerns and addressing opportunities for shared security interests. The workshop focused on discussing and developing practical application of new and shared knowledge important to the continued value of APCSS courses and the counter-terrorism course in particular.



#### **CHDS Inter Agency Coordination and Combating Terrorism (ICCT) Course (June)**

CHDS conducted the seventh annual ICCT course designed to help “build and strengthen a global network of CbT experts and practitioners committed to participation in support of U.S. efforts against terrorists and terrorist organizations.” This year nearly 40 percent of the CTFP-funded Fellows represented a police agency at the provincial, state, or national level. This included police units with primary counter-terrorism responsibilities or units responsible for protecting critical transportation infrastructure, including the Panama Canal, which is vital to U.S. interests. This program was part of a CHDS effort to assist the police of Rio de Janeiro and several other Brazilian civil and military state police units to support Brazil’s preparations for the 2014 World Cup and the 2016 Olympics.



#### **NDU International Alumni Seminar, Bangkok (September)**

NDU hosted an International Alumni Seminar in Bangkok, Thailand in September of 2011. The event was attended by 70 alumni from NDU and APCSS. International Counter-terrorism Fellow Graduates of the NDU classes of 1994, 1995, 1996, 1997, 1999, 2001, and each class from 2003-2011 were present, representing 10 countries in the region. At the Seminar, 10 alumni gave presentations on their work in the field in the areas of counterterrorism, maritime security, economic cooperation, and national security policy. VADM (Retired) Vic Agdamag of the Class of 2001, now Deputy Director of the Philippine National Security Council, presented on his country's first ever National Security Strategy, which he helped create with his training from NDU. Following the Seminar, many alumni stayed for the Regional Collaboration in Cyber Security and Cyber Terrorism conference hosted by NDU's iCollege, where they participated in sessions related to emerging cyber threats to national security and international cooperation in cyber security.

**Jordan:** In November, Colonel Aref Alzaben of the Jordanian Armed Forces (JAF) and CTFP Alumnus from numerous programs was praised by USCENTCOM leadership for his efforts in Afghanistan. The following is the letter Colonel Alzaben received from Commander, USCENTCOM:

**Georgia:** Andro Barnovi is a graduate of NPS. In December 2010, he was appointed to the position of the Rector of Georgia's National Defense Academy.



**Pakistan:** The faculty at CISA identified Brigadier Shafqat Asghar as a candidate for an adjunct faculty position at CISA. BG Asghar was particularly well-suited for this role given his demonstrated leadership as Class President, impressive experience in command and staff positions, and his strong academic performance while a CT Fellow. During this time, CISA plans to use BG Asghar to teach courses in CbT and COIN and support educational programs and training, as necessary. The purpose of this program has three primary objectives:

- 1) To provide a senior mentor for NDU/CISA's International Counter-Terrorism Fellows Program to advise current CbT Fellows.
- 2) To serve as a regional expert for South and Central Asia – a critical region given current U.S. strategic priorities in Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan.
- 3) To assist in teaching courses and supporting research efforts for the War and Conflict Studies Department dealing with CbT.



**Mexico:** Since 2009, Captain Alfonso Reyes Garces of the Mexican Naval Infantry and member of the Special Forces, has warned the Mexican government's strategy for fighting drug trafficking was headed towards failure. If it did not change, he said, the war against illegal drug cartels would never end. He expanded on this topic in his master's thesis from the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, California. Within his critical analysis, he highlights if drug trafficking is a national security threat, then it should be treated as such, but the strategy has not changed and, therefore, the government and its armed forces cannot achieve victory.

### **Unattainable Victory**

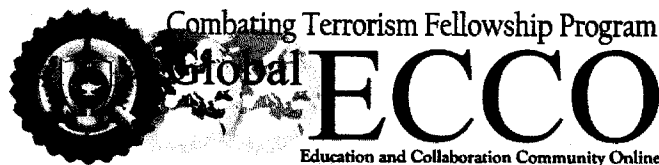

Unwilling to reform the strategy that has exacerbated the country's violence, the government of Felipe Calderon has indebted itself to a "war without an end" against drug trafficking. In less than two years from its end in power, the government does not know under what parameters it could demonstrate a victory.

