

Prowess For America and (Ret.) Lt. Gen. Buck Bedard:

BACKGROUND: Progress for America, Inc. ("PFA) is an issue advocacy/grassroots organization committed to representing a diverse coalition of concerned citizens, businesses, nonprofit organizations and community leaders who promote public policies that improve the lives of every American. It's a nonprofit501(c)(4). PFA promotes nonpartisan, conservative policies that improve the quality of life for the American people.

PFA Leadership: PFA was founded by <u>Tonv Feather</u>. Feather began his "campaign career over **25** years ago and has since worked in the campaigns of many Republican elected officials. He has served as Executive Director of the Missouri Republican Party, and was appointed by former Republican National Committee Chairman Haley Barbour to be his Midwest Regional Coordinator, overseeing nine Mid-western states. As the Midwest Coordinator, [Feather] was responsible for design and implementation of telephone and mail voter contact programs."

Television ads: In Sept., PFA produced four television advertisements supportive of President Bush's leadership and the dangers of terrorists. Previously, the group ran ads supportive of tax relief and Social Security reform.

Retired Lt. Gen. Emil"Buck" Bedard: On Sept. 19,2006, PFA announced a television ad featuring "Lieutenant General Emil R. "Buck" Bedard (Ret.), a three-stargeneral that was stationed in the Pentaaonon 9-11 is the voice in the ad, and calls these attacks "cold-blooded murders." The ad is airing on national cable and broadcast television in Missouri. During his 37 years in active duty, Gen. Bedard remembers the terror attacks that predate 9-11, including the Israeli 1972 Olympic Team murdered in Munich, the 1979 Iran Hostage Crisis, Marines killed by radical Islamists in Beirut, Americans killed in Nairobi, and the bombing of the USS Cole. "Americans think the War on Terror is something new," says Gen. Bedard, and, "they're wrong." In the ad Gen. Bedard also warms, "These people want to kill us because we are Americans."

Bedard In the Media: Bedard does very little media. He is on several corporate boards, including the Mobilisa wireless and mobile company, and occasionally does speaking engagements, mostly at university commencements.

Top PFA contributors: Univisionowner <u>Jerry Perenchio</u> donated "\$<u>4 million</u>...to a group called Progrose for Amorica, which runs slick ade supporting the war in Iraq." (HoustonChroniele, 9/28/06)

Overall fundraising: "The <u>Progress for America</u> Voter Fund, which raised \$45 million in 2004 and ran ads supportive of Mr. Bush, <u>received only \$25 in contributions during the first half of 2006."</u> (The New York Sun, 9/15/06)

Recommendation: We reach out to Gen. Bedard and ask if he is interested in being part of an outreach/surrogate operation.

United States Marine Corps (Ret.)

Lieutenant General Emil R. BedardLast Position Filled Deputy Commandant for Plans, Policies, and Operations



Effective 1 December, 2003, Lieutenant General Emil R. "Buck" Bedard retired with over 37 years of active duty service.

General Bedard graduated from the University of North Dakota in 1967. In addition to holding a M.S. degree, General Bedard's formal military education includes the U.S. Army Advanced Infantry Course in 1973, Armed Forces Staff College in 1980, and Army War College in 1986.

General Bedard was commissioned a second lieutenant on December 1,1967, and designated an infantry officer. While a lieutenant he served **as** a rifle platoon commander and company executive officer with 2d Battalion, 27th Marines and 3d Battalion, 3d Marines in the Republic of Vietnam. Subsequently, he was ordered to Quantico, Virginia, where he served **as** Commander and Staff Officer with Schools Demonstrations Troops.

As a captain he was assigned to the **U.S.** Army Intelligence School **as** an instructor and served **as** a company commander in the 3d Marine Division, Okinawa, Japan. He was also the Marine Officer Instructor on the NROTC *Staff* at Vanderbilt University and a platoon and company commander at the Marine Corps Officer Candidate School, Quantico, Virginia.

As a major he served **as** Logistics Officer, 7th Marines and Executive Officer, 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines.

Promoted to lieutenant colonel, he served as Assistant Operations Officer, I Marine Amphibious Force, G-3 and Pacific Plans Officer, G-5. Assigned to NATO in Holland, he served in the Central Region operations division in charge of reinforcement operations of allied forces to Central Europe.

Upon promotion to colonel he was reassigned to Twentynine Palms, California, where he directed the Combined Arms Exercise Program at the Marine Corps Air Ground Combat Center. He became Assistant G-3 for Operations for the 7th Marine Expeditionary Brigade and the 1st Marine Expeditionary Force during Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm. From May 1991 through June 1993, he commanded the 7th Marine Regiment, which deployed to Somalia in December 1992. In July 1993, he was assigned as the Assistant Division Commander for the 1st Marine Division, Camp Pendleton, California. In October 1993, he was assigned as J-3 Operations Officer, Joint Task Force, Somalia.

In June 1994, he was advanced to brigadier general and was assigned as the President, Marine Corps University/Commanding General, Marine Corps Schools, Marine Corps Combat Development Command, Quantico. Virginia. He was assigned as the Deputy Commander, Marine Forces Pacific, Camp H.M. Smith, Hawaii in June 1995. Assuming command of 2d Marine Division in July 1997, General Bedard was promoted to major general on September 1, 1997. He relinquished command of 2d Marine Division in June 1999 and assumed command of II Marine Expeditionary Force in July 1999. On June 29, 2000, General Bedard relinquished command of II Marine Expeditionary Force.

On 25 July, 2000 he was advanced to lieutenant general and assumed the duties as the Deputy Commandant for Plans, Policies, and Operations, Headquarters, U.S. Marine Corps, Washington, D.C.

His awards and decorations include the Distinguished Service Medal, Defense Superior Service Medal, Legion of Merit (with gold star in lieu of 2d award), Bronze **Star** (with Combat V), Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Air Medal with 18 Strike/Flight awards, Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal (with Combat V and 2 gold stars in lieu of subsequent awards), Army Commendation Medal, Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal and the Combat Action Ribbon.

Europe must not turn coward in Afghanistan, says US envoy

By David Rennie in Brussels (Filed: 29/09/2006)

The American ambassador to Kabul has accused European members of Nato of jeopardising the future of the alliance by refusing to send troops to Afghanistan, or banning their forces from entering areas with heavy fighting.



Ronald Neumann, who has survived **two** attempts on his life this year, said <u>European nations must not</u> turn <u>"coward" and "run away" from fighting terrorism in Afghanistan.</u>



In an interview with the German magazine Der Spiegel, Mr Neumann said some Europeans "obviously resist the idea that you have an army in order to fight. And I have very little patience for that".

The ambassador spoke as defence ministers from the 26-nation Nato alliance came under unprecedented pressure at a meeting in Slovenia to provide more troops to the multinational force trying to prop up the authority of the Afghan government amid a resurgence of Taliban activity.

Last night the ministers agreed a major expansion of Nato's mission into the volatile east of Afghanistan — but their agreement

owed nothing to European willingness to offer more troops. Instead, ministers simply agreed to place some 12,000 mostly **US** forces, already in the region, under Nato command.

The move will place US troops in eastern Afghanistan under the command of a British officer. Lt Gen David Richards — the largest number to be under foreign command since the Second World War.

In Germany the lower house of parliament voted by a large margin to extend the peacekeeping mandate of the 2,750 German troops serving with Nato for a further year.

The German foreign minister, Frank-Walter Steinmeier, told the Bundestag that Nato had no choice but to stay. "Afghanistan is only lost if we give it up," he said.

Des Browne, Britain's Defence Secretary, praised Poland for rushing forward the deployment of 900 troops to Nato's International Security Assistance Force (ISAF), but said he would be urging other nations to think about doing more.

"Allies must step up to the plate to meet our collective commitment to support the government and people of Afghanistan," he said.

However, even as Mr Browne headed for Slovenia, Spanish officials briefed the Madrid press that their government — in conjunction with France, Germany and Belgium — had seen off a request from the military commander of Nato, Gen lames Jones, to mobilise ground forces from the

"Eurocorps" - a rapid reaction force made up of troops from several European nations.

Spanish sources told El Pais newspaper that the four European nations had told Gen Jones the rapid reaction force was for unforeseen emergencies, and not for propping up an existing mission.

Spain's Socialist government also refused to send more troops, or to move any of its 750 armed forces now in western Afghanistan to the south, where British, Canadian and Dutch forces have been pounded by enemy attacks.

Mr Neumann criticised the "caveats" placed on forces from Germany, Norway, Belgium and other nations — variously keeping them away from the south, away from heavy combat zones, or forbidding them from going out at night.

He said: "If you can't fight in the place that produced al-Qa'eda and September 11 and a series of terrorist attacks in Europe, what is the point?"



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

The Army has improved its systems for ensuring that dwell time is broken for an active-duty soldier only when there is truly an urgent need.

The Army has had a dwell policy in place for several years that requires approval by the first General Officer in the chain of command to break a soldier's dwell time. With the advent of the assignment of Soldiers directly to transition teams, the first General Officer in charge of all enlisted or officer assignments now approves all reassignment actions which involve a break in dwell time.

The Army has modified personnel records to track dwell time.

Moreover, in April of this year we changed transition team assignments so they are considered permanent changes of station. This will enhance the ability to track soldiers on return, and assist in the protection of dwell time.

A **final** step is needed for those assigned as Individual Augmentees. These are now typically temporary duty assignments, which means that their dwell time is more difficult to manage. I will work with the Chairman and the Military Departments to change their status.

SUBJECT: Security Clearances and High-Level Language Skills (TAB A)

- United States security clearances generally require: I) U.S.citizenship and 2) that any foreign attachments be examined and evaluated by a trained adjudicator.
- Native speakers may have relatives, friends, investments, or property in their native country & other foreign countries. These are defined as potential risk factors requiring additional time and resources in the background investigation and adjudication process. Delays may last up to 18-24 months.
- Tension also occurs when a U. S. citizen has lived abroad and acquired foreign friends and associates. This affects the timeliness of our hiring of participants in the National Security Education Program. This government program funds students to study culture and language abroad in return for a commitment to federal service.
- Possible solutions to these issues include:
 - A Limited Access Authorization process, granting access to limited operational information based on a streamlined process.
 - Processing National Security Education Program award recipients for clearance when the fellowship is awarded rather than waiting for later government appointment. Current policy is that one must have a particular position is ra government organization before this process is engaged. Granting clearances before a government appointment would require a change to policy in the Executive Order.
 - o I will also engage the Personnel Security and Research Center as a source of additional ideas.

SUBJECT: Security Clearances for Those with High-Level Language Skills

- You asked us to come back to you with a plan to move the ball down the field resolve the security clearance issues that keep the Department from hiring individuals with much needed high-level language skills (Tab A).
- Our plan, detailed in the attached information paper, targets the most potent talent pools: 1) U.S. citizens participating in DoD education programs; and 2) U.S. citizens of heritage communities applying for DoD positions with language requirements.
- The major actions in the short-term plan require us to revise the Adjudicator Desktop Reference; train adjudicators and enable them to consult with cultural experts during the adjudication process; and scrub both Intelligence and non-Intelligence positions for valid language and clearance level requirements. In this way we can flag these positions for expedited hiring and clearance processing.
- The long-term plan requires us to partner with the Office of Personnel Management and Central Adjudicating Facilities to identify ways to modify the Office of Personnel Management's investigation questions to expedite the follow-on adjudication process; establish Central Adjudicating Facilities teams to handle our two priority populations; and identify entry level positions in which to place graduates of DoD-sanctioned education programs toward the goal of developing a career path.
- We have already initiated actions and will keep you apprised of our progress.

ACTIONS TO ACQUIRE HIGH PROFICIENCY LANGUAGE SKILLS

Background: The inability to have individuals with high proficiency language skills hired due to security clearance adjudication standards has surfaced in several forums:

- The Defense Human Resources Board, chaired by Under Secretary Personnel and Readiness, and attended by the DoD and Service Under Secretaries, Vice Chiefs of the Services and Joint Staff, have discussed this issue during several meetings since 2003.
- In recent years, the National Security Education Program has been unable to place DoD grant recipiknts who have been immersed in foreign cultures (as part of their mandated course of studies) due to clearance standards under the foreign influence category.
- The struggle with meeting clearance standards has become so pervasive the Office of the Director of National Intelligence will convene in mid-October a Human Capital Security Summit to address this issue for the Intelligence community.

Issue: Two areas of security clearance adjudicative guidelines negatively impact DoD success in hiring persons with high language skills: foreign influence and foreign preference.

Short-term Actions:

 - Establish a process to identify coded language positions for "special handling" during the hiring and security clearance;
 - Work with Components to conduct a hiring pilot for a sample of language positions to develop and document an improved hiring process model;
 - Promulgate best practices from the hiring pilot;
 - Oversee hiring processes for these language coded positions to ensure effectiveness of the process.

Long-term Actions:

- USD(P&R) will by June 2007:
 - Work with the Components to identify term placement opportunities for National Security Education Program graduates.

- BRAC 2005 Results:
 - o The 111th Fighter Wing, currently stationed at Willow Grove, will have its A-IO aircraft and associated operations/maintenance manpower redistributed.
 - o PA ANG will maintain an enclave on Willow Grove, to be contiguous with a new Armed Forces Reserve Center (AFRC).
- The Air Force is currently considering three initiatives for the PA ANG as part of its Total Force Integration plan:
 - o Establishment of a Warfighting Headquarters Augmentation Unit at Willow Grove (proposed, pending approval of FY08 POM):
 - Establishment of an Air Support Operations Squadron at Ft. Indiantown Gap (approved, FY08 POM);
 - o Strengthening the current RED HORSE (engineer) Squadron at Ft. Indiantown Gap (proposed).
- None of the three potential initiatives will bring a flying mission to Willow Grove, nor will they necessarily require the use of the Willow Grove airfield.

- In his letter, Governor Bush advised Deputy Secretaries England and Jackson that:

 - The United States needs a nationwide communications network that is interoperable across jurisdictions.
 - He appreciates DoD and DHS efforts "to develop requirements for buildout of approved satellite and ground based systems" in support of the Federal Communications Commission's Order FCC 05-204.
- The FCC Order reallocated 20 megahertz of spectrum in the 2 GHz mobile satellite service band to two providers, TMI Communications and ICO Satellite Services (TAB B). DoD and DHS are working to examine potential usage for the reallocated mobile satellite services bandwidth.
- The Defense Continuity and Crisis Management Office is leading the Department's efforts.
- Proposed "requirements for build-out" will support first responders operating during day-to-day and emergency operations.
- TerreStar™ (TMI spun off commercial satellite provider) proposed a network covering CONUS, Alaska, Hawaii, Canada, and Northern Mexico.
- The Defense Information Systems Agency established a Cooperative Research and Development Agreement (CRDA) with TerreStarTM to develop requirements for a satellite based communications system and explore enhanced contingency operations.

