

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
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- (c) Establishing selective screening program in the Partisan Division to eliminate all of the undesirables.
- (3) Lt Col Gill (USEC) from CTO 96.8 visited the island of YODO and inspected all of the CORAK agencies on that island. Heny small deficiencies were noted. All deficiencies noted have now been corrected.
- (4) General Stuarts visited the island of KANGHRA-DO on 19 May 1953. The purpose of this visit was (1) to determine if the defense mission was being carried out and (2) to determine if the physical arrangements of the Partismy Commanders Headquarters was adequate. The defense system and the apparant state of training were found to be adequate for the purpose, however, the tank support was found to be insdequate. (1) Tanks were not being maintained properly and at the time of the visit all five tanks were out of action. The average being two or three tanks out of action at all times. The maintanence problem has not been solved but a plan is being formulated to solve this problem. (2) The tank ammunition resupply was behind schedule. Since the time of the visit this deficiency has been partially corrected.

The physical arrangement, security, and housekeeping of the Partisan Commanders Headquarters was good except inadequate fire precautions were being taken. Corrective action was taken on the spot.

Major Johnson assured General Stuart that light aircraft could take off from and land on the public playground located near the village of Kanghwa. However, there is no sirfield near the CP nor does there appear to be any possible location in that vicinity to construct one.

- (5) Lt Col Barros and three Korean National Police conferred with General Stuart 21 May 1953. General Stuart informed the
 Korean Police officials that he would appreciate receiving information
 on offenses against law and order dommitted by the partisans and other
 indigenous employees of the 8220th AU. General Stuart also informed the
 National Police that he wanted only the information after it had been
 screened and that they must first satisfy themselves that the charges
 were true and not just remove. The National Police agreed on this policy
 and to date to complaints have been received.
- (6) Lt Button, Intelligence Division, PEC/LD(K), who was also CCRAK coordinator on YODO was listed as MIA on 12 May 1953. Lt Button railed to return from mission of launching two agents on the East Coast of Korea. Captain Karlstrom who was on YODO at that time enroute to YANG-DO was ordered to remain on YODO and assume Lt Button's duties. (See Tab "K")
- (7) The partisan operational plan for Phase II A was completed during the month of May 1953.
- (8) On many islands various CCRAK agencies maintain personnel with the mission of interrogating refugees and PsW arriving from the mainland. Procedures for Interrogation of PsW and Refugees at Friendly West Coast Islands was published in an unnumbered memorandum dated 9 May 1953. (See Tab WFS)

LOCATION AND IDENTIFICATION OF 1ST LT. LEONARD W. BUTTON

1. On 8 May 1953, 1st Lt. Leonard W. Button, 02263234, Infantry, United States Army, was captured by NKA Decurity Forces, in the general vicinity of TAM CHON (DV 9338), while overtly launching intelligence agents into North Korea. At the time of his capture he was dressed in US Army field uniform and wore appropriate insignia denoting his grade and branch.

2. Interrogation of certain refugees and returnees since the Armistice has revealed the following information relative to Lt. Button.

a. Park Suk TAE, while serving with the 8th ROK Div., was captured by the COF on 17 Feb 1951, and was sent to the Mine Mountain Prison Camp in Hapung. The subject frequently was transported to various areas for farm work, and while on a trip from Shi-ju to Kaesong, the subject was accused of distributing leaflets from the back of the truck and was consequently imprisoned in Pyongyang on 19 May 1953 to await trial.

On 20 May 1953, another prisoner, named SHIN HAN SU, was placed in the cell with Park. This new prisoner stated that he and an American Lt., for whom he had worked as an interpreter, had just been captured. The following day, 21 May 1953, the interpreter pointed out an American, who had just entered the jail in the company of 4 or 5 Koreans, as his former CO.