It is this assessment of the government's policy during its six years in power that Alfonso Reyes Garces, (officer from the navy, infantry captain and member of the Mexican Special Forces) wrote about in his master's thesis from the Naval Postgraduate School (NPS) in Monterey, California. NPS is a center of navy academic training in the U.S."

## **H. PROGRAM IMPROVEMENT INITIATIVES**

### **Updates on FY 2011 Initiatives**



**CTFP Global Education and Collaboration Community Online (ECCO):** In FY 2011, the CTFP ECCO project, which aims to connect alumni of CTFP events and

institutions, undertook several projects which created unique CbT-related educational content

for its users. In August, the first issue of the new journal, Combating Terrorism Exchange (CTX), was released. This peer-reviewed journal focuses on international efforts in the CbT realm and is written primarily by and for CTFP alumni. The ECCO project also laid the groundwork for the establishment of the website, CTFPECCO.org, which will provide a forum for CTFP alumni to connect, collaborate, and interact with one another, and will host the CTX journal and game-like CbT exercises, as well discussion boards and user blogs. The ECCO project also began work on the "Operator Archives" sub-project, which will collect the personal experiences of international and U.S. personnel in the fight against terrorism for use in developing international lessons learned.



### **Naval Small Craft Instruction and Technical Training School (NAVSCIATTS):**

A second in-resident Strategic Level Small Craft Combating Terrorism (SLSCCbT) course of instruction (COI) was conducted by U.S. Naval Small Craft Instruction and Technical Training School (NAVSCIATTS) at the John C. Stennis Space Center, Mississippi, from June 22 - July 20, 2011. The first SLSCCbT took place in New Orleans in June 2010. Both courses were successful in helping to build and sustain a robust network of partner-nation subject-matter experts to assist U.S. efforts in countering violent extremism on a global level. The latest SLSCCbT course was attended by 17 senior military officers, civilians, and law enforcement specialists from 14 countries. The goal of the course is to meet emerging defense requirements to build global partnerships through targeted, non-lethal, CbT education and training in accordance with current and on-going CTFP goals and priorities. The SLSCCbT course is specifically tailored to address strategic-level concepts necessary to thwart terrorism and illicit trafficking in a maritime environment. The curriculum included insights into establishing, leading, and developing operational campaign design and employing maritime small-craft units focused on counter-terrorism, maritime domain control, and counter-narcotics operations. Guest lecturers from the Naval War College, NDU, DOS and the Office of the U.S. Air Force Surgeon General helped to create a Joint, Interagency, Inter-governmental, and Multinational (JIIM) approach to building partner-nation capacity. All activities were aligned to meet CTFP core goals, including: developing and strengthening human and intellectual capital to improve understanding of both the ideologies of terrorism and the means of countering such threats, harmonizing views about the threat of terrorism and its evolution, and building and strengthening a global network of CbT experts committed to U.S. efforts against terrorists and terrorist organizations. By developing a robust group of trained officers, the capacity for partners to sustain and build upon shared experiences increases along with countering ideological support for terrorism and violent extremism.

### **GCMC Seminar on Combating Weapons of Mass Destruction and Terrorism (SCWMD/T) (March)**

This course is a joint project among the CTFP, DTRA, and the GCMC. The focus area of the course is to address the critical nexus between the proliferation of Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMD) and terrorist networks attempting to acquire them. Thirty six highly qualified and well-placed government officials from numerous countries who deal with policy, strategy, planning, or implementation of strategies to combat WMD or terrorism attended the course.

During the seminar, participants discussed the broad definitions of non-proliferation and counter-proliferation of transnational threats. Participants also looked at the pillars of a comprehensive strategy for combating weapons of mass destruction.

The following primary topics were addressed:

- Challenges posed by WMD use by terrorists;
- Nonproliferation mechanisms;
- Counterproliferation challenges and approaches;
- Consequence management, with an emphasis on pre-incident planning and mitigation;
- Requirements for interagency coordination to combat terrorism and WMD;
- Terrorist networks and proliferation networks; and

- Terrorist acquisition, manufacture, and use of WMD.