Thank you for your letter regarding the Department's efforts to develop requirements for approved satellite and ground based communications systems in support of the Federal Communications Commission's decision. State and local responders are the nation's first responders to any disaster. Therefore, their ability to interface with our nationwide communications systems is critical to ensuring a rapid response.

The Department of Defense will continue to work closely with the Department of Homeland Security in developing communications requirements. Recently, the Defense Information Systems Agency entered into a cooperative research and development agreement with a company offering an integrated satellite and cell tower-based system, the North American Emergency Response Communications Network. Although no single technology can resolve all nationwide communications system issues, emerging technologies hold great promise for creating interoperable and redundant solutions.

The Department of Defense will continue implementing communications capabilities to obtain situational awareness and enable decision-making in response to national security and emergency preparedness requirements. As this process goes forward, I welcome any additional comments regarding capabilities you would like to see in a nationwide communications network.

- Assigned, to each, a total of 20 megahertz of spectrum in the 2 GHz mobile satellite service (MSS) band, or 10 megahertz in the uplink band and 10 megahertz in the downlink band
- Modifications consistent with the Commission's authority with respect to licenses under Section 316 of the Communications Act
- Modifying these two spectrum reservations will facilitate ICO's and TMI's provision of public safety and rural broadband services, and allow them to compete effectively in the market for mobile telecommunications services to the benefit of US, consumers.

- Single, unified radio network that meets the radio voice communications needs of state law enforcement officers and agencies throughout the state of Florida.

- "Because of this unique private-public partnership arrangement, the state has saved more than \$600 million and due to the great work of M/A-COM and the other SLEW partners, we now have a statewide radio system that is the envy and marvel of the rest of the country," said Florida Governor Jeb Bush at an event in Miami held on July 14, 2006 announcing the completion of the SLERS voice system. "By providing a single system, Florida is able to provide law enforcement officers responding to an emergency with a more efficient means of communications and the ability to talk to one another in real time."
- SLERS accommodates more than 6,500 users with 14,000 radios in patrol cars, boats, motorcycles and aircraft wherever they are in the state. SLERS consists of an all-digital radio network covering 60,000 square miles (including 25 miles offshore).
- While other states use multiple methods and systems for public safety communication,
 Florida's law enforcement officers can now immediately contact every local and state
 agency through the SLERS system. This positions Florida at the forefront of emergency and
 disaster communications, creating a national model for innovative, statewide public safety
 communications technology and planning.
- This standardized communications system was tested successfully during the 2004 and 2005 hurricane seasons. Now all of Florida's public safety personnel will have access to the statewide system, providing quicker response time and increased communication before, during and after emergency situations.





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NATO Chief Denies Quotes in Woodward Book

Jim Jones, the four-star Marine general who heads NATO, denies a quote in Bob Woodward's latest book that he called the Iraq war a "debacle."

"That is a much stronger term than I would use," Jones told the Council on Foreign Relations in Washington today.

Jones came to discuss Afghanistan, where NATO has assumed the baton from the U.S.-led coalition. But it was inevitable that the tall and urbane general would be asked about the scathing alleged comments quoted in Woodward's State of Deniel, including his feeling that the Joint Chiefs of Statf had been "emasculated" by Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld. Woodward's quotes came from remarks Jones made to fellow Marine Gen. Peter Pace, who was visiting Jones in Stuttgert, Germany, last September on the eve of his ascension to the post of chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Jones said he and Pace were "just friends talking."

He added that if he had read Woodward's rendition of the conversation, which Jones recounted to him when the reporter had dinner with him in December 2005 in Brussels, "I probablywould have suggested that the tone was a little more critical than lintended it to be." Asked for his current view on Iraq, he said, "I'm personally committed to the idea that we have got to be successful in Iraq. The strategic consequences of failure would be enormous."

Regarding Jones's reported comment that Rumsfeld had emasculated the chiefs of the four armed services, the former Marine commandant implied that the problem (ay more in the law than in the personality of Rumsfeld. He said that he was on record as supporting revision of the Goldwater-NicholsAct so that the chairman and Joint Chiefs would be placed into the operational chain of command, which now runs from the president to the secretary of defense to the four-star combatant commands.

By law, the service chiefs' role is primarily advisory and to prepare, train, and equip the forces for use by the combatant commands. In yet another attempt to get Jones to state publicly whether he is critical of Rumsfeld, the general was asked if he agreed with the retired generals who have called for the secretary of delense's resignation in the past year.

"It do not associate myself with the 'revolt of the officers," Jones said. "It is the general officers' obligation to let their views be known, and there are ways to do that." Jones added that he will not be denouncing Rumsfeldpublicly once he retires.

Jones did use the occasion to call for more attention to Afghanistan and particularly to formation of a "successful campaign strategy on the war on drugs in Afghanistan," where opium cultivation has exploded. We're Tosing ground, and it bothers me," he said. Some 9,000 NATO troops have recently moved into the south of Afghanistan, where the Taliban and drug Tords have their stronghold. No permanent troops were stationed there before. NATO recently concluded "Operation Medusa" against the Taliban stronghold, which Jones called NATO's "first real test of ground combat resolve since World War II." He declared the operation a success and says NATO's



current troop strength in Afghanistan "is adequate for the mission."

While the NATO commander may be satisfied with the number of troops in Afghanistan, he has his work cut out for him in negotiating away some of the 50 restrictions or "caveats" that some NATO countries have placed on how their troops can be used. Some can't go after the Taliban or all Qaeda—they can only react once attacked: a few of the troops are not allowed to fight at night; others must stay in one geographical region. But Jones is primarily interested in forcing a new look at the overall strategy, not just the military operation. "The real challenge for the mission is how well the reconstruction and the international aid mission is focused," he said, particularly on counternarcotics efforts and judicial and police reform.

U.S. European Commander Confirms Quotes In Book

One of the highest-ranking generals in the **U.S**.military yesterday stood by views attributed to him in a controversial new book about the Bush administration's handling of the war in Iraq but said it was important to understand the context in which those views were expressed.

Marine Gen. James L. Jones, the U.S. commander for Europe, is quoted in "State of **Derial**," by The Washington Post's Bob Woodward, as believing that the war in Iraq is a "debacle" and that "The Joint Chiefs have been systematically emasculated by Rumsfeld." As Marine commandant, the post he held before moving to Europe, Jones was a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

The book also quotes Jones as delivering a warning about working with Defense **Secretary** Donald H. Rumsfeld to Marine Gen. Peter Pace, who was about to become chairman of the Joint Chiefs. "You should not be the parrot on the secretary's shoulder," Jones reportedly told Pace.

Jones's confirmation of Woodward's account is especially noteworthy because in the book, Pace denies that Jones made such remarks to **him**. Also, Jones's comments suggest that active-duty generals are beginning to criticize the defense secretary and the Iraq war with the harshness that several retired generals have used recently.

Speaking at a Washington meeting of the Council on Foreign Relations, Jones said he had a long discussion with Pace in Stuttgart, Germany, in September 2005, and then met. with Woodward in Brussels that December. He characterized both Pace and Woodward as old fiends. Speaking of the book's account of the September conversation, he said, "I don't challenge Bob's characterization of it, except that had I seen [the book], I probably would have suggested that the tone was more critical than I intended it to be."

Jones, who plans to retire in a few months, repeatedly declined to discuss the specific wording of his comments to Woodward about Iraq. "I'm not going to get into recollections of adjectives," he said. "I did talk about Iraq with a concern that Iraq deserves."

"I don't **think** that Iraq is a debacle," Jones told reporters after the meeting. "Iraq is a big problem."

Jones insisted there is a *sharp* distinction between his private comments and the criticisms made this year by retired generals. "I do not associate myself with the so-called revolt of the generals," he said. "I believe that general officers, both active and retired, have an obligation to let their views be known," but should do so in a "helpful" way.

The bottom line on his conversation with Pace, he said, was that it was "two fiends talking, one trying to help the other."

Jones said he has not discussed the comments in the book with Rumsfeld, who has been traveling this week. "We're a team, we're together, we have occasional family disagreements," he said after the meeting.

SUBJECT: Army End Strength Plan

- You asked for a status report on the FY04-11 Army End Strength Plan for the Active Component of the Army. More specifically, you wanted to see the progress that the Army is making on increasing the size of the operational Army and simultaneously reducing the size of both the institutional Army through military to civilian conversion as well as the Trainees, Transients, Holdees, and Students (TTHS) Account.
- Our plan is to peak at 512.6K in FY08 and then return back to 482.4K by the end of FY11, if operational demands permit. This structure allocates strength as follows: 355K Operational, 75K Institutional, and 52.4K TTHS Account. To date, the Army is making solid progress (TAB A). We successfully reduced the number of soldiers in the Institutional Army from 103.6K in FY01 to 92.4K in FY06. We grew the Operational Army from 303.2K in FY01 to 340.4K in FY06. The TTHS Account has stayed more or less constant from FY01 to FY05 and has grown over the last year because of the large numbers of accessions in FY06. The end strength plan for FY07 to FY11 is included in the table (TAB A)
- A breakdown of the actual and planned conversion of the Institutional Army is also shown in TAB A. In terms of positions, the Institutional Army is composed of two broad categories: positions controlled by the Army, and positions controlled by other DOD organizations. Because of the cost involved in the conversion process, we may need the help of the OSD to meet the planned objectives for those positions controlled by other DOD organizations. (TAB B)
- The TTHS Account has historically fluctuated between approximately 62K and 71K. Current operational demands, AC/RC rebalancing, and record recruiting levels will challenge our ability to reach the goal of 52.4K. We are currently conducting a holistic review of entry, advanced and home station training for each Military Occupational Skill (MOS) to identify both redundancies and opportunities for more efficient management.



SUBJECT: Review of DoD's Federal Advisory Committee Management Program

- In February 2005, the number of DoD-supported Federal Advisory Committees was reduced from ~62 to 53. At your request (Tab B) an independent review was undertaken by the Logistics Management Institute (LMI) to look at the scope of the Department's program and provide recommendations on ways to further reduce the number of boards, commissions, and task forces.
- The total number of committees continues to change. Currently, there are 52 DoD-supported Federal Advisory Committees: 22 non-discretionary, with three of the 22 being exempt from the Federal Advisory Committee Act (FACA); and 30 discretionary advisory committees. Of the 52, 16 are educational-related committees that, for the most part, involve school accreditation. This leaves 36 committees directly involved with core DoD-related issues.
- Building on LMI's analysis, my office is working with the OSD staff and Service components to develop a committee management model that consolidates similar activities, reducing the number of committees, folding smaller committees into larger ones (such as the Defense Science Board (DSB)) and reducing administrative overhead. Because the subjects cross organizational boundaries, involve multiple political equities, and in some cases require statutory change, we plan to continue tackling this work on a continuing basis.
- For this round, the most significant proposal is establishment of a Defense Health Board (DHB). In creating a DHB we would disestablish four separate boards for Pathology, Epidemiology, Mental Health, and Amputee Patient Care and make them sub-committees of the new DHB. Oversight of these boards, previously assigned to the Secretary of the Army, would be realigned to the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Health Affairs. In addition, separate advisory committees on Electronic Devices and Nuclear Weapons Strety would be disestablished and realigned under the DSB;

and two actuarial boards (for Retirement and Educational Benefits) will be proposed to Congress in **FY08** for consolidation into a single advisory committee.

- The proposed changes at Tab A, once implemented, will effectively reduce the total number of DoD-Supported Federal Advisory Committees from the current 52 to 47, including 21 non-discretionary and 26 discretionary advisory committees. The number, however, continues to fluctuate based on congressional action. The FY07 DoD Authorization Act created one new task force to look at Military Health Care, which we should be able to align under the DHB.
- I will continue to scrutinize the remaining committees. Working with the Services, the DoD GC and the Committee Management Secretariat for the General Services Administration, who manages the Executive Branch Federal Advisory Committee Management Program, I believe that additional opportunities can be realized (e.g., consolidating the Navy's two educational advisory committees; reviewing the Army's three existing Corps of Engineers advisory committees, one of which was established 40 years ago; and evaluating our two existing Reserve Forces-related committees to determine our future requirements). Since these potential opportunities may require legislative action and extensive stakeholder coordination, I recommend we proceed with the gains achieved in this round.

Summary:

- 1. All the Principals have coordinated on the proposed changes to the DoD-Supported Federal Advisory Committee Management Program resulting from the Top-to-Bottom Review, and the final package is ready for approval by the Secretary of Defense (Tab 1). These changes, to include the one involving changes to title 10, once implemented will reduce the total number of committees from 52 to 47. Of the remaining 47 committees, we will have 21 non-discretionary and 26 discretionary advisory committees, with 15 of the 47 involving education and accreditation issues.
- 2. The biggest changes associated with these proposals are: (a) the Defense Science Board absorbing the functions of two previously chartered committees; and (b) the establishment of the Defense Health Board, which will absorb the functions of three previously chartered committees. We are proposing, based upon the Principal's recommendations, that these changes occur no later than October 1,2006, which coincides with the GSA cycle, date for the President's Annual Comprehensive Report. Due to certain legal requirements the Defense Health Board must be announced in the Federal Register for 15 calendar days before it can be established we need to get the Secretary of Defense's approval at the earliest opportunity. The Federal Register notice has already been coordinated and we are holding it in abeyance pending the Secretary of Defense's approval.
- 3. We have already developed the necessary Federal Register notices and charter changes and coordinated them with the appropriate staff elements all we need to implement is the Secretary of Defense's approval.
- 4. As mentioned in memorandum to the Secretary of Defense, we intend to re-address some additional opportunities after the beginning of the fiscal year. Preliminarilywe have identified eight potential initiatives for the Principals to consider ... we will forward these to you for your consideration after we implement the Phase I recommendations. The Phase II recommendations will be a little more difficult to staff and will probably represent the point of diminishing returns when it comes to reducing the number of advisory committees.

JONATHAN KARL: All right, welcome. I'd like to welcome everybody to today's Council on Foreign Relations meeting. Thank you for coming.

Before we get started, just the obligatory reminder for all those cell phones and BlackBerries and avorything clear if we can, please, at the very least turn them to the silent position, I would appreciate it. And I would also like to remind everybody here, as it should be obvious from the presence of Tom Ricks and a few others, this meeting is on the record; everything here is on the record at the general's request. Obviously, General Jones needs no introduction. You have his bio. If I were to read through his bio, it would take up most of the next hour. So I will skip that. GENERAL JAMES L. JONES: That's all right. Read it!

