All of this was taken note of by the Russian side, as revealed by the questions that Russian (b)(6) officer posed to (b)(6) during their meeting. The following day, (b)(6) gave up (b)(6) laptop and flashdrives to border control authorities, as (b)(6) was departing (b)(6)

(b)(6) reported this information to us today, July 8, upon (b)(6) return to the US. (b)(6) can

provide background on the student or program if this is helpful, but I wanted you to be aware of this incident. We regard this incident as an isolated incident, as all other Borens did fine in Russia last year, but (b)(6) appears to have been careless in not following the rules, articulated to him on by (b) staff, Boren staff, and FBI personnel during respective security briefings.

We need to re-double our efforts in August, it would appear.

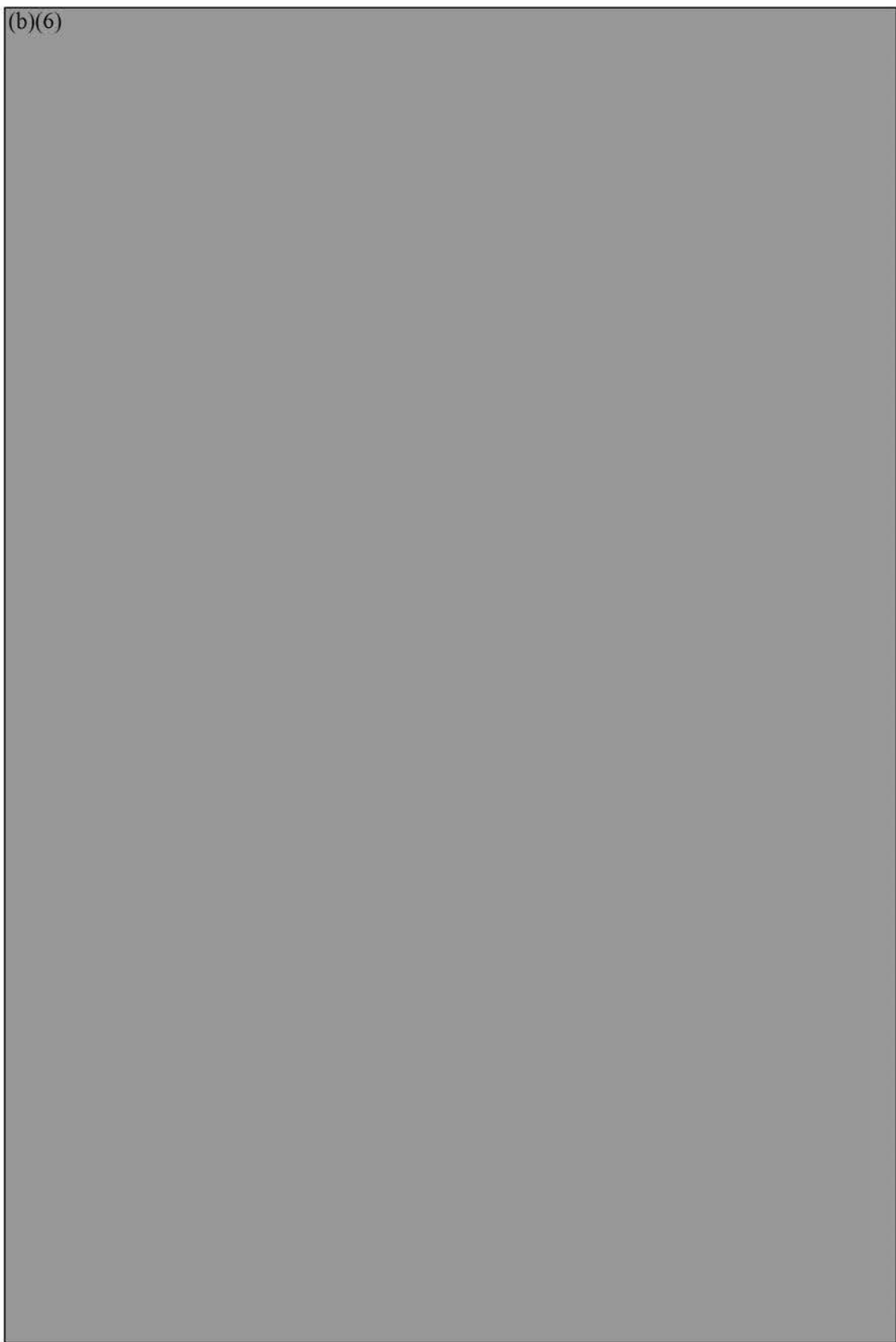

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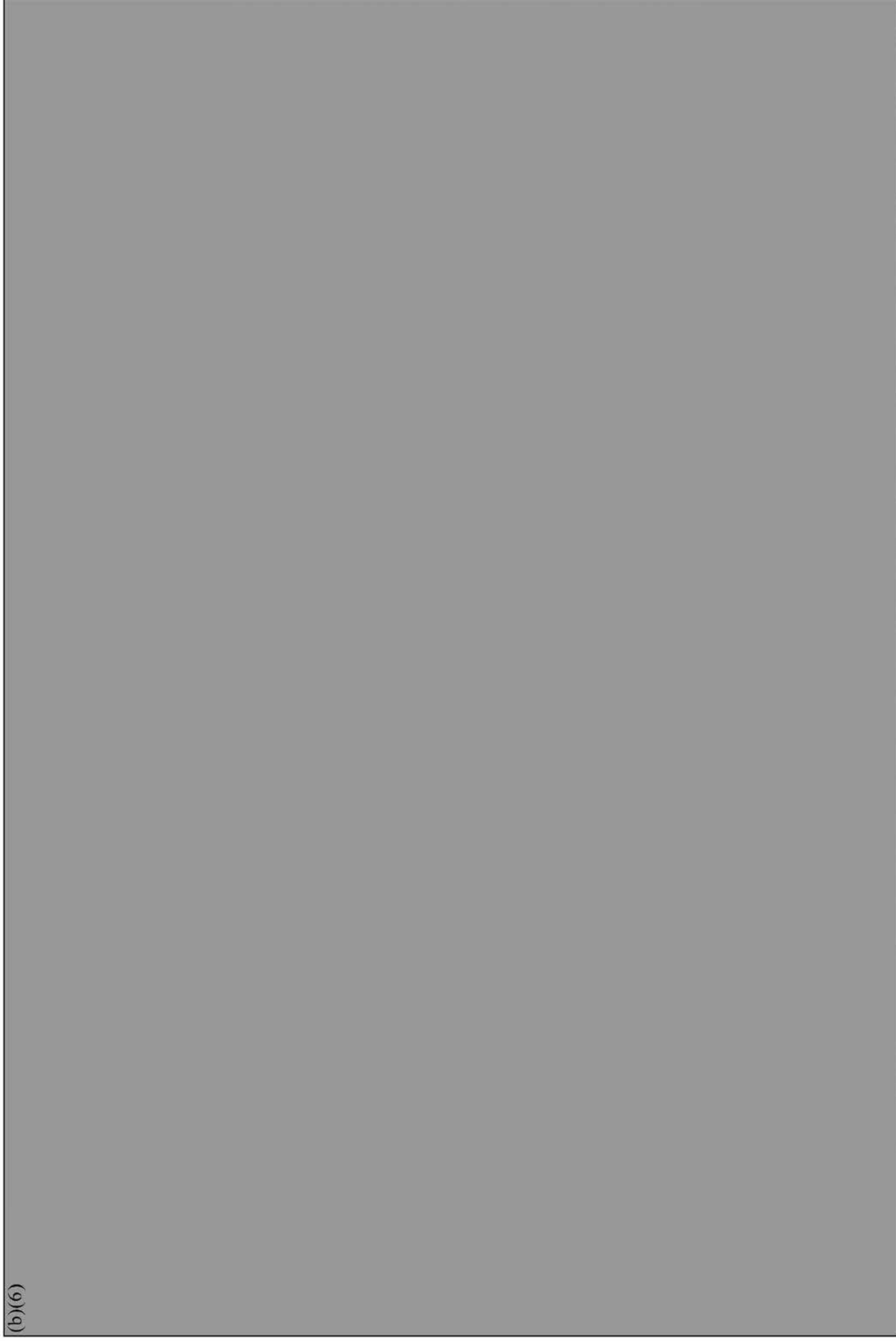

Thanks, (b)(6) I met with (b)(6) and the official word that the team will give, should anyone ask, is that we are not able to fund new students to Russia due to the current political and security situation – pretty much the same answer we would give regarding Egypt, Ukraine, or Kenya.

