SUBJECT: FT 73-79 Planning Guidence for Southeast Asia Force and Activity Levels (U)

The enclosures to this memorandum contain the Southeast Asia Planning Guidance applicable both to planning for the remainder of FT 73 and FT 74. and to the preparation of the FT 75-79 Defense Program. Enclosure 1 is a table of forces and activity levels. Enclosure 2 contains munitions planning assumptions. This guidance supersedes that of March 9, 1972.

The uncertainty of the military situation following the cease-fires in South Vietnes and Lace is reflected in the guidance. Thus, in addition to specifying force and activity levels for U.S. and Allied assets in Southeast Asia, this guidance also addresses capabilities which must be evailable in order to be able to deploy additional forces and increase activity levels, should that become necessary.

Because of its sensitivity this material should be handled on a strict need-to-know basis.


Attack mortic capability to be based in Theiland. Through FT 74 the Air Force will maintain the capability, if meded, to deploy with two weeks' notice sufficient forces to fly 10,000 ettack cortics per month indefinitely. A capability to fly 3,300 sortics per month indefinitely with two weeks' notice and 10,000 cortics per month indefinitely with one month's notice will be maintained through FT .75.

B-52 capability to be based in Thriland. Through FT 74 the Air Force will maintain the capability if meded, to deploy with two weeks' notice sufficient forces to fly 3,000 cortics per month indefinitely. A capability to fly 2,400 cortics per month indefinitely with two weeks' notice sufficient forces to fly 3,000 cortics per month indefinitely. All air and ground munitions procurement budgeting/programming, production scheduling, and distribution planning will be designed so as to support the munitions expenditures assumed above, while also protecting a munitions posture that could support the following surge capability. Services should assume that the surge, once implemented, would be miintained indefinitely. Naval gun munitions planning should similarly protect a munitions posture which could support the indicated surge in nevel gunfire support ship combat activity.

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The funds in the Air Force and Navy FT 73/74 air munitions procurement budgets and the Army FT 73/74 ground munitions procurement budgets, as approved in PBDs 207EC and 167EC, respectively, are not to be reduced from present levels unless and until the foregoing Southeast Asia munitions planning assumptions are modified by the Secretary of Defense. The Services' FY 75-79 PON munitions procurement programs are to be based on and FT 74 PDF inventory projections derived from actual 31 March 73 inventories, the foregoing SEA munitions planning assumptions, and the approved FY 73/74 munitions procurement budgets as defined by the above-specified PBDs.

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