KARL: I just wanted to make a couple of quick points about General Jones. Obviously, an authentic American hero—Silver Star winner, decorated many times over. But he's also somebody that survived time working in the Washington office after Vietnam with John McCain doing legislative affairs. So he's been through a lot. And General Jones, obviously, the 32 nd commandant of the Marine Corps, also the first commandant of the Marine Corps ever to leave that job at the end of his term and go on to another job on active duty, where he is currently the commander for U.S. European Command, and also—and one of the greatest titles I think you can have, the Supreme Allied Commander of NATO.

And it's a real honor to have you here with us.

I would also just add, in all the Marines that I have spoken to in advance of this meeting, the one thing that comes across—the phrase that's repeated over and over again is that General Jones is a Marine's Marine, one of the most respected men in uniform.

And again, it's a real honor to have you here. I know you have some opening comments.

JONES: Thank you. Thanks, Jon. And I'd like to thank everyone for being here. I didn't realize Afghanistan was such a passionate topic—(laughter)—especially to

members of the Pentagon press corps. I don't think I was this successful in the Pentagon briefings to get this turnout, so I'm delighted.

Let me just start off, if Icould, with a couple of comments about Afghanistan. This is actually a historical moment today for the alliance—actually tomorrow will be, precisely—because in addition to being engaged on three different continents with quite a few soldiers, sailors airmen and Marines—somewherearound 38,000 and climbing, which is not generally known—in the Balkans, in the Mediterranean, in counterterrorism operations and on the high seas, NATO's Article 5—only Article 5 mission is still ongoing, in Iraq, in a training mission, training and equipping mission for the Iraqi army, a small footprint in support of the African Union, the African Union in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, where we're conducting troop lifts in and out of the Sudan. NATO is really engaged in a lot of out-of-area operations. As a matter of fact, the term "out of area" doesn't really apply anymore because that geographical restriction has faded into history. NATO's also getting ready to certify a NATO response force, which is also a new operational concept, that will give the alliance much more flexible capability to do things rapidly at very long distances.

But Afghanistan remains the flagship mission for the alliance, this operational plan which is depicted to my left was briefed to the Nnorth Atlantic Council, the ministers of defense, in February of 2004, and now here on October 5 th, 2006, the counterclockwise rotation which started in Kabul and then went north and west, and then south this year, and now tomorrow will move to the east, essentially means that 37 sovereign nations have taken on the collective responsibility for security, stability and reconstruction in Afghanistan.

For the alliance this is a historical moment made possible by the recent decision by U.S. authorities to transfer—to the transfer of authority of some 12,000 soldiers—and Imean soldiers in a generic sense—to NATO effective October 5 th.

So this is an important day, one that will in fact bring about a renewed sense of commitment, certainly a unity of command, unity of effort and focus of, as Isaid, 37 sovereign countries that are engaged on making Afghanistan be a success. And I account myself as one of those who is optimistic for—that Afghanistan will be a success provided we continue to do the right things.

On that score, let me call your attention to the chart on my right, which is going to be replaced momentarily. This has to do with the business of what it takes to be successful in Afghanistan, in my view, and in my view, Afghanistan will not be resolved by military means. The military coefficient and footprint is very important.

believe that we have—while we are always looking for more capability, more equipment, generally speaking, the troop strength in Afghanistan under the current threat envelop is adequate for the mission, and I'm confident that we can take on any military challenge that there is and be successful.

But the real challenge in Afghanistan and for the success is how well the reconstruction mission, the international aid mission is focused, and on that score, I think there is a requirement to do more and to bring more focus, more clarity and more purpose and more results in a shorter period of time. And fundamentally, this is the exit strategy for Afghanistan.

If you look at the five pillars that are depicted, you're looking at the representation of five G-8 nations that have taken on responsibility to be a lead nation in this reform effort. Three of those pillars need massive attention, specifically the battle against counternarcotics, which touches every aspect of the recovery in Afghanistan. The money from this growing program—and it is growing—fuels the insurgency. It allows the opposition to build the IEDs that kill and wound innocent civilians and wound and kill soldiers of the alliance. It fuels the corruption problem in Afghanistan. It fuels the criminal element, and it touches every aspect of Afghan reconstruction. Included in that is the economic reconstruction.

There are a lot of figures out there that say, you know, can you put a figure on it? Anything that touches over 50 percent of the gross domestic product of a country, such as the narcotics problem in Afghanistan, is a big problem. And its needs more attention. It needs more clarity, more definition and more purpose. It is truly the Achilles' heel of Afghanistan.

The other two pillars that need to be—need some attention that has to happen almost sequentially or simultaneously, I should say, are the judicial reform. Corruption is a big problem in Afghanistan.

On that score, the results in the last three years have been, in my view, singularly unimpressive. And the Karzai government and those countries that are helping in this reconstruction aspect of Afghanistan need to have—show quicker and better success in as short a period of time as possible.

And lastly, the third one is the police reforms. Although the—there are numbers that are fairly impressive as to the number of policemen on the streets, the quality of the training needs to be enhanced. The quality of pay needs to be started, in some cases. And we must lift those very, very important functions out of the temptation of

corruption by making sure that we have the right investment, the right training and the right education of these forces.

So those three pillars are fundamentally very important to the near term of Afghanistan.

Not on that chart is another important program that I would like to highlight, and that's the idea of strategic communications inside the country. We simply have to do a better job explaining to the Afghan people why it is that they should be for what is happening in Afghanistan and against the alternative. Generally speaking, the Afghan people get it, but there is growing—there—obviously growing impatience with the rate in which these reforms are going to touch their lives.

NATO just completed a very, very important operational success in the south in the aftermath of Operation Medusa. And here Iwould like to pay great tribute to the troops of Canada, the United Kingdom and other countries—Holland, Estonia, Portugal, the United States and all of the countries that came to—that railled to the fight in the southern region for this important, decisive moment, which will be followed very quickly by evidence of reconstruction, so it touches the people's lives. There are many questions about the level of violence in Afghanistan. Let me just touch on that briefly.

In the south, the level of violence was predictable. We have never had troops permanently stationed in the south. There are now 9,000 NATO troops in the southern region. This is a first. This is an area that has largely been untouched by reconstruction. It's been affected by corrupt leadership, inadequate pay for government officials, and it has been the traditional home of the Taliban and the traditional crossroads of the narcotrafficking problem as well as criminal elements. So everything that we want to fix in Afghanistan is in the southern region. And with the clear military victory that just occurred—I did express some surprise at the tenacity of the Taliban. What was really surprising was the fact that they tried to Fight NATO troops almost conventionally, and they took a pretty heavy beating for it. Idon't expect them to make that mistake again. And they'll probably go back to this war of attrition that they're better at than conventional battle.

But the point is that anything we do militarily is perishable if it's no accompanied by reconstruction, and the 37 nations of the alliance understand this. The idea in Afghanistan is not to make more enemies than we already have and not to do anything that's not good for the people. And I think if we can fix the focus of the international reconstruction, keep the military doing what it's doing, celebrate the

primacy of the provincial reconstruction teams which are symbolically and actually very, very important in the difference they're making in the Afghani lives, then I think we could be on a very good track in a relatively short period of time.

■know you want to ask some questions. Jon, I'll just—I'll stop with that, and I'll be happy to respond to anything that people might want to talk about.

KARL: Well, picking up on the—(applause)—and Iwant to ask you about your plans and where we're going ahead in Afghanistan, but first let's take a step back. We're now at the point where this year, there have been more coalition deaths by a considerable number than there were last year. There have been already more than three times the number of coalition deaths (than) there were in all of 2004. You know the rest of the litany. Opium production is at record highs. You touched on some of the problems with the government. Just looking back, we're five years into Afghanistan. This was the model. This was the success story. What went wrong? JONES: Will, I'm not willing to concede that anything has gone wrong, per se, and I actually believe that there is more—there are more right things than wrong things. But I do recognize that we are at a point where we need to put more focus in certain areas in order to continue to proceed in the right direction.

I've already said that the narcotics problem is the Achilles' heel, and Ibelieve that. If think it affects every aspect of Afghan life, the problems with the government, the money that is used to fuel the combat and the opposition.

But where we are able to put in good governance, good leaders, good governors, where we're able to make sure that the Afghan army—which, by the way, is one of the success stories of Afghanistan. This was an army that contributed immeasurably in the success of Operation Medusa. It is in the thirty-thousands now, so it's about half-way to its eventual size. But it is an army that actually the people of Afghanistan are proud of, and that accounts itself very well on the ground.

But where we're able to make those changes—good governance, good police, good military leadership—the Taliban and the opposition drift off into areas where they can make more mischief.

KARL: But, I mean, if I can just—let me ask you, though, if I can try, on what some people have suggested has gone wrong. I mean, you're five years into this. The narcotics problem is not a new phenomenon. You said in your opening remarks that we basically hadn't done anything in the south until now. I mean, was it a mistake, perhaps, to rush into Iraq and not put enough focus into Afghanistan? (Laughter.) Did we think it was a—you know—did we—and I don't need you to talk about Iraq—

JONES: No, I know. Yeah, thank you. Thank you.

KARL:—but did we abandon Afghanistan? (Laughter.)

JONES: No, look, I think that first of all, the good things that have happened are that the Afghani people have voted in tremendous numbers on two major elections—the presidential elections and the parliamentary elections. There are some incredible stories of personal bravery to do that. Today in Afghanistan, 6 million children are going to school; 2 million of them are women. There's been thousands of kilometers of roads built. There are success stories in pockets around the country.

But you cannot be everywhere at the same time. Afghanistan's a big country. The first domino to fall in Afghanistan was to cause the collapse of the Taliban, and that happened. And in much of the country, in the north, for example, the threat is very low; in the west it's moderate; in the south it's high; and in the east it's high. And in the capital region, aside from occasional acts of violence, people are in the streets leading normal lives, stores are open, restaurants are open, hotels are open, and life is, in fact, struggling to achieve some normalcy and some sense of progress for the future.

This is palpable in the country. We can accelerate this process, and the areas that I've highlighted need more focus. And I think everybody recognizes that. The challenge is: How do you do that, who does it, how do you get everything from NGOs to 37 governments focusing, for example, on judicial reform?

There are a thousand prosecutors in Afghanistan. They live on \$65 a month. They cannot exist on \$65 a month in Kabul. An interpreter for the United Nations makes about \$630 a month. There's something backwards there, and somebody needs to fix that. Interpreters are important, but prosecutors that are not corrupt are even more important. The attorney general of Afghanistan, who is a man by all reputation who is uncorruptable, when asked, "What is it that you need to ensure that your prosecutors can do their jobs and actually start putting people who should be injail behind bars," he said, "If you were able to pay my 1,000 prosecutors \$350 a month, they would be above—beyondcorruption." That's a fairly simple solution, I think, and we have to figure ways to do that.

So is everything going great? No. But is there going to be a military defeat? No. So the battle is over hearts and minds and whether you can bring—whether 37 countries working together can bring the changes that are required to jump-start that society. And with 37 countries under all the mandates that you want, all the

legal authorities, the U.N. resolutions, you can do this. And I think it's a-eventually it'll be a success. It just depends on how much time we want to spend doing it. KARL: So tomorrow-very timely your visit here, in addition to the publishing of a new book that was just out—tomorrow, NATO takes over responsibility for stability and reconstruction in the country. You will have 12,000 American troops under NATO with the largest operation for U.S. under NATO ever.

Is NATO really up to the job, given the problem that you face as a NATO commander in terms of all the conditions that are put by various countries, the so-called caveats? You know, "Yes, we're going to commit forces"—and even that's been hard—"but you get the forces, but no, they can't, you know do night patrols. No, they can't operate in the south." I mean, you're—you mentioned the Canadians and the British, but I mean, the Italians, the Germans, the French, others—you're under some real restraints there, aren't you?

JONES: Yeah. (Laughter.)

KARL: But you're the Supreme Allied Commander!

JONES: I know.

The reality of an alliance like NATO, with 26 sovereign nations, is that we spend a lot of time getting consensus. NATO is an alliance that operates under consensus. You have to have consensus to take on a mission. Then you have to have consensus on the size force that you're willing to—that you want to raise, what are the rules of engagement, what are the rules of detention, how do you—and everything has to be agreed.

So you get to the point of where everything's agreed that you're going to take on a mission, and then you raise the force. And then the room gets a little quieter because that costs real money, Under NATO, if you provide forces. Nation X provides forces, Nation X pays for everything that has to do with those forces. It's not a bad system, but it just means that you really have to work hard to get those forces. And once you get those forces, many times there are national restrictions as to what the providing country will allow those forces to do. We battle that. And they are called caveats. In Afghanistan—I'm on record, and I'll say it again—we have, in my view, too many caveats. Every chief of defense knows it. They're tired of taking telephone calls from me. But I'm going—we're going to keep on talking about it because, little by little, we do make progress and we whittle it down.

In 2004 in Kosovo, we had so many caveats that our commanders spent more time trying to figure out what they couldn't do with their forces than what they could do.

Today, in 2006 in Kosovo—which, by the way, is another important NATO mission, and it will be in the headlines somewhere by the end of the year—but we have very few caveats. Nations have understood that this was an untenable situation, and we've made great progress over a couple of years on caveats and restrictions. We need to do the same thing in Afghanistan. There are roughly about 50 restrictions that have an operational impact on the commander of ISAF's ability to use his forces. I want to see that number go down. We will continue to work with nations to do that. It is slow. It's not automatic. But it doesn't mean that we're going to fail. It doesn't mean that.

I actually believe that caveats, when they're known, put a nation's troops at more risk than the nations who don't have caveats. If you're a thinking enemy like we're facing in Afghanistan, they want to find out which are the troops that won't fight, or that won't fight with the freedom that others do, and naturally they gravitate that way.

So fewer caveats is important. Caveats also mean that you have to compensate for what some troops can't do with other troops that can. So you actually wind up contributing more forces and it gets more expensive.

So that's the story on caveats. It's not a show-stopper, but it certainly is something that we have to keep working on.

KARL: What are—just so we can understand what we're talking about here, what are some of the known caveats? You said there are 50. How much—

JONES: Well, essentially, the ones that are the most hurtful are the ones that—say you have quick response forces around the country in the differ sectors that we've pointed out there on that map. A caveat would be a nation that has a company-size quick response force and says these forces cannot be used outside of this geographical boundary. So if that's true and that holds, that means that if you have a crisis in another part of the country, the commander cannot quickly go to those forces without going back to the capital and getting national authorization or not, as the case may be, to use those forces in a certain way.

