Kelly and Mark, I thought this trip report from the League Delegation earlier this year would be helpful in understanding the latest policy-level discourse and commitments from senior officials, most of whom I am assuming will be meeting with Mike when he goes later this year, still presumably in November.

All three governments have a way of being responsive to the League, knowing we'll pass it to the right levels in a unified effort, despite us having no "chain of command" requirements. In fact, that has proven to be precisely why they make commitments to the League.

Of course this is nothing new to you, Kelly and (b) but likely is to you, Mark. I'm finishing up letters today to Lao DPM/FM Thongloun Sisoulith, and Vietnamese DPM/FM Pham Binh Minh (son of former SRV DPM/FM Nguyen Co Thach, a "pioneer" on the Vietnamese side of the US-SRV rapprochement, plus mentor to many others now in senior positions). The plan is to ensure both receive the letters prior to your arrival in country, as well as help set the stage for Mike's first visit in November.

SRV Vice Minister of Defense Sr. LTG Vinh is due here in DC later this month, and I'm hosting a lunch to introduce our new Director to the SRV Ambassador as well. Today's close out meeting with USD(P) Wormuth was postponed until tomorrow (it was scheduled for 11:30 today). Lots going on with USD(P) and administration with ISIL, Russia, and Syria. I'll attend tomorrow, and let you know anything discussed in my area of responsibility.

Minister Vinh committed to more in depth discussions when I visit SEA in Nov. We're in a good place in all areas with SRV, and his only 'regret' he

mentioned is that more vietnamese and americans don't know how much we're doing together, and how closely aligned we are in our accounting responsibilities. As you mentioned below, Min Vinh noted there are no restrictions on where, how many, or make up of our teams, and they appreciated our noting their cooperation on archives.

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Mike, although I'll fill in any questions later, following are key points from the one-hour meeting.

I first thanked him and their leadership for the forward-leaving tech talks on September 17th, including the suggestion to move more rapidly than FY17-18 to expand operations in the central provinces, the offer to explore any options the US thinks might improve the process, and urging more use of unilateral SRV personnel to conduct operations, as well as the commitment for an answer on SB by end of the year. Vice Minister Vinh was very pleased with the rundown and my question as to their suggestions on what kind of assistance they would like to have to support their recoveries, and said, in abbreviated form:

- 1) There are no restrictions on our willingness to cooperate on this mission, jointly or unilaterally, and no longer restricted areas, but that in the past the USG responsiveness had been slow. I assured him I recall very well their 2009 request to increase the pace and scope of operations, but noted it is a new day, a new agency with you at the helm, and that I was confident we'd all be seeing an expansion. I also noted that an additional factor was your intention to form partnerships with private organizations/companies to provide assistance, especially on WWII, and gave them the example of the Tarawa remains recovered by History Flight and repatriated while I was in HI, noting that such could help alleviate the pressure of the additional mandate of WWII remains recoveries, without additional personnel, but also other areas where such support might be needed to augment achieving objectives.
- They would welcome underwater recoveries along the coastline, later clarifying there are sensitivities about large USN vessels in some areas, but there are options, such as smaller USN equipment and working from SRV

and private vessels. In response I said this is very welcome reiteration of what he'd earlier said and that I'd talked with Deputy PACOM and PACFLT CO, both favorable and looking forward to expanding the military relationship by working more closely on this mission. I added that I was confident you also were supportive and I am hoping that discussions could soon progress, but that decisions on such matters were entirely up to you, DoD, PACOM, etc. and their responsiveness to any USG proposals.

- 3) He noted they realize that recovery of their losses was their responsibility, Vietnamese killed in Vietnam, but mentioned possibly some form of DoD's DNA "matching" kit and underground detection (ground penetrating radar?) to locate remains in unknown locations, possibly training for use of specialized equipment and historical research to locate US records that might have locating information, but importantly, to seek personal artifacts that are very meaningful to the families who lost loved ones. He cited the recent TV documentary that was done in connection with the 40th anniversary of the reunification of their country and the end of the way, and the 70th anniversary of their national independence, an important year.
- 4) He mentioned Stony Beach and again said he has no problem with them coming to Vietnam and working on this issue with the US and SRV teams, and that he really didn't care what they did before or who they worked for, so long as their focus was strictly on the MIA issue. When I asked for clarification, stating that they work for DIA, have specialized training, cultural sensitivity, languages, sole mission to investigation and interview leads developed by analysts to help resolve cases, but they don't work for the Detachment. I noted that DIA's specialists in SB are permanently assigned in Laos and Cambodia, at the USEMB, but not in Vietnam and that it seemed illogical and said that is one reason I was disappointed that his schedule didn't have time for his=m to meet with DIA Director LTG Stewart, he smiled and nodded, saying it is "too soon" at present, but that he had been in charge of all military intelligence for 10 years and he has no problem with the background of anyone working on the issue, so long as they were working with the Detachment and VNOSMP.
- 5) There was also extensive discussion (due in no small part, in terms of extension) to Rick Weidman, VVA) on Agent Orange Dioxin and past efforts to do with scientific survey to determine the differences in birth defects between children born of southern (exposed) women and northern (unexposed) women since most eat basically the same diet, have similar lifestyles, so the results would be enlightening, etc., etc., Vinh said there are three areas that are the most toxic, Da Nang, where the US has been of significant assistance,m some \$84 million and a "model" of how best to ameliorate the toxic conditions in the environment, but also Phu Cat Air Base and Binh Hoa Air Base, both not yet treated and in very bad condition. He also noted it will take 100 years to clean the environment to where there is no danger to succeeding generations, etc. There was also a specific appeal to all of us to talk with our elected officials to help them understand the importance of such assistance on a humanitarian basis, but made very clear that even if there was no assistance in these areas, they would continue to cooperate fully on the American MIA issue.

Interestingly to me, since I'd never hear it, is that Vice stated he is the head of the national steering committees dealing with both UXO and Agent Orange, and it is clear he cares deeply about doing his best to address and

get support for addressing both issues, just as he does getting artifacts to families and recovering and returning remains to families.

whom I introduced as having known longer than any, at least 40 years of knowledge and commitment, thanked Vice Minister Vinh for the expanded cooperation that was evident and his commitment to continue doing more. Bob Wallace also thanked him and pledged also to take his concerns to House and Senate Members. Rick Weidman thanked the Minister, and committed to conveying his message to relevant MCs. Vinh invited us all to come to Vietnam and, of course, I noted Bob as coming regularly, usually when bring his Nat'l Commander, new each year. Vinh was very engaged, almost passionately expressive, and thanked me for coming and bring the guys with me. They also appreciated the opportunity and are in full support.

I'm too tired for more, but will add anything else I pick up from my notes, but wanted this to you before your meeting tomorrow morning, though most importantly, I hope you are feeling much better after a good night's rest. Hope to talk soon, Ann

- 3) Could the pace and scope of the Vietnam War accounting effort be expedited if additional funding was authorized and appropriated and more personnel were made available?

Obviously, there is always concern over the ability to sustain operations, especially when all are acutely aware of how fragile funding commitments can be.

4) Also, it was mentioned during the last DPAA Conference Call that DPAA had purchased some additional equipment for AFDIL to use in processing DNA, but what is the equipment purchased for use by AFDIL? (I was unable to tell them.)

Ann.

As we continue to move forward with the reorganization, I am taking a hard look at our decision criteria as it relates to inclusion of sites into the annual mission profiles with an eye towards improving the process. With the help of The Clearing, we are in the early stages of developing a new methodology as it relates to assigning cases to the MIL, MEL, and ultimately the OPLAN for execution. It is my desire to capture a process that effectively and efficiently aids site selection, as well as one that is easily explainable to the families, VSOs, Congress, etc..

The legacy system I inherited consisted of a number of determining factors that when combined assisted in the determination of where we focused our effort/resources. We started the determination process by ranking each case using our decision support tool, commonly referred to as the DECMAT. The use of this tool serves only as a method of initially ranking the sites within a country as we start the complex process for selecting the sites we will recover the following year. From this starting point numerous other factors are applied before we approve the following year's Operational Plan. These include: what sites are still open; any weather windows that would make recovery efforts infeasible, such as the monsoonal flow in Southeast Asia; how many sites can are we resourced (people and money) to deploy within the year; the logistics feasibility of conducting multiple sites during a single Joint Field Activity (e.g., we do not have unlimited helicopter support and sometimes have to balance a JFA by site type); host nation restrictions on where we can go; and also most importantly, the overall focus of the year within the OPLAN. Additionally, outside interest is always considered but balanced against all the other factors discussed previously.

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Mike, thanks for the reply, and the posit; ion on your schedule is clear, but nothing related to the selection process. It was my understanding that one of the primary factors was to be addressing cases on the MEL the longest, but I can certainly understand trying to complete and close sites previously opened. This site was only visited/surveyed in 2014, after being located in 1997, but the ease with which it is accessible, the relatively low cost and the length of time on the MEL are fairly persuasive.

Since all of those factors are known to you and you've indicated Site 1791 will be considered for inclusion on the FY17 OPLAN, are there other factors that will weigh into case selection? In past years we've heard about "outside interest" playing a role and some point system for compiling a basis for the decision. Is that system still in place? Or has than changed? I realize that you might not have all these answers and that the entire structure and approach may be in flux, but since you copied the Director and Deputy Director, I assume that perhaps there may have been some coordination and that this may be a topic best addressed to the most senior leadership.

If such is the case, I look forward to hearing the parameters of the current case-selection process that could be distributed by DPAA to all of the Vietnam War families, assuming that due to the vast differences in case-load, circumstances and environment, the selection process for the various wars may differ.

Again, my thanks, and this exchange will not be sent to the families in whose interest I intervened. My intervention was based primarily on the process question related to case selection, more than on behalf of these three particular families. I do not routinely raise any individual cases for the obvious reason that I have insufficient time. My focus is and always must be on the broader questions related to policy and approach, as well as implementation of the processes, communications and outreach that invariably affect all of the POW/MIA families.

Thanks for the email and sorry I missed you on my trip to DC. It was a quick turnaround with two full days of work with the DC team. As far as Case 1791, we do have it slated as an alternate site for both 16-3 and 16-4LA. I am sorry for the confusion relating to a possible go at this site during FY15. I'm not sure who was passing information about a potential mission to that site, excess funding, or a shortage of RLs preventing us from going, but 1791 was not planned/tentatively planned for as a primary or alternate site in the last FY. Relating to this year's missions however, we will be working a total of seven primary sites in both north/south Laos. Our ability to transition to the alternate sites will be solely driven by the team's ability to complete work and close out the primary locations. That said, as we go forward with the planning for FY17, Site 1791 will be considered for inclusion on next year's mission slate.

I realize this is not the desired outcome for the families involved with 1791, but I hope the work we will be doing during this year's JFAs in Laos will provide some comfort for those other families associated with the FY16 sites. Take care for now and thanks again for reaching out.

Mike, I understand that Case 1797 is currently not on the FY16 OPLAN and that during FY16, DPAA plans to cleaning up all of the OPEN sites except for two of them. Many of them have been open for many years. The location of Case 1791 is a northern province, and DPAA is going up north during JFAs 16-3LA and 16-4LA, but working three OPEN sites from two different base camps Xiangkhoang Province and Khammouan Province. Likely that won't allow time to go to Case 1791 in Ouidomxai Province, off by itself.

I just had another exchange with (b)(6) and asked directly if he thought there was anything potentially useful still at the loss site for his father's case, (b)(6) REFNO 1791, in which (b)(6) and (b)(6) were also lost. He sent the following photos and affirmed that he does think there may be, plus it is a piece of cake to get there to survey and do a recovery.

Granted, there are few, if any, other cases in the area, but that shouldn't obviate the facts: it is accessible, has been on the excavation list for about 20 years, and it needs to be scheduled. Just because the NOK of (b)(6) are not trouble-makers and/or screamers shouldn't be a reason not to press forward.

My question is when? And if not FY16, why? It isn't right, or so it seems to me. And if this can get moved up in priority by (b)(6)

(b)(6)

writing letters to you, Mike, Christine, Secretary Carter, or even Senators Ayotte and McCaskill, then maybe they should go for it. None of them are getting any younger either, but (b)(6) and (b)(6) both went to Laos early last year and that is how they got the photos. They also met with (b)(6)

and I think were told well possibly as an "alternative" site, but that isn't very reassuring after already waiting since the site was located in 1997, some 18 years ago!!!

I understand this was tentatively planned, or at least hoped-for, in FY15 when there was a bit of left-over funding, but the lack of Recovery Leaders prevented going forward.

I can't imagine the Lao Government allowing, or even considering, a "strategic partner" to attempt recovery of this site, even though it is out there all alone. It was a road built by the Chinese that (b)(6) and (b)(6) took to get to the site early this year. And (b)(6) speaks Lao and has lived there. It is hard to know what to tell him and, with all the confusion, even I am uncertain on the decision-making criteria for case selection priority.

I sent this to you, Mike, as you're the Asia and Pacific Regional Director, and copied (h)(6) and (b)(6) because they know the families involved. (b)(6) talked with (b)(6) at the League's 46th Annual Meeting and knows that this case was being left off the FH16 plans. He also knows that I planned to send someone (didn't really say who) an inquiry about the rationale. (b)(6) is a quiet, contemplative and supportive guy, was on the League board for many years, but he is getting a bit impatient since he has waited so long for their turn. Let me know what you think, and any

insights would be appreciated, but not distributed, translated perhaps, but not distributed without your express permission.

I'm sorry I didn't get to see and talk with you during your quick visit here recently and am pleased to help in any way you think I can, and wish you the very best, Ann

Hi Ann, Thank you for the call and the help! This is the actual rice paddy where the plane crashed. Of course back then and in 1997 it was all trees. The bottom picture is where the "witness" said the plane hit. If you look at the rice stubble, you can see a bare spot or a lesser growth spot. This is due to soil contamination. I had a small metal detector and it was going off all over, just small pieces and such and nothing identifiable. The day I met the witness, he pulled a large piece of iron out of a trash pile. I thought it too large to be an airplane part, looked more like a 500 lb bomb casing. In hind sight, it could have been a piece of an engine block; they are usually iron. The witness said that people scavenged the area over the years for things to sell. The 105 mm shell casing that one kid showed to me was all corroded and not worth anything. That is why it was still there. My dad was carrying a mixed cargo but mostly 105-106 mm (white phosphorous rounds).

The witness also told me that he did visit the sight several days later and the Chinese troops would not let them near. He said they were busy digging into the site. They piled the debris just to the left in the top picture. It too had a lot of pieces in the dirt. Anyway, I have more pictures and such and real certainly does. Again, we are not criers and ones to go banging on Congress doors and such. Maybe we should have.

I don't think I broke a sweat and there were no rivers to cross or mountains to repel down. Why I even think they could land a helicopter there!! The "Chinese Highway" that we drove up on is just past the tree line.

- ALL identifications (100%) are written up by a medical examiner and are then peer reviewed by another medical examiner. While the outside consultants are experienced and well-regarded, they are not medical examiners and cannot perform a peer review on an identification (because they are not "peers" in the same discipline). The outside consultants will be used to review troublesome or difficult cases. The outside consultants also perform external competency testing for our scientists.
- 2. The definition of what constitutes an identification has changed in the past year. Title 10 is the source of the change. Previously, an identification was made after the consultants agreed with Dr. Holland's assessment. An individual was (and is) accounted for when the NOK accepts the remains that were identified. Currently, an identification is established when the Medical Examiner signs the death certificate (DD2064), which is a legal document, establishing identity, and cause and manner of death. Since a medical professional now establishes identity, the Armed Forces Identification Review Board (DoDI 3001.3) has been abolished as of 10 DEC 2015. If the NOK/family does not agree with the identification, a Federal Court must make a decision due to the legal nature of the document.
- 3. Scientific integrity is the highest standard of the laboratory and will not be compromised. Identification of past conflict remains have always been and always will be established using the most current scientific methods combined with historical circumstances. ALL lines of evidence are utilized to make an identification.

4. Standard Operating Procedures have been modified to accommodate the pace of identifications mandated by Congress (200/vr). Written SOPs are currently being modified to reflect the new policies and procedures in the laboratory.

I'll pass the message to INGO in fact just hung up talking with him and he thought I should send along a "personal for" note related to Lab ID's you announced last Thursday, during the DPAA Conference Call. I have no idea from whom you received the numbers of IDs for Calendar Year 2015, but you gave us 58 for WWII, 34 form Korean War, and 11 SEA (meaning Vietnam War). You indicated 97 for the year, but that adds up to 103, so there is a discrepancy that begs correction.

The larger issue, and one you may wish to question (without attribution to me) is whether all announced as ID's had in fact gone through the entire ID process, including peer review and approval, and provided to the PNOK. I've heard that process was not applied fully, meaning it would be premature and presumptive to announce them as ID'd. Therefore, you may have been put in the position of providing faulty, on at least unsubstantiated, information to the NGO, VSO and MSO community.

There has been far too much emphasis, therefore pressure, on the ID numbers, not specifically mandated by Congress, but still taken as a mandate by some in the community. Further, there is nothing that undercuts the legitimacy of official efforts more than unfounded accusations of false IDs and/or duplicity in the ID process. The League has NEVER bought such absurd accusations, nor have I personally, and has actively fought against acceptance, as well as those making such accusations. As I mentioned to you some time ago, the League commended CILHI when under greatest attack, and we're well aware of the damage caused by unproven accusations.

I hope you have a productive trip to St. Louise and am glad you went to NARA, but when is it that you intend to launch for Europe? Travel safely, Ann



You all needed to know that the word is out on recovery of what COULD BE some remains of Daniel Thomas, and obviously is being widely distributed. My suggestion, if asked, is simply to say of course we all hope so, but until the Lab is able to thoroughly analyze the osseous material, there is no way to know whether they are remains from Daniel Thomas or Donald Carr, as both were in the incident.

Mike Helm also called me and he did NOT say his cousin was ID'd, just that they were all thrilled that what could be Daniel's remains were recovered, along with his ID tag and that digging continues. Just wanted you to know how widely the interim results are out.

I view this is good, in a way, and an opportunity for DPAA to fully explain the ID process, as it NOW exists, little of which is known to most families or veterans, much less the general public. There may be media inquiries, so please use this as a "kicker" to link the media into explaining publicly what should be better understood. As promised, attached are the remarks Ambassador Vinh delivered in Austin on April 28th. I wanted you to see his incoming note, responding to the League invitation, as well as my comments regarding his remarks. Too often, the ongoing accounting effort is lumped into the "legacies" definition and that shouldn't occur.

It diminishes the honor and importance of DPAA's and its predecessors' noble effort to account for and return missing personnel, something that all should recognize as a matter of respect for those who serve their nations and the families who support them. In relative terms, Ambassador Vinh is of a younger generation in the Foreign Ministry, so a bit sensitive education is helpful.

You'll note in his remarks some appreciation for "anti-war" elements, and that may help explain why he was the only speaker who did not receive a standing ovation, but from my assessment, it had relatively little "cadre-speak" and hostile rhetoric was negligible. His assessment of the future sounds about right, though TPP is in danger of failure due to our own chaotic political process. I guess we'll see.

I hope all goes well at the White House meeting on Thursday and see no reason why it wouldn't, as it is

simply a courtesy to bring in interested parties to more or less brief on the intentions for the President's visit, but I don't mind saying I was disappointed in the White House release this morning.

Dear Vinh, and good afternoon. I'm so pleased to hear from you. Thanks so much for the personal confirmation accepting our invitation to the Annual Dinner and we very much look forward to having you and your wife with us again.

In the near future, I'll send over the names of the nine Vietnamese personnel whose lives were lost on that tragic mission April 7 2001 while on a helicopter survey flight over incident sites. We're asking you to read their names from the head table podium, and General Milley will read the names of the seven Americans lost that fateful day, plus two others lost on December 15, 1973, also working on this humanitarian mission.

I very much appreciate your sending over your remarks delivered at the Vietnam War symposium at the LBJ Library in Austin. Most everything you raised was applaudable and demonstrated the national effort your country has undergone postwar, to the credit of both your government and people. It is a positive report and one that you should be proud to deliver on behalf of your country.

In reading through the text, and always conscious of sensitivities on the part of all parties, I winced at your inclusion of our bilateral cooperation to account for missing personnel as one of the "legacy issues" of the war. Although clearly US personnel became missing during that long ago conflict, I respectfully suggest that accounting for all who serve their nations could more accurately and honorably be defined as the ongoing humanitarian obligation of all nations.

We have actively advocated the need for US support to address the negative impact of unexploded ordnance and remediation of dioxins in the soil. This support, now quite substantial, was advocated in a spirit of humanitarian reciprocity, not out of guilt or dwelling on responsibility for wartime actions. To do the latter would not be well-received by the American people, especially our Veterans. We've earned their support for providing substantial assistance on this separate humanitarian basis.

I am very optimistic that President Obama's visit to Vietnam will have the same positive impact on our

Good morning, Mike,

As we all anticipated, impatience is growing and will continue to grow in the Vietnam War community as additional assets and resources are required for WWII remains recovery and an "ID-counting" mentality that still seems to motivate some, especially in the Lab. This is somewhat understandable since successful IDs are their sole measurement of success. Cases that have been on the Master Excavation List (MEL) for many, many years are still waiting. In our view, the priority for scheduling should NOT be influenced by political factors, including Members of Congress, but such pressures will increasingly be inevitable.

Families must have total confidence in the integrity of the process, as well as the people implementing it; therefore, I encourage you to determine the priorities for scheduling excavations based on DPAA's reality and in terms that all can and will understand and accept as logical, at least eventually, in the best interest of the overall mission. I cannot express that same hope for the WWII and Korean War families as they all appear more focused on their own individual cases.

I haven't sent this note or the article below to the families, or even the board as yet, but perhaps you might consider a solution, clearly spelled out, to separate accounting processes and priorities for each war. As related to the Vietnam War, the initial assurance on which confidence was built was directed from the top, and more recently by former Secretary

Hagel's direction to "build on the existing strengths" and implement the "complete reorganization" using that direction as a guideline.

I very much appreciate the budget figures and usage of operational funds you showed me in confidence, but to knowledgeable family members and veterans long involved, it is looking increasingly like what was working for Vietnam War accounting, that admittedly would NOT be applicable to WWII remains recovery, is being abandoned in favor of boosting the ID count. That rings much too closely to the Vietnam War media use of "body count" as applied to KIAs, often on both sides.

As in all instances, the decision is yours to make and, if you wish, I'll be more than happy to contribute to the process, quietly of course, either in person or by editing from afar, and welcome back, Ann

Valerie Wolfe was just nine months old when her father, Air Force Cpt. Thomas Wolfe, a pilot, was shot down and killed in Laos in 1966.

She is on a campaign to compel the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency to keep its promise to bring her father Caution-Caution-Caution-home.

"My father volunteered for duty in southeast Asia," Wolfe said.
"He was there a matter of months before he was killed. Originally listed as MIA, missing in action, that status was soon changed to MIA/BNR, missing in action, body not recovered, due to the official determination that no one could have survived the loss incident."

Zack Pryse, Wolfe's friend and former roommate, described the incident from letters he received from pilots in another aircraft that had

observed the crash.

"Tom wanted to see where he thought he had spotted an anti-aircraft gun a few days before," Pryse said. "Chuck Dudley [the pilot] was wounded, but he fought it all the way in. The navigator bailed out on the left side, but he got out too low. He deployed his 'chute, but landed in a bamboo thicket.

"I think Tom tried to grab the yoke. The plane bucked up but then went in. I think Tom fell out. The left engine hit the ground and the plane caught fire."

There was no rescue mission deployed as it was determined no one could have survived the crash.

The Wolfe family has, for years, kept in contact with military officials in an effort to have the crash site, identified in 1999, excavated and the remains of all three pilots returned to their families.

While the site was approved for excavation in 2006, no effort has been made by the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency, the military branch tasked with those efforts, to begin.

At each subsequent family update, those same officials would give, for various reasons, an extended five-year timeline before excavation could begin. The first delay on was cited for the possibility of unexploded ordinance making the site unsafe for excavation. Additional attempts to determine the status of her father's case were met with the response that the site had been recommended for excavation, but no other specific information as to why no action was being taken.

"We have attended family updates, written to our casualty officer, requested review information and provided DNA information," Wolfe said. "We have done whatever was asked of the family in a cooperative effort to enhance further progress toward remains recovery."

But one thing they didn't know, until 2012, was a part of the criteria in determining which sites to excavate was based on family involvement.

"Neither my sister nor I wanted to believe that our level of caring was being assessed as a criteria of who they should go looking for overseas. We found out in 2015 that it was, and that the box as a family had not been checked, even though we had kept in regular, consistent contact for decades."

And while her father's case remains near the top of the list, new cases are being added all the time.

"In actuality, my father's case is falling further away from selection, not moving closer, due to a new cluster policy, in which sites geographically located close to one another are prioritized to speed up the process." Wolfe said. "The likelihood of a serious review of my father's case will not occur until 2020."

For Wolfe, that is too long.

"Time is not on our side," Wolfe said. "The longer they wait, the less likely there will be recoverable remains. I was nine months old when my father was killed. I am 50 now. We have been waiting a very long time."

The motto of the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency is "Fulfilling Our Nation's Promise.

Wolfe now thinks it time -- past time -- for the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency to keep its promise to bring her father Caution-Caution-home.

UPDATE: June 4, 2016

AMERICANS ACCOUNTED FOR: The number of US personnel missing and unaccounted-for from the Vietnam War is now 1,619. Most recently accounted for is LCDR Frederick P. Crosby, USN, listed as KIA/BNR, North Vietnam, on 6/1/65. No information is yet available on his recovery date, but his remains were identified on 5/25/16. Also recently confirmed as accounted for was Major Dean A. Klenda, USAF, listed as MIA, North Vietnam, 9/17/65, recovered 12/8/14, and identified 12/30/14, but only recently announced. Prior to that release, the most recent was SFC Alan L. Boyer, USA/Special Forces, listed as MIA 3/28/68, Laos, and identified 3/16/16. This brings the total accounted for to 964 since the end of the Vietnam War in 1975. Another 63 US personnel, recovered by the US and identified before the end of the war, bring the total of US personnel accounted for from the Vietnam War to 1,027. Of the 1,619 still missing and unaccounted-for, 90% were lost in Vietnam or in areas of Cambodia and Laos under Vietnam's wartime control: Vietnam-1,262 (VN-464, VS-798); Laos-301; Cambodia-49; PRC territorial waters-7. These country-specific numbers can and do fluctuate when investigations result in changes to loss locations. Since formation in 1970, the League has sought the return of all POWs, the fullest possible accounting for those still missing, and repatriation of all recoverable remains.

47th ANNUAL MEETING: June 22-25, 2016, Hilton Crystal City Hotel, Arlington, Virginia. Registration is now closed. DoD again authorized COIN Assist travel for family members to attend, and attendance is up. Deputy Secretary of Defense Robert Work will Keynote the Opening Session, and Army Chief of Staff General Mark Milley will speak at the 47th Annual Meeting Dinner and joinSRV Ambassador Pham Quang Vinh and League Advisor (b)(6)

(b)(6) to participate in a special Commemorative Candlelight Ceremony, this year honoring the American and Vietnamese military personnel who lost their lives on an April 7, 2001, helicopter mission seeking answers on our missing men. Also of special interest will be the Deputy Director-Designate of the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA), Ms. Melissa Drisko, who will address the families, supported by DIA's team of specialists known to all as the Stony Beach Team. This team, comprised of nine highly skilled personnel, focuses solely on the Vietnam War accounting effort, with first priority on Last Known Alive (LKA) cases and live sighting reports.

There is also considerable anticipation of a comprehensive report from **Director Mike Linnington** on his first full year since assuming the reins as **Director of the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency** (DPAA), supported by many DPAA officials. All are likely looking forward to hearing what has occurred, changes and improvements made, and his plans for further implementing his promise one year ago to sustain DPAA's priority on Vietnam War accounting for at least the next 3-5 years. Family members who have not yet provided a **DNA sample for comparison** are strongly urged to do so. Check with your Service Casualty Office to determine eligibility.

US-RUSSIA JOINT COMMISSION (USRJC) ON POW/MIAS HOLDS PLENARY SESSION: After a lapse of over ten years, the USRJC finally held plenary discussions May 22-25 at the Pentagon. This lack of official contact, much less substantive discussions, can be attributed primarily to on-again, off-again bilateral tensions and lack of high level support by both governments for resuming joint humanitarian efforts. During this lengthy period, various scenarios were in play to terminate the Presidential Commission and replace that special communication channel with routine diplomatic contacts. That effort failed for many reasons, not least the strong opposition to such a move by the League and the major national Veteran organizations. All are closely watching to see what is reported from these most recent talks, not yet reported to the families or the veterans, but anticipated shortly. The plenary was led on the Russian side by General Colonel Vostrotin, a national hero in the Russian Federation, and on the US side by General Robert "Doc" Foglesong, USAF (Ret).

Advancing the Plenary, and following coordination with General Foglesong and with interagency approval, DPAA Director Linnington traveled to Moscow February 8th to meet with the Russian Co-Chairman, to propose the date and agenda. There is cautious optimism that the work of the USRJC will be renewed and restored, especially since the Russian Federation named its new Chairman and opened an office in their Embassy in Washington, DC. Recognizing it was past time to get beyond the endless delays that have plagued work of the USRJC, the League welcomes and appreciates these new initiatives by leaders in both countries and looks forward to increased efforts and accounting results. Earlier, Director Linnington also visited several European countries and senior US officials in the European region who will be contributing to the effort to conduct WWII recoveries.

