

Q: What actions have been taken regarding policies and procedures since the 2013 revelation of Dr. Hagmann's actions?

A: Several policy and procedure adjustments were instituted to ensure optimal oversight and educational outcomes.

1. The USU Department of Military and Emergency Medicine, within the School of Medicine, immediately developed a new course, Advanced Combat Medical Skills (ACME), to replace curriculum from the OEMS course;
2. The School of Medicine consolidated student operational experiences in to 12 opportunities, all vetted by multiple senior faculty or with onsite faculty supervision;
3. The USU Department of Military and Emergency Medicine developed a memorandum of agreement with the USU Commandant's office to share joint oversight and responsibility of student travel during operational experiences (attached);
4. The School of Medicine added language to the Student Handbook reinforcing the option of opting out of personal clinical procedures and examinations (attached);
5. A Dean's Policy Memorandum (DPM) was executed to promote positive learning behaviors and address alleged student mistreatment (attached);
6. The School of Medicine advanced a leadership program based largely upon emotional intelligence (attached);
7. The USU Department of Emergency Medicine, within the School of Medicine, stood up an educational committee meeting once a month where curriculum is carefully vetted and reviewed;
8. The USU Department of Emergency and Military Medicine has established a monthly leadership meeting with the School of Medicine Office of Student Affairs and the Commandant's office to implement, assess, and modify the new leadership curriculum;

Q: Can the University share the final disposition of the DCIS investigation?

A: The University was formally informed that the DCIS investigation has been closed. Because the investigation and related documents do not belong to the University, we cannot serve as a release authority or provide additional information related to the investigation. All inquiries related to the DCIS investigation must go through DCIS.

Q: Can the University confirm any redacted names if the media proposes any specific attribution to any comments or statements in the FOIA documents provided?

A: Since the University is not the release authority for the redacted FOIA documents, the University can neither confirm nor deny any proposed names to the redacted document content. The release authority of these documents is the DoD Office of Freedom Information.