On the battlefield of rapidly changing environments, you—the tyranny of distance and time work against you. So the better—the more control a commander has and the more agility he has and the more capability he has is directly related to the number of caveats we have to accomplish the mission.

Another one could be—you mentioned it yourself—our forces cannot be used at night. Another one is our forces cannot be used to fight the Taliban, for example.

KARL: Our forces cannot be used to-

JONES: Some. Some. But-

KARL: Strange way to go to Afghanistan.

KARL:—direct combat, you know, direct combat—some of them are. You cannot initiate combat. You can defend yourself if you're shot at.

Idon't want to overstate this. This—some of these are small—most of the major nations generally are very inside in the green, if you will, in terms of use of the forces. And they're doing some extraordinary work, particularly in the south, which was NATO's first real test of ground combat resolve in—probably since World War II. And Canada, the United Kingdom and the countries of the Netherlands, Romania, Estonia, Portugal, the ANA and the forces that came over from the eastern area, which were still Operation Enduring Freedom, acquitted themselves very, very well and actually are going to change the conditions in the south.

KARL: We've certainly seen the Canadians and the British and the Dutch do that In the south, and also take some real losses. Are you concerned about public opinion? And I mean, you look at the Canadians, you have burgeoning antiwar movement because of the—you know, they're not used to this.

JONES: There—this is definitely new territory for many allies. And the governments have shown great courage. The troops are doing everything that's being asked of them.

Ithink that, frankly, the best message you can send to public opinion is to actually show that we're—that's not all we're doing. We are fighting—we fought in the south in order to set the conditions for rapid reconstruction, changing—showing people that that their lives will be better by virtue—as a result of this.

It's unfortunate that we had to do this. But we're going to take care of the refugees, we're going to get them home, we're going to feed them, we're going to clothe them, we're going to repair their houses, we're going to open their schools, and we're going to leave forces behind to make sure that the Taliban or the narcotics cartels or the criminals or the different factions that are always fighting for influence over their lives don't come back. And in the south, where we had no permanent forces, we now have 9,000, and it's going to make a difference.

KARL: How many—how strong is the Taliban force down there now? And how heavy were their losses in this last—

JONES: It's very hard to put an exact figure. I've said publicly that Ithink around 1,000 to 1,500 casualties. We had the unusual—very unusual public statement by

their spokesman that they were conducting a tactical retreat because of the losses. It's hard to say how many. I would speculate in the entire country on any given day, you may have several thousand.

But it would be wrong to say that this is just the Taliban. And I think Ineed to set that record straight. The narcotics cartels have their own armies and their own capabilities. They're conducting a massive exploitation effort. Ninety percent of the product is sold in the streets of European capitals. It takes an enormous apparatus to ensure that the product gets to the markets. And they have their own capability to inflict damage; to make sure that the roads and the passages stay open and they get to where they want to go, whether it's through Pakistan, Iran, up through Russia and all the known trade routes. So this is a very violent cartel. They are buying their protection by funding other organizations, from criminal gangs to tribes, to inciting any kind of resistance to keep the government off of their back, and they're buying that kind of protection. And that's why I come back to these pillars, and particularly the narcotics pillar as being so critical to the future success in the reconstruction and stability of that country.

KARL: And what's the approach to that? I mean, are you—is it eradication? Is it—and how aggressive can you be without further alienating the people you're trying to support?

JONES: Well, the fact is that the military—the militaries do not have a leading role in this campaign. This is left up to the Afghans themselves, the Drug Enforcement Administrations of the participating countries.

The lead nation is the United Kingdom. There is supposed to be a tremendous energy associated with this, but it needs a fresh look because it is—it's still—we're losing ground. Imean, statistically there's—we're losing ground in the effort.

Idon't think there's any one solution, John. I don't think it's—eradication does it. ■ think you have to have a comprehensive approach to this problem. Some of it has to be fought in the capitals, which are the end of the supply chain. But it is definitely something that has to be addressed and has to be addressed more effectively than we've done so far.

KARL: Okay, General, I want to give the rest—those in the audience a chance to ask some questions, and as you can see, we have microphones on either side. So let's start right here.

QUESTIONER: Stephen Biddle from the Council. There's been a lot of tension to the issue of caveats, but in a sense, caveats are just a tip of a very large iceberg of

challenges associated with conducting a campaign this complex with this many independent actors involved.

I was wondering if you could comment on some of the issues of equipment interoperability, doctrinal comparability—all of the other challenges of combined warfare and a style of warfare that's in some respects more complicated than conventional operations to begin with.

JONES: One of the great qualities of the alliance is that for many, many years the armies, navies, air forces, Marine Corps and now Special Operations Forces of the alliance have worked on interoperability. It's not perfect. We need to continue the effort. This is why the establishment of the Allied Command for Transformation a few years ago was so important because it is the center of where the doctrines and the training and the procedures get developed and the new concepts get developed. The best work on interoperability doesn't help us too much in Afghanistan, but the navies of the - navies of NATO are completely interoperable. The air forces are very highly interoperable. The -not surprisingly, the armies are the ones that have the longest way to go, and Special Forces are just getting off the ground. But there's no guestion that when—as we've seen in the aftermath of Medusa with the forces that have just really arrived, coming together from eight or nine different nations, managed to pull everything off reasonably well: air-to-ground tactics, ground-toground coordination, working with the ANA, overcoming language difficulties. As you know, the most common language in NATO is English - English and French. But people come ready to do the job, and that's been less of a problem than the idea of raising forces is—the concept of force generation is difficult. But there's enormous capacity in the alliance for these kinds of missions. The reservoir of equipment and manpower is very high. The problem is paying for it.

And, frankly, it's not a question of capacity. It's a question of will.

KARL: Okay. Yes.

QUESTIONER: General Jones, can you hear me?

JONES: I can hear you.

QUESTIONER: This is Tom Ricks from The Washington Post. In Bob Woodward's new book, you are quoted on several controversial points such as calling the Iraq war a debacle, saying that Secretary Rurnsfeld had emasculated the Joint Chiefs and disputing what the chairman—his account of a conversation. Three quick questions on that. Were you guoted accurately? Have you heard back from Secretary Rumsfeld

or General Pace about this? And third, is the so-called revolt of the generals now extending to four-star generals on active duty?

JONES: Actually—(laughter)—just—l'Il take those one at a time, ■guess. (Laughs, laughter.) Tom, that sounds like a real fiasco you just started. (Laughter.) Let's see. Ithink the answer is that I have talked to General Pace. I have not talked to anyone else. Ihad a conversation with my very good friend, who I've known and served with for-well, since 1970. On the eve of his ascendancy to be the chairman, he came over to Stuttgart to make a round to talk to all of the combatant commanders, and ask us what we thought. And I shared some views that not onlythat were not limited to Iraq but Afghanistan, on the strategic value to the United States of forward- based forces. We talked about the - some of my views on Goldwater- Nichols. I'm on record in the Congress of being a supporter of a revision of Goldwater-Nichols to take care of some of what I think the unintended consequences of Goldwater-Nichols were. I - for example, | Ibelieve that the chairman - we should give serious consideration to the most senior man in uniform being in the chain of command. He has a lot of responsibility. Ithink he should have some authority to go with that. That's not new. I've discussed it with previous chairmen, with previous secretaries of Defense, with members of Congress. And so the context of the conversation was to prepare him and give him what's—the best support. I could, as there was no question that he was going to be the chairman. He'd been named, and we'd talked, so that's not the issue. We laughed about the tenacity it takes to survive and function eight years in the Pentagon.

And Ispoke from my own personal experience of exactly eight straight years in the Pentagon—and the liberating effect it has when you get to leave—(laughter)—for which I'm eternally grateful to the administration and Secretary Rumsfeld for keeping me on active duty and letting me do something as exhibitating and as wonderful as this was.

So I'm not going to get into recollections of adjectives. Iknow that we had a serious discussion.

I did talk about Iraq. Idid talk about Iraq with the concern that Iraq deserves. And I make no predictions there except that I'm personally committed to the idea that we collectively—we the nations, we the United States, however you want to put it, we the Iraqis—have got to be successful in Iraq. The strategic consequences of failure in Iraq, at least in my calculus, are very serious, and whatever we need to do to prevail is what has to happen. Similarly in Afghanistan. I've given my expose on that. I

know more about Afghanistan than Iraq. I try not to talk about things. Idon't know about.

And we went on to a number of other discussions, the role of the Joint Chiefs in a Goldwater-Nichols environment, and what's happened in terms of things about my own experience of having no—being specifically prohibited from participating in any acquisition process as a service chief, and yet being held accountable for acquisition problems in the public forum, in fact, by the Congress, when the law says you cannot affect acquisition. Your chiefs are in the—Joint Chiefs are in the requirements business but not in the acquisition business.

I just think there's a whole litary of things that need to be cleaned up in order to clarify functions, roles, missions and responsibilities. In the combatant commanders' world, we have a lot of responsibility, and I think there are some things there that we can tidy up to make sure that our national strategies with regard to theater security cooperation and the like get better—we're more agile and more effective. So the sum total of the discussion was two friends talking, one trying to help the other. I think that General Pace was absolutely the perfect choice to be chairman, and I think he's doing a great job. A lot of the things that we talked about he has put into place. And that was the context of it.

That conversation was in September of 2005. In December of 2005, my good friend Bob Woodward visited me in Brussels, came up to my house. We went out to dinner, we talked for a few hours, and we talked about those issues in that context. My intent was to be positive, not critical, and to reflect some of the things that Thave been known to stand for.

It was reported in the way it was reported. I don't challenge Bob's characterization of it, expect that had I seen it, I probably would have suggested that the tone was a little bit more critical than I intended it to be. I intended it to be more helpful to the new chairman, an honest discussion of some of the problems that I'd already talked about in both private conversations and in public testimony. And I think that's where I'd like to leave it.

KARL: And the revolt of the generals?

JONES: Oh. In a previous—at the National Press Club a few months ago, I was asked that question. And Ido not associate myself with the so-called "revolt of the generals." I believe that general officers, both active and retired, have an obligation to let their views be known. I think there's ways in which you can do that that can be

helpful. And so I don't—I do not in any way associate myself with that particular group, and will not associate myself in my retired life either.

KARL: And I think he also asked if you had talked to Secretary Rumsfeld since the book came out.

JONES: Oh, I'm sorry. No, the secretary has been out of town in South America. I last met with the secretary in Slovenia last week when the United States announced that it would transfer 12,000 troops over to ISAF.

KARL: Sir?

QUESTIONER: (Arnaud de Borchgrave, CSIS) Thank you. General, on September 5 th, a rather controversial agreement was signed by President Musharraf with the tribal leaders in north Waziristan. And you were quoted as saying let's give it 60 or 90 days to see if it's going to work. But the latest from Alghanistan is that attacks by the Taliban have trebled since September 5 th.

JONES: Well, the —I was in Islamabad. Idid meet with the senior military officials of the Pakistanis' military. They did brief me on the nature of the accords, and they were optimistic about being able to make them work. Since this was only my second meeting. I took it at face value, and I did say I know what you just recounted; I will return back to Islamabad in the near future, after we've made a complete assessment and give it a little bit of time to kind of see exactly how this is going to go.

Not being naive here, this is a big problem. The border situation is something that believe the leaders of the Pakistanis' military understand, that you cannot treat the problems in Afghanistan and Pakistan in isolation; this is a regional problem. And it's certainly—in my view, in Pakistan's interest that we find the solutions in Afghanistan because that will materially affect perhaps a spillover effect into not only Pakistan, but other countries of the region.

So strategically, success in Afghanistan is very, very important, and I hope that we'll have a very good relation between NATO—NATO's military and Pakistani military to bring about the situation that we want to see happen along the border region.

KARL: Okay. And if we can go back over here, and please state your name and your affiliation.

QUESTIONER: Jim Dobbins with the Rand Corporation. To follow up on Arnaud's question with respect to Pakistan, U.N., NATO or Afghan and U.S. officials are virtually unanimous in private in asserting that the Pakistani intelligence service is providing and is continuing to provide support to the Taliban in one form or another.

I wonder whether you'd be willing to comment on the degree to which the Pakistani intelligence service is somehow complicit in one way or another. And I also wonder whether you have any assessment of the proportion of the fighters that we're encountering that are recruited in Pakistan as opposed to recruited in Afghanistan. JONES: As NATO is just entering into its relationship with Pakistan, in a more total context, in the previous three years that I've been involved in this—with this issue, I've been focused on the north of the country, the capital region and the west, and only now has the—have we moved into the south and the east where the more difficult military problem exists. So we're still coming up to speed on many of these issues. I really can't comment on either question that you asked for—asked about because I'm still in the learning stage. But give me a couple of months, and maybe I can give you an answer that is more complete. It's just not been on my radar recently.

KARL: We'll come back in 60 or 90 days on that one.

JONES: Thank you.

KARL: Yes, back here. Yes, sir.

QUESTIONER: Lloyd Hand, DLA Piper. A piggyback on Arnaud's question earlier, General. Is the pursuit of bin Laden within the scope of the mission of NATO? And if so, are you permitted unrestricted authorization to pursue him? lust a comment also, if Imay. Ithink by your words and your conduct it's pretty clear why the NATO members in general and the U.S. in particular are very fortunate to have you as NATO's commander and particularly right now.

JONES: Thank you, sir. There is a—in the make-up of this—of our forces in Afghanistan, there is a distinction that nations have insisted upon between the more kinetic counterterrorism role. loosely defined as the aggressive search for Osama bin Laden, and aggressive counterterrorist operations in the high-threat regions that U.S. forces and coalition forces have been typically operating in, and the NATO mandate that really addresses more counterinsurgency/anti-terrorist activities. The—and so there is a little bit of a—and if you looked at the wiring diagram, you would see a little segue where the OEF coalition can in fact continue their mission to be more kinetic. It's not limited to any particular part of the country. We have command and control arrangements where if there is a serious opportunity somewhere, if it manifests itself, that forces that are tailored to do this can in fact go to different parts of the country to carry out that mission.

NATO has shown that it is—has the capacity to fight, if necessary. Ithink that question has been asked and answered. And I think that it's been answered very, very well.

NATO's focus, because of its capacity and mass, is going to be to harmonize the immediate effects of military operations with reconstruction. One has to follow the other in order to win the battle over the hearts and minds, if you will.

And so you will see a direct cause-and-effect relationship. You're—if you were in the south right now, you'd be seeing it start. And that is really the focus of the alliance. Now, if in fact a high-value target of opportunity presented itself in Afghanistan, can NATO apprehend people? Absolutely. Do we have a detention policy? Absolutely. It is agreed to by 26 sovereign countries. It works.