DPAA DIRECTOR VISITED THE PRC AND SOUTH KOREA: Recently, Director Linnington traveled to the PRC and South Korea. No specific information has yet been shared on the outcome; however, the League urged him to raise the need for PRC responsiveness not only on the known PRC controlled POW camps during the Korean War, but archival records that surely exist from PRC personnel who served during the Vietnam War, especially in communications units visited by the League Executive Director in 1982. The League welcomes and appreciates these efforts and is hopeful that PRC officials will at long last be responsive. Unfortunately,

immediately after the DPAA Director's visit, the PRC cancelled a field operation near the DPRK border, purportedly for security reasons.

During this lengthy period, various scenarios were in play to terminate the Presidential Commission and replace that special communication channel with routine diplomatic contacts. That effort failed for many reasons, not least the strong opposition to such a move by the League and the major national Veteran organizations. All are closely watching to see what is reported from these most recent talks, not yet reported to the families or the veterans, but anticipated shortly. The plenary was led on the Russian side by General Colonel Vostrotin, a national hero in the Russian Federation, and on the US side by General Robert "Doc" Foglesong, USAF (Ret).

Advancing the Plenary, and following coordination with General Foglesong and with interagency approval, DPAA Director Linnington traveled to Moscow February 8th to meet with the Russian Co-Chairman, to propose the date and agenda. There is cautious optimism that the work of the USRJC will be renewed and restored, especially since the Russian Federation named its new Chairman and opened an office in their Embassy in Washington, DC. Recognizing it was past time to get beyond the endless delays that have plagued work of the USRJC, the League welcomes and appreciates these new initiatives by leaders in both countries and looks forward to increased efforts and accounting results. Earlier, Director Linnington also visited several European countries and senior US officials in the European region who will be contributing to the effort to conduct WWII recoveries.

DPAA DIRECTOR VISITED THE PRC AND SOUTH KOREA: Recently, Director Linnington traveled to the PRC and South Korea. No specific information has yet been shared on the outcome; however, the League urged him to raise the need for PRC responsiveness not only on the known PRC controlled POW camps during the Korean War, but archival records that surely exist from PRC personnel who served during the Vietnam War, especially in communications units visited by the League Executive Director in 1982. The League welcomes and appreciates these efforts and is hopeful that PRC officials will at long last be responsive. Unfortunately, immediately after the DPAA Director's visit, the PRC cancelled a field operation near the DPRK border, purportedly for security reasons.

Mike, when I first heard of the below plan, I refused to believe you would ever seriously consider such an ignorant proposal, but since your management team is proposing it, I'm obligated to send this email. I will say at the outset, I strongly urge that you not react defensively and launch another investigation into unauthorized "leaking" of UNCLASSIFIED information. To do so would be even more destructive, and enough damage has already been done to the Vietnam War-related analytic workforce you inherited, though much had occurred prior to your arrival.

I recently learned that there is an internal DPAA "initiative" being considered to terminate the Last Known Alive (LKA) program with deliberate action to declare all cases "fate determined" and end the policy of resolving then as highest priority cases. I understand this has been rumored internally for about ten days or so, but that there are plans to present this absurd proposal to you, Fern and BG Spindler during the time you are in Hawaii for the Operations Symposium.

The longstanding policy-directed priority on these and other discrepancy cases was carefully considered by the POW/MIA Interagency Group (in which I participated fully) and formalized by President Reagan, based on US evidence of the individual in captivity or alive on the ground in immediate proximity to capture by hostile forces. This priority policy was further reinforced by General Jack Vessey at a White House Press Conference in 1987, following a trip to Hanoi where he addressed circumstances surrounding specific LKA cases. It is supported in Congress and by all the major national veteran groups, and we have boxes of supportive speeches and congressional testimony over four decades.

This longstanding policy and the evidence to support it have repeatedly been provided to the Vietnamese and Lao, with agreements reached long ago between the US and each country. The results has been effective in prompting increased cooperation resulting in insights into the level of Vietnamese knowledge and ability to provide archival information and case resolution.

Secretary of Defense Hagel's directive to USDP Christine Wormuth, your temporary predecessor VADM Mike Franken and to you was to "build on the existing strengths, noting failure was not an option. It is no accident that 1,027 American personnel have been recovered and identified since 1973,

all but 63 since the end of the Vietnam War in 1975. It was not accidental, but carefully structured to bring about the results thus far achieved.

The policy has been sustained over the years, not only surviving through some tumultuous years, but thriving to become the worldwide effort you inherited, with our full support and advocacy. This priority has been and is signaled to all - foreign and domestic - of the seriousness with which the US takes its responsibility to stand behind those who serve, the active-duty community and our veterans. The families would be crushed at the betrayal by DPAA and the blatant appearance of a write-off.

If word gets out beyond (INVEX) and me, there will be dramatic results, media headlines, congressional hearings, rebirth of the "Rambo movement," the next Rolling Thunder would be on DPAA's doorstep and a complete loss of family member and veteran organization support.

It appears this "initiative" is from newly assigned personnel with no historical background on the issue, and isolated from consultation with those who do have accurate historical perspective. A cursory check with informed veterans within DPAA would have evoked astonishment. If this plan is pursued and not stopped, expect strong public opposition, and the League will have no choice but to seek support from those who share our principles, values and commitment to the accounting mission and the priority that has sustained this effort since 1981.

It is evident that some on your staff do not agree with the priority you placed on Vietnam War accounting. This is not the only indicator, the last being discussion of shutting down the detachments. There will be no confidence in DPAA's leadership, and the fallout will be disastrous. Of that you can be certain.

I urge this be stopped immediately and the message made very clear as to why, on substance and commitment from YOU, the Director, and promises you have made to the families and veterans, stakeholders all.

Fern, I meant to call you yesterday while in the office, but time got away from me, not an unusual occurrence these days, so I'm back at it, trying to accomplish a few things to tie up loose ends.

I depart tomorrow at 5:05 PM for San Diego, and will initially spend time with my daughter and family there, before flying on to the Bay Area to see my eldest brother and family, then to Cambria for a couple of days with life-long friends, then on to Pismo Beach for a Mills Reunion, before returning to the Bay Area and flying back to San Diego for a couple of days before flying back to DC on July 27th.

Throughout, I'll be available on my cell phone, (b)(6) and most if not all of the time by this email. Feel free to call at any time.

I'm very concerned that someone with DPAA is thinking along the lines outlined below, namely that the PRC and DPRK might be sensitive to learning that DIA's well-known, long-recognized Stony Beach Team is intended to PCS to Hanoi, as we already have in Laos and Cambodia. Of course that is absurd, but I'm hoping you can bring an end to this during your conversation on Tuesday with (b)(6) and, hopefully, Melissa Drisko, directly and without filters.

To hear that anyone in DPAA should be asserting "caution" is needed lest the PRC and DPRK object to or be overly sensitive to "intelligence assets" being PCSd to Hanoi, he/she should get a grip on reality. The key player in future Vietnam War accounting IS the SRV, and they have indicated they are on board, know the nature and objectives of Stony Beach, and have NO problem with their being permanently in Hanoi, so long as the outward signals are directly related to the accounting mission/DPAA, just as I've repeatedly and faithfully reported to DoD/DPAA and its predecessor organizations. DIA is simply looking to DPAA, as the primary DoD agency responsible, for concurrence. Successive US Ambassadors have been on board and supportive, even giving up State and other billets in Hanoi to get SRV approval, but it was a bit too early from them at that time. NOW, is the time, due to agreement by both governments to continue to increase the bilateral relationship, including mil-to-mil, so the opportunity is definitely here, and the signals by moving now are completely within current broader policy, as they are priority on the accounting mission.

I sincerely hope you, as Acting Director, don't allow DPAA to be the reason this long-sought plus-up doesn't go forward as planned; that would be tragic, a self-inflicted wound for no substantive reason.

Obviously, DPAA can use the relatively cost-free additional assets to augment investigations in Vietnam, can be attributed to USG increasing the "pace and scope" the SRV has consistently requested since 2009, and DIA/SB's plan is to plus-up Vietnam coverage, with an adequate number of Vietnamese-speaking specialists. The question becomes, what is there to lose? It certainly won't mean any less PRC cooperation, likely quite the opposite, and it definitely would not have an adverse impact on the ZERO cooperation currently provided by the lunatic running the North Korean people into the ground.

You wanted to wait until Mike was gone before we talked, and I understand his last day in the office was June 30th, though on terminal leave until July 18th, perhaps to get moved and resettled. As you know, I'm willing to help you and Mark in any way possible, as I was Mike, but I think you're more secure in yourself than he was or ever will be, or so is my observation to date. I was very pleased to see the deadline for applications on the Director position extended until July 15th, an additional 15 days, though of course I have no idea who has applied, or will, just know that it will take a self-confident, intelligent, committed person to have any chance of success, and that is ONLY if he/she is self-confident and intelligent enough to listen and learn from knowledgeable civilians, plus build the trust necessary to succeed in restoring workforce and family member/veteran confidence.

Mark, I'm copying you because I feel you, as Deputy Director, also need to be fully aware, in case you're asked separately. Were I in your position, I would not want to be blind-sided, so I'm sure you don't either. You also feel free to call whenever you wish; I'm disappointed more than you can possibly know that my planned "exit strategy" went by the wayside with Mike's resignation, taking all my hopes and plans for writing a long-planned book on the history of our POW/MIA accounting efforts. That story needs to be told and will be all the more interesting written by the only female, non-government participant in the POW/MIA Interagency Group, with a TOP SECRET clearance, working with senior US officials to

develop the strategy and move toward normalization of relations between the US and Vietnam, as well as with Laos and Cambodia. It hasn't been boring, that's for sure, but I'm deeply saddened over what has occurred, knowing Mike's sudden departure means I'm not yet free to step back/out.

As cautioned earlier, and the potential danger/damage grows, as this Mickey Bergman obviously is in communication with the DPRK delegation to the UN. (b)(6) goes back to the early 1980s, and he does make contact with foreign governments which do their best to use him to their advantage. Here it is again, and I advise you bring this to Fern's and Mark Spindler's attention, NOT that they should communicate with (b)(6) the Richardson people nor the DPRK official, but so that others at the NSC and State can be prepared, as well as Dave Shear, ASD/APSA and now Acting Principal Deputy Under Secretary for Policy (or some such title).

If you prefer that I handle this, let me know, but clearly DPAA "leadership" would be unaware of the historical record on this. I have to talk with Fern anyway before I leave town on the 4th due to absurd discussions going on about the pros and cons of Stony Beach working out of the Detachment 2 office (in addition to their "real" office in the DATT's office), While I have no clue about the impetus/rationale, or lack of the latter, involved in this discussion, perhaps some are unaware that SB has been embedded in all field operations since 1992, their mission IS the accounting for Vietnam War missing, especially augmentation of DPAA's (and predecessors') collection of information on LKA and other discrepancy cases, archives, interviewing, etc. IF one just looked at the signals to the DPRK, PRC, Russia and others, they already know and have long known who SB is, who they work for and why, plus the Vietnamese have spelled out their welcome so long as they have the "front" of working within the DPAA spaces.

Of course that doesn't even consider the positive signals being institutionalized in the interest of both the US and SRV that the military-to-military relationship has been and is continuing to expand, to the benefit of regional security and stability, in particular the signals to the PRC and DPRK. One would think those engaged realize this. Arguments to the contrary should be carefully scrutinized for possible self-serving objectives, also recognizing that SB is the only USG asset still focused solely on Vietnam War accounting. Any move to restrict rather than expand and reinforce their integration, would be extremely negative for DPAA. That would be especially true after all the efforts made and Hanoi's positive responses, as well as their repeated appeals to expand the pace and scope of US efforts, PCS of Stony

Beach into Vietnam now can be viewed favorably and noted as adding to the US accounting effort.

It's that simple, at least in my view, and feel free to share this with Fern and Mark Spindler, but clearly, there is an absence of informed, experienced capability in the Policy Plans Directorate, not that John Unangst's departure had anything but a positive impact. Later, Ann



NSC staff fearful of wholesale housecleaning

The National Security Council's 46 member staff sits isolated, nervous and anxious amid reports of mass dismissals and transfers planned by incoming National Security Adviser Frank Carlucci.

Many agency staffers, who work in the White House basement and in the neighboring Old Executive Office Building, have warched their status plunge from that of Resigna indiministration insiders to possible ecopegoats in the Iranian arms scanlal, sources said.

Thus far, the staff has received no ifficial word from Mr. Carlucci's 10nember transition team on who will tay and who will go.

But the impression is "that everyme has been given his walking pesers," said one NSC aide. "There was a considerable fail in morale" after The Washington Times reported yesterday and Monday that top-level dismussals were planned by Mr. Carlucci, said another NSC source.

Many of the planned staff changes involve routine reassignment and others are said to reflect Mr Carlucci's belief that individuals should be rotated in and out of the NSC on a regular basis.

Nevertheless, "people here are disappointed," the source said Morale was already low two weeks ago when former NSC director Vice Adm. John Poindester resigned and Marine Lt. Col. Oliver North was fired for their roles in diverting proceeds from Transan arms sales to Nicaragua's anti-Marxist resistance, the source said.

The greatest fear of NSC andes is that the administration will "symbolically purish that place" to appease angry voices on Capitol Hill, he said.

"Carfucci is regarded as a real pro," the source said. "But we hope he is not going to sacrifice people without a hearing."

Abrupt changes have occurred before on the NSC staff under the tenure of President Reagan. With each new National Security Adviser—there have been five NSC directors in six years—turnoil has marked the transition.

But past changes were not extensive as those currently anticipated.

In the case of Mr. Reagan's first adviser. Richard V. Aflen, up to a third of the Carter administration's staff was retained for as long as two years to insure a smooth turnover in personnel.

Under William P Clark, Mr. Reagan's second NSC director, about a dozen staffers were quickly given notification of dismissed with a photocopied form letter. In the subsequent staff uproar, the fired aides were given an apology and an effort was made to find them new positions, often promotions.

Staff changes under Robert C. McFarlane, who succeeded Mr. Clark, and Adm Poindexter were more gradual, although top-level aides were quickly put into place. Beyond that the changes involved fewer than a half-duzen distrissals spread over a period of many months.

With every change, abrupt or gradical, stories soon circulated in the press about a weak and incompeteur NSC staff at the White House. Mean the characterizations were spread by that caucratic rivals.

Press reports that Mr. Carlucci plans a thorough house cleaning may bulster his image of a man with a charter to take charge in the wake of the Iran debacle, said one former high ranking NSC official, but "it's a disservice to the president."

"One failure [in the case of the Iran operation] does not mean the whole system has failed. That seems to be the presumption now And that's a bad development," the former official said.

"It would be insane to change everybody," he said. "You must do it over time. Don't do a wholesale guillotining of everybody it's silly. If you cleanse the temple, you will eripple an NSC mechanism that has really nothing wrong with it in the first place."

He and other sources said that continuity and expertise are moded "to keep things going."

"A complete sweep means new officers will not be effective for a year while they learn the ropes," a problem that Mr. Reagan does not need, one source said.

WASHINGTON: One word from Defense Secretary Ash Carter yesterday opened the door to US arms sales to Vietnam, a former enemy turned potential ally against a rising China. The administration has tiptoed towards easing the ban on lethal weapons sales ever since Vietnamese president Truong Tan Sang met with Obama in 2013 <

Caution-Caution-https://www.whitehouse.gov/the-press-office/2013/07/25/remarks-president-obama-and-president-truong-tan-sang-vietnam-after-bila > , but Carter's statement goes farther at a critical time, on the eve of Obama's first visit to Vietnam.

It was an exchange so brief and muted I had to listen to the audio half-a-dozen times and check with sources before I could believe Carter had really said something so momentous, yet apparently so casually. At yesterday's Senate Armed Services Committee hearing, Sen. Dan Sullivan showed a map revealing how Chinese fighters could potentially strike throughout the South China Sea, the northern Philippines, and Vietnam. SASC chairman John McCain — a former prisoner of war in Hanoi turned advocate of reconciliation — followed up with this question to Carter: "You would support lifting restrictions on provision of weapons to the Vietnamese?"

Carter's response? "We've discussed this in the past, and I appreciate your leadership in that regard, Chairman, and yes."

That final "yes" is the figurative bombshell that might let the US sell literal bombshells to Vietnam, which has fought multiple wars and skirmishes with its ancient enemy, China, since the US withdrawal in 1973.

"Assuming he [Carter] has a green light from the White House, this is a genuine shift," said Patrick Cronin, director of the Asia-Pacific Security Program at the Center for a New American Security. "The Obama administration went halfway in this direction when it announced a partial lifting of the ban; this would go all the way if Congress lets it happen."

"An unfettered arms sales policy toward Vietnam would give strategic weight to America's rebalance to Asia," continued Cronin, a longtime advocate of such sales. < Caution-Caution-http://www.wsj.com/articles/fontaine-cronin-the-case-for-u-s-arms-sales-to-vietnam-1405443723 > "The timing is crucial, given that China is stretching its influence over the South China Sea in advance of the international tribunal ruling (on China's territorial dispute with the Philippines) and President Obama is preparing for his first visit to Hanoi."

Besides the strategic symbolism of the US standing with Vietnam — which has already agreed to US Army stockpiles of humanitarian supplies on its soil — arms exports could assist Vietnamese operations to secure their airspace and waters against Chinese intrusion.

"Drones are an interesting possibility," said Dean Cheng of the Heritage Foundation. So are long-range radars and other intelligence-gathering tools, and perhaps helicopters for maritime patrol and resupply of island outposts.

"What they don't need, for example, is M-16 rifles," Cheng said. Vietnam's military is mainly equipped with robust Russian-made or similar equipment, he noted, and bringing in large quantities of maintenance-hungry American-made gear would require "opening up a new supply system in Vietnam, training an entire new logistical cadre."

"Their military infrastructure is built on Soviet tech," agreed Gregory Poling, head of the Asia Maritime Transparency Initiative at the Center for Strategic and International Studies. "The administration is therefore looking at those areas where Vietnam doesn't have much of a current capability–long-range air patrol, Coast Guard, radar, etc.–not fighter jets and the like."

In the longer term, added Cronin, "completely lifting the ban on lethal arms sales sets up the possibility of genuine co-production of defense arms in the years and

decades ahead. Joint production is far more likely to be sustainable and serious than simply transferring excess military hardware."

Good morning, Mike, and thanks for the feedback.

You're more than welcome on taking time to interact and try to contribute to the categorization process. I appreciate my views being considered by your staff, though regret your ultimate decision.

I have confidence in the integrity and commitment of the analytic community that determines categorization; therefore, my greatest concern since becoming aware of the April 2015 language was the families' perceptions of DPAA, families of all wars, not "just" the Vietnam War. That concern has been only marginally alleviated by removing "impractical" from the deferred categorization.

I respectfully disagree with your belief that deleting "deferred" from the list of categories would require DPAA to "throw everything out, and start (again), anew." Deleting "deferred" would have meant analysis of only one category of cases, many of which are the roughly 5,300 Korean War cases in the DPRK. As to WWII, I understood from your staff that the majority have not yet been reviewed and placed into categories, understandable considering the volume.

I fully agree that categorization is internally helpful and necessary for DPAA, especially in establishing priorities to achieve maximum efficiency and effectiveness, but the importance to the individual families cannot be overstated. As each one is hoping and praying for accountability in their lifetime, DPAA's categorization is crucial. All are impacted; thus my concern over their perception of DPAA. Nevertheless, the decision was yours to make and the consequences are yours to defend.

I also regret that there was no face to face discussion before you reached a final decision, though recognize you were returning from your NEA Asia trip when the staff discussion occurred.

As mentioned in my earlier note today, I huddled wth the P&P/OC team to discuss specifics of case management after your visit to our spaces last week — thanks for making the time to do so and offering perspectives on behalf of the Vietnam War families. After reviewing, I've agreed to modify the wording of the case categorization memo to better reflect the accounting community commitment to our mission, and not have words that could be misconstrued as cavalier or perceiving 'inconvenience'. Unfortunately, due to the 2-year time/effort that went into arriving and binning our cases, I am reluctant to start that process all over again, and throw everything out, and start (again), anew. Coupled with case categories being designed primarily for the internal use of our researchers and analysts within DPAA (and being quite dynamic), as circumstances change as new evidence arises.

I've decided to retain the "deferred" (pursuit) category, however it will now read: "deferred cases are assessed to have no new and/or viable leads, or site access." Concur with deleting " field operations impractical" -- not appropriate. Really has nothing to do with impracticality (if such a word) -- more about access/information.

I look forward to explaining these categories if you'd like and hand out the memos at the summer conference.

Of course, former Soviet Union involvement in the Vietnam War is well known, just as is PRC involvement, but I'd never seen such detailed information related to their ongoing support, as well as direct relationship to closely monitoring US aircraft carriers, bases and aircraft. Of course that last highlighted paragraph sparks specific interest and may also be picked up by others here in the US, not as quickly as was on it, with complete translation the day after publication.

I don't know who in the agency or elsewhere is monitoring the Russian publications, but whomever that is, I hope someone engaged in supporting the POW/MIA accounting mission is in close touch and tasking is in place.

Declassifying the Soviet "Fishing Trawlers" Monitored U.S. Aircraft Carriers to Help Vietnam

During our resistance war against the Americans, hundreds of Soviet "fishing trawlers" made voyages to Vietnam to monitor the bombers being launched by U.S. aircraft carriers. An article on the Sputniknews website describes the contributions made by Soviet reconnaissance and intelligence to help Vietnam during the war against the United States. This article is based on top-secret documents about these activities that Russia has partially (but not completely) declassified after half a century.

Even though all of the information on this subject is not available, today there is sufficient information to say that Soviet military intelligence personnel helped to save the lives of hundreds of thousands of Vietnamese and helped to protect hundreds of installations and facilities from being destroyed by aircraft based on U.S. aircraft carriers. One example of this is the "missile ambush" tactic used against American aircraft by Soviet specialists, and later by the Vietnamese missile officers that the Soviet specialists had trained. Back then, the missile units could not be kept constantly on combat alert throughout the territory of the Democratic Republic of Vietnam. Vietnamese missile forces and their Soviet advisors had to carry out the very difficult task of moving their air defense missile systems to ambush positions at locations where U.S. aircraft might penetrate North Vietnam's airspace. During those years, people were not just filled with respect; they were positively amazed at the level of accuracy displayed in the choices of times and locations for these missile ambushes. U.S. aircraft flew into the missile killzones as soon as they violated Vietnamese airspace. Today no one is surprised by this any longer, but everyone is truly respectful of the work done by the Soviet Union's spies. Vietnam's missile troops received timely reports on the number of U.S. aircraft taking off from aircraft carriers and from the airbase on Guam and on the timing and location of upcoming airstrikes. These reports were collected and supplied by Soviet reconnaissance vessels that were constantly present in the area.

Beginning in 1964, 17 small and medium-sized Soviet fishing trawlers were modernized and equipped with the most modern electronic equipment available at that time. However, the outward appearance of these vessels was not altered and they looked just like scientific research vessels or fishing trawlers!

For example, Soviet hydrographic vessels sailed from Pier 37 in Vladivostok Harbor manned by personnel wearing civilian clothing and equipped with fishing nets and cranes. However, these were not simple fishermen. These were reconnaissance vessels that were sent to monitor the locations from which U.S. aircraft took off to fly bombing missions against targets in North Vietnam.

The voyages of these Soviet reconnaissance vessels took them to the Pacific Ocean, where the U.S.'s Anderson Air Force Base was located on the island of Guam, six hours flying time from Vietnam, or to the Gulf of Tonkin, where U.S. aircraft carriers were operating. Over a ten-year period, Soviet reconnaissance vessels conducted a total of 94 reconnaissance voyages, each lasting for three or four months. A total of approximately eight thousand personnel personally participated in these operations or indirectly supported them.

The commander of one ocean squadron, Captain Dmitry Lukash (Ship's Captain First Class), said that the vessels in his squadron were constantly present near U.S. aircraft carriers both in and outside the Gulf of Tonkin to monitor the flights of the fighters, reconnaissance aircraft, and electronic warfare aircraft. Sometimes they got very close to the American aircraft carriers, within just 100 meters, close enough to be able to read the identifying numbers painted on individual aircraft on the aircraft carrier's deck.

As soon as American aircraft began to be raised to the flight deck, the trawlers immediately reported that fact to Soviet Navy Headquarters staff and a quick warning was passed to Vietnam. One Soviet reconnaissance vessel was also constantly present in the waters about three miles off of the airbase on Guam and it also carefully monitored the number of aircraft that had taken off, which direction they were headed, how many aircraft returned to the base, and whether or not any of them had been hit and damaged. This information was immediately reported to Moscow and Hanoi. Because of this, Vietnam always knew when U.S. aircraft had been hit and crashed into the ocean and when aircraft had been damaged and was informed of these facts before the U.S. put out any information on these incidents.

In fact, with regards to U.S. aircraft that were hit and crashed at sea, Soviet spies and technical specialists dove to the bottom of the sea and recovered hundreds of U.S. military documents and technical diagrams that were marked "secret" and sent these materials back home to Moscow. [Emphasis added by translator]

As promised, attached are the remarks Ambassador Vinh delivered in Austin on April 28th. I wanted you to see his incoming note, responding to the League invitation, as well as my comments regarding his remarks. Too often, the ongoing accounting effort is lumped into the "legacies" definition and that shouldn't occur.

It diminishes the honor and importance of DPAA's and its predecessors' noble effort to account for and return missing personnel, something that all should recognize as a matter of respect for those who serve their nations and the families who support them. In relative terms, Ambassador Vinh is of a younger generation in the Foreign Ministry, so a bit sensitive education is helpful.

You'll note in his remarks some appreciation for "anti-war" elements, and that may help explain why he was the only speaker who did not receive a standing ovation, but from my assessment, it had relatively little "cadre-speak" and hostile rhetoric was negligible. His assessment of the future sounds about right, though TPP is in danger of failure due to our own chaotic political process. I guess we'll see.

I hope all goes well at the White House meeting on Thursday and see no reason why it wouldn't, as it is simply a courtesy to bring in interested parties to more or less brief on the intentions for the President's visit, but I don't mind saying I was disappointed in the White House release this morning.

Dear Vinh, and good afternoon. I'm so pleased to hear from you. Thanks so much for the personal confirmation accepting our invitation to the Annual Dinner and we very much look forward to having you and your wife with us again.

In the near future, I'll send over the names of the nine Vietnamese personnel whose lives were lost on that tragic mission April 7 2001 while on a helicopter survey flight over incident sites. We're asking you to read their names from the head table podium, and General Milley will read the names of the seven Americans lost that fateful day, plus two others lost on December 15, 1973, also working on this humanitarian mission.

I very much appreciate your sending over your remarks delivered at the Vietnam War symposium at the LBJ Library in Austin. Most everything you raised was applaudable and demonstrated the national effort your country has undergone postwar, to the credit of both your government and people. It is a positive report and one that you should be proud to deliver on behalf of your country.

In reading through the text, and always conscious of sensitivities on the part of all parties, I winced at your inclusion of our bilateral cooperation to account for missing personnel as one of the "legacy issues" of the war. Although clearly US personnel became missing during that long ago conflict, I respectfully suggest that accounting for all who serve their nations could more accurately and honorably be defined as the ongoing humanitarian obligation of all nations.

We have actively advocated the need for US support to address the negative impact of unexploded ordnance and remediation of dioxins in the soil. This support, now quite substantial, was advocated in a spirit of humanitarian reciprocity, not out of guilt or dwelling on responsibility for wartime actions. To do the latter would not be well-received by the American people, especially our Veterans. We've earned their support for providing substantial assistance on this separate humanitarian basis.

I am very optimistic that President Obama's visit to Vietnam will have the same positive impact on our bilateral relationship as your General Secretary's visit last year. In my view, that visit was a resounding success and, frankly, an example of something I doubted I would ever experience. I'm so glad that both governments recognized the League's fundamental role in bringing our two countries together and am confident that this upcoming visit will further add to the comprehensive bilateral relationship that continues to expand.

We are in an exciting evolution and pleased that you are here to be Vietnam's Ambassador to the United States at such a critical time. Please extend my very best wishes to many whom I've grown to admire as outstanding representatives of your country, worthy of the positions they have been entrusted to fulfill. Of course I'm referring to people you know, especially DPM/FM Minh, Ministers To Lam and Vinh, Ambassadors Quang and Ba Hung, and many others who have contributed significantly to our

bilateral relationship over the years.

Enjoy your visit in Vietnam and travel safely.

P.S. I've read these articles, and met with SEN Blunt on Thursday about the Wolfe Case. I also explained to the Senator the long MEL (some MANY years longer than Wolfe), costs affiliated with Vietnam War efforts, need for additional resources as we've gotten cut from FY'15. Actually, Vietnam families should not/NOT be growing impatient in additional resources being REQUIRED for WWII activities, as the WWI efforts have been pretty benign to date. As I showed you, WWII efforts/costs are less than 1/5th of the cost of Vietnam War efforts (projected in FY'17: \$6.8M (both Europe/Pacific) vs \$32.8M in Vietnam Countries), yet produce 4 times the # of identifications, closure, and field recoveries as does the missing from Vietnam.

Good morning, Mike,

As we all anticipated, impatience is growing and will continue to grow in the Vietnam War community as additional assets and resources are required for WWII remains recovery and an "ID-counting" mentality that still seems to motivate some, especially in the Lab. This is somewhat understandable since successful IDs are their sole measurement of success. Cases that have been on the Master Excavation List (MEL) for many, many years are still waiting. In our view, the priority for scheduling should NOT be influenced by political factors, including Members of Congress, but such pressures will increasingly be inevitable.

