





As a senior faculty member, I have maintained an active research agenda while taking on leadership roles and significant service responsibilities and while teaching courses on Latin American politics, international security, and comparative politics.

Research: My scholarly work focuses on democratization and the rule of law in Latin America, Western Hemisphere security, and U.S. policy toward the region. I strive to remain a leader in the field of democratic consolidation, and my research continues to explore how nascent democracies build the rule of law. Other scholars of democratization now apply my theory of political fragmentation to cases in Latin America, Asia, and Africa. My Stanford University Press book, scholarly articles, and chapters are required reading for courses at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. I also publish on defense policy and security strategy. For instance, my 2012 *Joint Forces Quarterly* article is based on the premise that the integration of human rights and public security into a single coherent agenda is of critical importance for stability and democracy in Latin America and the Caribbean. Recent presentations include Combating Gang Violence in the Caribbean: Lessons from Central America's Northern Triangle, The Militarization of Law Enforcement: Integrating Human Rights and Citizen Security, and Preventing a Regional Arms Race: Trust and Transparency.

Leadership and Service: I have sought leadership positions and meaningful service activities at USNA. My colleagues in the Political Science Department elected me to serve as their representative on the Faculty Senate. My fellow Senators then elected me twice to serve on the Senate Executive Committee. I twice served as Faculty Chair for the Naval Academy Foreign Affairs Conference (NAFAC), which involved planning and oversight of one of the largest undergraduate foreign affairs conferences in the world. NAFAC is a week-long conference with year-round planning and an annual budget of over \$100,000 (not including in-kind contributions). Responsibilities include developing a conference theme (Beyond Borders: Latin America and Caribbean Basin in the 21st Century and Bridging the Gap: Combating Global Poverty), securing speakers, and selecting substantive topics for fourteen roundtables. NAFAC's annual participants include over 150 students from around the world, over 20 civilian and military advisors, and VIP speakers. I brought in important policy and academic speakers, including Ambassador Luigi Einaudi, Senator Christopher Dodd, Admiral James Stavridis, Dr. Paul Farmer, Dr. Paul Collier, and Nicholas Negroponte. The Dean selected me to serve on the USNA Admissions Board, which is a high profile, demanding responsibility. In addition, I helped found and grow the Latin American Studies Forum at USNA, which creates opportunities for midshipmen who are interested in the region. The Forum brings in speakers from a diverse set of disciplines to share their knowledge with the midshipmen. In the Political Science Department, I have contributed heavily to hiring decisions.

Teaching: My courses are among the most popular in the Political Science Department and are known for their rigor. I have developed and taught a variety of courses, including U.S.-Latin American Relations, Latin American Politics, Western Hemisphere Security, Democratization, and Transnational Criminal Networks.

I also coordinated the document with representatives from the State Department and the U.S. Agency for International Development. In Brazil, discussions with the U.S. Ambassador, the Brazilian Minister of Defense, academics, and civil society members focused on the implications of Brazil's status as an emerging global power. In Colorado Springs and El Paso, TX, we had in-depth conversations with the USNORTHCOM Commander and DEA, ATF, FBI, and Border Control agents. Whenever I travel to the USSOUTHCOM area of responsibility, I interact closely with our country teams, which has provided insight into the interagency process.

Public Speaking: I have developed extensive experience speaking on panels and to large audiences on a variety of topics relevant to security, defense policy, human rights, and democracy. Recent panel participation includes gang violence and illicit trafficking in the Caribbean and effective U.S. military support for Central America's fight against transnational organized crime.

Professional Recognition and Awards: I have received multiple grants to conduct research in Latin America, including a Fulbright Scholarship, an American Political Science Association Grant, and a Tinker Foundation Grant. I have also been recognized for excellence in teaching at both the Naval Academy and Stanford University.





Prior to his election to the U.S. Senate, Hagel worked in the private sector as the President of McCarthy & Co., an investment banking firm based in Omaha, Nebraska, and served as Chairman of the Board of American Information Systems (AIS). Before joining McCarthy & Co., Hagel was President and Chief Executive Officer of the Private Sector Council (PSC) in Washington, D.C.; Chief Operating Officer of the 1990 Economic Summit of Industrialized Nations (G-7 Summit); and President and Chief Executive Officer of the World USO.