Recently in the north we had an apprehension involving Germans; ANA, Afghan National Army: Operation Enduring Freedom forces; and one or two other countries that resulted in a high-value target being seized by Special Operations forces, transferred to the Afghan authorities, and then subsequently returned to other countries that wish to interrogate the person that was apprehended. Happened to be more about a drug issue than anything else, but also weapons and illegal arms shipments, explosives and all of that.

So we have the ability to do that. It's working, and I'm satisfied that the distinction between the two missions is clear, but it is not—and it's not difficult to find the harmonization to prevent the separate identity of both—I'm sorry—to preserve the separate identity of both.

KARL: Okay. Yes, ma'am?

QUESTIONER: Georgie Anne Geyer, Universal Press Syndicate. General, after Vietnam, there were a lot of meetings in the war colleges and so on, on counterinsurgency, on guerrilla warfare. I attended a number of them. And yet recently, once Iraq started, there have been all these articles about counterinsurgency not being taught in the war colleges, about—it seems that the farces, the services were not being trained in guerrilla warfare or counterinsurgency. I mean, I've seen whole, long articles. I'm just curious. Are we redoing the Vietnam story, having to learn it all over from the base?

JONES: Georgie Anne, Ildon't know, to be honest with you, Ilknow that when I was commandant of the Marine Corps, we dusted off one of the greatest books that Il think I've ever read, called Marine Corps Small Wars Manual, that General Al Gray actually forced me to read when Ilwas his military assistant. Actually, I think he gave

me a test on it. (Laughter.) And it is still one of the best manuals that are out there on how to be successful in counterinsurgency.

So I think our war colleges are certainly teaching that. I don't think that—there may be a little catch-up here, but I'm quite sure that with the amount of experience that we have in the armed forces right now, there's quite a bit of learning going on. I think—I know some services have studied, for example, the counterinsurgency efforts of Algeria, that had a very, very horrific problem just not that many years ago, in terms of violence on the scale of what we're seeing in Iraq, and were able to defeat it. It still has some remnants out there, but there's no question that Algeria had a success story there, and I think we're studying that. I personally go to Algeria, and the chief of defense has been very helpful in setting up conversations with people who—Algerians who fought in that insurgency.

So we learn lessons from everybody. It's important to do.

KARL: Yes? Back there.

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QUESTIONER: Philip Dine, St. Louis Post-Dispatch. I'm going back to narcotics in Afghanistan. Not just did the production of poppy rise by 59 percent over the last year, but the number of Afghans involved rose from 2 million to 2.9 million, which would translate to 36 million Americans. How did this happen? To what extent is it societal issues in Afghanistan, including the vicious cycle between economic development and illicit narcotics, and to what extent is it flawed or inattentive U.S. and U.K. policies?

JONES: Well, the amount of income that the farmer actually gets for growing the poppies is probably quite small, but it's guaranteed income and it's also generally money that's paid for in advance. So in those areas of the country where there is no alternative, they do what they have to to survive. And they also do it probably under the threat of—pretty serious threats as to what would happen if they didn't do it. So the answer is to find some international consensus on what is the overall campaign strategy for a successful war on narcotics in Afghanistan.

The good news is you can see it. It's not like Colombia, for example. You can't hide it in Afghanistan. It's just massive. And until we Figure out the ways to—whether It's subsidies, alternate crops, roads to markets. Figuring out a way to disincentivize the farmers but also make sure that they're not going to be killed by the cartels, all of these things kind of happening simultaneously—that plan has got to be together, and it's got to be holistic, it's got to be cohesive. It's a battle that's got to be joined. And we ought to—my view is we ought to look at it from a—you know, with a blank sheet

of paper and say, and then these are the people that are going to make this happen, whoever that is.

But it's where we are. We're still—we're losing ground, and it bothers me. It's definitely what is most pressing and most on my mind with regard to our future efforts in Afghanistan.

KARL: There, way in the back, standing up. (I'm trying to ?)-

QUESTIONER: Hi. This is Courtney Kube from NBC News. I want to take one more stab at the Woodward book. I want to read you just one quote: "The Joint Chiefs have been systematically emasculated by Rumsfeld." And regardless of whether you said that before, do you believe that now, and do you believe that we're in a debacle in Iraq?

JONES: I believe that in the context of the answer that I gave with regard to Goldwater-Nichols that the Joint Chiefs of Staff have had some restrictions put on them that were not intended to have the consequences they've had.

You—having'been a member of the Joint Chiefs during the 1999 to 2003 timeframe, Ifound that the Title 10 mission of organize, train and equip was a very time-consuming one. I definitely understood that. Had a little bit of a tougher time trying to stay abreast of a lot of the—you know, the war in Afghanistan, for example, and the movement towards Iraq. But that was partially because the system was set up that the chain of command goes from the commander in chief to the secretary of Defense to the combatant commanders. So off to the side of the direct line, you have the Joint Chiefs, you have the chairman, I mean, whose—(who) actually has to be involved in that—but the line of authority is clear, and that's—those are the rules, and those are the rules you play by.

A relook at Goldwater-Nichols Ithink at some point would be healthy to make sure that after the years of experience that—to answer the question, are we happy with that? Is that the way we really want it to work? Do we want the chiefs out of the acquisition business, for example? I think—personally, I think the answer is no; I think you want the chiefs to be involved. But that's an issue for another time.

Idon't want to get into "did you say"—"did you say a particular word to describe a situation?" Ithink the intent—I've tried to communicate the intent. It was positive, it's not meant against anything. But there's a lot of dynamics at work here on decision-making for the good of national security. I do believe that in the last few years that the trend has been in a more positive direction. I think there have been some helpful reorganizations inside the Pentagon that have allowed greater cohesion

and people from different walks to communicate their views. In think we're—General Pace has been able to carve out time so that the military community can actually—all the four-stars, combatant commanders, service chiefs can sit together, which is a little bit going backwards—going back to the old CINCs conferences. That's very healthy. And I think the secretary of Defense gets good advice from that particular community, as communicated by the chairman.

So I think there have been some positive developments. But I think a relook at Goldwater-Nicholas, to take a look at the overall impact of it, would be healthy for our positioning and how we do things in the future.

KARL: But just *so* we're entirely clear, the second part of that question on Iraq, and not what you did or didn't say. I mean, do you believe Iraq has been a debacle or—JONES: No, Ithink that's probably a stronger—much stronger word than Iwould use. Again, my mission is—I'm not trying to duck the issue, but the only role Ihave in Iraq is a NATO role of a couple of hundred people that do training and equipping. I am consumed by NATO, I am consumed by the transformation of the European Command. Ithink John Abizaid is doing a terrific job. He and Italk a lot, we help each other, we help each other immeasurably. I'm very grateful to the U.S. Central Command for what we've been able to kludge together, and what Afghanistan will be as of tomorrow.

But Ithink the most important thing about Iraq is that we succeed. However it has to be done, it is critical that we succeed on the ground in our efforts there. And as long as I'm in uniform, and after uniform, I do everything Ican to help that mission.

QUESTIONER: (Off mike.)

KARL: We are out of time. We're actually over. Just on that note, if I can ask everybody to please stay seated, General Jones is now, thanks to me, a little bit late for his next meeting; we'll give him a chance to get out.

But, General, again, Iwant to thank you for your candor. You have a reputation, well deserved, as a straight-shooter. And again, it's been an honor, and thank you very much for your time.

JONES: Thank you. Appreciate it. Thank you all. (Applause.)

Thanks, Jon. Good to see you. Thank you, lappreciate it.

KARL: We really appreciate it. Take care.

JONES: Thank you.

U.S. European Commander Confirms Quotes In Book

One of the highest-ranking generals in the **U.S.** military yesterday stood by views attributed to him in a controversial new book about the Bush administration's handling of the war in **Iraq** but said it was important to understand the context in which those views were expressed.

Marine Gen. James L. Jones, the U.S. commander for Europe, is quoted in "State of Denial," by The Washington Post's Bob Woodward, as believing that the war in Iraq is a "debacle" and that "The Joint Chiefs have been systematically emasculated by Rumsfeld." As Marine commandant, the post he held before moving to Europe, Jones was a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

The book also quotes Jones **as** delivering a warning about working with Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld to Marine Gen. Peter Pace, who was about to become chairman of the Joint Chiefs. "You should not be the parrot on the secretary's shoulder," Jones reportedly told Pace.

Jones's confirmation of Woodward's account is especially noteworthy because in the book, Pace denies that Jones made such remarks to him. Also, Jones's comments suggest that active-duty generals are beginning to criticize the defense secretary and the Iraq war with the harshness that several retired generals have used recently.

Speaking at a Washington meeting of the Council on Foreign Relations, Jones said he had a long discussion with Pace in Stuttgart, Germany, in September 2005, and then met with Woodward in Brussels that December. He characterized both Pace and Woodward as old friends. Speaking of the book's account of the September conversation, he said. "I don't challenge Bob's characterization of it, except that had I seen [the book], I probably would have suggested that the tone was more critical than I intended it to be,"

Jones, who plans to retire in a few months, repeatedly declined to discuss the specific wording of his comments to Woodward about Iraq. "I'm not going to get into recollections of adjectives," he said. "I did talk about Iraq with a concern that Iraq deserves."

"I don't think that Iraq is a debacle," Jones told reporters after the meeting. "Iraq is a big problem."

Jones insisted there is a sharp distinction between his private comments and the criticisms made this year by retired generals. "I do not associate myself with the so-called revolt of the generals," he said, "I believe that general officers, both active and retired, have an obligation to let their views be known," but should do so in a "helpful" way.

The bottom line on his conversation with Pace, he said, was that it was "two friends talking, one trying to help the other."

Jones said he has not discussed the comments in the book with Rumsfeld, who has heen traveling this week. "We're a team, we're together, we have occasional family disagreements," he said after the meeting.



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NATO Chief Denies Quotes in Woodward Book

Jim Jones, the four-star Marine general who heads NATO, denies a quote in Bob Woodward's latest book that he called the traqwar a "debacle."

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'That is a much stronger term than I would use." Jones told the Council on Foreign Relations in Washington today.

Jones came to discuss Afghanistan, where NATO has assumed the baton from the U.S.-led coalition. But it was inevitable that the tall and urbane general would be asked about the scathing alleged comments quoted in Woodward's *State* of Denial, including his feeling that the Joint Chiefs of Staff had been "emasculated" by Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld. Woodward's quotes came from remarks Jones made to fellow Marine Gen. Peter Pace, who was visiting Jones In Stuffgart, Germany, last September on the eve of his ascension to the post of chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Jones said he and Pace were "just friends talking."

He added that if he had read Woodward's rendition of the conversation, which Jones recounted to him when the reporter had dinner with him in December 2005 in Brussels, "I probably would have suggested that the tone was a little more critical than Lintended it to be." Asked for his current view on Iraq, he said, 'I'm personally committed to the idea that we have got to be successful in Iraq. The strategic consequences of failure would be enormous."

Regarding Jones's reported comment that Rumsfeld had emasculated the chiefs of the four armed services, the former Marine commandant implied that the problem lay more in the law than in the personality of Rumsfeld. He said that he was on record as supporting revision of the Goldwater-Nichols Act so that the chairman and Joint Chiefs would be placed into the operational chain of command, which now runs from the president to the secretary of defense to the four-star combatant commands.

By law, the service chiefs' role is primarily advisory and to prepare, train, and equip the forces for use by the combatant commands. In yet another attempt to get Jones to state publicly whether he is critical of Rumsfeld, the general was asked if he agreed with the retired generals who have called for the secretary of defense's resignation the past year.


"I do not associate myself with the 'revolt of the officers;" Jones said. "It is the general officers' obligation to let their views be known, and there are ways to do that." Jones added that he will not be denouncing Rumsfeldpublicly once he retires.

Jones did use the occasion to call for more attention to Alghanistan and particularly to formation of a "successful campaign strategy on the war oin drugs in Afghanistan," where opium cultivation has exploded. "We're losing ground, and it bothers me," he said. Some 9,000 NATO troops have recently moved into the south of Afghanistan, where the Taliban and drug lords have their stronghold. No permanent troops were stationed there before. NATO recently concluded "Operation Medusa" against the Taliban stronghold, which Jones called NATO's "first realtest of ground combat resolve since World War il." He declared the operation a success and says NATO's

current troop strength in Afghanistan "is adequate for the mission."

While the NATO commander may be satisfied with the number of troops in Afghanistan, he has his work cut out for him in negotiating away some of the 50 restrictions or "coveats" that some NATO countrils have placed on how their troops can be used. Some can't go after the Taliban or all Qaeda—they can only react once attacked: a few of the troops are not allowed to fight at night; others must stay in one geographical region. But Jones is primarily interested in forcing a new look at the overall strategy, not just the military operation. "The real challenge for the mission is how well the reconstruction and the international aid mission is focused," he said, particularly on counternarcotics efforts and judicial and police reform.

Information Paper: The U.S. Facenomy:

The level of defense spending as a proportion of national resources is out of proportion relative to historical levels.

• In 1953, near the end of the Korean War, defense spending accounted for 14% of gross domestic product (GDP). In 1968, at the height of the war in Vietnam, defense spending accounted for 9.5% of GDP. In 1986, near the end of the Cold War, defense spending accounted for 6.2% of GDP. In 2005, defense spending only accounted for 3.9% of GDP. See figure 1.

National defense has been getting the same size slice of the nation's income pie since the Korean War, yet the size of the income pie has nearly tripled.'




Figure 2. GDP and Defense Spending Per Capita.

- Defense spending per person has been flat since the Korean War. In 1953, we were spending the equivalent of \$1,920 per person on national defense and in 2005 we spent \$1,763 per person. Over the same period of time, gross domestic product per person has grown from \$13,000 to well over \$37,000 per person. See figure 2.
- Between 1968 and 2005, real gross domestic product grew by nearly 300% from \$3.7. trillion to over \$11 trillion. During the same time period, defense spending grew.by only 68% from \$358 billion to \$523 billion. See figure 3.

The Congressional Budget Office (CBO) and the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) predict growing federal tax revenues and declining deficits over the next five fiscal years.²




Figure 4. The Federal Deficit, 1929 – 2005 (and Estimates for 2006 – 2011).

• In 1968, the federal deficit was 2.8% of GDP and on a growing trend. In 2005, the deficit was 2.6% of GDP and on a declining trend. See figure 4.

Success in manning the All-Volunteer Force (AVF) requires a continued commitment to appropriate compensation as well as maintaining a desirable environment for service.