Families must have total confidence in the integrity of the process, as well as the people implementing it;

therefore, I encourage you to determine the priorities for scheduling excavations based on DPAA's reality and in terms that all can and will understand and accept as logical, at least eventually, in the best interest of the overall mission. I cannot express that same hope for the WWII and Korean War families as they all appear more focused on their own individual cases.

I haven't sent this note or the article below to the families, or even the board as yet, but perhaps you might consider a solution, clearly spelled out, to separate accounting processes and priorities for each war. As related to the Vietnam War, the initial assurance on which confidence was built was directed from the top, and more recently by former Secretary Hagel's direction to "build on the existing strengths" and implement the "complete reorganization" using that direction as a guideline.

I very much appreciate the budget figures and usage of operational funds you showed me in confidence, but to knowledgeable family members and veterans long involved, it is looking increasingly like what was working for Vietnam War accounting, that admittedly would NOT be applicable to WWII remains recovery, is being abandoned in favor of boosting the ID count. That rings much too closely to the Vietnam War media use of "body count" as applied to KIAs, often on both sides.

As in all instances, the decision is yours to make and, if you wish, I'll be more than happy to contribute to the process, quietly of course, either in person or by editing from afar, and welcome back, Ann

Valerie Wolfe was just nine months old when her father, Air Force Cpt. Thomas Wolfe, a pilot, was shot down and killed in Laos in 1966.

She is on a campaign to compel the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency to keep its promise to bring her father Caution-home.

"My father volunteered for duty in southeast Asia," Wolfe said. "He was there a matter of months before he was killed. Originally listed as MIA, missing in action, that status was soon changed to MIA/BNR, missing in action, body not recovered, due to the official determination that no one could have survived the loss incident."

Zack Pryse, Wolfe's friend and former roommate, described the incident from letters he received from pilots in another aircraft that had observed the crash.

"Tom wanted to see where he thought he had spotted an anti-aircraft gun a few days before," Pryse said.
"Chuck Dudley [the pilot] was wounded, but he fought it all the way in. The navigator bailed out on the left

side, but he got out too low. He deployed his 'chute, but landed in a bamboo thicket.

"I think Tom tried to grab the yoke. The plane bucked up but then went in. I think Tom fell out. The left engine hit the ground and the plane caught fire."

There was no rescue mission deployed as it was determined no one could have survived the crash.

The Wolfe family has, for years, kept in contact with military officials in an effort to have the crash site, identified in 1999, excavated and the remains of all three pilots returned to their families.

While the site was approved for excavation in 2006, no effort has been made by the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency, the military branch tasked with those efforts, to begin.

At each subsequent family update, those same officials would give, for various reasons, an extended fiveyear timeline before excavation could begin. The first delay on was cited for the possibility of unexploded ordinance making the site unsafe for excavation. Additional attempts to determine the status of her father's case were met with the response that the site had been recommended for excavation, but no other specific information as to why no action was being taken.

"We have attended family updates, written to our casualty officer, requested review information and provided DNA information," Wolfe said. "We have done whatever was asked of the family in a cooperative effort to enhance further progress toward remains recovery."

But one thing they didn't know, until 2012, was a part of the criteria in determining which sites to excavate was based on family involvement.

"Neither my sister nor I wanted to believe that our level of caring was being assessed as a criteria of who they should go looking for overseas. We found out in 2015 that it was, and that the box as a family had not been checked, even though we had kept in regular, consistent contact for decades."

And while her father's case remains near the top of the list, new cases are being added all the time.

"In actuality, my father's case is falling further away from selection, not moving closer, due to a new cluster policy, in which sites geographically located close to one another are prioritized to speed up the process." Wolfe said. "The likelihood of a serious review of my father's case will not occur until 2020."

For Wolfe, that is too long.

"Time is not on our side," Wolfe said. "The longer they wait, the less likely there will be recoverable remains. I was nine months old when my father was killed. I am 50 now. We have been waiting a very long time."

The motto of the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency is "Fulfilling Our Nation's Promise.

Wolfe now thinks it time -- past time -- for the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency to keep its promise to bring her father Caution-home.

STATUS OF THE POW/MIA ISSUE: May 19, 2016

1,620 Americans are now listed by DoD as missing and unaccounted-for from the Vietnam War. Vietnam - 1,263 (VN-465, VS-798); Laos-301; Cambodia-49; Peoples Republic of China territorial waters-7. (These numbers fluctuate due to investigations resulting in changed locations of loss.) The League seeks the fullest possible accounting for those still missing and repatriation of all recoverable remains. Highest priority is accounting for Americans last known alive. US intelligence indicates some Americans known to be in captivity in Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia were not returned at the end of the war. In the absence of evidence to the contrary, it must be assumed that these Americans could still be alive, and the US Government should not rule out that possibility.

Vietnam established comprehensive wartime and post-war processes to collect and retain information and remains; thus, unilateral efforts by them offered significant potential. Vietnam has since taken many unilateral actions that are welcome and appreciated, plus announced that there are no obstacles to full cooperation. Recently, Vietnam has increased implementation of commitments to provide long-sought archival records with relevant, caserelated information, thanks in part to improvement of working-level efforts, but primarily due to increased bilateral relations across the board. The early 2015 League Delegation brought commitments that offered real promise for increased success. First undertaken in northern Vietnam in 1985, joint field operations have dramatically changed and are now much more effective. Vietnamese officials are participating with greater seriousness and professionalism, achieving increased results, including both US-led Joint Excavation Teams and Vietnamese Recovery Teams (VRTs), led by Vietnamese and supported by a few US personnel. This formula allows a greater number of teams to "increase the pace and scope of field operations," as requested by Vietnam during discussions since 2009. Due to increased military-to-military cooperation, US Navy assets are now allowed to participate in underwater survey and recovery operations, when requested. These steps, long advocated by the League, are now coming to fruition and are reportedly are raised by US officials at all levels.

After a rough period, joint field operations in Laos are now increasingly productive, even though more difficult than elsewhere. Accounting efforts had slowed due to Lao Government inflexibility, attempting to over-price payment for helicopter support and denying permission for ground transport to accessible incident sites. Laos is now showing greater flexibility, earlier having increased the number of US personnel permitted in-country, now allowing ground transport to accessible sites, and has renewed a business license to a foreign company to provide reliable, small helicopter support. When helpful, Vietnamese witnesses are also allowed to participate in joint US-Lao operations. DIA's Stony Beach POW/MIA specialist is assigned full time in-country; however, his efforts are impeded by Lao reluctance to permit him to operate outside the confines of scheduled DPAA field operations. Also, despite strong

support from, and interventions by, US Ambassador Dan Clune, a border dispute with Cambodia that was ongoing when the League Delegation visited over a year aso continues to impede recovery operations in that area. The League urges officials in Laos and Cambodia to temporarily set aside their political disagreement and work trilaterally with the US to procced on this humanitarian recovery.

Related to DIA's Stony Beach Team, one Cambodia specialist works full time at the US Embassy in Phnom Penh, and research and field operations in Cambodia have received excellent support. Two Stony Beach personnel have for years rotated on temporary duty in and out of Vietnam, collecting information via archival research and interviews of potential witnesses. Vietnam was long ago requested to permit, and is still reportedly considering, permanent status for these two POW/MIA specialists. Successive US Ambassadors have strongly supported this important move, but increases in bilateral military relations should be sufficient to overcome any reluctance. The US Ambassador to Laos continues to support full use of the Lao specialist. It is hoped that the expanded bilateral relationships with Laos and Vietnam will mean positive decisions on challenges facing this mission. The Stony Beach specialists are sorely needed to augment the investigation process while witnesses are still living and able to facilitate locating incident sites for follow-up DPAA recoveries.

The greatest obstacles to increased Vietnam War accounting efforts are too few qualified scientists and unreliable funding that has caused US cancellation of scheduled operations, thus sending negative signals to foreign counterpart officials, especially in Vietnam. Since over 80% of US losses in Laos and 90% in Cambodia occurred in areas where Vietnamese forces operated during the war, Vietnam's expanded provision of helpful records, improved and increased archival research, interviews and field operations are the core means to expand accounting for Vietnam War missing personnel.

POW/MIA STATISTICS Live Sighting statistics provided by the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA)

Live Sightings: 1,996 first-hand live sighting reports have been received since 1975, none recently. 1,941 (97.24%) were resolved: 1,340 (67.13%) equated to Americans previously accounted for (i.e. returned POWs, missionaries or civilians detained for violating SRV codes); 45 (2.25%) correlated to wartime sightings of military personnel or pre-1975 sightings of civilians still unaccounted-for; 556 (27.86%) were determined to be fabrications. The remaining 55 (2.76%) unresolved first-hand reports are the focus of continuing analytical and collection efforts: 48 (2.40%) concern Americans reported in a captive environment; 7 (0.35%) are non-captive sightings. The years in which these 55 first hand sightings occurred are listed below:

Accountability: At the end of the Vietnam War, there reportedly were 2,583 unaccounted-for American prisoners, missing or killed in action/body not recovered. As of May 19, 2016, the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency lists 1,620 Americans as missing and unaccounted-for, 80-90% of them in Vietnam or in areas of Cambodia and Laos where Vietnamese operated during the war. According to the DPAA Lab, unilateral SRV repatriations of remains with scientific evidence of storage have accounted for less than 200 of the 655 from Vietnam; two were mistakenly listed as KIA/BNR in Vietnam in 1968, but remains were actually recovered at that time. All but seven of the 265 Americans accounted for in Laos since the end of the war have been the result of joint recoveries. Six were recovered and turned over by indigenous personnel from Laos and one from Vietnam. In addition, three persons identified were recovered in Vietnam before the end of the war. There follows a breakdown by country of the <u>963 Americans</u> accounted for since the end of the Vietnam War in 1975.

An additional 63 US personnel were accounted for between 1973 and 1975, for a grand total of 1,026. These Americans were accounted for by unilateral US effort in areas where the US could gain access at that time, not due to government-to-government cooperation with the post-war governments of Vietnam, Laos or Cambodia.



I'd seen it, and appreciate your forwarding. Since the article is undated, I assume he wrote it years ago. Application expressed similar outrage at DPAA publicly in Austin at our FMU, and even when John Byrd gave him a detailed answer as to why we simply don't disinter and ID, retort was, "sounds like a bureaucratic government answer to me".

Too many specifics to note -- but I'll probably write to all on the CC line next week, once I get a few more details. For instance, X-5588 WAS ALREADY DISINTERRED in 2013 and the identity was not one of the men way suggests in his editorial below, and it is still under analysis. 6 more Korean War unknowns were disinterred from the punchbowl 10 days ago, and identifications are under way for all 6 (good clavicle data available). Of course, way knows we have already exhumed 111 of the 866 Korean War unknowns, accounting for 59 servicemen and the rest under continuing analysis. Seven additional Korea disinterment packets are in staffing now, and we will look into each of the X-files he mentions.

One thing folks like And discount in their outrage (well noted by Andrews) is that they presume to know what happened and/or apply their present day frustrations to those that were most impacted by the loss. A case in point is a WWII loss we recently investigated involving the loss of a Navy fighter pilot who was killed when his Hellcat (along with three other Hellcats) were shot down by Japanese fighter in the last dogfight of WWII — a very famous dogfight for the Navy. The family had been told by a Japanese researcher that the remains of their relative had been located at the time of loss and buried in a cemetery and the family asked that we go get them.

We did thorough research, and from the IDPF determined the Japanese had indeed gone to the crash site at the time of loss and located the pilots remains and buried them in their local temple. However, the REST OF THE STORY is that the remains were recovered from the temple in 1946 by an Army Graves Registration Team. The remains consisted only of the upper torso, but the Army made an identification based on all eyewitness testimony as well as the uniform and aircraft wreckage that the locals had found which all belonged to the missing pilot had been recovered with the remains. The Navy consequently met and briefed the parents on the identification and the mother asked that they be buried as an unknown. Needless to say, the cousins were quite surprised when here.

I think some often presume to know what folks WERE thinking decades ago or what information they had been provided without a true understanding of the complexities involved. Some also like the attention that comes with faux rage, and publicly holding the government accountable. We'll do our best to deal with it all, and remain focused on the mission at hand.



Mike, when I first heard of the below plan, I refused to believe you would ever seriously consider such an ignorant proposal, but since your management team is proposing it, I'm obligated to send this email. I will say at the outset, I strongly urge that you not react defensively and launch another investigation into unauthorized "leaking" of UNCLASSIFIED information. To do so would be even more destructive, and enough damage has already been done to the Vietnam Warrelated analytic workforce you inherited, though much had occurred prior to your arrival.

I recently learned that there is an internal DPAA "initiative" being considered to terminate the Last Known Alive (LKA) program with deliberate action to declare all cases "fate determined" and end the policy of resolving then as highest priority cases. I understand this has been rumored internally for about ten days or so, but that there are plans to present this absurd proposal to you, Fern and BG Spindler during the time you are in Hawaii for the Operations Symposium.

The longstanding policy-directed priority on these and other discrepancy cases was carefully considered by the POW/MIA Interagency Group (in which I participated fully) and formalized by President Reagan, based on US evidence of the individual in captivity or alive on the ground in immediate proximity to capture by hostile forces. This priority policy was further reinforced by General Jack Vessey at a White House Press Conference in 1987, following a trip to Hanoi where he addressed circumstances surrounding specific LKA cases. It is supported in Congress and by all the major national veteran groups, and we have boxes of supportive speeches and congressional testimony over four decades.

This longstanding policy and the evidence to support it have repeatedly been provided to the Vietnamese and Lao, with agreements reached long ago between the US and each country. The results has been effective in prompting increased cooperation resulting in insights into the level of Vietnamese knowledge and ability to provide archival information and case resolution.

Secretary of Defense Hagel's directive to USDP Christine Wormuth, your temporary predecessor VADM Mike Franken and to you was to "build on the existing strengths, noting failure was not an option. It is no accident that 1,027 American personnel have been recovered and identified since 1973, all but 63 since the end of the Vietnam War in 1975. It was not accidental, but carefully structured to bring about the results thus far achieved.

The policy has been sustained over the years, not only surviving through some tumultuous years, but thriving to become the worldwide effort you inherited, with our full support and advocacy. This priority has been and is signaled to all - foreign and domestic - of the seriousness with which the US takes its responsibility to stand behind those who serve, the active-duty community and our veterans. The families would be crushed at the betrayal by DPAA and the blatant appearance of a write-off.

If word gets out beyond Isver and me, there will be dramatic results, media headlines, congressional hearings, rebirth of the "Rambo movement," the next Rolling Thunder would be on DPAA's doorstep and a complete loss of family member and veteran organization support.

It appears this "initiative" is from newly assigned personnel with no historical background on the issue, and isolated from consultation with those who do have accurate historical perspective. A cursory check with informed veterans within DPAA would have evoked astonishment. If this plan is pursued and not stopped, expect strong public opposition, and the League will have no choice but to seek support from those who share our principles, values and commitment to the accounting mission and the priority that has sustained this effort since 1981.

It is evident that some on your staff do not agree with the priority you placed on Vietnam War accounting. This is not the only indicator, the last being discussion of shutting down the detachments. There will be no confidence in DPAA's leadership, and the fallout will be disastrous. Of that you can be certain.

I urge this be stopped immediately and the message made very clear as to why, on substance and commitment from YOU, the Director, and promises you have made to the families and veterans, stakeholders all.

The discussions at the 15th Asian Security Summit (3-5 June 2016), popularly known as Shangri-La Dialogue in Singapore were indicative of the existing deadlock among the countries about Asia's future security architecture. Overall, the discussions were quite pessimistic. The two most important players in the regional politics – the US and China – openly alleged each other on the issues of escalations in the South China Sea as well as the deployment of the Terminal High Altitude Air Defense (THAAD) system on the Korean peninsula.

US Secretary of Defense Ashton Carter warned China that it was at the risk of 'erecting a Great Wall of self-isolation' if it continues its current policies in the region. Carter criticised the Chinese military buildup in the region and said he hoped that "this development doesn't occur because it will result in actions being taken both by the United States, and actions being taken by others in the region that will have the effect of not only increasing tensions but isolating China." Japan too made stern statements about Chinese activities in the South China Sea.

In response to the China's claim that the US and Japan are 'outsiders' in the region, Japanese Defense Minister Gen Nakatani said no country could be 'outsider' when it comes to regional stability. Responding to the US' stern words, the Chinese representative at the Dialogue, Deputy Chief of General Staff, People's Liberation Army, Admiral Sun Jianguo, claimed sovereignty in the region and said China "had no fear of trouble." He claimed "we were not isolated in the past, we are not isolated now, and we will not be isolated in the future." He suggested countries, indirectly indicating towards the US, to come out of the 'Cold War mentality'.

Similarly, on the issue of THAAD, the US defense secretary claimed that the issue of THAAD deployment would be raised during his discussion with the South Korean Defense Minister Han Min-koo. Another defence official of the US even claimed that the US and South Korea would make a 'public announcement' about the deployment of a THAAD unit. However, in his bilateral talks with the South Korean defense minister, the Chinese representative Sun Jianguo warned South Korea that "it would destabilize the Asia Pacific region." Sun said that it would "infringe China's strategic interests." Although, South Korea responded by stating that "China is overestimating THAAD" and that his country has "the will to allow THAAD deployment," in another statement, he denied the US defence secretary's claim that Seoul would discuss the issue during his meeting with Carter in Singapore.

Actually, it seems that the US and China are not ready to compromise and accommodate each other's security concerns and a game of 'staring at each other' is going on. In the sidelines of the Summit, defence ministers of the US, Japan and South Korea held a trilateral dialogue and stressed their collective efforts to pressurise North Korea via UN resolution 2270 – passed in March 2016 after the fourth round of North Korean nuclear and missile tests. The leaders representing Washington, Seoul and Tokyo were in agreement that a diplomatic engagement with Pyongyang is fruitless, and demanded more cooperation with Beijing towards the implementation of UN Resolution 2270. It is interesting to note that China appears to be moving in an entirely different direction. Just a few days before the Shangri-La Dialogue, Chinese President Xi Jinping met North Korean Foreign Minister Ri Su-yong in Beijing. This is an important departure from Xi's approach towards North Korea after he assumed office in 2013. Previously, he had avoided any direct high level contacts with Pyongyang but now there are speculations that he may have a summit meet with North Korean leader Kim Jong-un in the coming months.

Thus, the intensity of the contest in the regional politics was demonstrated at the Shangri-La Dialogue. Although around 500 defence and diplomatic officials and experts from 52 countries, including defence ministers from 23 countries participated in the dialogue, the contest between the US and China was clearly the main theme of the conference.

Unfortunately, a 'third opinion' remains almost ineffective in the process. Washington and Beijing are scheduled to hold their annual high-level Strategic and Economic Dialogue (6-8 June 2016) in Beijing. Hundreds of US and Chinese officials will conduct further discussion on regional issues. The US Secretary of State John Kerry, the US Treasury Secretary Jack Lew, China's State Councilor Yang Jiechi, and China's Vice Premier Wang Yang will to

participate in the dialogue. However, it appears that both the parties are not ready to budge from their respective positions.

Thus, the 2016 Shangri-La Dialogue showed that great power contests are going to overwhelm peace and security concerns of other countries. It is high time to ask if the great powers of the region remain adamant on the stubborn positions, would not it be correct to articulate a 'third opinion'? In the cacophony of contests that seems improbable; but if countries like India take the lead in articulating such an 'opinion', it would be a positive move for regional security and would also enhance India's stature and position in regional politics.

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SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE GOVERNOR TO ORDER THAT WHENEVER THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES IS FLOWN ON A PERMANENT FLAGPOLE IN FRONT OF THE STATE CAPITOL BUILDING, THE NATIONAL LEAGUE OF FAMILIES' POW/MIA FLAG SHALL BE FLOWN ON THE SAME HALYARD.

WHEREAS, in 1971, Mary Helen Hoff developed the idea for a national flag as a reminder of the United States servicemembers who, like her husband, Navy Commander Michael G. Hoff, were Prisoners of War or Missing in Action; and

WHEREAS, by the end of the Vietnam War, the United States Department of Defense listed more than two thousand, five hundred servicemembers as Prisoners of War (POW) or Missing in Action (MIA); and

WHEREAS, in 1979, the United States Congress and President James Earl "Jimmy" Carter, Jr. proclaimed the first National POW/MIA Recognition Day to acknowledge the servicemembers' families' concerns and symbolize the steadfast resolve of the American people to never forget the men and women who gave up their freedom while protecting ours; and

WHEREAS, in 1982, the National League of Families' POW/MIA flag became the only flag other than the flag of the United States to fly over the White House in Washington, D.C.; and

WHEREAS, in 1990, the United States Congress passed P.L. 101-355, which designated the POW/MIA flag as "the symbol of our Nation's concern and commitment to resolving as fully as possible the fates of Americans still prisoner, missing and unaccounted for in Southeast Asia, thus ending the uncertainty for their families and the Nation"; and

WHEREAS, in 1998, the Defense Authorization Act (P.L. 105-30 85) created 36 United States Code section 189a, which addressed 31 the display of the POW/MIA flag; and WHEREAS, while 36 United States Code section 189a was repealed, the operative language of that section was recodified into 36 United States Code section 902, which requires the POW/MIA flag to be displayed at the United States Capitol, the White House, the building of the office of the United States Secretary of Defense, each major military installation, and other specified locations on six designated days: Armed Forces Day, the third Saturday in May; Memorial Day, the last Monday in

May; Flag Day, June 14; Independence Day, July 4; National POW/MIA Recognition Day; and Veterans Day, November 11; and

WHEREAS, 36 United States Code section 902 requires the POW/MIA flag to be displayed at the federal World War II Memorial, Korean War Veterans Memorial, Vietnam Veterans Memorial, and the medical centers of the United States Department of Veterans Affairs on any day that the flag of the United States is flown; and

WHEREAS, Section 5-18.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, enacted in 2010, requires the POA/MIA flag to be flown on the grounds of the State Capitol on the same six designated days listed in 36 United States Code section 902, and allows the POW/MIA flag to be flown directly under the flag of the United States if the flag of the State of Hawaii is on a separate halyard from the flag of the United States; and

WHEREAS, Section 5-18.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, allows but does not require the POA/MIA flag to be flown on the grounds of the State Capitol building on other days; and

WHEREAS, the flag of the United States and the flag of the State of Hawaii currently displayed in front of the State Capitol building are on separate permanent flagpoles; and

Vietnam's Love-Hate Relationship With China: A Historical Explanation – OpEd

China had always been and would continue to be a key point of reference to the foreign policy makers of Southeast Asian countries, especially for Vietnam. Sharing land and maritime boundaries with China, Vietnam, from very early times, had been profoundly influenced by its giant neighbor in the north. It has shared cultural traditions; in fact, Prof. Arnold Toynbee, in his monumental book, Half the World – The History and Culture of China and Japan, includes Vietnam, along with Japan and Korea, in the East Asian world. At the same time, the proud and heroic Vietnamese had been intensely nationalist; they had always resisted China's hegemonistic designs. According to perceptive Southeast Asia watchers, Vietnam will be the bulwark against Chinese expansionism in Southeast Asia.

Vietnam, as we know it today, came into existence on the eve Asia's European age. Historically this country had several independent kingdoms. The first was the Indianised kingdom of Funan. We do not know its real name, Funan is the name given by Chinese historians. It

continued to exist from the first century AD to the Sixth century AD. It was located in the Mekong delta of Vietnam and Cambodia.

The second, which was also an Indianised kingdom, was Champa, the Chinese name for it was Lin Yi. It existed between 2nd and 17th century AD. It extended over the southern and central coastal regions of Vietnam. The people of Champa, known as the Chams, were highly Hinduised. There are still 200,000 Hindus in Vietnam. The Author had the good fortune to meet a Hindu Cham delegation in the World Hindu Conference held in New Delhi few years ago. They were very keen to establish contacts with Hindu religious organizations in India to foster and promote their Hindu identity.

The Vietnamese originally lived in the Red River delta in the northern part of Vietnam. They

developed their agricultural skills and became prosperous. Their rulers developed a good administrative system. But their curse was China, the northern neighbor. The expansionist Chinese rulers sent military expeditions to the South and brought Nam Viet under Chinese control. What is more they imposed Chinese culture on them and sinicised them. The Chinese conquest of Nam Viet took place in the second century BC and it continued till 967 AD. The thousand years of Chinese domination was characterised by frequent uprisings by the Vietnamese and brutal military reprisals by the Chinese army. The Important elements of Chinese culture- the Mandate from Heaven, Chinese script, Confucian values and the institution of Mandarinate - were introduced in Vietnam. But it was not blind imitation; the Vietnamese retained some of the indigenous characteristics. Unlike other Southeast Asian countries, which followed Theravada form of Buddhism, Vietnam followed the Mahayana form. It got mingled with Confucianism and Taoism and a syncretic religion known as Tan Giao came into existence. As far as script is concerned, till the Vietnamese script was romanised in the 17th century, Vietnamese adopted the Chinese characters. The Vietnamese also copied the centralized system of administration and gradually extended their sway over the whole country. In that process the people of the county were Vietnamised.

Suspicion of Chinese designs is a recurrent theme in Vietnamese history. While adapting the Chinese culture the Vietnamese, with extra-ordinary courage, resisted the Chinese army.

Andrew Forbes quotes a Vietnamese martial song sung by the Vietnamese guerrillas: "Fight to keep our hair long, fight to keep our teeth black, fight to show that the heroic southern country can never be defeated".

Nayan Chanda, in his book Brother Enemy, mentions an interesting incident. Even during the height of the war against the United States, when China's support was very crucial, the Vietnamese zealously guarded their cultural traits. In October 1972, the American scholar George M. Kahin visited Vietnam. He was very keen to find out the extent of religious freedom. He participated in a well attended mass in a catholic church in Hanoi. Soon after, his Vietnamese host asked Prof. Kahin, "Would you like to see something of our religion?" Kahin accepted the invitation and was taken across a bridge to a temple in an island in Hanoi's Hoan Kiem Lake. In that temple there were three altars, one to Buddha, one to God of Earth and water and a third dedicated to Tran Hung Dao, the General who defeated the Chinese Mongol army in the 13th century. Upon enquiring Prof. Kahin came to know that there were half a dozen shrines in Hanoi where Vietnamese paid homage to heroes and heroines, such Le Loi and Trung sisters, who had fought against Chinese invaders.

The Author cannot resist the temptation to narrate the heroism of the Trung sisters who committed suicide after resisting the Chinese invaders in the first century AD. The Trung sisters – Trung Trac and Trung Nhi – were daughters of a powerful Vietnamese landlord, who lived in the first century AD. Vietnam was under the rule of the Han dynasty; the Vietnamese women enjoyed more freedom than their Chinese counterparts. China was governed by Confucian values where women occupied a lower place. Feeling oppressed by the Chinese rule, the Vietnamese were exhorted to revolt and the Trung sisters organized a rebellion and formed an army of 80,000 men and women. They won back the territory conquered by the Chinese. In 42 AD the Chinese forces returned to recapture the territory. The Vietnamese fought hard, but were to be defeated. According to popular belief, the Trung sisters decided to take their own

lives in the traditional manner of jumping into the river and drowning. The Trung sisters became symbols of Vietnamese resistance. Temples were later built in their honour and the people of Vietnam celebrate their memory every year with a national holiday.

Ho Chih Minh was a great friend of China, he was well versed in Chinese history, culture and language; but, at the same time, as a keen student of history, he was also deeply sensitive to the threat posed by China to Vietnamese freedom. After the Second World War when the French colonialists wanted to re-establish their dominance over Vietnam, few Vietnamese nationalists wanted to use the Kuomintang forces as a buffer against the French Army. Ho Chih Minh, according to Andrew Forbes, cautioned his Vietminh colleagues and asked them to draw the right lessons from history. To quote Ho Chih Minh, "The last time the Chinese came, they stayed a thousand years. The French are foreigners. They are weak. Colonialism is dying. The white man is finished in Asia. But if the Chinese stay now, they will never go. As for me, I prefer to sniff the French shit for five years, than to eat Chinese shit for the rest of my life".

Vietnam's relations with the outside world, including China since the proclamation of independence on September 2. 1945, has undergone several twists and turns. Since the focus of

independence on September 2. 1945, has undergone several twists and turns. Since the focus of my paper is on Vietnamese history before the Second World War, I shall not dwell on the important developments that took place during the three Indo- China wars and in subsequent years.

I would like to conclude the essay with a quotation from the well known scholar Andrew Forbes who aptly sums up Sino- Vietnamese relations. Andrew Forbes quotes from a novel, Fried Gold, written by the famous Vietnamese novelist Nguyen Huy Thiep. To quote: "The most significant characteristics of this country are its smallness and weakness. She is like a virgin girl raped by Chinese civilization. The girl concurrently enjoys, despises and humiliated by the rape".