A quick update on those in and scheduled to go to Russia in 2014: One student returned home today, so we currently have (b)(6) students in Russia. (b)(6) of these (b)(6) will return by the end of the month. That will leave (b)(6) students (all Boren Fellows) in Russia through the fall semester.

We have 21 Boren Scholars and Fellows scheduled to begin their programs at the end of August or later in the fall. Eleven of them are on the Flagship Program. We will work with the other 10 to try to identify alternative programs. (One potential complicating factor is that we have learned that one of these 10 non-Flagship students is currently in Russia on an internship at the U.S. embassy.)

Below are draft emails that we plan to send. The first "general email" will go to the 10 non-Flagship Boren Scholars and Fellows. The language is very similar to language we have used when we have imposed other travel restrictions on students. The second "Flagship email" is one that we would send after they receive the official Flagship notice.

Dear Russian Language Flagship Capstone Students,

Due to the current escalation in tensions between Russia and the United States, including sanctions on both sides, the National Security Education Program has decided that as of August 2014 there will be a hiatus in The Language Flagship programming in Russia, including the Overseas Capstone program hosted by (b)(6) State University. We are planning to relocate the Russian Overseas Capstone program to an alternate institution in Almaty, Kazakhstan and are working closely with our partners at the American Councils for International Education (American Councils), the Institute of International Education (IIE) and your home institution to make arrangements for this program change. We intend this as a temporary hiatus in our programming with St. Petersburg State University for the 2014-15 academic year. We want to convey our great respect for the talent and dedication of our partners at St. Petersburg State University and look forward to maintaining relationships and cooperation with that institution over the long term.

NSEP is committed to providing students a secure environment for high-level, top-quality language programming. The option we are exploring in Almaty, Kazakhstan will be designed to provide the key elements of the Flagship Capstone experience, including intensive language instruction, direct enrollment in university courses conducted in Russian, local internships, and host family arrangements with Russian language speakers. Further details will be forthcoming from American Councils.

Confirmation of the alternate location will be provided pending final arrangements with the local university and arrangements with your home institutions.

NSEP, American Councils, and the Russian Flagship Directors at each of your campuses agree that the program in Almaty presents an excellent opportunity for Russian language immersion, access to Russian media, and study of Russian culture outside the Russian Federation. Almaty is a diverse environment rich in many cultural traditions in a stunning mountain setting with excellent recreational opportunities, and presents a unique opportunity to study Russian language and culture in-depth while also learning about Central Asia. The rich opportunities available in Almaty should provide excellent academic and professional preparation for future careers.

NSEP is also committed to cost containment for this transition: student costs will remain the same or lower than the St. Petersburg program. Flagship student support committed for the program in St. Petersburg may be used for participation in the relocated Overseas Capstone program in Almaty, and

IIE will work with all Flagship Boren Scholars to reprogram their awards for the new location. Language Flagship student support may not be used for participation in any other program in the upcoming academic year.

American Councils will be in touch shortly with more details on the program in Almaty, including timing and rescheduling the pre-departure orientation. While we are moving as quickly as possible to relocate the program, we expect that the pre-departure orientation will be delayed until mid-September as the soonest date.

Please be in touch with the Flagship Director or Coordinator on your campus to assist you with any special considerations you would like to address.

We hope that you will choose to continue with the overseas Russian Flagship program as we implement this relocation.

In following-up with (b)(6) we learned that it was during (b)(6) previous internship at the U.S. embassy in Astana (b)(6) had been advised to keep a low profile. Because of our long-standing policy to make award recipient names public, I talked to (b)(6) the PAO, about this last week, to find out what they told (b)(6) and also to clarify our policy.

In my conversation with (b)(6) I explained that transparency is essential, as being secretive is often less secure than being open. (b)(6) was in full agreement with our policy. After the release of this article in all institutions and universities in Kazakhstan again should appear Soviet poster "Do not talk!". Recently in Pavlodar I had a meeting, which once again confirmed my opinion that the United States hold Kazakhstan monitored closely and do not leave hope to sharpen its relations with Russia, to split the Customs and the Eurasian Union by playing the ethnic card.