In the mid-1980's, Hagel co-founded VANGUARD Cellular Systems, Inc., a publicly traded corporation. In 1981, President Ronald Reagan nominated Hagel to serve as Deputy Administrator of the Veterans Administration, a nomination confirmed by the United States Senate. Hagel also served as Deputy Commissioner General of the United States for the 1982 World's Fair. 



As Commander of the Texas Military Forces and Adjutant General for the State of Texas, I am responsible to the Governor of Texas for providing ready trained forces of the Texas Army Guard, the Texas Air Guard, the Texas State Guard, and the Adjutant General's Department, better known as the Texas Military Forces, in support of state operations. I am also responsible to the President of the United States for providing ready trained forces of the Texas Army Guard and the Texas Air Guard in support of federal missions. I am responsible for the readiness, training, bealth and welfare of approximately 25,000 military service members, federal technicians, and state employees and a budget in excess of \$600 million.

Since appointed as Adjutant General of the Texas Military Forces in April 2009 we have deployed approximately 5,000 (over 12,000 since August 2007) service members to Operations Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom in the US Central Command Area of Focus and supported additional missions in the US Southern Command, US Pacific Command and US European Command Areas of Focus. We formalized a new State Partnership with the Republic of Chile in 2009, continued the existing State Partnership with the Czech Republic, conducted over 50 military-

to-military engagements with each country, and trained numerous CH-47 Chinook pilots of the Singapore Air Force through Operation Peace Prairie. In addition to the continuous counterdrug support to federal agencies with our Joint Counterdrug Task Force, we deployed 286 personnel out 1,200 personnel authorized by the US President to support DHS's Customs and Border Protection agents in securing the US/Mexico border and which our personnel have been attributed with the seizure of over 3,600 lbs of drugs and the apprehension of over 600 illegal immigrants to date. The Texas Military Forces have provided over 45,000 person-days of Defense Support to Civil Authorities (DSCA) during State emergencies for hurricane, flood, wildfire and ice storm support. Texas State Guard personnel provided invaluable support to the State by planning, coordinating and executing, in conjunction with the Department of State Health Services, the largest humanitarian assistance exercise in the nation by providing over 55,000 medical services to approximately 13,000 uninsured Texas residents along the Lower Rio Grande Valley each year in 2009 and 2010. I resourced Texas's Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, and Explosive (CBRNE) Enhanced Response Force Package (CERFP) for success and validated it as capable of responding to a CBRNE event for the first time since its inception in 2005. Texas's Civil Support Team continued its validation as a first response force capable of identifying hazardous substances during an emergency event. Through Texas's National Guard Challenge Program, we graduated approximately 400 at-risk youths with a high school diploma. These at-risk youths have dramatically changed their lives and have gone on to lead productive lives to include service in the armed forces. I worked with staff to develop the first ever Joint Strategic Plan with the vision and value-based metrics to poise the Texas Military Forces for success for the next 20 years. We competed in the Army's Community of Excellence Program and attained 1st and 2nd Place in the Gold Division in 2010 and 2011, respectively.

As the Commanding General for the division, I commanded and controlled (C2) over 15,000 soldiers in the division's headquarters and seven major subordinate commands and administered a budget of approximately \$400 million. 
ever changing Defense Acquisition chinate as required by the Under Secretary of Defense's (Acquisition, Technology and Logistics)

Mark Ribbing

In August 2009, Mark Ribbing was appointed by the Obama administration to serve as Special Assistant to Secretary of the Navy Ray Mabus. In this role, Ribbing works in the office of the Navy's Chief of Information, helping the service develop effective public-communication strategies in support of its programs and operations worldwide.

Since joining the administration, Ribbing has produced policy memoranda and briefing materials on some of the most vital issues facing the Navy and Marine Corps, including ballistic-missile defense, international energy strategy, and the evolving Asia-Pacific security landscape.