UPDATE: July 2, 2016

AMERICANS ACCOUNTED FOR: The number of US personnel missing and unaccounted-for from the Vietnam War is still 1,618. Most recently accounted for was Colonel Patrick H. Wood, USAF, listed as MIA on 2/6/67, North Vietnam, remains returned on 12/14/15, and identified 2/29/16. Just prior to this was LCDR Frederick P. Crosby, USN, listed as KIA/BNR, North Vietnam, on 6/1/65, remains returned 12/14/15, and identified on 2/17/16, but not announced by DPAA until 5/25/16. Also recently confirmed as accounted for was Major Dean A. Klenda, USAF, listed as MIA, North Vietnam, on 9/17/65, recovered 12/8/14 and identified 12/30/14, but also only recently announced by DPAA. Prior to that release, the most recent was SFC Alan L. Boyer, USA/SF, listed as MIA 3/28/68, Laos, recovered 6/16/98, and identified 3/16/16. This brings the total accounted for to 965 since the end of the Vietnam War in 1975. Another 63 US personnel, recovered by the US and identified before the end of the war, bring the total of US personnel accounted for from the Vietnam War to 1,028. Of the 1,618 still missing (POW/MIA) and unaccounted-for (KIA/BNR), 90% were lost in Vietnam or in areas of Cambodia and Laos under Vietnam's wartime control: Vietnam-1,261 (VN-463, VS-798); Laos-301; Cambodia-49; PRC territorial waters-7. These country-specific numbers can and do fluctuate when investigations result in changes to loss locations. Since formation in 1970, the League has sought the return of all POWs, the fullest possible accounting for those still missing, and repatriation of all recoverable remains.

DPAA DIRECTOR RESIGNS: LTG Michael S. Linnington, USA (Ret), named as DPAA Director in June, 2015, abruptly resigned on June 16th to accept a position as CEO of the Wounded Warrior Project, an NGO headquartered in Jacksonville, Florida. There had been considerable anticipation of hearing a comprehensive report on his first full year since assuming the reins at DPAA. All were looking forward to learning what has occurred, changes and improvements made, and plans for further implementing his promise a year before to be DPAA Director for at least ten years and his commitment to sustain DPAA's priority on Vietnam War accounting for at least the next 3-5 years. This unexpected reversal of his pledge changed the environment dramatically; however, all present for the League's 47th Annual Meeting (see below) were courteous and attentive to Mr. Linnington's explanation on the reasons for his abrupt departure.

LEAGUE POSITION: In response to Mike Linnington's June 16th emailed announcement, the following statement was released by Ann Mills-Griffiths, League Chairman of the Board & CEO:

"Almost exactly a year ago, at our 46th Annual Meeting, DPAA Director Mike Linnington gave the families and veterans his word that he would be with this mission 'for the long term, at least ten years." His unexpected resignation came as a shocking reversal. Emails and calls since the annuancement expressed understandable frustration and anger, but we've been through many disappointments since 1992 and know the long-serving dedicated civilians have been the core of accounting efforts for years. We trust them to continue as they have, in the

interest of all. This latest episode will bring greater, even more unified determination to move forward, on that you can rely."

PRESIDENT VISITS VIETNAM: On a trip to Vietnam from May 22-25, President Obama met with senior Vietnamese officials. During a press conference concluding his official meeting, he stated, "On behalf of the American people, including our veterans, I want to thank the government and the people of Vietnam for the many years of cooperation to account for Americans missing in action – solemn efforts that we'll continue together."

US-RUSSIA JOINT COMMISSION (USRJC) ON POW/MIAs HOLDS PLENARY SESSION: After a lapse of over ten years, the USRJC finally held plenary discussions May 22-25 at the Pentagon. This lack of official contact, much less substantive discussions, can be attributed primarily to on-again, off-again bilateral tensions and lack of high level support by both governments for resuming joint humanitarian accounting efforts. During this lengthy period, various scenarios were in play to terminate the Presidential Commission and replace this special presidentially-established communication channel with routine diplomatic contacts. Those efforts failed for many reasons, not least the strong opposition to such a move by the League and the major national veteran organizations. Those most directly impacted are eager to see momentum return to the work of the USRJC, a viable channel for engaging Russia and the former states of the former Soviet Union.

The plenary was led on the Russian side by General Colonel Vostrotin, a national hero in the Russian Federation, and on the US side by General Robert "Doc" Foglesong, USAF (Ret). A report published on May 26 by DPAA stated, "....the USRJC was re-energized to make further progress in each of the four conflicts' working groups. All agreed to expand archival research opportunities in both countries. The US side declared that they will continue work to find information on the 264 servicemen Russia lists as MIA from its LONG involvement in Afghanistan. The US also indicated it will increase efforts to help the Russian side determine what happened to its missing citizens from other past wars and conflicts." VFW Executive Director and Assistant National Adjutant Bob Wallace and League Chairman of the Board & CEO Ann Mills-Griffiths attended social functions hosted by the two delegations, one at the Army-Navy Country Club in Arlington, VA, another at the Russian Cultural Center, hosted by the Russian Chairman, and a closing reception at the VFW's Headquarters on Capitol Hill in Washington, DC.

ADVANCING THE PLENARY: Following coordination with General Foglesong, and with interagency approval, then DPAA Director Linnington traveled to Moscow on February 8th to meet with the Russian Co-Chairman, General Colonel Vostrotin, to propose the date and agenda for the plenum. The League is cautiously optimistic that the work of the USRJC will be renewed and restored, especially since the Russian Federation named its new Chairman and opened an office in their Embassy in Washington, DC. Recognizing it was well past time to get beyond the endless delays that have plagued the Commission's work, the League welcomes and appreciates these new initiatives by leaders in both countries and looks forward to increased efforts and accounting results. While traveling, Mr. Linnington also visited several European countries and senior US officials in the region who are now contributing to the effort to conduct WWII recoveries.

FORMER DPAA DIRECTOR'S VISIT TO THE PRC AND SOUTH KOREA: Former Director Linnington also traveled to Beijing and Seoul. No specific information was shared on the discussions or their outcome, but shortly after the talks concluded, the PRC cancelled a long-planned field recovery mission near their border with North Korea (DPRK) purportedly for security reasons. Mr. Linnington also visited Seoul and held talks with officials there, renewing longstanding ties with South Korean officials who continue to support US accounting efforts, even building their own "DPAA-equivalent" agency, with the experienced advice and counsel of DPAA's Deputy Director Outreach & Communication, (b)(6)

former Commander and Deputy Commander of the Central Identification Laboratory, absorbed into JPAC in 2003.

Prior to his trip, the League urged Mr. Linnington to raise the need for responsiveness by Beijing, not only on the known PRC-controlled POW camps during the Korean War, but on records that surely exist related to PRC personnel who served during the Vietnam War. Specifically requested were archival documents related to communication units in the Vieng Xai/Sam Neua cave complex in northern Laos visited by the League Executive Director in 1982. The League recognizes the need for PRC cooperation to account for US personnel lost during both the Vietnam and Korean wars, hoping that new initiatives will be undertaken without extensive delay, and is hopeful that PRC officials will at long last be responsive.

47TH ANNUAL MEETING HELD LAST WEEK: Despite Mr. Linnington's unexpected resignation and the last-minute withdrawal of Deputy Secretary of Defense Robert Work, replaced by Acting Under Secretary for Personnel & Readiness Peter Levine, as the Opening Session Keynote Speaker on June 23rd, the 47th Annual Meeting was the largest and most productive in years. It included the 47th Annual Meeting Dinner & Commemorative Candlelight Ceremony in which Army Chief of Staff General Mark A. Milley was the speaker. His supportive, meaningful remarks inspired all present, as did his participation, along with Vietnam's Ambassador to the United States H.E. Pham Quang Vinh, in reading aloud the names of 16 American and Vietnamese personnel who lost their lives on April 7, 2001 in a tragic helicopter accident while on a mission to account for our missing. Some of their families were honored guests at the dinner. League Senior Policy Advisor (b)(6) read the names of men still missing and unaccounted-for whose loved ones were present. At the Opening Session, Mr. (b)(6) presented remarks - fully coordinated with and supported by League Chairman of the Board and CEO Ann Mills-Griffiths - assessing DPAA's first year as a DoD agency. His fair, objective, critical observations held the rapt attention of family members, veterans and all US officials present. The full text of (b)(6) remarks is available on the League's web site, Caution-www.pow-miafamilies.org < Caution-http://www.powmiafamilies.org/>, as are nearly all official presentations, though former DPAA Director Linnington again had nothing in writing. The incoming Deputy Director of DIA, Ms. Melissa Drisko, spelled out DIA's full and continuing support for its Stony Beach Team of specialists, now the only US Government unit focused solely on Vietnam War accounting, primarily on Last Known Alive (LKA) cases, interviewing witnesses, collecting relevant archival material and augmenting DPAA investigation capabilities, including those of DPAA Detachments in Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia. A full report of the 47th Annual Meeting will be included in the upcoming League Newsletter.

Fern, I meant to call you yesterday while in the office, but time got away from me, not an unusual occurrence these days, so I'm back at it, trying to accomplish a few things to tie up loose ends.

I depart tomorrow at 5:05 PM for San Diego, and will initially spend time with my daughter and family there, before flying on to the Bay Area to see my eldest brother and family, then to Cambria for a couple of days with life-long friends, then on to Pismo Beach for a Mills Reunion, before returning to the Bay Area and flying back to San Diego for a couple of days before flying back to DC on July 27th. Throughout, I'll be available on my cell phone, Thire and most if not all of the time by this email. Feel free to call at any time.

I'm very concerned that someone with DPAA is thinking along the lines outlined below, namely that the PRC and DPRK might be sensitive to learning that DIA's well-known, long-recognized Stony Beach Team is intended to PCS to Hanoi, as we already have in Laos and Cambodia. Of course that is absurd, but I'm hoping you can bring an end to this during your conversation on Tuesday with (b)(6) and, hopefully, Melissa Drisko, directly and without filters.

To hear that anyone in DPAA should be asserting "caution" is needed lest the PRC and DPRK object to or be overly sensitive to "intelligence assets" being PCSd to Hanoi, he/she should get a grip on reality. The key player in future Vietnam War accounting IS the SRV, and they have indicated they are on board, know the nature and objectives of Stony Beach, and have NO problem with their being permanently in Hanoi, so long as the outward signals are directly related to the accounting mission/DPAA, just as I've repeatedly and faithfully reported to DoD/DPAA and its predecessor organizations. DIA is simply looking to DPAA, as the primary DoD agency responsible, for concurrence. Successive US Ambassadors have been on board and supportive, even giving up State and other billets in Hanoi to get SRV approval, but it was a bit too early from them at that time. NOW, is the time, due to agreement by both governments to continue to increase the bilateral relationship, including mil-to-mil, so the opportunity is definitely here, and the signals by moving now are completely within current broader policy, as they are priority on the accounting mission.

I sincerely hope you, as Acting Director, don't allow DPAA to be the reason this long-sought plusup doesn't go forward as planned; that would be tragic, a self-inflicted wound for no substantive reason.

Obviously, DPAA can use the relatively cost-free additional assets to augment investigations in Vietnam, can be attributed to USG increasing the "pace and scope" the SRV has consistently requested since 2009, and DIA/SB's plan is to plus-up Vietnam coverage, with an adequate number of Vietnamese-speaking specialists. The question becomes, what is there to lose? It certainly won't mean any less PRC cooperation, likely quite the opposite, and it definitely would not have an adverse impact on the ZERO cooperation currently provided by the lunatic running the North Korean people into the ground.

You wanted to wait until Mike was gone before we talked, and I understand his last day in the office was June 30th, though on terminal leave until July 18th, perhaps to get moved and resettled. As you know, I'm willing to help you and Mark in any way possible, as I was Mike, but I think you're more secure in yourself than he was or ever will be, or so is my observation to date. I was very pleased to see the deadline for applications on the Director position extended until July 15th, an additional 15 days, though of course I have no idea who has applied, or will, just know that it will take a self-confident, intelligent, committed person to have any chance of success, and that is ONLY if he/she is self-confident and intelligent enough to listen and learn from knowledgeable civilians, plus build the trust necessary to succeed in restoring workforce and family member/veteran confidence.

Mark, I'm copying you because I feel you, as Deputy Director, also need to be fully aware, in case you're asked separately. Were I in your position, I would not want to be blind-sided, so I'm sure you don't either. You also feel free to call whenever you wish; I'm disappointed more than you can possibly know that my planned "exit strategy" went by the wayside with Mike's resignation, taking all my hopes and plans for writing a long-planned book on the history of our POW/MIA accounting efforts. That story needs to be told and will be all the more interesting written by the only female, non-government participant in the POW/MIA Interagency Group, with a TOP SECRET clearance, working with senior US officials to develop the strategy and move toward normalization of relations between the US and Vietnam, as well as with Laos and Cambodia. It hasn't been boring, that's for sure, but I'm deeply saddened over what has occurred, knowing Mike's sudden departure means I'm not yet free to step back/out.

As cautioned earlier, and the potential danger/damage grows, as this Mickey Bergman obviously is in communication with the DPRK delegation to the UN. (b)(6) goes back to the early 1980s, and he does make contact with foreign governments which do their best to use him to their advantage. Here it is again, and I advise you bring this to Fern's and Mark Spindler's attention, NOT that they should communicate with the Richardson people nor the DPRK official, but so that others at the NSC and State can be prepared, as well as Dave Shear, ASD/APSA and now Acting Principal Deputy Under Secretary for Policy (or some such title).

If you prefer that I handle this, let me know, but clearly DPAA "leadership" would be unaware of the historical record on this. I have to talk with Fern anyway before I leave town on the 4th due to absurd discussions going on about the pros and cons of Stony Beach working out of the Detachment 2 office (in addition to their "real" office in the DATT's office), While I have no clue about the impetus/rationale, or lack of the latter, involved in this discussion, perhaps some are unaware that SB has been embedded in all field operations since 1992, their mission IS the accounting for Vietnam War missing, especially augmentation of DPAA's (and predecessors') collection of information on LKA and other discrepancy cases, archives, interviewing, etc. IF one just looked at the signals to the DPRK, PRC, Russia and others, they already know and have long known who SB is, who they work for and why, plus the Vietnamese have spelled out their welcome so long as they have the "front" of working within the DPAA spaces.

Of course that doesn't even consider the positive signals being institutionalized in the interest of both the US and SRV that the military-to-military relationship has been and is continuing to expand, to the benefit of regional security and stability, in particular the signals to the PRC and DPRK. One would think those engaged realize this. Arguments to the contrary should be carefully scrutinized for possible self-serving objectives, also recognizing that SB is the only USG asset still focused solely on Vietnam War accounting. Any move to restrict rather than expand and reinforce their integration, would be extremely negative for DPAA. That would be especially true after all the efforts made and Hanoi's positive responses, as well as their repeated appeals to expand the pace and scope of US efforts, PCS of Stony Beach into Vietnam now can be viewed favorably and noted as adding to the US accounting effort.

It's that simple, at least in my view, and feel free to share this with Fern and Mark Spindler, but clearly, there is an absence of informed, experienced capability in the Policy Plans Directorate, not that John Unangst's departure had anything but a positive impact. Later, Ann

Whereas; We ask that a minimum of (30) business days turn around be adopted in order to further allow for the members who have authored and submitted their resolution --- to revise their resolution for re-submission purposes.

Whereas; Consideration is given to further resubmit a first time refused resolution and to further allow for the process to be fair and balanced in giving the members a true voice rather than being made to wait another year's time to resubmit.

Whereas; The current screening committee rules are broken and have failed the members for year with no recourse but to wait another year's time to revise and resubmit.

Whereas; Knowing full well with documented evidence (on file with the U.S. DoD) that the Vietnamese government sat on the remains for years of captured POW's while also preparing these same stored remains kept underground with a key chemical applied to keep them from Deteriorating.

Whereas; The U.S. DoD failed to secure the most recently requested documents/field reports generated by the U.S. JFI (Joint Field Investigate Dept. Accounting Agency teams) via Freedom of Information Act Request placed just this spring of 2016. Still pending....

Be It Resolved; That today any refused resolution cannot be revised in time after denial by the state's screening committee. Therefore maintaining a breach of justice against the members.

Be It Resolved; That the time frame of no less than (30) business days be included to allow time by the members to revise and resubmit their resolution.

Be It Resolved; That at all working levels of the American Legion's which involves the Post/District/State Committee--be supplied a copy this resolution for consideration in no less that (30) business days and approve same.







Good Friday Evening Mr. Livick!

SSG Duus's media release today on Cpl. White does not seem to have confirming documentation on the 'Recently Accounted For' list found on the DPAA website. Is this due in part to web master posting delays, my inability to search or perhaps just an oversight?

I am going to make an assumption, Todd, that these remains (Cpl. White's) have been around awhile (1990's or earlier, 1954, perhaps due to the stated fact that Cpl. White died in captivity) waiting on technology to catch up and since the DPAA Medical Examiner recently signed off on the identification, should not Cpl. White's reported identification fall into proper chronological order based on ME's signature date on the website listing?

As we have discussed, this case, like many before it, has not come to the light of day until a media release is initiated by Public Affairs, on average, 8-10 days prior to scheduled services.

As we have discussed, there seems to be a lack of transparency and sense of urgency when it comes to DPAA notifying the American public on the identification of remains. This is not an intentional act, I am sure, but merely staff trying to interpret/follow orders/policy/procedures as they are directed. This issue – public notification – screams the need for an updated policy/procedure with emphasis on clarification, continuity as well as consistency. The DoD has notified the public of combat & non-combat casualties as soon as the next of kin has been notified and we both know that public notification often occurs before the remains even arrive at Dover. I know there is a way for DPAA to match or exceed the notification time line goals set by its parent Department.

I know we agreed to bring this issue to the monthly conference call next week, Todd, and I am hoping you will have taken advantage of the lead time and surprise us with an announcement that DPAA will initiate new policy and procedures to update the Public (at minimum the Family, Military and Veteran Organizations that participate in the monthly conference call) on remains identified within a period of time (24-48 hours) after the Family has been notified.

I hope the new policy/procedures puts time restraints on the DD 2064 report flow from the ME to CSO and then CSO to PNOK with a goal of a maximum allowable time of 168 hours, seven (7) days. This would allow the public notification to occur at a maximum of 8-9 days after the ME has confirmed the ID. A bonus to your 'surprise' would be you noting it will be implemented in full before the end of August 2016.

I do look forward to response, Todd.

The family of Army Cpl. Charles A. White, 20, of New Lexington, Ohio, unaccounted for from the Korean War, asked us to send you today's news release (attached) on the identification of his remains.

He will be buried July 29 in New Lexington, Ohio.

On December 3, 1950, White was a member of Company G, 2nd Battalion, 7th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Infantry Division, when his company's position was overrun by the Chinese Communist Forces near Huksu-ri, North Korea. Repatriated American prisoners of war reported that White died in captivity at Prisoner of War Camp 1, Changsong, North Korea, in 1951. Based on this information, the U.S. Army declared White deceased as of May 12, 1951.

We met, or at least talked, back on January 13, 2010 about (h)(6) Charles who was captured on the same day as Alfred Buie.

You were copied on this email in order to help families communicate, especially when their loved ones were part of the group missing from the same unit at the same time. Over the years, we have learned that we often learn more from each other than from our government. You may have documents in your possession that mention Buie.

Buie is listed MIA, but there is evidence that he was captured and may have been with Charles in captured status.

As you recall, I am the one who mentioned to you that remains N-14278 from Changsong originally had Charles name associated with it, but either those remains were eventually matched to someone else . . . or still remain unconfirmed for Charles. My notes indicate that as of 1/14/2010, these remains were in the Punchbowl cemetery.

As you may already know, 29 men went missing from G Company, 7 th infantry regiment on 12/03/1950. Only two were labeled killed-in-action, though my research indicates that one of them, Lt Wallace may have died at Chongsong as a prisoner on 5/18/1951
Another 5 were labeled POWs and evidence indicates that all five died in enemy hands.
That leaves us with 22 men who were labeled MIAs, including Alfred Buie. Yet evidence from my
research indicates that Alfred Buie, William Frank, & Ray Schaffer were POWs.
Particularly, (b)(6) Alfred is on the MIA/CAP report (spreadsheet previously sent) as being reported on by Earnest Charles. That means that someone in the military determined that the 545 Report of Death signed by Earnest Charles did indeed describe Alfred Buie instead of 'Buick''. There is a "debriefing report" from Earnest Charles located in the National Archives.

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2. d. The identity and location of other persons who observed the incident:

The men who told us about this incident were PsW who came from the Bean Camp. There was a fellow named Chelli (fnu) (phonetic), whose home was in Pennsylvania. He was from the 24th Regiment, and was an Italian fellow about 5'9" in height and weighed about 140 pounds. Also, there was a guy named Aldrich Boyd (phonetic), who was about 5'11", weighed 140 pounds, from the 24th Regiment, and I believe he was from North Carolina.

3. Do you know of any US prisoners who died or disappeared while in captivity? Do you know the circumstances? Had any of them made propaganda against the United States?

Hammonds, who I have named and described previously, was taken out of Camp #1 and I never saw him again.

Friday (phonetic) (fnu), died in 1952. He was in my Company. He became ill and they could have taken him to the hospital, but they didn't. He had dysentery and they just left him in the camp until he was almost dead then they took him to the hospital where he died the next day. The only medicine they gave him was some kind of a white powder, but it didn't help him. I believe Friday's home was in Indiana.

There was also a PW named White (fnu) who died in PW Camp #1. He also had dysentery. I believe his home was in Ohio.

The Chinese often took PWs from Camp, usually at night, but I don't know where they were being transferred. These were usually the reactionaries or PsW who were giving the Communists trouble at Camp. Just before the armistice I guess they took about 20 reactionaries from our camp. Some of these were:

Leedal (phonetic), (fnu), about 5:10", middle finger missing. He was from Chicago. I don't remember anything else about him with the exception that he tried to escape at one time.

Mitchell, Charles. He was from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He was about 5'7" in height, chubby build, had brown hair, light complected and was in the 31st Regiment before being captured.

William Abbott. He was with the 31st Regiment, 7th Division before being captured. He came from Ohio; was about 5'7" in height and weighed about 140 pounds; light complected and had been wounded in the back.

There was another PW, (fnu) Harrison, who they took out of Camp separately and we never knew what happened to him. He had gotten into a fight with another PW. Some of the Chinese used to like Harrison and I thought they had taken him out of camp for his own protection. Harrison had been friendly with a Chinese Platoon Leader. Harrison was about 5'9" in height, had a round face; I never knew very much about him

Additional PsW who died in camp: (they were all buried on a hill near Camp, which was called Boot Hill. It was unmarked until 1953, when they started making grave markers and then they did mark the graves.)

Clyde Clayton. I believe he was from the 31st Regiment and his home was in Ohio or Oklahoma. He was a First Sergeant. He was small, about 5.6" in height and was about 42 years of age. His hair was turning grey. The cause of his death is unknown to me.

Swarmer (phonetic) (fnu), a 1st Sergeant from the 31st Regiment. He was in his early forties, was about 5'10" and was tall and had a light complexion. He had been heavy; however, I don't recall any other details about him other than he died from dysentery.

White (phonetic) (fmm) who died from dysentery. He was about 5'9" tall, weighed about 150 pounds and was around 20 years of age. He was originally from Ohio.

Pete Nordike (phonetic). He was about 5'10" and weighed around 160 pounds, light completed. He had beri-beri, I believe.

There were some other PsW who died; however, I do not recall any of their names.

- 4. In describing the atrocities in answers to Questions #1, #2 and #3, state whether the atrocities occurred in PW Camps, hospitals, or PW movements; the apparent reasons, if any, why acts were committed, and if the atrocities consisted of any of the following acts:
 - a. Executions:

The PsW mentioned previously who were shot during their march to PW Camp #1. These were the only executions that I know of.

b. Beatings:

I don't know of any.

c. Starving: (amount in comparison to that given the guards)

No one starved except that some of them were sick and couldn't eat the food they gave us and these men died.

d. Torture of any sort?

None that I know of.

marding us were Chinese soldiers. There were mards at all road intersections within the camp (that would make nine (9) in our company alone and there were seven (7) companies); two (2) would be located in a cornfield just in back of the camp, and at night there would be four (h) or five (5) walking around in each company area. I couldn't estimate how many were stationed there altogether.

Living conditions were very bad in the camp, and never got better until the Spring of 1953. Earch and April of 1951 were the hardest for us. I know of twenty-five (25) deaths during this period, mostly in my company, so I figure there were many more within the camp. Deaths at this time were caused by dysentery, beri beri, and stomach trouble. I think it was trying to get used to the bad food we were eating. At this time the wounded and sick were but in two (2) large buildings we called the "Death House". The place was filthy and had rotten floor boards. There was a doctor, but all the sick and wounded got was a pill. The doctor had no medicine. I can only remember the names of three (3). now who died: They were:

Sherman (first name unknown) - 7th Division, 32nd Regiment,
"A" Company (1st Sgt)
White (first name unknown) - 3rd Division, "I" Company
John Pirst - 2nd Division, 38th Regiment,
Hq. Company

All three (3) died of stopach disorders or malnutrition. I nursed John FIRST for swhile, and he seemed to be getting better. He died after being taken to the "Death house".

The food was very bad. Our diet consisted primarily of rice, soy-beans, barley, potatoes, and very bad pork. The pork was kept over extended pariods without refrigeration and was wormy. In 1953 our food began retting nomewhat better. We received some candy and sugar and a bottle of beer on Christmas Day of 1952. We also received digarettes in 1953. We know the diet wasn't adequate because we all suffered from might blindness. On 21 July 1953 I got ptomaine poisoning from some canned beef I atc. I was the only one affected to the best of my know-ledge. By this time the hospital had been cleaned up and was furnished with beds and white sheets. The hospital was now maked by a somen surgeon, two (2) male doctors, and some Chinese assistants.

We had two (2) types of uniforms, winter and summer. The winter uniform issue consisted of one (1) pair of cotton padded pants, one (1) cotton padded coat, and rubber shoes, like our American sneakers.

During the stay at this camp I buried my best buddy, who died of dysentery, in the manner mentioned above. This type burial was all that was allowed. His name was Charles A. White and his home was in the vicinity of Newark, Chio.

Approximately 700 American men were repatriated from this camp.


I was released on 14 August 1953 and rode to Panmunjom where I was freed.

It took a while, but, here's the story on bureaucrats removing 11 words from the PUC issued to SOG April 4, 2001 at Ft. Bragg.



Government Bureaucrats Insult SOG Aviators

Aviators flying support during the secret eight-year war in Laos, Cambodia, and North Vietnam had their heroic efforts erased by a small federal government agency in 2013, SOFREP has learned.

During that top-secret <u>cross-border war</u> fought from 1964 to 1972, Army, Air Force, Marine Corps, and Navy aircraft supported Green Berets and their indigenous counterparts running reconnaissance and other classified operations deep behind enemy lines under the aegis of the Military Assistance Command Vietnam—Studies and Observations Group, or simply SOG.

The secret war was a high-risk security operation hidden from the press, the public, most members of Congress, as well as the family members of special operations forces who ran these top-secret missions. SOG operated outside the normal chain of command, answering directly to the White House and a key staff member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

So secret were these missions, it took 29 years after SOG's closure in 1972 for these warriors to be recognized publicly for their extreme courage, sacrifice, and tremendous losses. This official recognition finally came in the form of the Presidential Unit Citation (PUC), the unit award for valor, equivalent to the Distinguished Service Cross—our nation's second highest individual award for valor, second only to the Medal of Honor.

The SOG PUC was presented in a public awards ceremony held on April 4, 2001 at Fort Bragg, North Carolina. That PUC was awarded to SOG personnel "for extraordinary heroism" by Secretary of the Army Thomas E. White. In the written narrative of that award, it explained why SOG units received it "for extraordinary heroism, great combat achievement, and unwavering fidelity while executing unheralded top-secret missions deep behind enemy lines across Southeast Asia."

The narrative named a few Air Force units that supported SOG: the 1st Flight Detachment, the 15th Air Commando Squadron, the 15th, 20th, and 90th Special Operations Squadrons, and the South Vietnamese Air Force's 219th Special Operations Squadron. It also cited Navy SEAL operations along the coast of North Vietnam under the command of the U.S. Navy Advisory Detachment based in Da Nang, one Navy EC-121 aircraft and crew based in Saigon, and Marine Corps personnel assigned to SOG headquarters staff in Saigon and Da Nang.

After describing many of the SOG missions performed by these warriors during the secret war, the citation turned briefly to acknowledge the unnamed air units that supported the ground troops:

"Supporting these hazardous mission were Special Operations Group's own United States and South Vietnamese Air Force transport and helicopter squadrons, along with U.S. Air Force forward air controllers and helicopters units of the U.S. Army and U.S. Marines Corps. These courageous aviators often flew into and through heavy fire to extract Special Operations Group operators from seemingly hopeless situations, saving lives by selflessly risking their own."

But it didn't name any of the Army or Marine Corps units.

The insult to SOG aviators

During the eight-year war, numerous American helicopter units flew these high-risk missions across the fence into enemy territory supporting SOG teams. Hundreds were killed and wounded supporting these missions. Some units, such as the 101st Assault Helicopter Battalion, the 229th Assault Helicopter Battalion of the 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile), the Muskets of 36-C from the Americal Division, the 176th Aviation Company, and Marine Corps Huey gunships and Cobra gunships from HML-367 (Scarface) to name but a few were assigned to fly SOG missions regularly. However, they and dozens of other aviation units that supported SOG were not mentioned by name in the PUC citation or narrative.

Over time, airmen from these and other units went back to the Army seeking to have their military records reflect their time serving in the deadly SOG missions. In reaction to the aviators and crew members seeking just recognition, bureaucrats from the Army Human Resources Command—Award and Decorations Branch took an extreme measure: They had a new general order written and approved in 2013.