It all started with the fact that I went to a third year student of the Faculty of International Relations, one of the major universities of the United States. Call (b)(6) name will not - let yourself live in peace. But, for readers this story will be a warning. And so, a call from a stranger, and I will travel in Pavlodar, read your blog, I want to talk to.

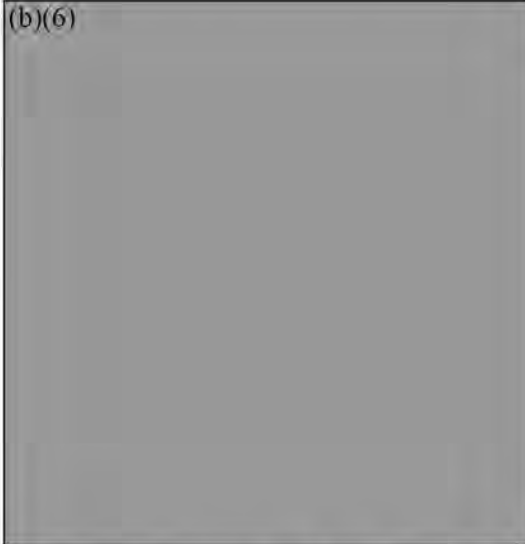

In my conversation with (b)(6) I explained that transparency is essential, as being secretive is often less secure than being open. (b)(6) was in full agreement with our policy. (b)(6) then told me that (b)(6) might be a little nervous because when (b)(6) was an intern over the summer, (b)(6) met with a blogger, who wrote a post about (b)(6) as well as the Boren Awards more broadly. (b)(6) name was not used. (b)(6) sent a link to the post (which is now several months old) and a long and very rough google translation (see below). (b)(6) will probably want to read it in the original. The post does mention several Boren Awardees by name, either based on what is currently published on our website, or what they have learned about alumni based on linked in accounts. (It also mentions two other students by name who, if their names are transcribed correctly, are not Boren Awardees.)

(b)(6) and I have discussed and our advice would be to maintain our current policies, remaining open and transparent in publishing Boren Scholar and Fellow names for the year they are abroad, while continuing to urge our awardees to exercise caution and good judgment in sharing any additional information on line.

After the release of this article in all institutions and universities in Kazakhstan again should appear Soviet poster "Do not talk!". Recently in Pavlodar I had a meeting, which once again confirmed my opinion that the United States hold Kazakhstan monitored closely and do not leave hope to sharpen its relations with Russia, to split the Customs and the Eurasian Union by playing the ethnic card.

It all started with the fact that I went to a third year student of the Faculty of International Relations, one of the major universities of the United States. Call (b)(6) name will not - let yourself live in peace. But, for readers this story will be a warning. And so, a call from a stranger, and I will travel in Pavlodar, read your blog, I want to talk to.

I immediately realized that it would not idle talk. In (b)(6) blog, I periodically open the secret facts of US influence on the policy of Kazakhstan. So my American reader hardly would chat with me about the nature and the weather. We met up with (b)(6) in the cafe "Plate". This time I sat in front of the interlocutor of America, a petite, pretty girl. Childish face - big, honest eyes, eyebrows house. (b)(6) is fluent in Russian, Tatar and Turkish. Says (b)(6) is trained in Kazan. Learns there Tatar language and mentality of the people. In Kazakhstan arrived a few days on a private visit.

(b)(6) said that the Russian media are strong anti-American sentiment, and only heard from everywhere: America, America, America. Meanwhile, in the American press about Russia hardly write. Many Americans are still unaware of Russia only two things that there are bears and vodka. I was of the opinion that in the current Cold War America conducts aggressive offensive and defensive Russian only.

First Cold War, when the Soviet Union in proportion to respond to information attack the United States, the American press reigned anticommunist hysteria. I recalled the interlocutor of how America tried to ruin the reputation and Kazakhstan. First, for no apparent reason has made it to the black list of countries-sponsors of terrorism, then, as if in confirmation, Kazakhstan thundered series of senseless attacks.

The site www.borenawards.org clarifies that Boren Scholarship was established in 1991 and is designed for language and cross-cultural training of student interns in the countries of interest to US national security. The list includes 110 countries in the world, including Russia and Kazakhstan (US, Canada, Australia, New Zealand and Western Europe do not appear in it). In exchange for the \$ 20 000 students were trained in one of the 110 countries for graduation are required to serve a year in the Ministry of Defense, intelligence agencies, or the US State Department. Those who decide to remain in the civil service, guaranteed career development and special

preferences.