## **New Initiatives For FY 2012**

- **CTFP ECCO:** The CTFPECCO.org website will be fully operational in the first quarter of FY 2012. The CTX journal will continue its quarterly publication schedule, with the second issue coming out on November 1, 2011, and subsequent issues every three months. Throughout FY 2012, game-like exercises will be deployed onto the website and will be accessible to CTFP alumni, current CTFP students, and students in sponsored courses. The "Operator Archives" will continue its collection of material and will post its data on the website, as well. Throughout FY 2012, ECCO will continue its outreach initiatives by sending representatives to multiple events to inform participants of the website and its features, and to encourage participants to stay connected with each other, developing the CbT network more expansively.
- **Combating Terrorism Exchange (CTX Journal):** The CTX is a focused, peer-reviewed CbT journal highlighting collaborative CbT and counterterrorism initiatives, real-world insights from the field, and astute CbT analysis. Readers and contributors hail from an internationally diverse array of professions and world renowned CbT experts, covering the private sector, government, and military perspectives of CbT. The challenges each DoD schoolhouse and Regional Center faces with engaging its alumni networks are overlapping, and it is becoming more imperative to overcome these challenges collaboratively. The CTX is an openly available resource for both CTFP institutions and alumni, allowing for networking that is supplemental to existing platforms at each respective institution. FY 2012 will provide an opportunity for the CTX to serve as a voice for alumni to discuss priority issues which in turn benefits the United States interagency efforts. The U.S. Government benefits by having access to the discourse of our global allies and in turn provides a method for communicating globally through direct and indirect contact with key decision makers worldwide
- **Bangladesh**  
Bangladesh's national counter-terrorism strategy identifies a number of milestones that will need to be reached in order to implement an effective strategy. One of these is the establishment of a national threat assessment center. In FY 2012 the CTFP will offer training and education to help develop the requisite skills required to operate such a center.
- **Social Media**  
The impact of social media on popular uprisings is a much debated topic. In FY 2012 the CTFP will focus resources on helping partner nations to understand how to use social media to counter terrorist and insurgent threats.
- **Global, Collaborative Scenario Gaming**  
In FY 2012, the CTFP will begin using collaborative gaming as a vehicle for stimulating greater international cooperation in CbT.
- **NPS Core Laboratory**  
In FY 2012, the CORE Laboratory will continue building on its databases to support course work and thesis research for international students. Once the data is operational, faculty and students will use the laboratory's databases to analyze current global terrorist and insurgent activities. Specific groups that will be studied in depth include the Taliban in Afghanistan, al Shabaab in Somalia, and the Kurdish Workers Party in

Turkey. The information gleaned during this research will assist participants from partner nations in developing innovative responses to ongoing threats.

## **I. SUMMARY**

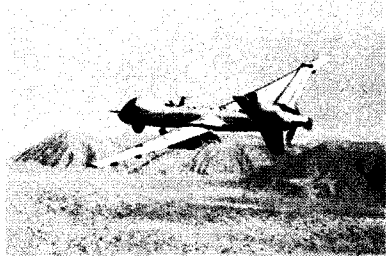
The CTFP is a valuable tool in the global fight against terrorism and fills a crucial void in U.S. Government efforts to provide targeted international CbT education and training. The close relationship between OSD and the COCOMs has turned the program into a strategic tool in the struggle against violent extremism which effectively supports the efforts of the COCOMs in achieving their objectives through flexible, targeted international partner education and training. Building on previous efforts, the CTFP made significant strides during FY 2011 to develop and reinforce the CbT capabilities of partner nations, and to strengthen a global network of CbT experts committed to the fight against violent extremism and their proponents. Senior DoD and DOS officials consistently note the value of a global CTFP network and derive benefit through active participation in CTFP activities or by accessing the network to gain a better understanding of partner perceptions and best practices. The CTFP's continued efforts in operationalizing the global network, through a combination of targeted education and virtual communication, will help to ensure the United States has a vast resource of CbT capability from which to draw in the years to come.