Under General Order 2013-07, the following words were removed from the original General Order 2001-25: "...and helicopters units of the U.S. Army and U.S. Marines Corps." That was the only mention of Army and Marine helicopter units who fought so valiantly during the secret war.

"The U.S. Army Center of Military History requested that Army Human Resources Command—Awards and Decorations Branch make an administrative clarification by removing the phrase, 'and helicopter units of the U.S. Army and U.S. Marine Corps," said Ray Gall, public affairs officer for the Army's Human Resources Command. "This phrase generated numerous requests for the award's amendment since the award's approval because numerous aviation unit elements were on call to support MACV-SOG on a rotational basis," he added. "These units were neither part of MACV-SOG nor formally attached or assigned to it, and are therefore ineligible for inclusion on the PUC. The PUC recognized only the organic elements and formally attached or assigned units."

He said service members not mentioned in the PUC narrative "would be recognized for their efforts in their own unit awards and individual decorations." Many of the units that supported SOG 40-plus years ago no longer exist, and the ones that are operational today are deployed or in training for present-day assignments.

The PUC change was carried out quietly and surreptitiously without any notification to the handful of surviving SOG veterans or aviators, nor to SOG personnel who helped write it and who took it up the chain of command 15 years ago for review prior to it being approved. Retired Maj. John Plaster, the key author of the PUC, and MG Ken Bowra—both of whom ran SOG reconnaissance missions—assisted in getting the first PUC approved. Both men said they were not notified prior to

the new 2013 PUC being issued. They learned about the redaction from a SOFREP correspondent.

In a recent interview with Plaster, he said, "I never heard from anyone about this change and I certainly don't understand how anyone can change it and why anyone would change it."

Reaction to this bureaucratic slap in the collective face to Army and Marine Corps aviators who supported SOG missions drew immediate and heated reactions.

"Let me get this straight," said Douglas L. "The Frenchman"
LeTourneau, who ran SOG recon missions from September 1968 to
September 1969 and had his recon teams saved numerous times from
attacking enemy forces by Army and Marine aviators. "Some stinking,
REMF bureaucrat, for the sake of bureaucratic expediency, went to the
trouble to get an Army general order written and approved that removed
11 words from our PUC to make their lives easier while insulting every
aviator who served on a SOG mission. From this administration, I'm not
surprised."

Attorney James R. Moriarty flew three tours of duty in Vietnam with Marine Corps VMO-2 gunships, which supported SOG missions in Laos, Cambodia, and North Vietnam. He said, "Many of the most courageous and successful missions of the Vietnam War were conducted in secret by Special Forces soldiers and indigenous personal operating in SOG missions across the fence. Because these missions took place in Laos and Cambodia, at great distances from conventional supporting troops, artillery, or naval gunfire, the air assets assigned to SOG took on an even more important role in supporting these brave men.

"The forefront of these air assets included Army and Marine helicopter squadrons, whose men bravely and at grave risk of loss of their own lives provided transportation, gun and rocket support, communications and, most of all to a desperate team trapped by the enemy, extraction and a return to base, sometimes in body bags. The enormous success of SOG in Southeast Asia simply could not have taken place without this support, and for some bureaucrat to come back decades after the

war to remove the scant recognition these Army and Marine aviators received in the initial award of this PUC is beyond acceptable."

Green Beret Mike Taylor ran SOG recon and company-sized missions into Laos and Cambodia and was a forward air controller over SOG areas of operations for more than 18 months. Few in SOG had more experience working with air assets assigned to SOG than Taylor, who retired as a lieutenant colonel and is presently chairman of the Special Operations Association's **POW/MIA**Committee.

"I cannot comprehend any reason whatsoever that some anonymous, unnamed bureaucrat in the Army Board of Military Corrections, safe and warm in his cubicle in Alexandria, Virginia, forty-plus years after the war, would be moved to remove 'helicopter units of the U.S. Army and U.S. Marine Corps' from the SOG PUC," said Taylor. "Certainly, no information came to light between the original award in 2001 and the amendment in 2013 to indicate that those brave, valiant, and selfless warriors did not, in fact, 'support' our 'hazardous missions.' They were essential to our mission accomplishment and, more personally, our survival."

There are many corrections that the board might have made, Taylor said, pointing out that SOG is misnamed as "Studies and Observation Group" and, repeatedly, as "Special Operations Group" throughout. "But, such criticisms are insignificant," he said. "The petty, small-minded deletion of the Army and USMC helicopter units is not. It is egregious. In fact, there are aviation assets that should be added to the narrative, such as the terrific support we received from the A-1 Skyraider units associated with MACV-SOG."

Jeffrey J. "Crash" Makool was a crew chief with A Company "The Comancheros" of the 101st Assault Helicopter Battalion based out of Phu Bai. That unit's primary mission was supporting SOG teams across the fence in Laos. Makool, who served from 1970–71, survived two helicopter crashes with The Comancheros supporting SOG missions in Laos when his choppers were gunned down by enemy fire.

"I was on the ground with SOG Green Berets twice when my chopper got shot out from underneath me. It was terrifying for me, and the Special Forces recon men were fearless. When my second bird crashed, my helicopter landed on top of me, knocking me unconscious. I'll never forget it, waking up to Walter Martin. The tall Green Beret lifted the burning chopper off of me before the aviation fuel that was leaking on me ignited. It's a total disgrace to every aviator who served in SOG and to those who never returned. I'm totally disgusted with the Army, the military, and our f****** government to denigrate us in such a manner. I have the original PUC hanging on my wall; it means I have all the love and respect from the men of MACV-SOG."

Jack Tobin, president of the 10,000-member Special Forces
Association said he was going to report this "bureaucratic disgrace" to
the command staff of the U.S. Army Special Forces Command at Ft.
Bragg and the Special Operations Command at MacDill AFB.

Rick Estes, president of the Special Operation Association, which was formed 39 years ago by SOG recon men and expanded to include aviators and other special operations forces including Navy SEALs, Marine Corps **Force Reconnaissance**, and Air Force Pararescuemen, added, "It's simply beyond my comprehension why anyone would tamper with the PUC awarded to SOG in 2001. It's nuts. It's wrong."

Taylor concluded, "This was such an unnecessary insult. What was the intent of this amendment? What did it accomplish? Shame on everyone involved in the initiation, approval, and publication of Department of the Army General Order 2013-07."

As chairman of the SOA's POW/MIA Committee, Taylor noted that today, there are approximately 260 aviators who remain listed as missing in action in Laos. At least 105 of them died in support of the eight-year secret war. Additionally, in Laos alone, there are 51 SOG Green Berets still listed as MIAs.

Every aviator and Green Beret interviewed by SOFREP agreed that removing those 11 words from the original 2001 PUC heaped the greatest insult upon the dead, the men killed in action during SOG missions.

The Vietnam-US-China Triangle: New

Dynamics And Implications – Analysis

CPV General Secretary Nguyen Phu Trong's recent visit to Washington has been praised by both sides as a "historic" landmark in bilateral relations (The White House, 2015). However, in order to gain a more nuanced evaluation of the visit's significance, the visit needs to be considered within the broader regional context, and against the backdrop of recent changes in the Vietnam-US-China triangle.

This paper seeks to analyze the new dynamics in this triangular relationship and their implications. By adopting a three-level analysis approach, it will examine three of the most important factors at the systemic, national and sub-national levels which currently shape the relationship from a Vietnamese perspective.

These factors are the increasing strategic competition between the US and China, the level of strategic trust between Vietnam and the two powers, and Vietnam's domestic political and economic developments.

The paper is divided into four sections. The first three analyze the mentioned dynamics, while the final section discusses possible implications for the region.

The paper argues that new dynamics in the triangle are conducive to the improvement of Vietnam-US relations while unfavourable for Ha Noi's ties with Beijing. Vietnam's relations with the US will therefore improve significantly, while its relations with China will suffer significant setbacks. However, these trends may still be constrained by traditional factors shaping Vietnam's foreign policy, such as ideological considerations and Vietnam's wish to maintain a balance between the two great powers.

SYSTEMIC LEVEL: INTENSIFYING STRATEGIC

COMPETITION BETWEEN THE US AND CHINA

US-China strategic competition is on the rise, and the two countries seem to be heading towards a Cold-War style rivalry, characterized by an intense contest for zones of influence and, to a lesser extent, for military supremacy. The only difference is that outright confrontation is deliberately being avoided, at least for the time being, due to their complex interdependence in many realms.

China's determination to expand its footprint worldwide and to challenge American primacy through its military buildup and such initiatives as the Asian Infrastructure Development Bank (AIIB), the One Belt – One Road (OBOR) project, or the building of massive artificial islands in the South China Sea, shows its departure from Deng Xiaoping's mantra of "tao guang yang hui" (hide our capabilities and bide our time). The Chinese leadership, especially under Xi Jinping, seems to have come to believe that while China's power has come of age, that of the US is declining. They are confident that it is now time for China and its people to aspire for the "Chinese Dream", and to forge a new international order more conducive to

its interests and commensurate with its rising power. Such aspirations, however, have raised concerns not only in Washington, but also in regional capitals, including Ha Noi.

Meanwhile, Washington's determination to preserve its global primacy, especially in the Asia-Pacific region, has informed its hardening stance against Beijing. To most observers, US key regional initiatives, such as the strategic rebalancing to the Western Pacific and the Trans-Pacific Economic Partnership Agreement, all have been launched with China as the hidden primary target. The US has also worked quietly to expand and strengthen its network of regional allies and partners to gain a strategic upper hand over China.

Against this backdrop, Southeast Asia has emerged as an arena for the two powers' strategic competition. Vietnam, in particular, has become a natural target for both powers' diplomatic manoeuvres.

After the Haiyang Shiyou (HYSY) 981 oil rig crisis in 2014, China tried to restore its relationship with Vietnam by inviting CPV General Secretary Nguyen Phu Trong to visit Beijing in April 2015. China accorded Mr. Trong the highest level of protocol with a 21-gun salute. During the visit, while trying to address tensions over the South China Sea, the two sides also put an emphasis on economic cooperation. They agreed to establish two working groups on infrastructure development and financial cooperation (BBC Vietnamese, 2015; Voice of Vietnam, 2015). These agreements seem to serve China's purpose of promoting the AIIB and its renminbi internationalization project, but Vietnam also stands to benefit.

For example, the two sides agreed to include Vietnam's northern port of Hai Phong in China's Maritime Silk Road initiative (Nikkei Asian Review, 2015). In addition, three major infrastructure projects that may receive Chinese funding, namely the Lao Cai-Ha Noi-Hai Phong high-speed railway, the Lang Son-Ha Noi highway, and the Mong Cai-Ha Long highway, were also discussed (Voice of Vietnam, 2015). More offers may also be made by China during President Xi's visit to Ha Noi later this year.

On the part of Washington, its efforts to deepen ties with Ha Noi have also brought about positive results. These efforts are focused on both

economic and strategic aspects. On the economic front, Washington has been successful in securing Vietnam's participation in the TPP even when the agreement contains "sensitive" provisions, especially regarding labour rights and Vietnam's state-owned enterprises. The increase in bilateral trade and US investments in Vietnam has also cemented the economic foundation of bilateral ties and further consolidated the US position as a key economic partner of Vietnam. 1 Meanwhile, Washington's attempts to forge a closer strategic relationship with Ha Noi led to its pledge in 2013 to provide US\$18 million for Vietnam to purchase patrol vessels, and its decision in October 2014 to partially lift its ban on lethal weapon sales to the country. Broader frameworks for bilateral strategic cooperation have also been set up. The two sides concluded a Memorandum of Understanding on defence relations in 2011, which was later supplemented by a "Joint Vision Statement" announced in June 2015. The enhanced defence cooperation with the US certainly makes Vietnam-US relations more comprehensive than Vietnam-China relations. Ha Noi currently has no meaningful defence and strategic ties with Beijing due to the South China Sea disputes.

Given the rising strategic competition between the two major powers, it is in Vietnam's interest to maintain a balance between them. However, such an option is becoming harder for Vietnam to pursue. Due to China's growing assertiveness in the South China Sea, Ha Noi finds it increasingly difficult to promote its relationship with Beijing but more comfortable, even necessary, to forge a closer relationship with Washington. And while the strategic interests of Vietnam and China become increasingly incompatible, those between Vietnam and the US have converged steadily, for which Washington's deepened involvement in the South China Sea disputes is a case in point.2

Therefore, while Vietnam is open to diplomatic manoeuvres by both Washington and Beijing, the South China Sea disputes and China's increasing assertiveness tend to push Ha Noi further away from Beijing and closer to Washington.

NATIONAL LEVEL: STRATEGIC TRUST BETWEEN VIETNAM AND THE TWO GREAT POWERS

The increasing level of mutual trust between Vietnam and the US perhaps embodies the most important development in bilateral relations in recent years.

Since bilateral normalization in 1995, the CPV's suspicion of US intentions to subvert its regime has been a major obstacle to the development of bilateral ties. For example, official documents of the Party have long identified "peaceful evolution" by "hostile forces" as one of the major threats to regime security. In 2009, the Secretariat of the CPV's Central Committee issued Directive 34-CT/TW on "stepping up the fight against the scheme of 'peaceful evolution' in the fields of culture and ideology". A follow-up document prepared by the CPV's Central Department of Propaganda and Education guiding the implementation of the Directive identified some US initiatives as part of its "peaceful evolution" scheme against the regime. Specifically, the document argued that the US wish to send volunteers of the Peace Corps3 to Vietnam

signified its plan to sow the seeds of a "color revolution" in the country. Meanwhile, US education assistance, such as the Vietnam Education Fund (VEF) and the Fulbright Economic Teaching Program, was seen as a disguised tool to "transform" Vietnam politically by producing a generation of pro-American and pro-Western intellectuals.4

However, by 2015, such perceptions seem to have subsided. During Mr. Trong's visit to Washington in July, Vietnam granted a license for the establishment of the Fulbright University Vietnam, which is an outgrowth of the Fulbright Economic Teaching Program and partly funded by the US Department of State. The university is reported to adopt American curriculums and enjoy a greater level of autonomy than its Vietnamese counterparts (Thanh Tuan, 2015). Meanwhile, during his first-ever visit to the US in March 2015, Minister of Public Security Tran Dai Quang confirmed that Vietnam would allow the U.S. Peace Corps to operate in the country (Vuving, 2015). And last but not least, to many observers, the most important indication of the growing trust between the two countries is the expansion and deepening of military cooperation.

The enhanced level of mutual trust results from efforts by both sides, especially the US commitment to respect the VCP's domestic political interests. For example, in the Joint Statement by President Barack Obama and President Truong Tan Sang which established the bilateral comprehensive partnership in 2013, the two sides underscored that they would respect "each other's political systems" (The White House, 2013). The same commitment was also repeated in the Joint Vision Statement during Mr. Trong's visit to the US (The White House, 2015).

Vietnamese leaders' lessened paranoia about the US "peaceful evolution" may also have derived from their changed perception of the threats and interests presented by a deepened Vietnam-US relationship. While the "peaceful evolution" is a vague threat that may never actualize, stronger ties with Washington offer tangible immediate benefits such as trade, investment, and military cooperation. These factors contribute to Vietnam's economic performance and its better position vis-à-vis China in the South China Sea. From the Vietnamese leadership's perspective,

Washington's warm reception of Mr. Trong also indicated that the US acknowledged the VCP's

rule in Vietnam, which ultimately boosts the CPV's domestic political legitimacy. These considerations further weaken their perception of the US as a threat to the regime.

Contrary to the positive developments in Ha Noi's ties with Washington, its relationship with Beijing is suffering from an increasing trust deficit. This largely results from China's growing assertiveness and coercion in the South China Sea.

Especially, the HYSY 981 oil rig crisis in 2014 dealt a major blow to Vietnamese leaders' confidence in their Chinese counterparts and deepened their perception of the China threat. China's massive artifical island building in the Spratlys right after the oil rig crisis, during a time when the two sides were supposed to be mending their relations, caused the strategic trust between the two countries to further deteriorate.

It is no coincidence that the CPV has recently tolerated an increasingly anti-China discourse in the official media. Major media outlets now regularly carry news reports, op-eds and commentaries that directly criticize China's expansion in the South China Sea. The

commemoration of military clashes between the two countries, such as the 1974 Paracels battle, the 1979 border war, the 1984 Vi Xuyen battle, or the 1988 naval clash in the Spratlys, was once a taboo but is now allowed. To a certain extent, Vietnam's increasing overture to the US as well as Japan and India also indicates its declining trust in China.

In other words, Vietnam's "balance of trust" between China and the US now tips in the latter's favor. This is a gradual yet significant shift. After the Tiananmen crackdown in 1989, for example, some Vietnamese leaders believed that "no matter how expansionist it is, China remains a socialist country",5 and that Vietnam should "join hands with China at any cost to protect socialism, repulse the United States and other imperialist forces" (Co, 2003, pp. 31-32). This belief led the Vietnamese leadership to consistently pursue normalization with China despite the 1988 Spratlys naval clash that happened shortly before that.6 Today, such thinking has become irrelevant. The CPV's regime has consolidated itself after three decades of reforms under Doi Moi, and Vietnam's international status has also improved significantly, giving Ha Noi more room to resist Beijing's pressures. More importantly, China's rise and its growing coercion in the South China Sea have forced Ha Noi to appeal to nationalism, which serves as an increasingly important pillar in its current legitimation strategy. As such, it is national interests rather than ideological considerations that now dictate the country's foreign policy making. Such a shift also tends to play in Washington's favour at the expense of Beijing's.

SUB-NATIONAL LEVEL: VIETNAM'S DOMESTIC ECONOMIC AND POLITICAL SITUATION

Vietnam's economy has been experiencing a slowdown since 2008. Specifically, from 2008 to 2014, the country registered an average annual GDP growth rate of 5.8 per cent, significantly lower than the 7.6 per cent achieved in the 2000-07 period. Against this backdrop, Vietnam has been aggressively pursuing free trade agreements (FTA), including the TPP, not only to boost exports and attract more foreign investment, but also to provide an impetus for domestic economic reforms, especially regarding SOEs. The TPP, with such regulations as the "yarn forward" rules of

origin,7 is also expected to reduce Vietnam's trade deficit vis-à-vis China and its heavy dependence on the northern neighbour for material imports.8 As a result, if the TPP comes into effect, although China may remain Vietnam's top economic partner for the forseeable future, its relative importance to Vietnam will be reduced by the expected deepening of economic ties between Ha Noi and Washington.

Politically, China's growing assertiveness in the South China Sea and bilateral tensions over the disputes have caused nationalist sentiments in Vietnam to run high. For example, in a 2014 survey carried out by the Pew Research Centre, while three-quarters of Vietnamese surveyed (76%) expressed a favourable opinion of the US, China was viewed by respondents as the greatest threat to the future of the country, and a majority of them (84%) worried that the South China Sea disputes could lead to a military conflict (Pew Research Center, 2015a).

Similarly, according to another survey released on 23 June 2015, nearly three-quarters of Vietnamese respondents (74%) said it is more important to be tough with China on territorial disputes than it is to

have a strong economic relationship (17%) with their neighbour to the north (Pew Research Center, 2015b).9 Against this backdrop, Vietnamese leaders will be tempted to appeal to nationalist sentiment to stay popular. To put it a different way, while Vietnamese leaders would not wish to be seen openly as "pro-China" or "pro-America", carrying the latter tag may be less damaging, or even prove favourable in certain cases, to their political standing.10

Another domestic development that may have important implications for Vietnam's future relations with both China and the US is the CPV's 12th national congress and the election of its new leadership next year. In preparatory congress documents released for party members' preview and comments, the South China Sea disputes have been specifically decribed as being "complex, intense and highly unpredictable" (phức tạp, gay gắt và rất khó lường).11

The documents also acknowledge that "the protection of national sovereignty and territorial integrity [...] is facing many difficulties and challenges". Such views imply the CPV's growing awareness of the threats that the South China Sea

disputes present for the country. They may also lead to a harder stance by Vietnam on the issue in the future, which possibly includes, among other things, a continued strategic alignment with the US.

In terms of leadership transition, if Prime Minister Nguyen Tan Dung becomes the new CPV General Secretary, 12 Vietnam's relations with the US may enjoy another boost. Mr. Dung, who routinely presents himself as a nationalist leader, has publicly spoken out against China's expansion in the South China Sea on numerous occasions, including the famous statement that Vietnam will not trade its sovereignty and territorial integrity for an "illusionary friendship" [read: with China] (VnExpress, 2014). The rather liberal domestic agenda under his premiership also resonates better with Washington than Beijing. 13 Moreover, his family members' personal connections with the West in general and the US in particular may also positively influence his view on the US as well as Ha Noi's relations with Washington. 14 In case some person other than Mr. Dung takes over the CPV's helm, the factors analyzed above will still likely cause him or her to lean more towards the US.

IMPLICATIONS FOR THE REGION

New dynamics in Vietnam's relations with China and the US have important implications for not only the two powers, but also the broader region. For China, this trend means that its South China Sea strategy is backfiring. Its artificial island building in the Spratlys, in particular, is deepening the perception of the "China threat" not only in Ha Noi but also in many other regional capitals. Beijing's preference for "hard power" over "soft power" will further undermine its moral authority and ultimately hurt its legitimacy for regional leadership. Its worsened relationship with Vietnam and the region's growing suspicion of China's strategic ambitions are cases in point. Now with China's artificial islands completed, the chances of restoration of mutual trust between Ha Noi and Beijing will diminish. However, China's willingness to conclude a legally binding Code of Conduct in the South China Sea and its strict selfrestraint from coercive measures may still help. On the contrary, escalatory actions such as militarizing the artificial islands and establishing an Air Defence Indentification Zone (ADIZ) in the South China Sea will do irreparable damage to China's

relations with Vietnam as well as the whole region. Beijing's fear of a US-led strategic encirclement will then become a self-fulfilling prophecy.

For the US, this is the right time to accelerate its rapprochement with Vietnam. The growing trust between Ha Noi and Washington, Ha Noi's deepened suspicion of Beijing, and Vietnam's domestic conditions provide the right catalysts for Washington to engage Ha Noi in a more meaningful and substantive relationship that best serves the national interests of both countries. The most important rule for the US to observe is to continuously nuture mutual trust by fully respecting Vietnam's political system and assuring Vietnamese leaders that the US will always take Vietnam's interests into consideration in any negotitation with China.15 Further steps to promote bilateral strategic relations such as helping Vietnam to enhance its maritime capacity, engaging Vietnam in US-led regional security initiatives, or completely removing the outdated ban on lethal weapon sales to the country should be considered. In terms of human rights, to be fair, there are many things Vietnam should improve, but it has indeed made considerable progress over the past few years. Therefore, while Washington,

for various reasons, may want to maintain pressures on Ha Noi's human rights record, it should not allow the issue to impede bilateral strategic cooperation. A harsh stance on the issue may backfire as it will encourage Ha Noi to use the issue as a bargaining chip in its dealings with Washington.

Dynamics in Vietnam-US-China relations also reflect key currents in regional geopolitics, most notably regional countries' strategic (re-)alignments to deal with China's rise, and the intensifying major power competition, especially between the US and China. However, it would be naïve to believe that Vietnam's relations with the US are driven only by the China factor. Other important mutual interests, such as trade, investment, or education cooperation, are also involved.

At the same time, Vietnam's relations with China will not completely be dictated by the South China Sea disputes, and economic cooperation with China still matters greatly for Ha Noi. Therefore, Vietnam's strategic re-alignment with the two major powers will continue to be an incremental transformation rather than a paradigm shift,

depending largely on Ha Noi's perception of the China threat in the South China Sea. To hedge against possible consequences of over-relying on Washington, Ha Noi will also seek to deepen its ties with other major countries in the region, especially Japan, India and like-minded ASEAN partners. The outcomes of such efforts, again, will largely be determined by how regional countries perceive the China threat, a puzzle to which China itself holds the answer.

CONCLUSION

An analysis of new dynamics in the Vietnam-US-China triangle suggests that, at least in the short run, Vietnam's relations with the US enjoy strong prospects for further development, while its relations with China will suffer significant setbacks.

These new dynamics, however, may still be constrained by traditional factors shaping Vietnam's foreign policy. For example, while ideological considerations may be becoming less relevant in Vietnam's foreign policy making, they still matter.16 Similarly, although the coming leadership transition bears some implications for

Vietnam's foreign relations, one should not exaggerate the individual role of Vietnamese political leaders, be it Prime Minister Dung or anyone else, in the making of the country's foreign policy. Vietnam's China and US policies will continue to be collectively determined by the CPV Politburo, which makes any policy changes regarding the two powers subject to thorough deliberations, and hence gradual rather than radical. Moreover, although the geopolitical gravity currently tends to push Vietnam away from China towards the US, such a trend is still constrained by Vietnam's long-standing wish to maintain a balance between the two powers.

France to Lend Maps to Cambodia Amid Dispute Over Vietnam Border



Former colonial ruler France has agreed to lend a set of maps to Cambodia following a request from Prime Minister Hun Sen and amid a dispute over the demarcation of the Southeast Asian nation's border with neighboring Vietnam, officials said Tuesday.

France will hand over the maps—produced by its National Geographic Institute (IGN) prior to Cambodian Independence in 1953—in a ceremony on Thursday, chairman of Cambodia's border committee Var Kimhong told a press conference in Phnom Penh, citing a letter from French President François Hollande.

The French maps will then be used to verify the 26 maps currently used by Hun Sen's government to demarcate the 1,228-kilometer (763-mile) border with Vietnam, he said, both of which use the same 1:100,000 scale.

The opposition Cambodia National Rescue Party (CNRP) alleges that Hun Sen's government has ceded land to Vietnam based on its own set of incorrect charts, which adhere to a 1985 agreement signed by the two countries during Vietnam's occupation of Cambodia.

In Hollande's Aug. 31 letter, written in response to a July request by Hun Sen and obtained Tuesday by RFA's Khmer Service, the French president confirmed the decision to lend the IGN maps to Cambodia as part of a bid to resolve the ongoing dispute.

He commended Cambodia's "interest in demarcating the border according to international law with transparency," but added that Paris would "show no bias" on the issue as the former ruler of French Indochina—an area which comprised parts of Cambodia, Vietnam and Laos until those nations won their independence following World War II.

"In order to resolve this conflict, the French Embassy in Phnom Penh will deliver a copy of the maps published by the IGN, which the institute has provided," the letter said.

"However, France would only consider sending map experts to assist in verification if the two relevant sides [Vietnam and Cambodia] make a joint request."

Verification process

Deputy chairwoman of Cambodia's border committee Koy Pisey told RFA that the French maps would "clear up the border issue" and urged the country's politicians to "stick to the facts" when using them to verify the government's own charts.

"When we receive the maps, we will reveal them to the public and we will verify our own maps," she said.

Ruling Cambodian People's Party (CPP) spokesman Chhim Phalvorun told RFA that if the verification ceremony shows the Cambodian and French maps are matched, it would dispel any allegations that the government is using incorrect charts.

"If the map is verified, we can resolve our internal issue," he said.

The government has invited five representatives each from the CNRP and from the royalist Funcinpec party, as well as Cambodia's lawmakers, to act as witnesses during the verification process.

But CNRP lawmaker Ou Chanrith, who will join a team of opposition witnesses, called on the government to allow more stakeholders to take part in the verification process, and said the "discussion must allow questions" from all sides.

Sok Touch, head of border research for the Royal Academy of Cambodia, told RFA that he would also take part in the verification process, adding that he expected it to put an end to the border dispute once and for all.

He urged Cambodia's politicians to "stop exploiting the border issue" for their own purposes and to "allow researchers to work on the case."

Hun Sen response

Hun Sen on Tuesday sent a letter to Hollande thanking him for the French maps, and stressing that his government is using "legal maps" to demarcate the border with Vietnam.

"I would like to inform His Excellency that there is no conflict between Cambodia and Vietnam over the maps because they are recognized by the two countries," he wrote, adding that the only dispute over the border is linked to internal Cambodian politics.

Hun Sen's letter follows a statement last week that the government would prosecute anyone who accused the government of using a fake map, according to *The Phnom Penh Post*.

Opposition Sam Rainsy Party (SRP) Senator Hong Sok Hour was arrested on Aug. 15 and charged with treason for allegedly posting a phony section of the country's border treaty with Vietnam on social media.

The United Nations sent a set of 1964 maps delineating the border to Cambodia in early August based on a request from Hun Sen, who has also asked for maps from the U.S. and the United Kingdom.

After a two-hour verification process, the government declared that the U.N. maps matched its own, and that the matter was resolved.

Cambodian Opposition MP 'Attends to Personal Affairs' in US Amid Fears of Arrest

An outspoken opposition lawmaker from Cambodia has arrived in the U.S. to "attend to personal affairs" amid fears of his arrest, after authorities detained a colleague over the weekend for posting a disputed diplomatic document online relating to the country's border with neighboring Vietnam.

Um Sam An, a member of parliament with the main opposition Cambodia National Rescue Party (CNRP) who holds U.S. citizenship, told RFA's Khmer Service Tuesday that he had arrived by flight in Atlanta and would soon continue on to Lowell, Massachussetts, where he owns a home.

"My trip to America is not an escape from Cambodia," he said, adding that he had traveled to the U.S. to meet with his wife and son, and to "attend to personal affairs."

Um Sam An said he had been invited to the U.S. on the invitation of the Cambodian-American community, and planned to "brief them on Cambodia's current political situation and deliver an update on the country's ongoing border dispute with Vietnam."

The lawmaker said he plans to return to Cambodia within "one and a half months."