Wikipedia contains a biography of David Boren, to establish this scholarship. But even with these modest cost, from 1991 to the present day America could prepare more than three thousand young officers of national security. About 30 people at each of the 110 countries of the world. Clearly, this is a very approximate number, without regard to dropout. 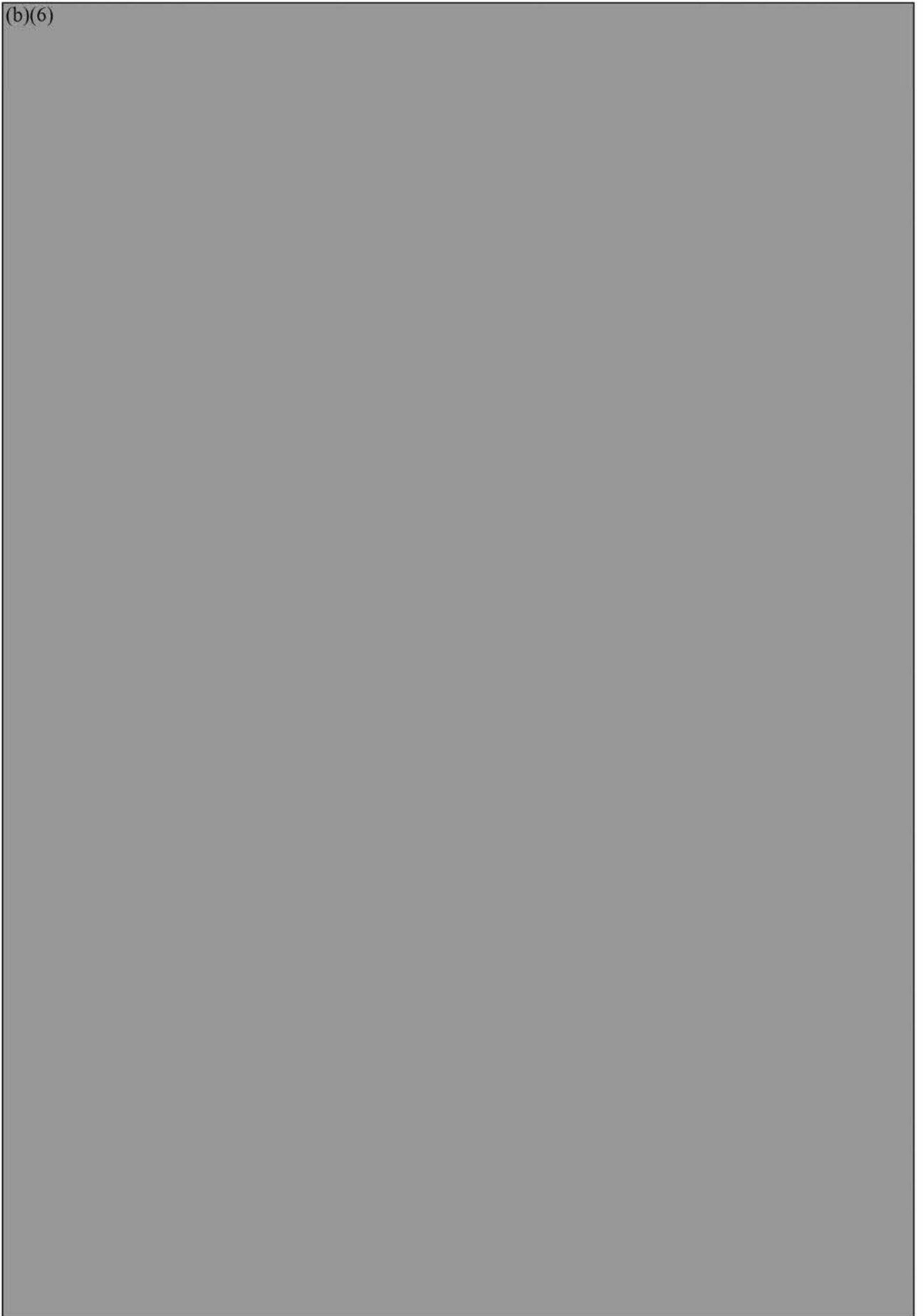