- In 1968, a soldier's salary was 25% lower than that of a typical full time worker in the private sector. By 2005, a soldier's salary was about 30% more than that of a typical full time worker in the private sector. See figure 5.3
- Increases in soldier compensation reflect the challenges of manning the AVF during a time of war and a strong economy.
- Increases in soldier compensation also reflect the high quality of people serving in today's Army. Our soldiers are more educated and demonstrate higher measured aptitude

CBO and OMB estimates assume nominal GDP growth of 5% per year; inflation of 2% per year, that revenues will remain constant as a percent of GDP, and that there will be no reform of Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, or the Alternative Minimum Tax. CBO projects that the deficit will become a surplus by 2012 by assuming expiration of the Economic Growth and Tax Relief Reconciliation Act of 2001 and that discretionary spending will grow at the rate of inflation.

than society at large. The Army is made up of highly-capable people who are dedicated to a lifetime of self-improvement and achievement. They want to **serve** but at the same time they want compensation that matches the quality of their service. They also want the opportunity to continually develop their skills in order to remain competitive in today's high-tech, globalized economy.

Today's economy rewards *high* quality people who can solve problems and work with ever-evolving technology. These are the same type of people that the Army has and will need well into the future. To help encourage these high quality people to serve, the Army provides attractive compensation. To keep these high quality people **in**, the Army provides and must continue to provide superior leadership, superior equipment based on cutting edge technology, and superior opportunities to engage in self-development.

As a percent of total spending, procurement and research, development, test, and evaluation (RDTE)spending have trended downward since the end of the Cold War. See figure 6.

- In 1984, Army procurement and RDTE accounted for 31% of total Army spending. In 2005, Army procurement and RDTE accounted for only 17.5% of total Army spending.
- In 1987, Army procurement and RDTE was \$28.1 hillion. By 2000, the figure had fallen to \$12.9 hillion. In 2005, the figure had grown to \$23.3 hillion, but the bulk of the growth was for procurement in supplemental funding for the Global West on Terrorism.⁴
- In 1999, we were spending \$7,083 per soldier on individual equipment. Today, we are spending \$25.980 per soldier. The increased spending results from our greater use of advanced technologies and commitment to force protection. Think back to Vietnam when we were sending soldiers into battle with little more than a steel pot and an M16. Today, we equip our soldiers with the highest quality equipment that allows them to see first, act first, finish decisively, and have the confidence to know that they will survive if surprised on the battlefield.
- The Army costs so much more today because of our increased reliance on advanced technologies and our greater commitment to force protection. Part of the cost increase can be attributed to higher personnel costs. Part of the cost increase can be attributed to higher than expected operational tempo. But the best way to understand the cost increase is to think of the increased quality of our Army relative to years past. Consider an analogy. In 1968 a brand new Ford Mustang cost an inflation-adjusted equivalent of \$8,000 whereas a 2006 Ford Mustang costs about \$27,000. Today's new car costs so much more in real terms because it is a qualitatively different car. It is more reliable, has better performance characteristics, and has exponentially better safety features. The same can be said for today's Army. It is more reliable, more capable, and exponentially better equipped fur today's fight. We need to make a continued commitment to investing in full spectrum capabilities in order to maintain our qualitative superiority.

Despite Small Increases Since 9/11, Department of Defense Spending As a Proportion of GDP Continues at its Lowest Levels Since Prior to World War II

Between 1968 and 2005, GDP Grew by Nearly 300% While Defense Spending Only Grew 68%

The Current Budget Deficit as a Percent of GDP is Smaller Than During the Reagan Defense Build-Up and,




Figure 5. Salary Accruals for Service Members and Civilian Full Time Equivalent Workers.




Figure 6. Army Procurement and RDTE Spending as a Percent of Total Spending.





Figure 7. Army Total, Procurement, and RDTE Spending, 1984-2005.



Breed characteristics

Most Lipizzaus measure between fourteeu and sixteen hands. They are compact and muscular, with very powerful hindquarters, allowing them to do the difficult "High School" (Dressage) movements, including the "airs above the ground." They generally have a strong-featured head with a convex profile, set high on a well-muscled, arched neck. They have short cannons, their legs have good bone, and well-sloped shoulders. Their gaits are powerful and elastic, although different in style from the Warmblood breeds seen in many Dressage competitions. Lipizzans are naturally balanced, well-known for excellent trainability and intelligence.

Lipizzans are slow to mature, usually not being put under saddle until the age of four, and not considered **fully** mature until the age of seven. However, they also are long-lived horses, often performing well into their mid-20s, and living into their thirties. For example, the stallion Siglavy Mantua I was a featured solo performer with the Spanish Riding School at the age of 26 during its 2005 tour of the United States.

Dear Secretary Rumsfeld:

I am writing to you in light of today's media reports on plans to maintain current force-levels in Iraq for another four years. I remain concerned that maintaining approximately 140.000 troops in Iraq presents significant challenges to the U.S. military's ability to perform its most critical security missions.

As Army Chief of Staff General Peter Schoomaker has repeatedly stated, exhausted stocks of vehicles and gear, as well as manpower shortages are leaving our forces strained beyond precedent and ill-prepared for combat duty. I am sure that you will agree that our soldiers' bravery and valor can never be exhausted. But the same cannot be said for the fleets of humvees, trucks, and aircraft they depend on. For this reason, I offered an amendment to the Fiscal Year 2007 Defense Appropriations bill to ensure that a \$17 billion shortfall in critical funding for repairing and replacing this weaponry was addressed. As you know, my amendment was approved unanimously by the Senate and incorporated into the final version of the Defense spending bill. But much more remains to be done.

As the United States responds to nuclear posturing along the Korean Peninsula, it is particularly important today that efforts are made to relieve the strain being placed on our Armed Forces. The United States must always be in a position to exercise all of its foreign policy options, including the military option.

Once again; it is being reported that the Army Chief of Staff is requesting that the proposed Department of Defense budget address critical shortfalls in the budget to replace or repair our fleets of vehicles and equipment wiped out and lost due to combat in Iraq and Afghanistan. Moreover, senior Army officials have been cited as expressing concern that the Army's current end-strength is inadequate to meet the ongoing manpower requirements of the wars.

Nonetheless, Congress' efforts to expand the size of the Army have been obstructed, forcing individual soldiers to repeatedly rotate into areas of operation for over a year. Such policies have seemingly strained unit morale, mental health, and military family relations. Now, according to media accounts, America's citizen-soldiers in the National Guard and Reserves are being told that they may have to increase the number of overseas deployments, even beyond the current rate of once every three to four years.

As policy-makers, we should have no higher priorities than the preparedness of ow military to protect our nation. Meeting these needs necessarily requires that we look after the safety and wellbeing of America's troops deployed in harm's way. As you develop the fiscal year 2008 Defense budget, I strongly urge you to develop a plan that will meet a \$25 billion requirement for vehicle and equipment needs reportedly identified by Army Chief of Staff General Peter Schoomaker. Furthermore, I strongly urge you to take steps to relieve the personnel strains caused by current defense policies and expand the active Army force to 560,000 troops, as advised by former Army Chief of Staff and current president of the Association of the United States Army, General Gordon Sullivan.

I look forward to reviewing a prompt response to this letter.

Thank you for your letter of October 12, 2006, to the Secretary of Defense, Honorable Donald Rumsfeld, concerning Army resources and readiness. Secretary Rumsfeld asked me to respond on his behalf.

The Nation continues to ask a great deal of the Army, and as you noted, our Soldiers are responding with extraordinary bravery and valor. It is imperative we do not take their service and sacrifices for granted. We must resource our Soldiers with the best training, equipment, and leadership that our Nation can offer, while at the same time provide them with a quality of life that is commensurate with the quality of their service.

I appreciate Congress' recent support, particularly for fully funding the Army's Fiscal Year 2007 reset requirement of \$17.1 billion in the fiscal year 2007 Defense Appropriations Act. Reset is critical to supporting the current fight, and it is vitally important to the future readiness of our Army. It is not a short-term requirement either. We will continue to require significant funds to repair, replace, and recapitalize our equipment for 2-3 years beyond the cessation of hostilities.

The scale of the Army's contribution to the current fight has strained all components of our force -- Active, Guard, and Reserve. The Quadrennial Defense Review calls for the Army to have 18 to 19 brigades available for deployment at all times. Due to existing requirements, we have surged well above this level for an extended period of time. We have done a great deal to minimize this strain, to include developing the Army Force Generation (ARFORGEN) Model to determine how to resource requests for Army forces. This model is based on predictable and assured access to reserve component units. It is important to understand that the deployment of reserve component forces is not an indication of a lack of readiness. Rather it is a fundamental part of our plan to resource Army requirements. It also represents a shift in the reserve component's role from a strategic reserve to an operational reserve.

Consistent with the authority provided by Congress in the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2007, the Army plans to grow to approximately 512,000 in 2008. This authority gives us the headroom both to transform the Army, and to increase the number of active duty brigade combat teams from 33 to 42. These initiatives have increased the operational Army from our pre-9/11 operational strength of

303,224 to 341,902 today. Our current plan is to increase the operational Army to 355,000 by Fiscal Year 2008. As always, the size of the Army will be reevaluated annually, and adjusted in accordance with operational demands.

Every 10,000 Soldiers added to the Army endstrength costs approximately \$1.2 billion per year. Funding for Army end-strength above 482,4000 is not included in the fiscal years 2008 – 2013 Program, and the Army simply cannot absorb an endstrength increase without a corresponding increase in resources. An unresourced endstrength increase would significantly exacerbate our continuous challenge to balance warfighting, readiness, reset, and modernization requirements.

As we developed the Fiscal Year 2008 budget, we worked closely with the Office of the Secretary of Defense to ensure that the resources the Army requires to support our National Security Strategy are clearly communicated and fully justified. Secretary Rumsfeld understands our requirements, and supports our efforts to balance the resources we receive with the requirements asked of us.

Ultimately, our Army's readiness, both today and tomorrow, depends on a national commitment to recruit, train, and equip our Soldiers, and to support their families – it is really a matter of National priorities, not affordability. At the height of the Second World War, Defense expenditures exceeded 38 percent of our Gross Domestic Product (GDP). Today, these expenditures amount to less than 4 percent of the GDP. In this extraordinarily dangerous time for the Nation, we can and must reverse this trend.

With the support of Congress, we have prepared the Army to operate in the 21st Century security environment. But as we look to Fiscal Year 2008 and beyond, we face significant challenges. I look forward to working together with the Congress as we address these important issues.

Thank you for your interest in the well-being of our Soldiers and their families and your continued support of our Army.



U.S. Defense Spending as a Percentage of GDP





U.S. Defense Spending*



Your review and coordination is again requested based on an additional request by the Secretary of Defense, dated September 25,2006, that the timeliness of completing military and criminal investigations be examined and any impediments to expediting the process he identified and corrected. (Jab C). Previously, I asked you to review and coordinate on a proposed response to the Secretary's note of August 2nd that thought be given to changing the review process from sequential to concurrent reviews. The proposed response was to recommend that the Department "stay the course" with sequential review, but to place increased emphasis on expediting the review process. (Tab B).

Because both of the Secretary's notes express concern with the timeliness of investigations, a combined response for your review and coordination is provided at Tab A. The proposed response recommends that the Secretary establish 120 days as a reasonable standard of time in which to expect the completion of high-interest investigations, and that a working group be established to examine the investigative process for impediments to timeliness arid recommend corrective measures. From the following options, I am asking for your specific recommendation regarding a proposed working group review:

- I. Recommend no working group be established: or
- 2. Recommend that a working group be established comprised of investigators, judge advocates, and other DoD experts experienced military and criminal investigations; or
- Recommend that a blue-ribbon panel of outside experts be established under the auspices of the Federal Advisory Committee Act for reasons of public education and transparency of the review process.

This responds to your snowflakes of August 2nd and September 25th expressing concern over the length of time it takes to conduct military and criminal investigations. Tab C. On August 2nd you stated that thought should he given to requiring that the current system of sequential reviews be changed to concurrent reviews in order to expedite the time it takes to bring closure to these investigations and appropriate actions. Regarding the investigation review process, I asked Jim Haynes to address this and make recommendations after coordinating with the Secretaries of the Military . Departments and Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. His evaluation and recommendations, in which the Secretaries of the Military Departments concurred, are at Tab B. Recognizing the many facets and considerations involved in the timing, and subsequent review, of military and criminal investigations, I agree with his assessment that requiring concurrent reviews map create more problems than is warranted by the time potentially saved. I share his view that our emphasis should be on expediting existing processes and improving summaries of status reports for key superior officials with a "need to know,"

On September 25th, you emphasized that investigations take too long and that the process ought to be brought into the 21st Century. Consistent with the above recommendation that emphasis should be placed on expediting the investigative and review processes, the proposed memorandum at **Tab A** stresses the importance of expediting these investigations and establishes a reasonable completion deadline for high-interest investigations. In order to identify antirectify possible impediments to expedited investigations, Jim Haynes also asked the Secretaries of the Military Departments and the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff to consider a working group of experts experienced with these investigations and their review he established to examine this "timeliness" issue and make corrective recommendations. The working group would be a panel of investigators, judge advocates and other DoD experts familiar with military and criminal investigations, or a blue-ribbon panel of outside experts established under the Federal Advisory Committee Act for reasons of public education and transparency of the review process. The consensus view was Lagree with this recommendation.

SUBJECT: Timeliness of High-Interest investigations

Each year the Department of Defense conducts thousands of investigations into a wide variety of issues and incidents. Most are administrative but some are criminal; most are relatively simple in scope but some are quite complex; most are of interest primarily to the Department or one of its components but some are also of interest to the public, the media and Congress. I am concerned about the timeliness of investigations of national or worldwide interest, regardless of subject matter, scope or complexity—high-interest investigations.

The essential element of any investigation is thoroughness. An investigation that leaves significant questions unanswered or that provides a cursory, and therefore perhaps misleading, account of the facts does no one a service. But thorough investigations that take many months to complete also do a disservice: to those in the Department who rely on timely completion so they can act, to the individuals involved who await timely completion so they can know where they stand, to the public that expects timely completion as a manifestation of the Department's commitment to resolving the issue or incident under investigation, including assessing accountability as appropriate, and to the Congress, which must await timely completion before exercising its oversight responsibilities.

Accordingly, I expect each of you to make the timely completion of high-visibility investigations a priority within your components and a matter of personal interest. For purposes of this memorandum, a timely investigation is one that is completed within 120 days of the date that the command becomes aware of the incident to be investigated. You may grant exceptions to this timeline in extraordinary circumstances only. If additional resources are needed, I expect you to provide them. If concurrent staffing of completed investigations within the administrative and operational branches of the chain of command is needed, I expect you to coordinate such a review. Without sacrificing thoroughness at any stage of the investigative process, you should ensure that timely investigations become the standard in all high-interest cases.