Um Sam An earlier told RFA that he had gone into hiding and fled to Thailand after police arrested Senator Hong Sok Hour of the opposition Sam Rainsy Party (SRP) on Aug. 15 from the residence of a lawmaker belonging to the CNRP.

Speaking from the border with Thailand on the day Hong Sok Hour was taken into custody, Um Sam An said he had decided to leave Cambodia after learning from local media and a fellow CNRP member that the government planned to arrest him next.

Spokesman for the Council of Ministers Tith Sothea told RFA Tuesday that no criminal proceedings had been initiated against Um Sam An, who has repeatedly accused the government of ceding land to Vietnam, which invaded and occupied Cambodia in 1979, by using incorrect maps to determine border demarcations.

But he didn't rule out the possibility that the lawmaker might face charges in the future.

"He speaks out like this to serve his political purpose," Tith Sothea said.

"We can't guess his destiny—whether he will face the court or not. But no one should be above the law."

Sam Oeun Sok, chief attorney at the AMRIN Law and Consultants Group, told RFA that simply expressing his opinion about the border dispute with Vietnam was "no reason to arrest Um Sam An," adding that the lawmaker "didn't commit any crimes."

Interior Ministry spokesman Gen. Khieu Sopheak told RFA Tuesday that he had not received any information suggesting Um Sam An would be arrested.

Senator's arrest

Prior to his arrest on Saturday, Hong Sok Hour had posted comments on social media claiming that an article of the 1979 Cambodia-Vietnam Friendship Treaty was meant to dismantle, rather than simply define, the border between the two countries.

He had also posted online two copies of the 36-year-old border agreement with Vietnam containing the article's disputed wording.

During a graduation speech in the capital Phnom Penh last week, Hun Sen accused Hong Sok Hour of posting a "fake" copy of the treaty that could "endanger national security" and called for his arrest,

ordering the city's international airport to block him from leaving the country.

Hong Sok Hour, who holds citizenship in both Cambodia and France, has claimed he did not fake the disputed article, which he found online several years ago, and said he was willing to correct it if it was proven false.

On Sunday, Hong Sok Hour was sent to Prey Sar prison and charged with forging a public document, using a forged public document, and incitement to cause serious unrest for social security—which could carry a combined maximum prison sentence of 17 years, according to the *Phnom Penh Post*.

All 47 ruling Cambodian People's Party (CPP) members of the Senate approved Hong Sok Hour's arrest a day later, invoking an article in the constitution which calls for the removal of parliamentary immunity for any lawmaker "caught red-handed in a criminal act." SRP senators had boycotted the hearing.

Recent ban

On July 24, Um Sam An was banned from the National Assembly, or parliament, for 15 sessions and had his salary halved for two months after he was deemed to have "insulted" the legislature's president Heng Samrin with remarks posted to social media earlier last month.

The remarks accused Heng Samrin of refusing to forward to Hun Sen a July 6 letter demanding that the prime minister cease the demarcation process with Vietnam, which had been signed by several opposition members.

The National Assembly's legal council found Um Sam An in violation of the constitution, the civil servant status law, and internal rules of the legislature, and also ordered a record of his mistake to be broadcast and posted throughout his constituency in Siem Reap province.

Ruling party lawmaker Chheang Vun had earlier warned that Um Sam An's parliamentary immunity could be removed for the remarks he posted.

Um Sam An has led activists in inspections of roads and other infrastructure built by Vietnamese villagers in disputed territory, at least one of which led to clashes with Vietnamese near the border of Cambodia's Svay Rieng province at the end of June.

Washington Contemplates The Chinese Military - Analysis

After enduring much criticism for its tepid reaction to China's assertive behavior, there are signs that Washington is considering a stronger stance. For several decades, U.S. official publications had repeated what was, in essence, a mantra: the People's Liberation Army (PLA) is progressively improving its weapons and training, although it is decades behind the United States military. Implicit in the mantra was the assumption that the PLA likely always would be decades behind the US. This view also conveniently overlooked the reality that the Chinese military was unlikely to challenge the US globally, where the U.S. does possess a preponderance of power, rather than regionally, where it is stretched thinly.

One indicator of the change in tone occurred in April, when the Office of Naval Intelligence released its first unclassified report on the Chinese navy since 2009.[1] ONI predicted that, by the end of the decade, the PLA Navy (PLAN) will have completed its transition from a coastal force to one capable of multiple missions around the world, adding that PLAN had launched more ships than any other country in 2013 and 2014 with comparable increases planned for 2015 and 2016.

A major revelation of the ONI report was the first public acknowledgment that the ships of China's newest destroyers, the Kunming, or Luyang III (052D) class, are outfitted with new generation indigenous supersonic, vertically launched YJ-18 antiship cruise missiles. With a reported cruise range of as much as 180 kilometers and a terminal sprint range of 40 km at Mach 2.5-.3.0 speeds as well as a sea-skimming flight capability and a command data link, the YJ-18 is extremely difficult to defend against.

The submarine fleet, ONI reported, has also been augmented, and is expected to number at least 70 by 2020. More capable models are being phased in: eight conventionally-powered Yuan class boats are being added to the existing twelve. Like the older Song class, the Yuan are capable of launching YJ-18 missiles, but have the added advantage of air independent power systems which enable them to increase the time they can stay submerged and hence render them harder to detect. In terms of nuclear submarines, Shang-class boats are replacing older Han-class SSNs, and the expected deployment of Jin-class nuclear-powered ballistic missile submarines will

provide the PRC with its first credible at-sea second strike nuclear capability. The JL-2 ballistic missile that the Jin is equipped with has a range of approximately 4,598 miles. According to the U.S-China Economic and Security Review Commission, this gives the PRC the ability to conduct nuclear strikes against Alaska if launched from waters near China, against Alaska and Hawaii if launched from waters south of Japan; against Alaska, Hawaii and the western portion of the continental United States if launched from waters west of Hawaii; and against all 50 U.S. states if launched from waters east of Hawaii.[2] The Chinese air force is developing two stealthy fighters, the J-20 and J-31 which, however, are not expected to become operational for several years. If, as expected, existing issues can be resolved, the planes could present a serious challenge to fifth-generation U.S. fighters.[3]

Moreover, the ONI report noted, China's coast guard and maritime law enforcement fleets, which back up PLAN's missions, are larger than those of other claimants to disputed territories in the East China and South China seas—Japan, Taiwan, Vietnam, Indonesia, Malaysia, and the Philippines—combined. China commissioned its first aircraft carrier, the Liaoning, in 2013, and a second carrier, to be entirely indigenously produced, is under construction. Advances are also being made in unmanned aerial vehicles and in cyberspying. In the latter, two separate breaches of U.S. government databases holding personnel records and security-clearance files exposed sensitive information about at least 22.1 million people, including not only federal employees and contractors but their families and friends.

In May, a month after the release of the ONI report, a second meaningful event occurred. Commander of the Pacific Fleet Admiral Samuel Locklear, who had been a leading candidate to succeed General Martin Dempsey as head of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, was passed over in favor of General Joseph Dunford. Locklear's 2013 comment that he considered climate change to be the major security threat to the Asian-Pacific region had aroused widespread criticism. Locklear was believed to be echoing the Obama administration's views at the time so as to position himself for promotion. Presumably, those views had changed. Locklear, who had been lobbying for the Joint Chiefs job for some time, had applied for a delay in retirement so that he could be considered. Subordinates, requesting anonymity, described the admiral as "accepting the administration's near-mythical China narrative no matter how towering the evidence against it" and currying favor with Washington to the detriment of what, in their opinion, constituted prudent security policy.[4] Locklear's April 2015 testimony to a Senate Armed Services Committee hearing in review of the Defense Authorization Request for Fiscal Year 2016 and the Future Years Defense Program supports this opinion. Although the admiral did not repeat the climate change theory, his testimony did not dwell on Chinese aggression but rather advocated "continuous dialogue" and advised that "the U.S. will need more transparency and understanding of Chinese intentions in order to minimize friction and avoid miscalculation or conflict in the future."[5]

Also in May, a U.S. P-8A Poseidon reconnaissance plane accompanied by a CNN news crew flew over a disputed area which China has been expanding and broadcast to television audiences worldwide the warnings issued by PLAN to leave immediately.[6] Shortly thereafter, U.S. Secretary of Defense Ashton Carter, speaking at the inauguration of Admiral Harry Harris as new PACOM, stated bluntly, "There should be no mistake: the United States will fly, sail, and operate wherever international law allows, as we do all around the world."[7] In his keynote address to the annual Shangri-La Dialogue a few days later, Carter singled out China for criticism and again asserted the U.S. right of transit according to international law.[8] Adding substance to his words, newly appointed Commander of the Pacific Fleet Admiral Scott Swift joined another surveillance flight in July.[9]

In August, in a third indication of Washington's increased willingness to admit the security threat posed by Beijing the U.S. Defense Department issued an Asia-Pacific Maritime Security Strategy. It noted that, despite claiming indisputable sovereignty over the islands in the South China Sea and the adjacent waters and that it held "sovereign rights and jurisdiction over the relevant waters as well as the seabed and subsoil thereof," the Chinese government had left unclear the precise nature of its claims, including whether the PRC claims all the maritime area located within the line as well as all the land features therein. It had also unilaterally established an air defense identification zone (ADIZ) overlapping those of Japan and South Korea, and with more stringent regulations than other ADIZ. Whereas other claimants had sought to reclaim portions of what they consider to be their territories, China had as of June 2015 reclaimed more than 2,900 acres, amounting to 17 times more land in 20 months than all other claimants had for the past 40 years.[10] These assertive claims had led to a proliferation of dangerous incidents, including, in August 2014, a Chinese J-11 fighter crossing directly under and doing a barrel roll over an American P-8A Poseidon approximately 117 nautical miles east of Hainan Island—i.e., in international waters.

A subtext of the Defense Department document appears to be an administration effort to counter domestic criticism that there has been little substantive progress to implement what President Barack Obama, in a speech to the Australian parliament in November 2001, termed the pivot to Asia. The United States, the strategy document stated, has 368,000 military personnel in the Asia-Pacific region, more than a quarter of whom are west of the international date line. Over the next five years, the navy is to increase the number of Pacific Fleet ships outside U.S. territory by 50 percent; by 2020, 60 percent of naval and overseas air assets will be home ported in the Pacific. The Marine Corps presence will also be enhanced. Freedom of Navigation exercises have proceeded at an increased tempo, as have training and exercises with allies and partners. The 2014 iteration of the annual RIMPAC exercise was the largest on record, with 22 nations participating, including to a limited degree, China. U.S. marines have trained Japanese Ground Self Defense Force (SDF) units in such activities as retaking islands. New guidelines for Japan-U.S Defense Cooperation will enable the US military and the SDF to work more closely together. In Indonesia, the April 2015 SEASURVEX exercise included a flight portion over the South China Sea for the first time. The annual joint U.S.-Philippine Balikatan exercise was the largest and most

sophisticated to date and, significantly, involved a territorial defense scenario in the Sulu Sea, with SDF personnel observing. High-level visits between U.S. and Indian leaders, the latter having territorial issues with China as well, have established the basis for closer defense ties. India and the U.S. conduct annual MALABAR exercises.

A semi-formal partnership among the United States, Australia, and Japan has existed for some time; in November 2014, President Obama, Japanese Prime Minister Abe Shinzō, and Australian Prime Minister Tony Abbott held their first trilateral meeting, agreeing to expand cooperation. Naval cooperation with Vietnam has been expanded; Singapore is to become the center of a regional maritime domain awareness network.

So far, these manifestations of increased concern fall into a category that might be called signaling. China has it turn signaled back, and the message is defiant. A defense white paper issued just before the Shangri-La dialogue began vowed a strong defense of China's sovereignty, security and development interests. Separately, a sweeping new national security law was passed, aimed as much at suppressing domestic dissent as external threats. Other new laws have extended the regulations on adapting civilian ships for military use, and the government began laying the diplomatic and legal foundations for establishing a base in strategically-located Obock, on the northern coast of Djibouti. A Chinese admiral warned that, if confronted with a threat in the South China Sea, his government would not hesitate to establish another ADIZ covering that area,[11] something Washington has been attempting to head off since Beijing's announcement of an East China Sea ADIZ two years ago. A contra-indication of the administration's resolve on China was the decision not to publicly blame Beijing for the hacking of Office of Personnel Management data,[12] as was its inclusion of China in RIMPAC 2015 despite strong congressional opposition.

It is not clear what actions Washington would take if, for example, the PLA should fire on an American surveillance plane flying within the area China insists is within its territorial waters. It is also unclear how much United States' actions in defense of freedom of navigation in the area are backed by neighboring states, even those who have expressed the most anxiety about the PRC's encroachment on what regard they regard as their territories. Countries both large and small are reluctant to take actions that might anger China. Many of these countries also hold military drills with China.[13] Corruption and mismanagement in some countries mean that aid given for the improvement their militaries is wasted.[14] And there is domestic opposition to joining with the United States to protect their islands. For example, one day after Philippine Foreign Ministry Voltaire Guzman requested American help to protect resupply boats to disputed territories, currently being interdicted by Chinese ships, Xinhua quoted former Filipino president Joseph Estrada as accusing the United States of interfering in the internal affairs of his country and opposing its military deployment in the South China Sea.[15] When, in 2007, Beijing as well as the Indian left wing registered dissatisfaction with the presence of Japan at the MALABAR exercises, India subsequently declined to invite Japan, although it has been invited to the 2015 iteration. And, despite Indonesian defense officials' complaints that China claims part of

Indonesia's Riau Islands Province, the country's foreign ministry has stated that there is no territorial issue between the two countries.[16]

Given the ambivalence among many of its allies and partners in the region about protecting their claims, it would be unwise for the United States to do more than insist, as it has since at least 2010, that that all disputes be settled through peaceful negotiation. At the same time, to protect its own interests as well as those of allies and partners, Washington must continue to forcefully back its assertions that it will not countenance the interdiction of freedom of navigation.

Whereas a decade ago U.S. policy aspired to draw China in as a responsible member of the international community, it now seems to have decided on a more minimal goal: to prevent China from disrupting the security of the Asia-Pacific region and beyond. There are no easy solutions. Should the deceleration of the PRC's economic growth impede its aggressive activities, that may do more than any actions by Washington to mitigate current tensions.

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
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

The plan is to ensure both receive the letters prior to your arrival in country, as well as help set the stage for Mike's first visit in November.

SRV Vice Minister of Defense Sr. LTG Vinh is due here in DC later this month, and I'm hosting a lunch to introduce our new Director to the SRV Ambassador as well. 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TRIP REPORT: LEAGUE DELEGATION TO SOUTHEAST ASIA January 20 – February 10, 2015

Summary: League Chairman of the Board Ann Mills-Griffiths, Vice Chairman (b)(6) and Senior Policy Advisor (b)(6) comprised the League Delegation that represented all the Vietnam War POW/MIA families, as well as the interests of working level US officials and our nation's veterans, in meetings with US and foreign officials in Laos, Vietnam, Cambodia and Thailand from January 23 – February 10 th . Our schedule was thoughtfully coordinated by then JPAC Policy & Plans (b)(6) to whom we express sincerest appreciation.
The League is especially grateful to our Senior Policy Advisor, (h)(6) who has served in this position since retiring from the Army in January, 1989, the very day he left his key position (after a record eight years) as Director of Asian Affairs on President Reagan's National Security Council staff. Trained as a Thai Foreign Area Officer (FAO) with unparalleled knowledge, experience and friendships across Southeast Asia made him invaluable to the League, to the success of the POW/MIA accounting mission, with commitment amply demonstrated since 1981. After hours of conversations and briefings by the League and dedicated US officials then in place, he developed the Reagan Administration's "10-point strategy" to resolve the issue and never stopped pushing. He and his wife, have attended every annual meeting since 1981, though his early participation was official. He took the issue seriously, understood the families' perspective and, despite unwarranted attacks, set about implementing President Reagan's assigned priority. This League Delegation was the 5th since he assessed Vietnam's cooperation and decided he could, in good conscience, return to Vietnam. The significant results achieved since priority was raised in 1982 are in large part due to the efforts of (h)(6).
US Ambassadors, Deputy Chiefs of Mission and Embassy staff members, Detachment Commanders and staff, and Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA) Stony Beach Team specialists participated in all official discussions. The League appreciates the briefings from those most directly engaged with counterpart governments in all countries visited, as we did their support during working-level meetings and calls on senior officials.
Following several meetings at US Embassy Bangkok, including with US Chargé d'Affaires Patrick Murphy, DIA's Stony Beach Program Chief(b)(6) and Lao/Thai specialists (b)(6) and (b)(6) Deputy Commander (b)(6) USA, and
(b)(6) Deputy Commander (h)(6) Cambodia specialist personnel (h)(6) the Army Attaché, and others on the Country Team, the Delegation first traveled to Phnom Penh, Cambodia, for discussions with US Ambassador Bill Todd and his Country Team.
In Cambodia, meetings were held with Deputy Prime Minister (DPM) and Minister of Interior (MOI) Sar Kheng, President of the National Assembly Heng Samrin, General Moeang Samphan, Secretary of State in the Ministry of National Defense (MND), and MOI Secretary of State and Permanent Vice Chairman of the Cambodian POW/MIA Committee Sieng Lapresse, before flying by helicopter to Koh Tang, island site of an ongoing effort to recover personnel still unaccounted-for from the 1975 USS Mayaguez incident, including three Marines left behind alive.
The next stop was Vientiane, Laos, for discussions with US Ambassador Dan Clune and his Country Team before visiting three of four ongoing field recoveries, a completed and closed site, and returning to the Lao capital. Discussions were held with DPM and Minister of Foreign Affairs (MFA) Thongloun Sisoulith, Vice Minister of National Defense (MND) Lieutenant General (LTG) Chansamone Chansylath, President of the Lao National Veterans Federation Brigadier General (BG) Somphone Keomixay and Ambassador Khouanta Phalivong, Director General of MFA's Americas Department and head of the Lao POW/MIA Team, comprised of MFA, MND and Ministry of Public Security (MPS) officials.
Always central to many of the League's overall goals, Vietnam was the final stop. Detailed discussions took place with the Vietnam Office for Seeking Missing Persons (VNOSMP), the accustomed prelude to senior policy-level discussions with Vice Minister of National Defense (MND) Senior LTG Nguyen Chi Vinh, Vice Minister of Public Security (MPS) To Lam, and Vice Minister of Foreign Affairs (MFA) Ha Kim Ngoc Ngoc, all of then known to the League from past years.
Mrs. (b)(6) accompanied their husbands and, along with DIA's Stony Beach Program Chief (b)(6) visited (by road and boat) one of the field recovery sites in Laos. The ladies also attended several social events in each country and added significantly to the Delegation's efforts by their presence. As is customary since 2003, expenses for individual travel and accommodations, as well as most meals, were voluntarily paid by the participants, for which the League expresses sincere appreciation. In each country, the ladies, aided by the Chairman, purchased locally crafted items to raise funds for the League at this year's Annual Meeting Boutique, a very successful side-event, chaired by League State Coordinator (b)(6) assisted by Mrs. (b)(6)

We are also grateful for the support extended by the Washington, DC-based Vietnamese, Lao and Cambodian Ambassadors and their Embassy staffs. For many years, League Delegations have received courtesy visas prior to departure; a gesture of significant respect for the League and our mission, and this year was no exception. The League Chairman and Office Administrator (h)(6) met over lunch with long-serving Lao Ambassador Seng Soukhathivong while his staff worked to accomplish issuing the visas. The Royal Cambodian Embassy was equally accommodating, though Ambassador Hen Hem was ill, so we met with Special Assistant to the Ambassador Peang Gafour. Finally, special appreciation and a warm welcome are extended to Vietnam's new Ambassador to the US Pham Quang Vinh. He has tough shoes to fill with the return to Hanoi of his predecessor, Ambassador Nguyen Quoc Cuong, a uniquely talented individual who delivered stirring, thoughtful remarks at the League's 44th Annual Meeting Dinner in June 2013 and was very successful as his Nation's Ambassador to the United States.

Cambodia: Consistently cooperative for decades, Cambodia continues to provide the highest level of support and assistance, responding positively to <u>all</u> requests. Failure to achieve answers in recent years has been due to US-imposed legal obstacles to operations, budget shortages and scheduling glitches. As a result, the primary focus in Cambodia is to express the families' and our nation's appreciation for their willingness to assist all POW/MIA accounting efforts on a humanitarian basis.

We first called on US Ambassador to Cambodia Bill Todd, a talented asset and advocate for all US interests and, in our case, specifically on the accounting mission. He and his Country Team, including long-serving DIA Stony Beach Cambodia specialist (b)(6) were informative and helpful in briefing the Delegation on all aspects of US objectives in Cambodia, including the level of humanitarian assistance and support through USAID and the NGO community, the increase in military-to-military cooperation, bilateral and multilateral efforts on mutual concerns, such as addressing international terrorism, narcotics and human trafficking, etc. (b)(6) Commander of Detachment 1 in Bangkok, also leads POW/MIA operations in Cambodia and was supporting us throughout our visit.

League delegations over many years have been received at the highest levels in the Kingdom of Cambodia, including by His Majesty King Norodom Sihamony and long-serving Prime Minister Hun Sen though, on this visit, these two leaders were out of the country. In Phnom Penh, we met with His Excellency Heng Samrin, President of the National Assembly, DPM/MOI Sar Kheng, Secretary of State in the MND General Moeang Samphan, and Permanent Vice Chairman of the Cambodian POW/MIA Committee Sieng Lapresse, who also serves as Secretary of State in the MOI. Due to a death in his family, we were unable to meet with long-time friend General Pol Saroeun, Commander in Chief of the Royal Cambodian Armed Forces and Chairman of the Cambodian POW/MIA Committee.

The League Delegation expressed appreciation for Cambodia's decades of cooperation and the expectation that US funding and personnel would become more stable and predictable, plus likely increase as a result of the complete reorganization now ongoing. We thanked them for their total support and integration of the DIA Stony Beach Team specialist and stressed the fact that Cambodia continues to lead all countries in providing support and assistance. We asked them to try to ensure that sensitive border conflicts with the Lao and Vietnamese are not permitted to interfere with humanitarian cooperation, as had just occurred on the Lao-Cambodia border, causing cancellation of a field recovery in a border province. Though believed to be a localized action by uniformed border guards, Cambodian officials expressed concern and their intention to follow-up with the Lao. They also stressed continuing commitment to do whatever was needed for however long to help the US account for our missing personnel.

We were flown by helicopter to the USS Mayaguez excavation site in Koh Tang, an island off the southern coast of Cambodia. During this field visit, we also saw long-serving POW/MIA Committee Deputy Chairman LTG Kem Channee. We deeply appreciated this opportunity, facilitated by Detachment 1 Commander (b)(6)

(b)(6)
and his specialists. Senior Lab archeologist (b)(6)
on his 66th field recovery as scientific leader, demonstrated his customary leadership and professionalism, motivating all involved with his commitment, positive attitude and commendable skill. All were impressed with the breadth and scope of the recovery and deeply appreciated the tremendous support and assistance provided.

Laos: We were met at Wattay International Airport by Detachment 3 Commander (b)(6) and long-time Casualty Resolution Specialist (CRS)(b)(6) plus other Det 1 staff facilitating our arrival through customs. Discussions in Vientiane with US Ambassador to Laos Dan Clune and his Country Team were most helpful throughout the visit. Ambassador Clune and (h)(6) graciously hosted the League Chairman and the Childresses for the first three nights at their official residence, site of a lovely reception in the League's honor they hosted for many Lao and US officials. The Country Team meeting, broad in scope, highlighted the need for renewed US efforts to increase the effective US Aid for International Development (USAID) program, a big component of longstanding efforts to demonstrate humanitarian reciprocity.

The Delegation's initial in-country mission was to visit three of four ongoing field recoveries and one site previously completed and closed. After flying commercially on Lao Aviation to Savannakhet, we drove with Detachment 3 Commander (b)(6) to Xekong and overnighted at the base camp, the Xieng Khoang Hotel. We flew by helicopter to three recovery sites, received briefings, touring each and talking with the military teams and scientists, archeologists and anthropologists, all of whom were most impressive and committed, despite the difficulties faced.

We also surveyed a completed and closed site involving a reported burial location of a discrepancy Last Known Alive case. We all were extremely impressed by the scope and extent of this repeat recovery effort, symbolic to us of the extent to which US specialists go to account for US personnel still missing and unaccounted-for, whether an aircraft incident or a case of someone captured, held and reported to have died and been buried, perhaps the most difficult of sites to successfully locate and recover. While no additional remains were located during this follow-up recovery, it was meaningful to see firsthand the extraordinary effort made on this case, circumstances too often necessary.

At all of these sites, the League donated family size mosquito nets to village-level Lao officials, symbolic of additional nets, purchased by the League, that will be delivered by US field teams to Lao people helping with field recoveries in the various areas we visited. This small humanitarian gesture was meant to demonstrate the League's continuing support for humanitarian assistance, an initiative begun by the US Government in the early years of the Reagan Administration and long since expanded.

The level of support and assistance provided by (b)(6) and his team throughout our time in Laos, but especially as we flew by helicopter and traveled by road and boat (in the case of the ladies and DIA's Stony Beach specialist) to the field sites was extraordinary and deeply appreciated. We also were inspired by the dedicated field personnel with whom we were privileged to spend some time, including Lao personnel who were with us throughout. These mostly senior US enlisted personnel knew precisely why they were there, working in difficult locations under often dangerous circumstances, eating primarily self-transported food when in the field, more or less on the run between shifts. We are most grateful for their efforts and those of their leaders, military and civilian.

Following our return to Vientiane, significant discussions were held with Lao Deputy Prime Minister (DPM) and Minister of Foreign Affairs (MFA) Thongloun Sisoulith, raising points related to operational requirements necessary to be more efficient and effective in achieving accounting results, and again clarifying the role and status of DIA's Stony Beach specialist in Laos. We briefly explained the ongoing reorganization of the US accounting community and expressed optimism that formation of the new Defense agency would help ensure full and predictable funding for field operations. To move cooperation forward, we urged the Lao Government to: 1) initiate another internal search for relevant records, few as they may be due to wartime circumstances, and request Vietnam's assistance in providing relevant records on incidents where their troops operated during the war; 2) agree to an increase, as needed, in the number of US personnel allowed in-country simultaneously, to conduct field operations; 3) approve more US teams to operate from additional base camp locations near remote incident sites, when needed and requested, to expedite accounting results; 4) reassess and reduce imposed requirements for Lao escorts (security personnel) to help reduce costs; 5) raise an unnecessarily restrictive 8:00 p.m. curfew on US team participants; and 6) increase flexibility and participation by DIA's Stony Beach in the investigation process. (Though assigned in Laos for over five years, with prior Lao agreement on increased flexibility within and outside of Joint Field Activities (JFAs), imposition of excessive escort and advance notice requirements continue to impede cost-effective, small team investigations, as initially and repeatedly proposed and long understood. Our dismay over this practice was cited as unbecoming in today's environment.)

Related to all these points and suggestions, the League noted changed and changing circumstances in Laos, with freedom of movement by NGOs (Non-Government Organizations) and traveling tourists, no escort/security requirements imposed, etc. Given prior successes with Vietnam in 2011 and earlier in raising archival research in a detailed format, we provided a compelling reference summary of archival documents that the Lao should be able to locate, in Vientiane or Hanoi, and provide to the US or, at a minimum, produce a reasonable explanation as to why the archival documents might be unavailable. (All of the above points were raised in significant detail at an earlier "roundtable" discussion with working-level officials who grasped the proposals and agreed to raise them with their superiors, including focus on the small-team concept for Stony Beach-led investigations.)

DPM Thongloun's positive reaction was notable, as was his reasoning in responding that all of these issues warrant a closer look to see what the Lao Government can recommend to solve such challenges. He recognized the difficulties of the archival document issue and indicated willingness to communicate with Vietnam, noting that unlike the Lao, the Vietnamese had the wartime ability to report and retain documents. He committed to looking closely at the current situation and how the proposed changes could be accommodated, stressing the importance of archives to reach the fullest possible accounting.

The DPM noted that security needs can be unpredictable, based on local understanding and acceptance, but pledged to look at the guard/escort requirements and step-by-step improvements. The Minister recognized the urgency in working to resolve any border issues so as not to adversely impact joint field operations and agreed to contact Cambodian officials. He expressed understanding of the small-team proposal related to the DIA Stony Beach investigations and indicated that the arrival of the new Stony Beach specialist in the spring will provide an opportunity to review the concept and look for ways to overcome any obstacles.

It was clear that DPM Thoungloun recognizes some of the restrictive measures of the past need to be modified, and changes for the better need to come with the ever-improving bilateral relationship. It is also evident that the loss of two key Lao national security officials in 2014 severely impacted the leadership of the Ministries of Defense and Public Security, leaving both with newly appointed senior officials who may or may not be permanently assigned in these positions. We are hopeful our visit will help them to better understand the history of our joint efforts over many years.

The gap caused by losing two such highly placed national security officials in the same helicopter accident is understandable and the situation is still in flux, possibly shifting to generational changes as in other areas. Time will tell but, in the interim, the Lao had an opportunity to respond further on all issues raised by the League during the semi-annual POW/MIA Consultations held February 20th in Vientiane by DPAA's Interim Deputy Director Major General Kelly McKeague, USAF. (In these consultations following our return, the Lao responded in some areas, i.e., lifting unrealistic curfew restrictions, affirmed flexibility in permitting small team Stony Beach investigations outside of the Joint Field Activities, and agreed to reassess their archival holdings and communicate with Vietnam on their holdings that may be helpful but, as expected, deferred other matters for higher level consideration and decision.)