When President Obama tapped Secretary Mabus to oversee the long-term environmental and economic restoration of the Gulf Coast in the aftermath of the Deepwater Horizon oil spill, Ribbing joined the Secretary's Gulf Coast Recovery Team. He participated in environmental-policy deliberations with White House staff; organized public meetings for Secretary Mabus in Louisiana; and wrote speeches for the Secretary and other administration officials.

A native of Missouri, Ribbing attended Yale College, where he graduated in 1992 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in history. In 1995, he received a Juris Doctor degree from Columbia Law School, with certification from the Parker School of Foreign and Comparative Law.

After working briefly as a lawyer and editorialist for the Lehman Communications Corporation, a Colorado newspaper group, Ribbing joined *The Baltimore Sun* in 1997 as a reporter covering the deregulation and expansion of the telecommunications and high-technology industries.

In April 2001, he became a senior speechwriter for New York Mayor Rudolph Giuliani, writing on the full span of topics facing the leader of the nation's largest city. From September 11 until the end of the mayor's term on December 31, Ribbing worked to help meet the unprecedented communication needs arising from the terrorist attack at the World Trade Center.

Ribbing then returned to his original hometown of St. Louis, where he joined the staff of Mayor Francis Slay. Ribbing worked as a speechwriter and crime-policy aide, and became involved in the administration's deepening efforts to reform the city's public-school system. He left City Hall to focus on this issue, serving as the startup project manager for a public charter school. While in St. Louis, Ribbing served in the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary, participating in security patrols on the Mississippi River.

In 2007, Ribbing joined a Washington, DC-based think tank, the Progressive Policy Institute. As PPI's director of policy development, he drew upon his experience in law, government and journalism to formulate, write and edit policy materials across a broad range of subject areas.

Along with PPI President Will Marshall, Ribbing co-edited the book *Memos to the New President*, a collection of policy prescriptions written by leading experts in defense, energy, education, and other fields. Ribbing's articles have appeared in numerous publications, including *The Wall Street Journal, The Christian Science Monitor*, and *U.S. News and World Report*.

Alan F. Estevez

Principal Deputy Under Secretary of Defense for Acquisition, Technology and Logistics

Alan Estevez was confirmed by the Senate as the Principal Deputy Under Secretary of Defense for Acquisition, Technology and Logistics in October 2013.

As the Principal Deputy Under Secretary of Defense for Acquisition, Technology and Logistics, Mr. Estevez develops and implements strategies, policies, and programs that increase the Department's warfighting capabilities, management efficiency, and buying power in support of the Warfighter. Mr. Estevez supports the Under Secretary of Defense in all matters related to acquisition; logistics and materiel readiness; research and engineering; nuclear, chemical, and biological weapons; operational energy; installations and environment; and the defense industrial base.

Prior to his current appointment, Mr. Estevez held several key positions within the Office of the Secretary of Defense. From August 2011, when he was confirmed by the Senate, to October 2013, Mr. Estevez served as the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Logistics and Materiel Readiness. In this position, he was responsible for providing world class military logistics support to the men and women of the United States Armed Forces and managing a budget of over \$170 billion in logistics operations. He was the first career Federal official to hold this position. Mr. Estevez served as the Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Logistics and Materiel Readiness from November 2006 and performed the duties of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Logistics and Materiel Readiness from April 2009 to August 2011.

From October 2002 to November 2006, Mr. Estevez was the Assistant Deputy Under Secretary of Defense for Supply Chain Integration and was responsible for developing global defense supply chain management and distribution policies. From 1981 to 2002, Mr. Estevez held positions of increasing responsibility within the Office of the Secretary of Defense, the Department of the Army, and the Military Traffic Management Command.

Over the course of his career, Mr. Estevez has received the DoD Distinguished Public Service Medal, the DoD Distinguished Civilian Service Medal, the 2011 Presidential Rank Distinguished Executive Award, the 2006 Presidential Rank Meritorious Executive Award, two Office of the Secretary of Defense Medals for Meritorious Civilian Service (2005 and 2009), and the 2005 Service to America Medal. He was inducted into the Senior Executive Service in October 2002.