Park stated that although he saw the American several times and even heard his name mentioned once, due to the darkness prevailing in the jail he was unable to give an accurate description of the Lt., and is also unable to recall his name. The subject was instructed, however, by SHIN HAN SJ, to remember the dates and circumstances of the incident even if he forget the rest.

SHIE HAN SU was tried by the Ministry of Social Jecurity and was sentenced to seventeen years imprisonment. The Lt. was also tried by the Ministry of Jocial Security but his sentence is unknown. The Koreans captured with the Lt. were not to be tried until their families who were residents of Morth Korea were contacted.

b. Other South Korean agents who were in confinement at the same jail with Park Suk TAE at this time, confirmed the details of the Lt's capture. They were Fak Sung HAK and Kim (full name unknown). Their story is as follows:

"PAK SUNG HAX and KIM were launched from YODO in the latter part of April and were apprehended by the NKA soon thereafter. Upon interrogation, the two agents told the HK's their mission, unit designation, pick up time, and recognition signals. As a result of this information, when

the American Lt. approached the shore in a small boat for the pre-arranged agent pick up, the NKA were waiting for him. When challenged, the Lt. tried to swim to safety, but he and 4 or 5 of his companions were captured."

- 3. Sub Yong 500, one of the guards captured with the Lt. also con-Sirmed the story of the two agents.
- h. Since the foregoing information coincides perfectly with details given by other members of the launching party who were not captured, and Lt. Button was seen and identified alive on 21 May 1953 and further was reportedly tried and sentenced by the Ministry of Bocial Becurity there is an excellent chance that Lt. Button is alive and in the hands of the MK authorities at a penal institution.
- 5. Information contained in the file of G2 #F#E confirms that Lt Button, an intelligence project officer based on the Island of Yodo in Worson Herbor, as reported 1h Hay 53 to be missing in action since 12 key 1953 when he failed to return from an egent launching mission.

A Board of Officers appointed by paragraph 1, Division Order No. 25, dated
27 October 1955 (copy attached) convened at 1000 hours, 16 Jenuary 1956,
for the purpose of reviewing all relevant data pertaining to unresolved casualties
of the late Korean Conflict and, after considering the pertinent factors involved
as outlined below, duly approved Findings of Nonrecoverability of Remains in the
case of BUTTON, Leonard W. 1st Lt. 0 2 263 284

- American Graves Registration personnel have concluded thorough and systematic search and recovery operations in all of South Korea. Although these operations effected the recovery of many United States deceased servicemen, the search was unsuccessful insofar as this particular individual is concerned. Area Clearance Certificates have been received for all of South Korea, and an applicable Certificate of Nonrecoverability for this decedent has been furnished by the Overseas Command.
- Available evidence indicates that many of the casualties which are carried on the records of the Department of Defense as missing in action in South Korea were actually captured and transported to North Korea where they subsequently died; however, specific information is lacking as to the number, identity or circumstances surrounding their disappearance.
- Shortly after cessation of hostilities in 1953, arrangements were made between representatives of the opposing forces to permit search and recovery operations in the Demilitarized Zone for a limited period of forty-five (45) days. Within the restrictions imposed, as complete a search as possible was made and some remains were recovered. Entry into the Demilitarized Zone by either side for search and recovery operations has not been permitted since that period.
- In September 1954, the United Nations Military Armistice Commission and the Communists concluded negotiations regarding the recovery of those deceased servicemen who were interred in territory under the control of the opposing forces. As a result of these negotiations, disinterments were accomplished by the occupant of the territory and a mutual exchange of remains was subsequently effected. The agreement did not permit either side to enter the territory of the opposing side to conduct search and recovery operations. Although the Communists turned over approximately 4000 United Nations deceased personnel, it is now known that not all of the United States servicemen actually interred in North Korea were returned.

All United States remains recovered by Graves Registration units or received from the Communists during the exchange of remains in 195h were removed to laboratories in Kokura, Japan, where they were scientifically processed by identification specialists and physical anthropologists. Despite the most exhaustive efforts, identification of a number of these remains could not be established.