While, it seemed little short of miraculous to expect positive responses in such a short time (less than a month), shortly before the League Delegation's arrival Ambassador Clune had sent the DPM/FM a very effective, succinct letter laying out some of these same concerns. The impact of a unified position by DoD, State and the League prompted some progress and, if DPM/FM Thongloun can manage to persuade the Lao leadership to react positively in other respects, it would be most welcome and mutually beneficial. DPM/FM Thongloun's openness, warmth and receptiveness during discussions were welcome, encouraging, and revealed vision in looking to the future with cautiously optimistic realism.

Minister of Posts & Telecommunications (former Lao Ambassador to the US) Hiem Phommachanh and his wife, Kanika, retired senior official in the Lao MFA, hosted a luncheon in the League Delegation's honor at the lovely new Landmark Hotel in Vientiane, during which much on POW/MIA accounting was discussed. The Minister's current, challenging portfolio covers expanding telecom interconnectivity with neighboring countries, cybersecurity, and the issue of national telecom interface with worldwide networks/telecommunication.

Substantive discussions were also held with the Deputy MND LTG Chansamone Chanyalath and with President of the Lao National Veterans Federation BG Somphone Keomixay, the first such meeting by the League with a Lao official in charge of Veterans Affairs. BG Somphone indicated he looks forward to meeting any veteran delegations that may come to Laos and showed great familiarity with US-Lao accounting efforts, expressing his full support. The same basic points on POW/MIA accounting issues were raised in each meeting, though the focus for specific issue-related matters was during discussions with DPM/FM Thongloun, the ranking Lao official, and Ambassador Khouanta Philavong and the interagency specialists who participated in roundtable discussions.

Vietnam: Going into discussions with senior Vietnamese officials, a more cooperative attitude was evident, a positive spirit of mutual collaboration to address and solve any problems that exist and to seek solutions to new challenges. Due to 2013 discussions in Washington, DC, on the sidelines of bilateral US-SRV Defense Dialogue, it was clear that initiatives to expand bilateral and multilateral POW/MIA accounting cooperation would be given positive consideration. This was in keeping with Vietnamese proposals – to the League since 2009 and repeatedly since to the League and US officials – to expand the pace and scope of field operations and overall cooperation. US responsiveness to Vietnamese proposals had been sporadic at best and undermined perceptions of US seriousness in the minds of many, domestically and internationally. As a result, we looked forward to positive, thoughtful discussions with officials in the Vietnam Office for Seeking Missing Persons (VNOSMP), the coordination point within the SRV Government for all POW/MIA accounting-related matters, followed by meetings with senior Vietnamese officials.

We were met upon arrival on February 3rd at Noi Bai International Airport by Detachment 2 Commander (b)(6)

(b)(6) and long-time Casualty Resolution Specialis (b)(6) transported to the Hilton Hanoi L'Opera Hotel where we were met by DIA's Stony Beach Team Vietnam specialist (b)(6)

The following morning, US Ambassador to Vietnam Ted Osius hosted a Country Team Briefing at his residence in downtown Hanoi, after which we returned to the Hilton, prior to departure for the VNOSMP's Office at the Ministry of Defense where extended, very positive and detailed discussions were held with Director Mr. Tran Thanh Tam and interagency members of the VNOSMP. In addition to specific requests, we briefly explained the ongoing reorganization of the US accounting community and expressed optimism that formation of the new Defense agency would help ensure full and predictable funding for field operations.

This substantive discussion was followed by an office call with Vice Minister of Foreign Affairs Mr. Ha Kim Ngoc, known to the League from earlier years in MFA and VNOSMP, with significant experience dealing with Americans during his tenure at the United Nations. A lovely dinner that evening was hosted by Mr. Nguyen Ba Hung, MFA's Americas Director and former head of the VNOSMP, also very well known to the League from prior VNOSMP chairmanship and other MFA assignments; he was the Consul General in San Francisco prior to returning to Hanoi.

The first formal meeting on Thursday, February 5th, was with Mr. To Lam, Vice Minister of Public Security (MPS) at the Ministry's External Affairs Office. Again, Vice Minister To Lam was familiar to the League from our call in 2011, also at the Ministry. This important session was followed by the all-important meeting with Senior Lt. General Nguyen Chi Vinh, Vice Minister of National Defense (MND) and he was also known to us. (In addition to the League Delegation in 2011, the League Chairman had met with LTG Vinh in 2014 when he was in Washington, DC, for the Defense Dialogue with the US Assistant Secretary of Defense for Asian and Pacific Security Affairs (ASD/APSA), a position since assumed by former US Ambassador to Vietnam David Shear.)

The same points were raised at all meetings, in greater detail with the VNOSMP, and a hard copy was left to ensure there were no misunderstandings, though interpretation support was outstanding, whether by INVENT or a Vietnamese official. We first recognized how far things had come since cooperation was seriously begun in the early 1980s, noting that this year marks the 30th anniversary of the first joint recovery in Vietnam, cooperation that served as a bridge leading to normalization of the bilateral relationship celebrating the 20th anniversary this year. We expressed sincere gratitude to the government and people of Vietnam for the humanitarian assistance that has brought answers and peace of mind to several hundred American families and the continuing improvements that are making today's efforts even more efficient and effective.

In light of the increasingly close partnership between our countries and the ever-expanding political, economic and military relationship, we noted it is increasingly hard to explain to the families and veterans why there would be any remaining obstacles to full, open cooperation. Thus, in light of current circumstances, we noted we are urging both countries to intensify cooperation – both unilateral and joint – before more immediate family members as well as case-related witnesses, pass away.

Specifically, we asked Vietnam to 1) waive the 100-person limit on US personnel allowed for each JFA when the need arises or additional personnel unexpectedly become available; 2) approve more than two recovery teams operating in one province simultaneously, when justified on a case-by-case basis; 3) approve the two DIA Stony Beach Team Vietnam specialists for permanent relocation to Hanoi; 4) renew and expand unilateral research to other-than-military archives and provide long-requested documents on last-known-alive and other discrepancy cases in Vietnam and in areas of Laos and Cambodia where Vietnamese forces operated during the war; 5) locate and provide the remains, or remains fragments, of US personnel who died while in Vietnam's control that have not yet been returned and are unlikely to be recovered jointly.

Responsiveness at all levels was positive, both generally and specifically, with clear affirmation of commitment and willingness to renew archival research, noting it has become routine since 2011 and will continue. The Vietnamese noted they had provided 82 documents since the League's last visit and that some archives are not filed by POW/MIA as a topic, thus are more difficult to locate. They added that they will accept the Lao cases for ideas on how to search their archives and will work with the Lao, if asked. They affirmed their intention to continue the unilateral Vietnamese Recovery Team (VRT) concept, jointly tested and determined to be very productive and less costly. They offered to expand the VRT process to take on more and more difficult cases if the US wishes to do so.

They noted that from the initial list of 34 restricted cases, there are now only two sites still in that category, both off shore and too sensitive for joint operations in the current environment. (Unspoken were concerns over dissension in the South China Sea.) The Vietnamese agreed to further increase the pace and scope of operations, adding that both sides must prepare personnel for expansion, citing the US need for more team leaders, linguists, archeologists and anthropologists, noting their need to train Vietnamese personnel to develop skills necessary for conducting advance negotiation and coordination with provincial officials. They added that we, collectively, must not lose effectiveness.

They also opined that the remaining cases in Vietnam are increasingly difficult and pose significant risks to all personnel, asking that the League convey this concern over health and safety to US officials. We replied by stating our view that the US Government was not legally permitted to offer health insurance protection, as previously requested, but that safety of Vietnamese and Americans on the joint teams was also highest priority to the US side.

Related to longstanding, repeated US requests for acceptance of the two Stony Beach specialists on a permanent basis, Vice Minister of Public Security To Lam indicated he saw no problem with them working in the MIA office and, after hearing that they don't work for the Detachment, but to augment the Detachment's investigations, the Vice Minister indicated that the Stony Beach visas could be extended (1 year vs 3 months) as an interim step while this was further considered. (Ultimately, this will be resolved at a higher level, but the attitude for consideration was positive.)

Vice Minister of Defense Senior LTG Vinh agreed to increase cooperation and look closely at all initiatives discussed with the VNOSMP and raised to Vice Minister Ngoc and Vice Minister To Lam. He asked for greater assistance by the US to locate remains of their servicemen and, in particular, asked the League to help spread the word about our collective efforts. He mentioned having traveled with SRV President Truong Tan Sang to the US in 2013 and meeting with veterans group representatives at that time, an opportunity he viewed as invaluable to increase understanding between the veterans in the two countries. He also expressed appreciation for the humanitarian assistance the US has provided to help ameliorate the dangers of unexploded ordnance and damage suffered from Agent Orange, especially in the Da Nang area that was heavily impacted. We provided suggested archival locations in the US on which Vietnamese researchers could focus and pledged to notify the major national veterans organization, through League channels, of their impending visit and need for assistance in this area.

Personal Reflections of Vice Chairman of the Board (b)(6) written February 4, 2015 and raised in concept during the VNOSMP meeting: My father, (b)(6) MIA/remains returned, flew 94 missions over North Vietnam before his RF-4C crashed evading hostile fire. The last two days, I've been privileged to be on a field visit to 4 field Recovery sites in Savannakhet Province, Laos. As we were transiting to the sites via ground vehicles and helicopters, I was struck by the thought that I was witnessing the same terrain and environment my father saw as he executed his missions from Northeast Thailand into North and, perhaps, South Vietnam.

I could see the majestic mountain ranges with formidable karst formations. I stood under the jungle canopy, sometimes in double and triple thickness. Looking up from the ground and down from the helicopter as we flew, I could appreciate how someone on the ground could hear and almost see a rescuer, but not be seen by him. I saw the smoke and haze and clouds that could hide an entire mountain range blocking line-of-sight-style radios and rescue beacons. I appreciated how easy it was to hide deadly, radar-guided anti-aircraft missiles and artillery in the dense foliage and rocky terrain. I could only imagine the desperation of wounded crewmen in badly damaged aircraft trying to get back to the safety of Thailand through this deadly landscape.

The province we visited was directly on the Ho Chi Minh trail which was used by the North Vietnamese Army to supply combat missions into South Vietnam and support the Viet Cong already there as well. Two of the sites we visited were other RF-4C losses. Of the four crewmembers on these two aircraft, two were accounted for and the other two are still missing in action, with a presumption of death. Both incidents were similar to my father's circumstances of loss; both resulted in high speed impacts with considerable destruction of the aircraft.

Fortunately for our extended family, my father's remains were recovered by the NVA, initially buried, later exhumed, stored, then unilaterally repatriated and identified. My father was afforded proper burial with full military honors. The effort we witnessed was to affect the same for these two unreturned US veterans. I also saw brave, dedicated US service personnel who volunteer to work in harsh and uncomfortable conditions, away from home for months, searching for their missing comrades. Most weren't even born when these men fought and died. They are all heroes.

As I rode in the van and in the helicopter, I thought to myself, as Dad was flying over this country, he probably could not have imagined in his wildest dreams that his oldest son would someday be driving in that same country looking for missing Americans. With indescribable irony, I can only imagine that he was thinking of his family, but those thoughts would have been back at home in Idaho, certainly not in Laos.

Mike, although I'll fill in any questions later, following are key points from the one-hour meeting.

I first thanked him and their leadership for the forward-leaving tech talks on September 17th, including the suggestion to move more rapidly than FY17-18 to expand operations in the central provinces, the offer to explore any options the US thinks might improve the process, and urging more use of unilateral SRV personnel to conduct operations, as well as the commitment for an answer on SB by end of the year. Vice Minister Vinh was very pleased with the rundown and my question as to their suggestions on what kind of assistance they would like to have to support their recoveries, and said, in abbreviated form:

- 1) There are no restrictions on our willingness to cooperate on this mission, jointly or unilaterally, and no longer restricted areas, but that in the past the USG responsiveness had been slow. I assured him I recall very well their 2009 request to increase the pace and scope of operations, but noted it is a new day, a new agency with you at the helm, and that I was confident we'd all be seeing an expansion. I also noted that an additional factor was your intention to form partnerships with private organizations/companies to provide assistance, especially on WWII, and gave them the example of the Tarawa remains recovered by History Flight and repatriated while I was in HI, noting that such could help alleviate the pressure of the additional mandate of WWII remains recoveries, without additional personnel, but also other areas where such support might be needed to augment achieving objectives.
- 2) They would welcome underwater recoveries along the coastline, later clarifying there are sensitivities about large USN vessels in some areas, but there are options, such as smaller USN equipment and working from SRV and private vessels. In response I said this is very welcome reiteration of what he'd earlier said and that I'd talked with Deputy PACOM and PACFLT CO, both favorable and looking forward to expanding the military relationship by working more closely on this mission. I added that I was confident you also were supportive and I am hoping that discussions could soon progress, but that decisions on such matters were entirely up to you, DoD, PACOM, etc. and their responsiveness to any USG proposals.

- 3) He noted they realize that recovery of their losses was their responsibility, Vietnamese killed in Vietnam, but mentioned possibly some form of DoD's DNA "matching" kit and underground detection (ground penetrating radar?) to locate remains in unknown locations, possibly training for use of specialized equipment and historical research to locate US records that might have locating information, but importantly, to seek personal artifacts that are very meaningful to the families who lost loved ones. He cited the recent TV documentary that was done in connection with the 40th anniversary of the reunification of their country and the end of the way, and the 70th anniversary of their national independence, an important year.
- 4) He mentioned Stony Beach and again said he has no problem with them coming to Vietnam and working on this issue with the US and SRV teams, and that he really didn't care what they did before or who they worked for, so long as their focus was strictly on the MIA issue. When I asked for clarification, stating that they work for DIA, have specialized training, cultural sensitivity, languages, sole mission to investigation and interview leads developed by analysts to help resolve cases, but they don't work for the Detachment. I noted that DIA's specialists in SB are permanently assigned in Laos and Cambodia, at the USEMB, but not in Vietnam and that it seemed illogical and said that is one reason I was disappointed that his schedule didn't have time for his=m to meet with DIA Director LTG Stewart, he smiled and nodded, saying it is "too soon" at present, but that he had been in charge of all military intelligence for 10 years and he has no problem with the background of anyone working on the issue, so long as they were working with the Detachment and VNOSMP.
- 5) There was also extensive discussion (due in no small part, in terms of extension) to Rick Weidman, VVA) on Agent Orange Dioxin and past efforts to do with scientific survey to determine the differences in birth defects between children born of southern (exposed) women and northern (unexposed) women since most eat basically the same diet, have similar lifestyles, so the results would be enlightening, etc., etc., Vinh said there are three areas that are the most toxic, Da Nang, where the US has been of significant assistance,m some \$84 million and a "model" of how best to ameliorate the toxic conditions in the environment, but also Phu Cat Air Base and Binh Hoa Air Base, both not yet treated and in very bad condition. He also noted it will take 100 years to clean the environment to where there is no danger to succeeding generations, etc. There was also a specific appeal to all of us to talk with our elected officials to help them understand the importance of such assistance on a humanitarian basis, but made very clear that even if there was no assistance in these areas, they would continue to cooperate fully on the American MIA issue.

Interestingly to me, since I'd never hear it, is that Vice stated he is the head of the national steering committees dealing with both UXO and Agent Orange, and it is clear he cares deeply about doing his best to address and get support for addressing both issues, just as he does getting artifacts to families and recovering and returning remains to families.

(b)(6) whom I introduced as having known longer than any, at least 40 years of knowledge and commitment, thanked Vice Minister Vinh for the expanded cooperation that was evident and his commitment to continue doing more. Bob Wallace also thanked him and pledged also to take his concerns to House and Senate Members. Rick Weidman thanked the Minister, and committed to conveying his message to relevant MCs. Vinh invited us all to come to Vietnam and, of course, I noted Bob as coming regularly, usually when bring his Nat'l Commander, new each year. Vinh was very engaged, almost passionately expressive, and thanked me for coming and bring the guys with me. They also appreciated the opportunity and are in full support.

I'm too tired for more, but will add anything else I pick up from my notes, but wanted this to you before your meeting tomorrow morning, though most importantly, I hope you are feeling much better after a good night's rest. Hope to talk soon, Ann

Mike, I've confirmed availability of Bob Wallace and (b)(6) the two most important form my standpoint and likely Hanoi's as well, but have you checked your schedule.

I noted below September 30th as preferable since that is best for Bob, and of course I want him/VFW there and Mike/Legion can make it either day. I'll get back to you as soon as I get word from the SRV Ambassador or Sr. Col Hung, the DATT. More to follow when available, but I sure wish was here, especially if Ba Hung is on the Vinh Delegation, as is likely.

I've asked (b)(6) if any of the Stony Beach guys have additional insights on the SRV Steering Committee 1237, presumably still led by Sr LTG Cong, as I know SB has long had interest in their military recovery operations. I know only their mission which is to locate and return unaccounted-for Vietnamese personnel, now evolving into attempts to identify, never missing, but known dead and many buried in unknown locations, including some as groups buried by US personnel.

Their actual needs may be very simple and easily addressed with perhaps training of historians, investigators and scientists, but this has been going on for some time and the circumstances have changed measurably. There are likely many options and variations that warrant some consideration, but certainly no immediate commitment, unless from the VSOs agreeing to publish an article, perhaps written by you, that could be publish in their national magazines.

Mr. Ambassador,

I'm taking the liberty of again contacting you regarding the possibility of hosting a luncheon in honor of Vice Minister Vinh on September 29th, 12:30 - 2:00 p.m., or September 30th, 12:00 - 1:30 p.m., preferably the latter.

Knowing the demands that will be on you and the Vice Minister, it is not my intention to pressure you or your staff for a decision, but I wanted you to know that I have contacted the leaders of the VFW, American Legion, Vietnam Veterans of America, Special Operations Association and Jewish War Veterans of America to confirm their availability. I have proposed the two dates and times, when most if not all will be available, and am doing the same with our new DPAA Director and others.

Ambassador Nguyen Ba Hung, in his role as Director of the VNOSMP, again requested consideration of ways in which the USG and VSOs might be able to assist your government's efforts to recover and identify remains of Vietnamese citizens killed and while serving your country. This subject was raised to Generals McKeague and Spindler on September 17th during Technical Talks in Hanoi. It was also raised during the League Delegation early this year, and I well recall Sr.LTG Cong's visit, in 2014 as I recall, during which he raised this same need.

As you likely know, we collected and provide to your government information from American veterans when General Vessey's was serving as Presidential Emissary in the later 1980s. My thinking now is that our new DPAA Director, LTG Mike Linnington, USA (Ret), our VSO leaders and I could gain greater understanding of your government's current thinking over informal discussion at lunch.

Please do let me know as soon as you have confirmed with officials in Hanoi whether either date/time can be accommodated in the Vice Minister's schedule and, hopefully, yours as well.

> Mike, although I'll fill in any questions later, following are key points from the one-hour meeting.

> I first thanked him and their leadership for the forward-leaving tech talks on September 17th, including the suggestion to move more rapidly than FY17-18 to expand operations in the central provinces, the offer to explore any options the US thinks might improve the process, and urging more use of unilateral SRV personnel to conduct operations, as well as the commitment for an answer on SB by end of the year. Vice Minister Vinh was very pleased with the rundown and my question as to their suggestions on what kind of assistance they would like to have to support their recoveries, and said, in abbreviated form:

> 1) There are no restrictions on our willingness to cooperate on this mission, jointly or unilaterally, and no longer restricted areas, but that in the past the USG responsiveness had been slow. I assured him I recall very well their 2009 request to increase the pace and scope of operations, but noted it is a new day, a new agency with you at the helm, and that I was confident we'd all be seeing an expansion. I also noted that an additional factor was your intention to form partnerships with private organizations/companies to provide assistance, especially on WWII, and gave them the example of the Tarawa remains recovered by History Flight and repatriated while I was in HI, noting that such could help alleviate the pressure of the additional mandate of WWII remains recoveries, without additional personnel, but also other areas where such support might be needed to augment achieving objectives.

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> 3) He noted they realize that recovery of their losses was their responsibility, Vietnamese killed in Vietnam, but mentioned possibly some form of DoD's DNA "matching" kit and underground detection (ground penetrating radar?) to locate remains in unknown locations, possibly training for use of specialized equipment and historical research to locate US records that might have locating information, but importantly, to seek personal artifacts that are very meaningful to the families who lost loved ones. He cited the recent TV documentary that was done in connection with the 40th anniversary of the reunification of their country and the end of the way, and the 70th anniversary of their national independence, an important year.

> 4) He mentioned Stony Beach and again said he has no problem with them coming to Vietnam and working on this issue with the US and SRV teams, and that he really didn't care what they did before or who they worked for, so long as their focus was strictly on the MIA issue. When I asked for clarification, stating that they work for DIA, have specialized training, cultural sensitivity, languages, sole mission to investigation and interview leads developed by analysts to help resolve cases, but they don't work for the Detachment. I noted that DIA's specialists in SB are permanently assigned in Laos and Cambodia, at the USEMB, but not in Vietnam and that it seemed illogical and said that is one reason I was disappointed that his schedule didn't have time for his=m to meet with DIA Director LTG Stewart, he smiled and nodded, saying it is "too soon" at present, but that he had been in charge of all military intelligence for 10 years and he has no problem with the background of anyone working on the issue, so long as they were working with the Detachment and VNOSMP.

- > 5) There was also extensive discussion (due in no small part, in terms of extension) to Rick Weidman, VVA) on Agent Orange Dioxin and past efforts to do with scientific survey to determine the differences in birth defects between children born of southern (exposed) women and northern (unexposed) women since most eat basically the same diet, have similar lifestyles, so the results would be enlightening, etc., etc., Vinh said there are three areas that are the most toxic. Da Nang, where the US has been of significant assistance,m some \$84 million and a "model" of how best to ameliorate the toxic conditions in the environment, but also Phu Cat Air Base and Binh Hoa Air Base, both not yet treated and in very bad condition. He also noted it will take 100 years to clean the environment to where there is no danger to succeeding generations, etc. There was also a specific appeal to all of us to talk with our elected officials to help them understand the importance of such assistance on a humanitarian basis, but made very clear that even if there was no assistance in these areas, they would continue to cooperate fully on the American MIA issue.
- > Interestingly to me, since I'd never hear it, is that Vice stated he is the head of the national steering committees dealing with both UXO and Agent Orange, and it is clear he cares deeply about doing his best to address and get support for addressing both issues, just as he does getting artifacts to families and recovering and returning remains to families.
- whom I introduced as having known longer than any, at least 40 years of knowledge and commitment, thanked Vice Minister Vinh for the expanded cooperation that was evident and his commitment to continue doing more. Bob Wallace also thanked him and pledged also to take his concerns to House and Senate Members. Rick Weidman thanked the Minister, and committed to conveying his message to relevant MCs. Vinh invited us all to come to Vietnam and, of course, I noted Bob as coming regularly, usually when bring his Nat'l Commander, new each year. Vinh was very engaged, almost passionately expressive, and thanked me for coming and bring the guys with me. They also appreciated the opportunity and are in full support.

Hi Ann -

Unfortunately, funding has never been our issue as we perform our accounting mission. It's possible that could change, with increased access to field sites, costs inherent in Strategic Partnerships, and a new Case Management System. We underspent slightly last year, but we were very close to closing out the fiscal year having spent what was allocated. My goal is of course to spend every nickel we're given, and ask for more. Our LIMFAC has always been people: deployable teams to get out to sites/locations on our MEL -- of which there are many ready to be recovered.

Given ongoing efforts to cut budgets, reduce OSD personnel billets by 25% (including Defense Agencies), and mitigate expected cuts to the operational force, any "ask" for more people on our part will likely not go very far. In fact, I'm doing all I can to keep what we have now. My argument is we've already taken a PACOM cut of 20% over the past few years -- we can't take another. This month and next we'll see how far that argument goes.

Other responses below -- but should be expanded on face to face.

Mike, although disappointed that you will be unable to meet with them on December 5th, the Board had a couple of questions I couldn't really answer, so I said I'd following up.

- 1) Is the funding stated in the Defense Authorization Bill for FY16 (\$123,372 million) adequate for the expanded mission? (yes, but given it's our first year, we'll know in about 6 months as costs for strategic partnerships come to fruition, and our case management costs are known).
- 2) If yes, is there any danger that some % of the budgeted funds could be cut if an across the board cut is required? (yes -- negotiations are ongoing now -- it's a 50/50 proposition for DPAA -- I'm personally arguing against any further cuts....not delegating this to anyone lower than myself ("rank", makes a difference unfortunately).
- 3) Could the pace and scope of the Vietnam War accounting effort be expedited if additional funding was authorized and appropriated and more personnel were made available? (yes -- it's a very bad time to ask for more people/money -- until we can get our identifications much higher than the 80/year we're doing. If we find/identify 200 -- we'll have much stronger legs to stand on asking for more resources).

Obviously, there is always concern over the ability to sustain operations, especially when all are acutely aware of how fragile funding commitments can be.

4) Also, it was mentioned during the last DPAA Conference Call that DPAA had purchased some additional equipment for AFDIL to use in processing DNA, but what is the equipment purchased for use by AFDIL? (I was unable to tell them.) (2 Next Generation Sequencers: currently going through validation, and on line in a few months -- I'll send product information soonest....). As well as the science behind what it does for us).

Thanks in advance for your reply to what I assume easily answered questions.



He also knows that I planned to send someone (didn't really say who) an inquiry about the rationale. Hi Ann, Thank you for the call and the help! This is the actual rice paddy where the plane crashed. Of course back then and in 1997 it was all trees. The bottom picture is where the "witness" said the plane hit. If you look at the rice stubble, you can see a bare spot or a lesser growth spot. This is due to soil contamination. I had a small metal detector and it was going off all over, just small pieces and such and nothing identifiable. The day I met the witness, he pulled a large piece of iron out of a trash pile. I thought it too large to be an airplane part, looked more like a 500 lb bomb casing. In hind sight, it could have been a piece of an engine block; they are usually iron. The witness said that people scavenged the area over the years for things to sell. The 105 mm shell casing that one kid showed to me was all corroded and not worth anything. That is why it was still there. My dad was carrying a mixed cargo but mostly 105-106 mm (white phosphorous rounds).

The witness also told me that he did visit the sight several days later and the Chinese troops would not let them near. He said they were busy digging into the site. They piled the debris just to the left in the top picture. It too had a lot of pieces in the dirt. Anyway, I have more pictures and such and restricted certainly does. Again, we are not criers and ones to go banging on Congress doors and such. Maybe we should have.

I've had my team look into the specifics on the case of Private Wilson, and although I'm concerned anytime I read that our government's accounting effort has been anything but responsive to families, I'm buoyed by learning from our team that we've been actively pursuing this case for several years, and has provided updates to Mr. [by(6)] Pvt Wilson's (b)(6)
through the Army Service Casualty Office.

In 2012 and 2013, teams from our office made on-the-ground investigations of both the reported site where Pvt Wilson's light tank was destroyed, just outside the village of Landean, France, and the reported burial site of an unknown U.S. soldier in the southwest corner of the forest of Fougeres. As you noted, a private organization, History Flight, has also conducted work on Pvt Wilson's case, and though they have yet to locate his remains, I understand they have developed some promising leads which we are developing now, with hopes of pursuing in the coming year. As we do, we will continue to keep PVT Wilson's family informed.

Please know that if our government (or any private organization with whom we are working) recovers the remains of any missing U.S. service member from any of our past conflicts, we will work to ensure a proper identification, repatriation, and burial with full military honors. Should Pvt Wilson's remains be identified, DPAA and the Army service casualty office would provide, at U.S. government expense, the honored burial for which he and his family have waited so long. PVT Wilson's family will surely NOT have to pay the private organization, or rely on the French to pay for these services.

In the event that Pvt Wilson's remains go undiscovered as a result of this most recent information, DPAA will continue to pursue all possible leads in our efforts to locate his remains.

Thank you for bringing this case to my attention. In addition to allowing me to verify internally that my team is coordinating effectively with History Flight, your inquiry made me aware of the need to contact Pvt Wilson's family to reaffirm our commitment to his case.

I do not know the current status of the specific case you raised, but I'm confident that one or both of these officers will be in touch directly or through one of their staff to respond more knowledgeably to your inquiry.

Although formed in 1970 to focus solely on achieving the fullest possible accounting for our loved ones missing from the Vietnam War, we are very proud that our determination was able to sustain the mission and see its evolution into DPAA, as directed by former Secretary of Defense Chuck Hagel. As a result, over 600 US personnel today are engaged in the accounting mission, setting an example for the world that our country stands behind those who serve our country - past, present and future - including if captured or missing.

Best wishes to you and know that all of us realize what you and your generation of soldiers did for us and the western world during WWII.

Dear Ms. Griffiths:

As an "old soldier" I still try to live by the Soldier's Creed, especially the following parts:

I will never accept defeat.

I will never quit.

I will never leave a fallen comrade.

