progress of the Long-Term Defense Program (LATDP) established by MATO heads of state in May 1978. The LATDP was intended to supplement the MATO regular defense planning system and called for improving MATO defense capabilities in nine functional areas. The GAO found that the LATDP was designed to last into the 1898s, but was prematurely terminated as a discrete program after only four years. The GAO indicated that the termination resulted from procedural difficulties and insufficient allied support.

established to ensure LETP implementation centered on allocating national responsibility for particular improvement measures and assigning program monitors for each of the functional areas. The GAO stated that these procedures created difficulties for national defense planners and LETP program monitors. The result, GAO reported, was incorporation of the LETP measures back into the regular HATO force planning process. The GAO concluded that, while LETP achieved little progress in the nine functional force improvement areas, the program contributed positively to MATO defense planning by placing greater emphasis on functional planning for MATO as a whole.

officials attribute the program's demise to allied concenic difficulties and budgetary constraints. The GAO concluded, however, that allied disagreements over assessment of the Warsaw Past threat and strategy to meet it, appropriate national spending priorities, burdensharing and the U.S.-European balance of trade in defense equipment represented more fundamental barriers to the success of the LTDP and programs like it.