Mr. Estevez is a graduate of Rutgers University in New Brunswick, New Jersey, where he earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Political Science. He also holds a Master of Science degree in National Resource Strategy from the Industrial College of the Armed Forces (now the Eisenhower School) at the National Defense University, Washington, DC.

Assistant Secretary of Defense for Special Operations/Low-Intensity Conflict & Interdependent Capabilities

Michael G. ("Mike") Vickers was nominated as Assistant Secretary of Defense for Special Operations/Low-Intensity Conflict & Interdependent Capabilities by President Bush on April 4, 2007, and was unanimously confirmed by the U.S. Senate on July 23, 2007. President Ohama announced on February 26, 2009, that Mr. Vickers would continue to serve as ASD (SO/LIC&IC).

Mr. Vickers is the senior civilian advisor to the Secretary of Defense on the operational employment and capabilities of special operations forces. He is also the senior civilian adviser on counterterrorism, irregular warfare, counternarcotics, and special activities. In his Interdependent Capabilities role, he advises the Secretary of Defense on the operational employment and capabilities of strategic and conventional forces.

Prior to his appointment as ASD (SO/LIC&IC), Mr. Vickers served as Senior Vice President, Strategic Studies, at the Center for Strategic and Budgetary Assessments (CSBA). From 1973 to 1986, Mr. Vickers served as an Army Special Forces Non-Commissioned Officer, Special Forces Officer, and CIA Operations Officer. During this period, Mr. Vickers had operational and combat experience in Central America and the Caribbean, the Middle East, and Central and South Asia. His operational experience spans covert action and espionage, unconventional warfare, counterterrorism (including hostage rescue operations), counterinsurgency, and foreign internal defense. During the mid-1980s, Mr. Vickers was the principal strategist for the largest covert action program in the CIA's history: the paramilitary operation that drove the Soviet army out of Afghanistan.

Mr. Vickers received his B.A., with honors, from the University of Alabama. He also holds an MBA from the Wbarton School of the University of Pennsylvania.

Andrew C. Weber

Assistant Secretary of Defense for Nuclear, Chemical, and Biological Defense Programs

The Honorable Andrew C. Weber is the principal advisor to the Secretary of Defense, the Deputy Secretary of Defense, and the Under Secretary of Defense for Acquisition, Technology and Logistics for matters concerning nuclear, chemical, and biological defense programs (NCB). The NCB mission is to prevent, protect against, and respond to these global threats. Mr. Weber is the Staff Director of the Nuclear Weapons Council, which manages the nuclear weapons stockpile, and he oversees the Defense Threat Reduction Agency and the Nunn-Lugar Cooperative Threat Reduction Program.

Since taking office, Mr. Weber has overseen an expansion of Nunn-Lugar programs into new regions, including the Middle East, Africa and the Asia-Pacific. The program has supported the elimination of chemical weapons in Libya and Syria. He has also focused on reform of the nation's biodefense enterprise. His nuclear duties include executing President Obama's direction to ensure a safe, secure, and effective nuclear weapons stockpile, and to prevent nuclear terrorism.

Prior to his appointment by President Obama, Mr. Weber served for 13 years as an Adviser for Threat Reduction Policy in the Office of the Secretary of Defense. He played a key role in Nunn-Lugar operations to remove weapons grade uranium from Kazakhstan and Georgia, and nuclear capable MiG-29 aircraft from Moldova. Mr. Weber also developed and oversaw the Department of Defense Biological Threat Reduction Program.

Most of Mr. Weber's 28 years of public service have been dedicated to reducing the threat of weapons of mass destruction proliferation and terrorism. He served previously as a United States Foreign Service Officer, with diplomatic assignments in Saudi Arabia, Germany, Kazakhstan, and Hong Kong.

From 2002 through 2008 Mr. Weber taught a course on Force & Diplomacy at the Edmund A. Walsh Graduate School of Foreign Service at Georgetown University. He has a Master of Science in Foreign Service degree from Georgetown and is a graduate of Cornell University. Mr. Weber speeks Russian and is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.