I know you have read many of the recent stories about MIA Marines whose remains have been recovered on Kwajelin and Tarawa. Well, over the recent Veteran's Day weekend I received a very disturbing email from my late uncle's (SGT Paul J Bearden, KIA 23Jul1944) (Mr. (b)(6) about the last remaining casualty of the 106th Cavalry Group in WWII whose remains were never recovered. The pertinent parts of that email follow:

"His name is Pvt. Ronald A. Wilson, 36761382. He was confirmed as KIA via witnesses in a tank just south of Landean (north of Fougeres) on 2 August 1942. He was a member of F Company and, from what I can tell, 3rd Platoon. The 88mm struck the left tread from behind and the second round went through the engine and out right where was sitting as assistant driver. Photos are quite clear. The lieutenant's leg was badly injured. A tank came back and picked up the three and he was left as the tank started burning. Finally, 3 years ago, a woman reported that the partisans lived next door to her family in a house in the forest on a dead end road. She said the partisans brought his remains and buried them. Unfortunately, after all the work the POW/MIA caseworker put into this, and two trips by the team to France, JPAC has no interest that I am aware of. The caseworker was going to present the case in 2013 for JPAC action; however, the government shutdown and subsequent non-reorganization of JPAC (meaning they were to reorganize and did not, and then lost all interest) meant they gave up on the case--even after traveling to the burial site and talking to the witnesses. The That Contacted a private foundation and they have been doing the work--and will do the excavation. As far as I know the family will have to pay to bring him home or the French might take care of this. I do not think our government is interested in helping.

The [b] contacted me shortly after [b] and I started our search. And we have become very good friends. His name is (b)(6) and he will make any arrangements to have him brought home and buried. You can contact [b] at [b] agmail.net. < Caution-mailto [b] agmail.net. > [b] would welcome you contacting him. Phone is [b](6) Pvt. Wilson's family could never found out what happened to him. They were not aware of the description of the event in the 106th Cavalry book--which is exaggerated based on local accounts. No Germans were killed that day. One of the two German gunners was slightly wounded and they rode a horse into the village the next day to find a doctor. They came back after the war to visit and thank the local doctor and people and much was learned from them.

and I were at Red's grave in 2008 when we learned that Pvt. Wilson's name was on the Wall of the Missing. I was really puzzled because I knew he was listed as KIA. So we started the search right away. I became so focused at (b)(6) grave that and the guide watched me for a long time--I had no idea that I stood there thinking for so long. It was quite emotional, as was Dowling's grave.

It has been confirmed that there is a body at the location. Excavation should be very soon. Every indication, including location near the tank, points toward Pvt. Wilson.

As far as I know JPAC has no role. will make burial arrangements. Either had and the family pay to have him shipped home or maybe the French government will help. I wish I knew which congressman to complain to about the lack of interest by JPAC and our government since Sept. 2013."

Any assistance the ROA could provide in the recovery and return of PVT Wilson's remains would be greatly appreciate by this "old soldier," Mr. (b)(6) and the (b)(6) family.

Mike, I'm again disappointed in your knee-jerk reaction, or over-reaction, that appears to stem from an inclination to control everything, repeat everything, related to this mission. That is an impossibility for any leader of any organization or agency, public or private, commercial or nonprofit..

I believe the best any leader can do is lay out your vision for achieving the mission and select people who have integrity, good judgment and character, intellectual capacity, knowledge and experience or ability and willingness to learn, good judgment about people and their motivation, and loyalty, first to the mission, then to their bosses.

Yes, that's a tall order and precisely why I believe you are the right guy at the right time in the right job. That is saying a LOT, Mike, and you need to have confidence in me, not over-react. I learn something new about this mission and its implementation each and every day, including about people. You've encouraged me to reach out to your people, then signaled the opposite to them, asking for our confidence, then extended little in return.

Korean War Army corporal Konnoth Stuck (Clarence Stuck

Remains found in a mass grave near a notorious POW camp in North Korea made an 83-year-old Pennsylvania man break down in sobs.

The remains belong to Army corporal Kenneth Stuck -- an MIA for 65 years.

"I can't wait until he comes home," Stuck's brother Clarence, of Manheim, told FoxNews.com Sunday.

The Joint POW/MIA Accounting Command identified the remains last month through DNA testing.

"The Army casualty office called me and told me that 'we have your brother," Stuck said. "I had to pull over and call my son to tell him to come get me because my car was flooded -- with my tears."

Kenneth Stuck was declared missing on Nov. 2, 1950, during the Battle of Unsan, a devastating defeat for American and UN troops by Chinese forces in the North Pyongan province, according to LancasterOnline < Caution-http://lancasteronline.com/news/local/a-soldier-comes-home-remains-of-korean-war-veteran-mia/article_76c2370e-99e2-11e5-b60e-87ddb83096d9.html > . He was 24.

The enlistee's remains were found near the prisoner of war camp called Camp 5 at Pyoktong in a massive grave that contained the remains of some 322 POWs, the Pennsylvania news outlet reported Sunday.

Stuck told the news outlet his brother appears to have died of starvation. He says that's based on the condition of the remains, which also indicate that his brother died "maybe 20 years ago."

The remains are expected to be returned to Pennsylvania in the next few weeks.

Stuck said the VFW is preparing a marker for his brother's burial in a cemetery where Stuck said their parents are interned.

"He was the greatest buddy you could ever have," Stuck told LancasterOnline. "We were really close....I'm just glad he'll finally be Caution-home."

AMG Question: According to the article, Stuck told the news outlet his brother appears to have died of starvation. He says that's based on the condition of the remains, which also indicate that his brother died "maybe 20 years ago." If that is true, he would have had to survive some 30 years in captivity before his death. Having never heard of such, and wanting facts, can you tell us whether the remains recovered and identified did or did not reveal an accurate, or fairly accurate, date/year of death?

Freddy, the League's opposition to formation of yet another select committee at this point is based on the fact that major changes are still taking place in the accounting effort. The newly formed DPAA is coming together and just beginning to get its feet on the ground. The Director, LTG Mike Linnington, USA (Ret) needs to have time to get his team on track to demonstrate DPAA's ability to attain a new level of effort and results in terms of achieving increased accounting.

While closely watching relevant budget and personnel requirements as formative tasks are addressed, we've been assured there will continue to be expansion on the Vietnam War accounting mission as requested by the Vietnamese since 2009, with the US effort insufficient and inadequate until recently. With the the additional requirements related to WWII and Korean War remains recoveries, including hundreds buried as unknowns in the Punchbowl and elsewhere around the world, the workload on DPAA cannot be overstated.

A new Select Committee at this point would be a major distraction and could interfere, even severely impede, DPAA's ability to focus maximum attention and energy on important, immediate tasks as they move into full operational capacity by year's end. That is precisely what Director Linnington intends, and we are determined to do all we possibly can to support and facilitate DPAA's efforts, seeking additional budget appropriations if needed and even asking Congress to fence DPAA funding if necessary, though of course we hope that won't be required.

Suffice to say this mission needs another select committee like one needs a hole in the head. What we need is seriousness, integrity, transparency and realism in all communications with the families and our Nation's veterans. I strongly believe this is the last viable opportunity to really generate the answers we all seek. We now have the right guy, in the right position, at the right time, supported up his chain of command. With unified support and cautious optimism, carefully monitored by the League and our major national Veteran organizations, this opportunity can be maximized and significant progress really can bring answers for the families.

Vietnam, Cambodia inaugurate two border markers

Vietnam and Cambodia jointly held ceremonies in the Vietnamese provinces of Gia Lai and An Giang on Saturday to inaugurate border markers No. 30 and 275.

The ceremonies were attended by Vietnamese Prime Minister Nguyen Tan Dung and his Cambodian

counterpart Hun Sen, along with delegations of elite officials from the two countries.

Vietnam and Cambodia have achieved significant results in establishing the border markers between the two nations, PM Dung said in his speech at the inauguration of border marker No. 30 in Gia Lai, located in the Central Highlands, on Saturday morning.

The management of the border line separating Vietnam and Cambodia is based on the regulations promulgated in the agreements and treaties which were signed by the two governments, the premier added. The road connecting two checkpoints of the international border gates of Le Thanh, located in Gia Lai, and O Yadav in the Cambodian province of Rattanakiri was also opened to traffic during the ceremony. The road, which will provide connection between localities in Vietnam's Central Highlands and eastern Cambodia, is expected to facilitate the development of the economy, tourism, trade, and investment of the two parties in particular and Vietnam, Cambodia, and Laos in general, according to PM Dung. Cambodian PM Hun Sen considered the inauguration of border marker No. 30 the result of Vietnam and Cambodia's long-term efforts.

He also hoped that the two countries would soon finish establishing all border markers in accordance with local and international laws, creating favorable conditions in the link between Vietnam, Cambodia and other member states of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN).

Another ceremony was organized on the afternoon of the same day in An Giang to launch boundary marker No. 275.

"The inauguration of marker No. 30 and the road connecting two checkpoints of the Le Thanh-O Yadav international border gate, together with the launch of marker No. 275, marks the Vietnam-Cambodia Joint Committee on Land Border Demarcation and Marker Planting's completion of defining and building all key markers at 10 international border gates along the two countries' borderline," PM Dung said. He also asked PM Hun Sen to together direct the joint committee to address existing issues and accelerate the completion of land border delimitation in order to build a boundary of peace, stability, cooperation and sustainable development.

Thanks for the article; it saved me time looking for it, and I'll get back to you on my thoughts and recommendations, if any.

I talked with and tried to cover some of the bases we discussed, largely because his memory of historically important events, processes and people is second to none. Also, he is in the midst of major sorting/storing retained archival materials for the book he and I hope to write, once you're successfully and comfortably on your way. (As noted earlier, my exit strategy.)

He and I are in full agreement on SB's origin, initial mission, evolution, utility today as value-added to DPAA, at no cost other than openness and coordination, rather than stove-piping as we've seen over the years. And, as related to working in the USEMBs, whatever the country, there is always the need to ensure that the DATTs and the Ambos understand that their primary mission must not be undercut or impeded by other requirements, though sometimes useful in expanding access and ease of acceptance. You may wish to call him to talk about Stony Beach, though I think I probably covered it fairly well, but as I was covering the subject, he came up with point after point. That means, he could likely add more to your understanding, if more is needed. For example, I failed to point out that much of SB's initial activity on the live POW aspects(b)(3):10 USC § 424 and other reporting coming along as the year moved forward.

I talked with pare about the Last Known Alive (LKA) cases and while talking I came up with a name that he agreed works well and is far preferable to the "Fate Determination Board" and that is the LKA EVALUATION BOARD. The key factor is to ensure that in language used to convey results, the old terminology doesn't creep back into the content, i.e. we have evaluated your son's case and determined his fate as no longer being LKA = WRONG! The language in explanation should be along the lines of "In analyzing all of the evidence collected over the last X investigations and reviews, our thorough assessment has concluded that your son/husband did not survive the incident and it is likely, due to the proximity to hostile forces, that his remains 1) were recovered and have not yet been repatriated, so will be the subject of sensitive discussions on the need for additional unilateral efforts; 2) were possibly buried in a nearby location and efforts to locate and recover them will ensue; or 3) will not be recoverable due to the following factors: a., b. and c. In other words, no further "fate determinations" on a presumptive basis, but careful analysis of accumulated evidence and circumstantial information leading to a solid conclusion, avoiding presumptions or determinations and, if unclear, the lack of clarity should be acknowledged, along with any options that may exist.

I also mentioned our discussion on the importance of the case coordination process and the HI-based operational support analysts need for the insights and knowledge available in the SEA team of specialists remaining in DC and vice versa to keep the DC-based analysts engaged in the "heart" of the issue, seeking

and obtaining answers for the families and helping account for these American veterans/colleagues and bring them Caution-home. [hw6] felt strongly that the relationship between the operational support analysts and the macro-strategic analysts was crucial to best utilize assets and resources, as well as keeping the HI-based people on the right track and the DC-based people motivated for the right reasons and being part of the accounting process.

Generally on public diplomacy, it is hard to know where to start, but it was covered quite extensively in the earlier paper was and I did on strategy.

Finally, while talking, while talking, asked if you had mentioned anything further on the follow-up letters you planned to send to Vietnamese, Lao and Cambodian officials after your early December trip, specifically as related to your conversation regarding a comprehensive plan that the working level on both sides would put together for approval at your level and that of your counterparts. I told him I was clueless, that you mentioned nothing in this regard, nor had anyone sent me a draft for a "snake check," but that I raise the subject.

I'll pass the message to [15M6] in fact just hung up talking with him and he thought I should send along a "personal for" note related to Lab ID's you announced last Thursday, during the DPAA Conference Call. I have no idea from whom you received the numbers of IDs for Calendar Year 2015, but you gave us 58 for WWII, 34 form Korean War, and 11 SEA (meaning Vietnam War). You indicated 97 for the year, but that adds up to 103, so there is a discrepancy that begs correction.

The larger issue, and one you may wish to question (without attribution to me) is whether all announced as ID's had in fact gone through the entire ID process, including peer review and approval, and provided to the PNOK. I've heard that process was not applied fully, meaning it would be premature and presumptive to announce them as ID'd. Therefore, you may have been put in the position of providing faulty, on at least unsubstantiated, information to the NGO, VSO and MSO community.

There has been far too much emphasis, therefore pressure, on the ID numbers, not specifically mandated by Congress, but still taken as a mandate by some in the community. Further, there is nothing that undercuts the legitimacy of official efforts more than unfounded accusations of false IDs and/or duplicity in the ID process. The League has NEVER bought such absurd accusations, nor have I personally, and has actively fought against acceptance, as well as those making such accusations. As I mentioned to you some time ago, the League commended CILHI when under greatest attack, and we're well aware of the damage caused by unproven accusations.

I hope you have a productive trip to St. Louise and am glad you went to NARA, but when is it that you

intend to launch for Europe? Travel safely, Ann

Dear General Vinh:

I hope this letter finds you well and assume you are preparing to again travel to our nation's capitol for the Defense Policy Dialogue next week. As we discussed when you visited Washington, DC, in July with the General Secretary, the atmosphere of bilateral cooperation between our two countries has never been better and there is, or was, every reason for optimism that continued expansion would ensure building on the solid basis thus far undertaken.

Therefore, it was with surprise and sincere disappointment that I learned earlier this week that what I had hoped would be cordial and fruitful discussions between you and Director of our Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA) and LTG Vince Stewart, USMC, would not be taking place as proposed.

All are looking at ways to further increase the pace and scope of operations, as initially proposed by your government in 2009. With the expanded political, economic and military-to-military cooperation that now exists, including what I understand is an initial program sharing mutually beneficial intelligence, there should no longer be any obstacle to increasing such cooperation, especially on this humanitarian mission.

As you know, I've long advocated increased bilateral military-to-military cooperation, strongly believing that our two governments can and should work together to expand ties and broaden understanding. One such area of importance to the accounting mission is to gain your government's approval for permanent stationing in Hanoi of our two DIA Stony Beach specialists. Time is running out to obtain the answers we seek to end the families' uncertainty. These two specialists, now rotating in and out on temporary duty status, need to be fully utilized in conducting the small scale investigations needed, accompanied by and in full coordination with your designated officials.

At Technical Talks held late last week in Hanoi, Ambassador Nguyen Ba Hung and other VNOSMP members suggested further increases in bilateral cooperation and committed to responding to this longstanding US request by the end of the year. Of course it was my hope that you would take the opportunity of your upcoming visit to inform General Stewart of your government's favorable decision.

Since you and he regrettably will not meet next week, I nevertheless hope that you will deliver that positive message during the Defense Policy Dialogue (DPD) with Ambassador Shear and our new DPAA Director LTG Mike Linnington, USA (Ret) previously described in my September 7th letter to DPM/FM Minh. I also sincerely hope that your leadership will re-consider and determine that increasing intelligence and national security cooperation is in the mutual interest of both countries, carefully as such a policy must be drawn.

As School Changes, Coach Hopes to Bring Winning Ways to Summit View

Change has arrived at Summit View Academy, the combined elementary and middle school in Independence. Academically, the school will emphasize science, technology, engineering, art, and math (STEAM) beginning this year.

Also new this year is Head Football Coach Bill McLeid, who hopes to end years of losing seasons. McLeid was a staff member at the middle school last year and took over as head football coach this season.

Changing what he called a losing culture required a lot of direct communication with potential players.

"For us, I went out and got a good amount of kids to come out and play football this year back in the spring and that kind of made some people uneasy because they didn't know what was going to go on at the school," McLeid told The River City News. "The football team remains, the school will be the same other than how they teach things and it's all systems go. One of the things that I do find, is that a lot of the kids don't come out to participate, so I made it a mission of mine to go into the school hallways and ask these kids to come out and play. I look them in the eye and say I want them to come play football for me, and that seemed to make a difference. I have 56 kids on the roster this year as opposed to 30 or less over the last three or four years, and they're having a great time."

The school intends on changing the mascot and team colors for the school over the course of the year, another step towards changing the losing identity.

"In terms of the team itself, it's been kind of a tough road for athletics at Summit View as a whole, really not a whole lot of success. A lot of losses, but some bright spots in there over the last four, five or six years from an athletic perspective. Football, not so much. It's been kind of a losing culture, so we have some things that we kind of need to focus on to try to change that. Why it happens to be that way, I really don't know based on the demographics of our school system," McLeid said. "One of the things that we are trying to focus on this year, not only being a fundamentally sound football team, but trying to focus on more on life, scholastic, what it takes to be a man of integrity, what it takes to be a productive citizen in

life, we're just trying to focus on a lot of things and wrap them all into one. If you know anything about football, it's probably one of the best sports to do that, because those life lessons are out there in the field every day. My coaching staff and I are trying to wrap all of that into one significant thing. I think it's starting to resonate with these guys."

One of those examples is demonstrated by the POW-MIA decal the team has added to its helmets this season to honor the Prisoners of War Missing in Action. The team also plans to visit the soup kitchens in Covington and Newport as one of its practice times to give community service to those in need.

Another element to the culture that McLeid intends to improve is building a relationship with the Simon Kenton football program since the high school receives many of its students from Summit View.

"I have a good relationship with Simon Kenton head coach Jeff Marksberry and with his help, we've tried to build that bridge. It's been wonderful. Jeff is a great guy, he's been a great help to me and my kids, he has allowed me to bring my team up there to the varsity field and practice with his varsity team and coached by his coaching staff and that really got my kids excited. I want these kids to see what the next level is and what's in store for them when they move on to the next level."

McLeid wants to see success on the field, but he's more concerned about molding quality young people into good citizens once they grow up.

"We want to win, but we want to do it the right way."

AMERICANS ACCOUNTED FOR: The number of US personnel missing and unaccounted for from the Vietnam war is still 1,624. For various reasons, including wishes of the family, DoD announcements are often delayed far beyond the ID dates and sometimes not even made. The number of Americans now listed by DoD as returned and identified since the end of the Vietnam War in 1975 is 961. Another 63 US personnel, recovered by the US and identified before the end of the war, bring the total of US personnel accounted for from the Vietnam War to 1,024. Of the 1,624 still missing and unaccounted-for, 90% were lost in Vietnam or in areas of Cambodia and Laos under Vietnam's wartime control: Vietnam-1,266 (VN-467, VS-799); Laos-302; Cambodia-49; PRC territorial waters-7. These country-specific numbers can and do fluctuate when investigations result in changes to locations of loss. Since formation in 1970, the League has sought the return of all POWs, the fullest possible accounting for those still missing, and repatriation of all recoverable remains.

REPATRIATIONS OF REMAINS: On December 10th, remains that could be those of two US personnel missing and unaccounted-for from the Vietnam War, recovered during joint field operations in Laos were honored at a repatriation ceremony, attended by US Ambassador Dan Clune. On December 12th, remains believed to be those of four US personnel, also missing and unaccounted-for since the Vietnam War, were honored in a repatriation ceremony at Noi Bai International Airport in Hanoi. Some were turned over by civilian Vietnamese and others were recovered during field recovery operations in Vietnam. The four remains were reviewed by Vietnamese and American forensic specialists who determined the potential for identification. US Ambassador to Vietnam Ted Osius was joined by specialists from DPAA's Detachment 2 and the Vietnam Office for Seeking Missing Persons (VNOSMP) in honoring those repatriated. In remarks, Ambassador Osius reportedly expressed gratitude for the goodwill and increasingly efficient and effective cooperation being afforded by the Government of Vietnam. The League extends sincere appreciation to all - American and Vietnamese - for the policy and operational support and/or participation which contributed to this repatriation and looks forward to further expanding the level of effort that can lead to increased accounting results.

DPAA DIRECTOR VISITS CAMBODIA, LAOS & VIETNAM: DPAA Director Mike Linnington recently made his first trip to the three most directly engaged Vietnam War countries. He first briefly visited Cambodia, then made official calls in Vientiane, Laos, and flew by helicopter to visit DPAA and Lao personnel conducting field operations. He returned to Vientiane before going on to Hanoi to meet with senior officials there. He also visited DPAA and Vietnamese teams conducting field operations in Vietnam before flying back to the US, arriving in time for a DPAA-hosted Family Update in Portland, ME, on November 14th. On December 5th, Mr. Linnington briefed the Board of Directors on this important, introductory visit that came at a

time of ever-increasing bilateral political, economic and military-to-military cooperation. More information will be provided when available.

GOOD Caution-news: DPAA has now invited representatives of responsible national Veteran organizations to attend and observe briefings at DPAA-hosted POW/MIA Family Updates around the country. The League deeply appreciates the decision to again include our Veterans in these meetings. Though often general in content, the briefings given are firsthand and provided by responsible US officials. Since DPAA is stressing the importance of outreach and transparency, DPAA-hosted Updates provide an opportunity for both.

GENERAL FOGLESONG VISITS MOSCOW: US Chairman of the US-Russia Joint Commission on POW/MIA Affairs General Robert H. "Doc" Foglesong, USAF (Ret) traveled to Moscow to meet on November 9th with Russian Co-Chairman General Colonel Valery Vostrotin. The two Co-Chairs outlined their hope of renewing and restoring the work of the USRJC and noted the importance of the new Russian Office of the USRJC located in the Embassy of the Russian Federation in Washington, DC. This important office was opened in July, 2015, and is headed by Maxim N. Alekseev, an impressive Russian official with a diverse background and record of experience. The League welcomes this new initiative and looks forward to working with Mr. Alekseev and senior Russian officials in Moscow. It is past time to press forward and end the seemingly endless delays.

ACCOUNTING RESULTS: Although the pace of joint field recoveries and investigations related to the Vietnam War has resumed a higher level, the Vietnamese, in particular, have repeatedly called for increasing the pace and scope of such operations, in fact since 2009. At present, the political climate, regionally and bilaterally with Vietnam, lends itself to expanding cooperation across the board. Contact your elected officials and ensure they understand that there must be full funding, with increases as needed, including on qualified personnel, for the new Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA).

STATUS OF THE POW/MIA ISSUE: March 26, 2016

1,621 Americans are now listed by DoD as missing and unaccounted-for from the Vietnam War. Vietnam - 1,264 (VN-466, VS-798); Laos-301; Cambodia-49; Peoples Republic of China territorial waters-7. (These numbers occasionally fluctuate due to investigations resulting in changed locations of loss.) The League seeks the fullest possible accounting for those still missing and repatriation of all recoverable remains. The League's highest priority is accounting for Americans last known alive. Official intelligence indicates that Americans known to be in captivity in Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia were not returned at the end of the war. In the absence of evidence to the contrary, it must be assumed that these Americans could still be alive, and the US Government should not rule out that possibility.

Vietnam established comprehensive wartime and post-war processes to collect and retain information and remains; thus, unilateral efforts by them offered significant potential. Vietnam has since taken many unilateral actions that are welcome and appreciated, plus announced that there are no obstacles to full cooperation. Recently, Vietnam has increased implementation of commitments to provide long-sought archival records with relevant, caserelated information, thanks in part to improvement of working-level efforts, but primarily due to increased bilateral relations across the board. The early 2015 League Delegation brought commitments that offered real promise for increased success. First undertaken in northern Vietnam in 1985, joint field operations have dramatically changed and are now much more effective. Vietnamese officials are participating with greater seriousness and professionalism. achieving increased results, including both US-led Joint Excavation Teams and Vietnamese Recovery Teams (VRTs), led by Vietnamese and supported by a few US personnel. This formula allows a greater number of teams to "increase the pace and scope of field operations," as requested by Vietnam during discussions since 2009. Due to increased military-to-military cooperation, US Navy assets are now allowed to participate in underwater survey and recovery operations, when requested. These steps, long advocated by the League, are now coming to fruition and are routinely raised by US officials at all levels.

After a rough period, joint field operations in Laos are now increasingly productive, even though more difficult than elsewhere. Accounting efforts had slowed due to Lao Government inflexibility, attempting to over-price payment for helicopter support and denying permission for ground transport to accessible incident sites. Laos is now showing greater flexibility, earlier having increased the number of US personnel permitted in-country, now allowing ground transport to accessible sites, and has renewed a business license to a foreign company to provide reliable, small helicopter support. When helpful, Vietnamese witnesses are also allowed to participate in joint US-Lao operations. The Lao Government permits DIA's Stony Beach POW/MIA specialist to full time in-country; however, is still far too limited in terms of operating outside the confines of scheduled DPAA field operations. Also, despite strong

support from, and interventions by, US Ambassador Dan Clune, there are still challenges that must be addressed and resolved.

Related to DIA's Stony Beach Team, one Cambodia specialist works full time at the US Embassy in Phnom Penh, and research and field operations in Cambodia have received excellent support. Two Stony Beach personnel have for years rotated on temporary duty in and out of Vietnam, collecting information via archival research and interviews of potential witnesses. Vietnam was long ago requested to permit, and is still reportedly considering, permanent status for these two POW/MIA specialists. Successive US Ambassadors have strongly supported this important move, but increases in bilateral military relations should be sufficient to overcome any reluctance. The US Ambassador to Laos has also supported full use of the Lao specialist. It is hoped that the expanded bilateral relationships with Laos and Vietnam will mean these positive decisions will not be further delayed. The Stony Beach specialists are sorely needed to augment the investigation process while witnesses are still living and to facilitate locating additional incident sites for follow-up DPAA recoveries.

The greatest obstacles to increased Vietnam War and worldwide accounting efforts are 1) too few qualified scientists to lead recovery teams; and 2) unreliable funding that has caused US cancellation of scheduled operations, thus sending mixed, negative signals to foreign governments and counterparts. These challenges are being addressed by Mr. Michael Linnington, named to lead the "complete reorganization" of the accounting community directed by former Secretary of Defense Chuck Hagel. Since over 80% of US losses in Laos and 90% in Cambodia occurred in areas where Vietnam's forces operated during the war, Vietnam's expanded provision of helpful records, improved and increased archival research, interviews and field operations are the core means to expand accounting for Vietnam War missing personnel.

The Wall

A little history most people will never know.

Interesting Veterans Statistics off the Vietnam Memorial Wall.

There are 58,267 names now listed on that polished black wall, including those added in 2010.

The names are arranged in the order in which they were taken from us by date and within each date the names are alphabetized. It is hard to believe it is 57 years since the first casualty.

The first known casualty was Richard B. Fitzgibbon, of North Weymouth, Mass. Listed by the U.S. Department of Defense as having been killed on June 8, 1956. His name is listed on the Wall with that of his son, Marine Corps Lance Cpl. Richard B. Fitzgibbon III, who was killed on Sept. 7, 1965.

There are three sets of fathers and sons on the Wall. 39,996 on the Wall were just 22 or younger.

8,283 were just 19 years old.

The largest age group, 33,103 were 18 years old. 12 soldiers on the Wall were 17 years old.

5 soldiers on the Wall were 16 years old.

One soldier, PFC Dan Bullock was 15 years old.

997 soldiers were killed on their first day in Vietnam .. 1,448 soldiers were killed on their last day in Vietnam ..

31 sets of brothers are on the Wall.

Thirty one sets of parents lost two of their sons.

54 soldiers attended Thomas Edison High School in Philadelphia . I wonder why so many from one school.

8 Women are on the Wall, Nursing the wounded.

244 soldiers were awarded the Medal of Honor during the Vietnam War; 153 of them are on the Wall.

Beallsville, Ohio with a population of 475 lost 6 of her sons.

West Virginia had the highest casualty rate per capita in the nation. There are 711 West Virginians on the Wall.

The Marines of Morenci - They led some of the scrappiest high school football and basketball teams that the little Arizona copper town of Morenci (pop. 5,058) had ever known and cheered. They enjoyed roaring beer busts. In quieter moments, they rode horses along the Coronado Trail, stalked deer in the Apache National Forest. And in the patriotic camaraderie typical of Morenci's mining families, the nine graduates of Morenci High enlisted as a group in the Marine Corps. Their service began on Independence Day, 1966. Only 3 returned home.

The Buddies of Midvale - LeRoy Tafoya, Jimmy Martinez, Tom Gonzales were all boyhood friends and lived on three consecutive streets in Midvale, Utah on Fifth, Sixth and Seventh avenues. They lived only a few yards apart. They played ball at the adjacent sandlot ball field. And they all went to Vietnam . In a span of 16 dark days in late 1967, all three would be killed. LeRoy was killed on Wednesday, Nov. 22, the fourth anniversary of John F. Kennedy's assassination. Jimmy died less than 24 hours later on Thanksgiving Day. Tom was shot dead assaulting the enemy on Dec. 7, Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day.

The most casualty deaths for a single day was on January 31, 1968 ~ 245 deaths.

The most casualty deaths for a single month was May 1968 - 2,415 casualties were incurred.

For most Americans who read this they will only see the numbers that the Vietnam War created. To those of us who survived the war, and to the families of those who did not, we see the faces, we feel the pain that these numbers created. We are, until we too pass away, haunted with these numbers, because they were our friends, fathers, husbands, wives, sons and daughters. There are no noble wars, just noble warriors.

Please pass this on to those who served during this time, and those who DO Care.