To assist you in this effort. I have asked the General Counsel of the Department of Defense to establish a working group of experts to identify impediments to timely investigations and solutions to those impediments. Please provide him the support he needs in this important project.

- This responds to the Secretary's question whether military and criminal investigation reports should be concurrently reviewed, as opposed to the general practice of command sequential reviews. Tab A.
- Administrative and criminal investigations should be conducted concurrently, notwithstanding their different purposes and procedural requirements, thereby expediting the beginning of the review process.
 - o Great caution is required to ensure that the administrative investigation does not impede or compromise the higher-priority criminal investigation (e.g., by failing to properly account for or preserve evidence for possible criminal prosecution or prematurely alerting witnesses and suspects of the investigation and its evidence).
- Concurrent reviews may also be directed. The manner in which reviews are conducted, sequentially or concurrently, is not a legal requirement, but governed by policy regulations and practical considerations.
- Sequential reviews better allow responsible commanders to conduct their independent reviews without direct or indirect pressure from superiors or outside influences that potentially may impact their discretionary decisions.
 - O Sequential command review process is **more** time-consuming than a system of concurrent reviews.
- Concurrent reviews potentially increase the likelihood of two problems that would require special attention:
 - o First, expanding the number of persons with access to reports increases the chances of premature releases of information ("leaks" to outside sources or pressures upon senior officials to respond to inquiries concerning the content of reports that are known to be possessed).



- O Second, there is an increased **risk** of **superior-subordinate**unlawful command influence or direct or indirect interference, placing in question the discretionary command decisions and any resultant command accountability actions.
- o Neither problem is insurmountable, but the first is more difficult to guard against and control than is the second, and the second presents more significant legal problems than the first.
- O Requiring concurrent reviews may create more problems than is warranted by the time saved.
- Expediting the completion of investigations may require the supplementation
 of resources that are currently available to senior commanders.

RECOMMENDATION. That you advise the Secretary that we should stay the course with sequential reviews, but expedite status reports and improve the summaries of those status reports for key superior officials with a "need to know." Rationale:

- Concurrent reviews **are** likely to increase incidents involving **the pre**decisional release of information and thereby transform **what** may be a sensitive investigation into **a** public debate or media event.
- Concurrent reviews increase the chance that senior officials' statements, intentional or otherwise, may be perceived as an effort to insert improper influence on a subordinate's discretionary decisions, thereby creating litigation issues and jeopardizing individual accountability actions.
- Senior officials may benefit from the perspectives, decisions, and actions of subordinate command officials.

The following comments are provided in response to your draft reply to the question posed by the Secretary of Defense at Tab A regarding military and criminal investigations:

It is important to distinguish between investigations and their *review*. It is also important to distinguish criminal investigations from command and administrative/safety investigations (which have varying objectives, requirements and timelines).

Your draft reply recommends "stayingthe course" (with sequential vice concurrent review), with some specific recommendations. I agree, and I believe current regulations and guidance are sufficient to ensure the expeditious completion of the review of most investigations. In exceptionally complicated, high-profile cases there are additional ways to accelerate completion of the reviews, such as streamlining the review process by paring the number of commands that endorse investigations, and imposing "special" shortened review timelines. These recommendations should not become the norm for all investigations, but, rather, could be imposed in those cases of particular public interest.

The recommendation to continue sequential (vice concurrent) review should include a brief reference to the fact that sequential review allows the chain of command to more effectively re-direct, refine, and clarify investigations at each development stage

We appreciate the support you have provided, and continue to provide, in tactical training, personal equipment, weapons, helicopters and facilities for all of the Afghan police and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA). We also we believe more needs to be done.

With regard to your support, we fully appreciate the Department of Defense's (DoD) position that the opium and illicit drug trafficking threat is primarily a "law enforcement problem" in Afghanistan and recognize your valid concern about "mission creep." Your awareness of the adverse impact that eradication of opium could have on poor farmers, combined with the possibility of increased insurgency and loss of support from the local populous that the DoD might face from such a opium eradication program, is reflected in your timely and courageous support for rural development by the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) in Afghanistan.

We have **spoken** out on the Department of State's failed eradication program, as well as the need for the DEA to turn the hulk of the U.S. counterdrug policy and effort in Afghanistan against the major drug kingpins, the heroin processing labs, and the drug convoys. These same convoys carry the drugs out and bring hack the new NVGs, IEDs, landmines, and modem weapons, including crew-served weapons, all purchased with the drug monies from the Taliban and other anti-coalition forces. In addition, we have heard that these drug monies *are* also used to pay foreign fighters as well.

We all know the drugs fuel the violence and insurgency, we think that the debate concerning these obvious links is over, and now we need a new policy that addresses both the drugs and related terror, simultaneously.

As to your Department's view that the counterdrug mission is one of law enforcement in Afghanistan, and with the DEA's increased presence and willingness to take on the Afghan drug mission to go after the prioritized targets that we noted above, the problem we need to solve now is one simply of mobility. The DEA cannot function and carry out its law enforcement role, including enforcing the new PATRIOT Act provision on narco-terrorism,

without military support and assistance in the current Afghan security climate, and that means the DoD's military operational and tactical air support for some of the DEA's counterdrug missions across Afghanistan.

We need to fight both drugs and terror simultaneously and have both your Department and the DEA doing this job, but in complement, so that we prevail in Afghanistan. We must find a way to merge your counterinsurgency mission with that of the DEA's drug- fighting mission. We have some simple suggestions on how to do so quickly in the interim, until such time as the DEA has its own capacity to conduct missions and operations in country and the security situation improves dramatically to permit the DEA's own independent operations. This mission gap must be filled before the start of the 2007 Afghanistan opium crop.

We suggest for your consideration actions which the DoD could undertake to improve the situation on the counternarcotics front in Afghanistan. Specifically, we suggest that DoD shall permit, facilitate and encourage DEA agents to participate (ride along, in fact) in DoD Sensitive Site Exploitation (SSE) operations in Afghanistan, including SSE operations involving: (1) overlapping high-value DoD and DEA targets, (2) direct action missions in which there are a strong likelihood that a targeted Anti-Coalition Militant (ACM) may be in possession of substantial amounts of illicit narcotics based on DoD or DEA intelligence information, or (3) any planned, direct-action mission in areas of traditional, strong-opium production and processing, such as the Helmand province.

Any involvement of DEA agents in SSE operations as described above shall occur only after the targeted locations have been fully secured and are deemed safe for civilian law enforcement personnel.

In all other instances where extensive amounts of illicit drugs are located at secured sites by DoD personnel, the DEA should be alerted as soon as possible, and in a timely fashion, so that it can *take* appropriate action consistent with the previously suggested actions and attendant criteria.

We very much appreciate your taking the time to consider this proposal

Thank you for your letter regarding Department of Defense (DoD) counternarcotics support in Afghanistan. We appreciate your recognition of the support the Department has provided the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) and the Afghan police over the past several years to help improve their capability to stem narcotics production and trafficking.

In **2002**, the United Kingdom assumed the position **of G-8** lead nation for counternarcotics in Afghanistan. Since Afghanistan has become a sovereign nation the **U.K.has** continued to maintain a leading role in supporting the Afghan National Drug Control Strategy. The State Department, as the **U.S.** counternarcotics lead, supports the Afghan government and complements U.K. efforts through the **U.S.** Embassy in **Kabal.** DoD acknowledges its unique abilities and authorities are essential in supporting **U.K.** and State Department efforts to reduce narcotics production and trafficking in Afghanistan. Law enforcement forces face enormous challenges in Afghanistan, and the Department is committed to continuing its support for the counternarcotics efforts there.

Regarding your specific recommendations for DoD, the Secretary has already taken such action. The forces supporting Operation Enduring Freedom (OEF) currently have authority to embed non-military counternarcotics personnel, to include DEA, when operating in areas of known or suspected drug-related activity. OEF forces also have been instructed to notify DEA regarding the disposition of significant drug caches discovered during operations. Although these authorities have existed for more than a year, we have taken your concerns very seriously and will work more closely with DEA to make use of this important capability.

Afghanistan: Five Years Later

As we reach the five-year'anniversary of the beginning of Operation Enduring Freedom, it is natural to cast an eye on Afghanistan. While attention generally focuses on Iraq, Afghanistan remains one of the central fronts in the War on Terror. After all, only five years ago Afghanistan was a lawless region that provided a training ground and sanctuary for Osama bin Laden's deadly al-Qaeda network.

In today's age, there is often a tendency to measure progress against an unrealizable ideal—to expect development to occur in a vacuum that does not factor in preexisting conditions. It is bard to comprehend how destitute Afghanistan was in 2001—and how much progress has been made since. Afghanistan was one of the poorest nations in the world with little infrastructure; it was ruled by a vicious totalitarian regime; drought had decimated agricultural mainstays; the economy was a shambles; and decades of war had left it a broken, lawless nation.

And yet now, despite ongoing violence in some provinces, there is a vast array of promising indicators across a broad spectrum—from security to education to health care. Afghanistan is now a fragile democracy, and a strong ally in the War on Terror. The population is free and is taking advantage of the increasing political and economic opportunities. And the government continues to extend the arm of peace and order to long-neglected regions of the country.

This is not to downplay the very real threats that still face Afghanistan. It is merely to say that any candid discussion of the mission should include the good as well as the bad. Five years on, there is a multitude of good news—testament to the hard work and dedication of our armed forces, the international community, and, most important, the Afghan people themselves.

Democratic Reforms

The Taliban ruled by force and imposed a radical interpretation & Islam on the entire population. There were no freedoms to speak of, particularly for women. There were numerous bans on leisure activities, such as television, various games and sports, even kite-flying. There was only one state-sanctioned radio station. Criminal punishments for those who ran afoul & the regime included amputations, stonings, and public executions.

Today:

❖ The Afghanistan constitution, signed into law in **2004**, includes provisions to protect individual rights, particularly for women.

- ❖ In the 2004 presidential election, more than 8 million Afghans voted, and 41 percent were women. In the 2005 parliamentary election, more than 50 percent of eligible voters cast a ballot.
- Women hold 68 of 188 seats in the lower house of parliament.
- Approximately 50,000 domestic election observers were trained for the 2005 parliamentary election.
- ❖ At least 40 judicial centers have been built or rehabilitated, and almost 600 judges trained.
- ❖ There are now 32 independent radio stations that reach 60 percent of the population.
- ❖ At least 4.7 million refugees have returned to Afghanistan.

Education

It is a well-known fact that the Taliban did not believe in education for women. But the Taliban's neglect of Afghanistan's people was not limited to women: By the end of the Taliban regime, Afghanistan had a 70 percent illiteracy rate, and 80 percent of schools had been damaged or destroyed. In 2002, only 32 percent of school-age children were enrolled, and 97 percent of girls did not attend.

Today:

- ❖ At least 5 million students are enrolled, a 500 percent increase since 2001. Of these, 40 percent are women and girls.
- ❖ More than 50,000 teachers have been trained. At least 65,000 teachers regularly listen to a radio teaching program that airs daily.
- ❖ More than 500 schools, which serve 400,000 students, have been built. All are repaired with local materials and expertise—and are earthquake-resistant.
- ❖ The United States helped create an Afghanistan Primary Education Program to make up for lost schooling years under the Talihan. At its peak, 170,000 students attended daily, 58 percent of whom were women.
- ❖ The United States has helped print more than 48 million textbooks and distribute more than 42 million textbooks.

Health Care

In 2001, only 8 percent of Afghanistan's population had access to health care. The maternal mortality rate was the highest in the world. There was no health-care infrastructure to speak of.

Today:

- ❖ At least 80 percent of the population has access to at least basic health care.
- ❖ More than 500 health clinics have been built and serve 340,000 patients per month. These clinics reach approximately 7.4 million citizens.
- ❖ For rural areas, at least 2,000 community health workers have been trained, and they treat an additional 150,000 people per month.
- ❖ Since 2004, full immunization for children 1-2 years of age has increased 150 percent, to 37 percent of the population. The United States has helped vaccinate at least 5 million children.
- ❖ The United States has treated 700,000 cases of malaria.
- ❖ To combat childhood polio, the United Nations Children's Fund and the World Health Organization provided vaccinations of 9.9 million children.

Economics

After 25 years of war, the economy of Afghanistan in 2001 was almost non-existent. There was no centralized government to institute economic policies, and little infrastructure—not even a formal banking system. What commerce there was existed outside of 'any domestic or international structure. There were few opportunities available to Afghans to better their situation.

Today:

- ❖ The Afghanistan economy was valued at \$2.4 billion in 2002. The number for 2006 is \$7.3 billion, and projected to rise to \$8.8 billion next year.
- Per capita income has doubled since 2001.

- ❖ The government of Afghanistan collected more than \$177 million in revenue in 2002–2003, and \$300 million in 2004–2005, an increase of 70 percent. President Karzai estimates the revenue for 2005–2006 will be \$500 million.
- ❖ More than 3 million land deeds and more than 55,000 businesses have been registered since 2001. At least 85 percent of all property deeds have been restored or reorganized, decreasing land-ownership disputes.
- ❖ There is now a Central Bank with 32 computerized provincial branches. The Central Bank has \$2 billion in foreign reserves.
- ❖ More than 10,000kilometers of road have been built or improved since the Taliban fell. And at least 3,000 kilometers more are under construction.
- The average speed on most roads has increased 300 percent.
- ❖ The completion of the Kabul-Kandahar highway improved transportation for 30 percent of country, and reduced travel times for those two cities from 15 hours to 6 hours. USAID 9.12
- ❖ The U.S. portion of the Kandahar-Herat highway has reduced travel time between those two major cities from 10hours to 4.3 hours.
- Rehabilitation of the Kajaki **Dem** and surrounding transmission lines will **bring** power to 1.7 million Afghans in a critical security area.
- ❖ According to the World Bank, Afghanistan ranks near the top of all nations in ease of starting a business.
- ❖ Coca-Cola opened a \$25 million bottling plant in Kabul, which employs approximately 500 Afghans.
- ❖ Ford, 3M, and Boeing are examining business opportunities in Afghanistan.
- ❖ Wherever the infrastructure and security situation is improved, what little support there is for the Taliban continues to decline.
- Numerous structural-improvement projects are ongoing, and many others are planned and have funding committed for them.

Agriculture

Agriculture has long been a mainstay **A** the Afghanistan economy, and it **is** estimated that 70 percent **A** the population makes its living off the land. Opium production remains

a problem, but in areas where infrastructure and security has been improved—and where alternative-livelihood programs have been initiated—there has tended to be a decline in opium production.