Physical characteristics and dental data for each unidentified remains as recorded by the professional personnel of the laboratories have been compared with like data for each unresolved casualty, including those known to have been lost at sea, without effecting an association. A wide disparity exists between the number of unidentified remains and the number of unaccounted for casualties.

In view of the completion of search and recovery activities in accessible territory, the inaccessibility of both the Demilitarized Zone and North Korea, and the inability to associate a remains in our custody at this time with the decedent, it is concluded that his remains are NONRECOVERABLE.

Dear Mr. Butten:

I regret that I must communicate with you at this time without being able to furnish you with any definite information regarding your son, the late First Lieutenant Leonard V. Button.

The Department of the Army is making every effort to resolve all of the casualties of the Korean Conflict. To accomplish this important task, it is necessary for the records containing the physical characteristics of our unresolved casualties to be as complete as possible. Although the servicemen's files contain a record of all dental treatments received and all bone fractures or uniformations sustained during their military service, there is a possibility that they may have received treatment by a civilian dentist or doctor which is not reflected in these records.

Since your son is one of our unresolved casualties, we would like to have a complete record of any of his dental and physical characteristics which may have been recorded by his family dentist or doctor prior to his entry into the service. This information should include such dental treatments as extractions, fillings, bridge work, dentures, and peculiarities of the toeth and physical treatments for injuries to bones which may have resulted in fractures. Any x-mays of bones or toeth will also be of great excistance. These x-mays will be returned, if so desired, after our records have been assectated to reflect the information. If you prefer, you may forward the more and address of the dentist and/or doctor, and we will combact him direct for this information.

Your prompt cooperation in this matter will be appreciated and, for your convenience in replying, I am enclosing an envelope which requires no postage. Your son's man, rank, and service number should be included in any communication partaining to him.

Dear Mr. Button:

Since your son, First Lieutenant Leonard W. Button, 0 2 263 284, was reported missing in action on 13 May 1953, the Department of the Army has entertained the hope that he survived and that information would be received dispelling the uncertainty surrounding his absence. However, as in many cases, no information has been received to clarify his status.

Full consideration has been given to all information bearing on the absence, including all records, reports and circumstances. These have been carefully reviewed and considered. In view of the lapse of time without information to support a continued presumption of survival the Department of the Army must terminate such absence by a presumptive finding of death. Accordingly, an official finding of death has been recorded under the provisions of Public Law 490, 77th Congress, approved March 7, 1942, as amended.

The finding does not establish an actual or probable date of death. However, as required by law it includes a presumptive date of death for the termination of pay and allowances, settlement of accounts and payment of death gratuities. In this case this date has been set as 14 May 1954.

I regret the necessity for this message but hope that the ending of a long period of uncertainty may give at least some small measure of consolation. I trust that you may find sustaining comfort in the realization that your loved one made the supreme sacrifice while serving honorably in our country's cause.



Dear Mr. Button:

I regret that I must confirm the recent telegram in which you were informed that your son, First Lieutenant Leonard V. Button, has been reported missing in action in Ecres since 14 May 1953.

I know that added distress is caused by failure to receive more information or details. Therefore, I wish to assure you that at any time additional information is received it will be transmitted to you without delay.

The term "missing in action" is used only to indicate that the whereabouts or status of an individual is not immediately known. It is not intended to convey the impression that the case is closed. I wish to emphasize that every effort is exarted continuously to clear up the status of our personnel. Under battle conditions this is a difficult task as you must readily realize. Experience has shown that a number of persons reported missing in action are subsequently reported as returned to duty or being hospitalized for injuries.

In order to relieve financial worry on the part of the dependents of military personnel being carried in a missing in action status, Congress exacted legislation which continues the pay, allowances and allotments of such persons until their status is definitely established.

Parmit me to extend to you my heartfelt sympathy during this period of uncertainty.