- There have been more than 28,000 micro-loans given out for agricultural activities.
- ❖ At least 140 farm markets have been constructed.
- Agricultural programs to increase farming efficiency now extend to more than 1 million fanners.
- ❖ At least 2.5 million Afghans have benefited from irrigation and road projects linking farms to market.
- ❖ Irrigation rehabilitation has improved water supplies for more than 1 million acres approximately 10 percent of nationwide farmland.
- More than 210 imgation structures have been built and nearly 4,500 kilometers of canals cleaned.
- Since 2004, there has been a 40 percent increase in cereal production, and a 46 percent increase in wheat production.
- Almost 4.000 acres of fruit and nut orchards have been planted in the eastern region.
- ❖ More than 19,000 women have been trained in improved poultry management.
- ❖ At least 14 million head of cattle have been vaccinated or treated.
- ❖ For every \$1 USAID has invested in agriculture, there has been an \$11 return.
- Only 8 percent of the population makes its living from the opium trade.

Security

There is no doubt that security continues to be a major challenge. Remnants of theformer Taliban regime and elements of al-Qaeda continue to try to derail progress throughout the country. But just jive years ago, there was no formulized rule of law; there was no respected national army; there was no national police force. The nation had been wracked by war for nearly 30 years—and was a pariah from the international community. Only three states were willing to accord the government diplomatic

recognition—and there was little order within Afghanistan. The Taliban harbored and supported al-Oaeda, the world's most deadly terrorist organization.

Today:

- ❖ Afghanistan is no longer an open sanctuary for al-Qaeda.
- ❖ The Afghan National Army (ANA) currently has more than 30,000 trained and equipped troops; the Afghan National Police has more than 46,000 trained and equipped forces. Approximately 4,000 Afghan security forces are still in training.
- ❖ The ANA is growing at a rate of approximately 1,000a month, and the **force** may increase to 70,000.
- The ANA has successfully conducted independent combat operations and continues to improve its combat capabilities.
- The ANA is composed of five corps and ten brigades. It is an infantry-centric force focused on counterinsurgency capability.
- After the Taliban fell, the private militias of tribal chief and "warlords" were placed under the control of the Ministry of Defense—then disarmed and demohilized.
- ❖ There are 21,000 U.S. troops in Afghanistan; there were less than 10,000 in 2002; and approximately 13,000 in 2003; and similar numbers to present in 2004 and 2005.
- There are 40 nations with troops on the ground in Afghanistan, and approximately 40,000 international troops in country.
- ❖ For the first time in its history. NATO forces are deployed beyond their traditional European borders.
- ❖ NATO's conunand in Afghanistan—the International Security Assistance Force (ISAF)—expanded in July to cover Afghanistan's southern provinces.
- ❖ The Operation Enduring Freedom Coalition transferred authority for all security operations to NATO/ISAF on Oct. 5. This will improve command and control and coordination within Afghanistan.
- ❖ There are 24 Provisional Reconstruction Teams (PRTs) controlled by NATO operating throughout the nation. These entities, a mixture of military and civilians, are involved in infrastructure improvement.

While it has become fashionable in some circles to call Afghanistan a forgotten war, or to say the United States has lost its focus, the facts belie the myths. To be sure, no one doubts that great obstacles still exist; the recent up-tick in violence reiterates that the enemies of a stable, peaceful Afghanistan remain persistent and motivated.

Even so, the Afghan people — with strong support from free nations across the globe-are building a future they can be proud of: secure and prosperous at home, and respected abroad

Warren P. Strobel's and William Douglas's recent article ("U.S. Broadcasts Into Iran Called Too *Soft"*) is riddled with errors, starting with the first sentence. The reporters' claim—that a "Pentagon Unit has drafted a report" on U.S. radio broadcasts into Iran—is incorrect in every respect.

An individual DoD employe — because of specific language skills—was asked by an interagency committee on Iran policy to monitor and personally evaluate **U.S.** broadcasting into Iran. She did so. There was no "Pentagon report." The charge made that there is a 'gambit' underway by the Pentagon to take control of Iranian broadcasts is simply wrong.

Unfortunately, the remainder of the article follows a similar course, insinuating repeatedly that the Pentagon is preparing for a confrontation with Iran. Again, the facts interfere with a good story. The President and Secretary of State are on a diplomatic track with Iran, and there is no daylight between their policy and the Department of Defense.

Strobel and Douglas even referenced the now-defunct Office of Special Plans, even though the myths surrounding that entity—and repeated in this article—were thoroughly discredited by the Robb-Silberman Commission and the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence.

Finally, contrary to the article's insinuations, having an Iran policy office at the Pentagon is not a mystery. In both State and Defense, the Near East bureaus have offices dealing with Iran, as well as offices dealing with policy toward every other country in the region. These Iran offices were established to support closer interagency work on Iran policy, not for imagined or nefarious purposes.

We ask that these errors be corrected in every publication in which this story appeared.

The Services and Infrastructure Money

When I came *in*, I looked at the *infrastructure* of the Department and sensed that the Services had been using infrastructure money as a piggy bank for weapons and the like.

I said we should end it, and I put each Service on a trajectory where they would end up having all their facilities and their Departments up to snuff in a set number of years. And then, during the next year, they continued to use those **furchs** as a piggy bank. My recollection is the Army **remains** at something like a **150-year** recap rate and is supposed to be at **45** years.

SUBJECT: Role of the Department of Defense in Disaster Response

Thank you for your memoranda dated June 16 and June 30 respectively, which follow up on our discussions regarding the need to develop plans for the Department of Defense (DoD) to he prepared to play a significant role in responding to a natural or man-made disaster. I appreciate your ongoing dialogue to work through these issues, and concur with your mutual conclusion that we must develop a contingency plan Ter employing our military forces to response to a disaster, and that we must complete this plan soon—before the next disaster strikes.

As we approach the heart of hurricane season, ten months since Hurricane Katrina struck and live months since the Homeland Security Council's Lessons Learned report was released, it is important that the appropriate roles and responsibilities of DoD in response to disasters are clearly defined. Please provide me your positions on the following issues:

- 1. Legislative change regarding the lead role for domestic incident management. Hurricane Katrina Lessons Learned Recommendation 22 states that "DOD and DHS should develop recommendations for revision of the NRP to delineate the circumstances, objectives, and limitations of when DOD might temporarily assume the lead for the Federal response to a catastrophic incident." Attorneys from your departments, as well as the White House and the Department of Justice, have concluded that the very broad incident management responsibilities assigned to the Secretary of Homeland Security in section 502(3) of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 cannot be reassigned, even temporarily, to the head of another department or agency without new legislation. Alternatives that would define an enhanced role for the Secretary of Defense within the present statutory framework have been considered and found to be suboptimal. Would you favor a legislative change that would give the President the discretion to assign the section 502(3) responsibilities, on a temporary basis, to another official?
- 2. Policy guidance. Assuming that the Honieland Security Act is amended as described above, policy guidance will be required that describes the factors for consideration to inform a decision by the President lo transfer the lead responsibility for domestic incident management and directs the development of a detailed plan for implementing such a decision, including a delineation of responsibilities under the NRP in the event of such a

transfer. I request your concurrence on the following factors for consideration: which have been developed jointly by our staffs:

- a. the availability and effectiveness of Federal, State, and local responders, private sector contractors, and non-profit volunteers;
- b. the effectiveness of coordination among Federal departments and agencies and the State and local governments in the affected jurisdictions;
- c. the existence of requests for Federal military or disaster relief assistance from the Governors of the affected Slates, and the status of the implementation of the NRP and emergency authorities; and
- d. the need for the involvement of active duty U.S. military forces in the response to the incident, and the need for an integrated or coordinated command structure among the Federal military forces, State National Guard forces under the Adjutant(s) General, the Governor(s), and other Federal and State personnel and assets.
- 3. Detailed plan for a significant DoD role. The level of cooperation and coordination between your departments has been outstanding, and much good work has been accomplished in preparation for this hurricane season as well as implementing the recommendations from the Katrina Lessons Learned report. However, we must develop detailed plans for DoD to undertake a significant role in the Federal response to a catastrophic event, whilether that role involves managing the response at the direction of the President (assuming a legislative change described above) or performing significant responsibilities at the request of the Secretary of Homeland Security exercising delegated Presidential authority (e.g., tinder the Stafford Act). Please provide me an update on your planning efforts in support of this objective.
- 4. New or amended legal authorities for the use of Federal military forces. Attorneys from your Departments as well as the White House and the Department of Justice convened a working group to determine whether any changes are needed to the relevant legal authorities governing the use of military forces for domestic disaster response. The consensus view was that no such changes are necessary. Please confer with your respective General Counsels, and let me know if you concur with that view.
- 5. Guidelines for the employment of military forces in civil support operations. In light of the niultiple authorities and circumstances for the employment of military forces in domestic civil support operations, it has been suggested that we develop a "playbook" containing agreed-upon guidelines for the deployment of Federal military forces in disaster relief. It is my understanding that the legal working group has developed a draft document that discusses the relevant authorities. Please let me know your views on whether a "playbook" is desirable, and, if so, are you satisfied that current draft is complete.
- 6. **Military** employment agreements. We must determine the best means for us to reach an agreement with State officials on the use of Federal troops in coordination with National Guard in disaster response. While we should prepare for and maintain the option of establishing a dual status command structure for pre-planned events (e.g.

National Special Security Events), we must also be prepared to consider other memoranda of agreement to set forth responsibilities and command/control/coordination arrangements for catastrophic incidents as a means of ensuring that National Guard and active military forces achieve unity of effort. These agreements will serve as a foundation from which Federal forces and National Guard forces can develop joint plans, training, and exercises for significant domestic response operations. Please let me know your specific recommendations regarding the development of other possible coordination mechanisms, including other memoranda of agreement.

I have **asked** Kenneth Rapuano, the Deputy Assistant to the President for Homeland Security, to host a meeting with your Deputies tomorrow to resolve these issues or develop decision options.

Thank you for your attention to this matter and for your continued efforts to enhance our disaster response readiness.

SUBJECT: Playbook for Times of Disaster and the Role of the Department of

Defense in Disaster Response

Per my memorandum to you and Secretary Chertoff of August 3,2006 (copy attached), among other things I asked for your view on the desirability of a playbook. I am told that the memorandum was transmitted to OSD, but unfortunately it did not reach you. I agree that a playbook should be developed, and that process is already well underway.

Under the leadership of John Mitnick of the White House Counsel's office, a lawyers' working group composed of attorneys from DOD, DHS, DOJ, and the White House has been developing a compilation of the legal authorities relating to use of Federal military forces in disaster relief, which would provide the legal basis for an operationally-focused playbook. DoD's representative is Carl Wagner of Homeland Defense.

Based on input from the working group, DOJ's Office of Legal Counsel completed a drat? of the authorities document on July 13 and circulated it to the group for comment. Mr. Wagner (DoD) promptly provided comments to the group on July 17, and DHS is still reviewing the document. Although the document has not been finalized, I agree with Secretary Chertoff that there is broad consensus among the attorneys on the authorities.

Last Thursday, after discussions with Mr. Mitnick, and in keeping with Secretary Chertoff's domestic incident management responsibilities, the DHS General Counsel's office undertook to draft a playbook drawing on and incorporating portions of the authorities document for legal backup. We expect to receive their draft shortly, which, once reviewed and cleared by the interagency working group, will be staffed at senior levels of the relevant departments and in the White House.

In a conversation with Admiral Giambastiani yesterday prior to the hurricane preparedness meeting with the President, it became clear to me that the Joint Chiefs were not aware of the draft authorities document. Immediately after the meeting I provided a copy to Admiral Giambastiani and also to Admiral Keating.

There are several other issues addressed in my August 3 memorandum, and there have been further discussions on some of them; e.g., Assistant Secretary McHale and Deputy Secretary Jackson met with Kenneth Rapuano on August 4 on the issue of the desirability of a legislative

change regarding the lead role in domestic incident management. I would appreciate your thoughts on those other issues.

I look forward to continuing to work with you on disaster relief preparedness,

- This memorandum provides an interim response to your note (next under) requesting an update regarding DoD's role in catastrophic response, as referenced in Fran Townsend's memorandums of August 3, 2006 (TAB A) and August 17,2006 (TAB B).
- Legal Authorities: In mid-August, DOJ's Office of Legal Counsel completed a draft authorities document describing DoD's potential roles and responsibilities in responding to a catastrophic event, natural or man-made. A lawyer from my staff participated in the preparation of the draft. The Joint Staff is completely familiar with its content. It envisions a supporting role for DoD, with the role of Lead Federal Agency assigned by statute (Homeland Security Act of 2002) to DHS. The draft is still under formal review by DHS, though I am trying to move it through their bureaucracy with a sense of urgency.
- **Draft Playbook:** A Playbook for Times of Disaster and the Role of the Department of <u>Defense in Disaster Response</u> has also been prepared by an interagency working group. Unfortunately, it too is in draft form, subject to on going interagency coordination. The title "Playbook" is misleading, in that it really is limited to a discussion of legal authorities, not operational capabilities.
- 15 National Planning Scenarios: Interagency progress is finally being made toward deliverable, integrated operational capabilities necessary to support a national response to catastrophic events. A DoD Strategic Guidance Statement is now near completion and, when published, will require our department to plan for the various DoD roles and missions in response to each of the 15 National Planning Scenarios (TAB C). I am pushing the HSC and DHS to require all relevant Federal departments and agencies to engage in similar planning. DHS has agreed to send 10 students to our next year-long Planners Course at the Joint Forces Staff College. The 15 National Planning Scenarios, if properly emphasized by DHS, can now become the driver of true jointness for interagency consequence management planning (e.g., Goldwater-Nicbols for the interagency). Moreover, if tied to DHS grant money, these same 15 scenarios can be used to shape mutually supporting state and local plans, thereby achieving an integrated <u>national</u> response.
- I will keep you informed as these documents and capabilities move forward.

The House Government Reform Committee, Subcommittee on National Security, Emerging Threats, and International Relations with jurisdiction authority and oversight responsibility of matters affecting the "overall economy, efficiency and management of government operations and activities" (Rule X, clause 1(h) (6), Rules of the House of Representatives) recently hold 4 hearing entitled Weapons of Mass Destruction: Current Nuclear Proliferation Challenges.

During the course of the hearing a discussion ensued concerning the extent nonproliferation sanctions affected the policies of rogue regimes. Specifically, Iran, also a Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty (NPT) signatory, is suspected of pursuing nuclear weapons technology. Iran's attempts to acquire nuclear, chemical, and biological weapons and missiles to deliver them, along with its longtime support of terrorism, led President Bush in his January 29, 2062, State of the Unioneddress to label Iran part of an "axis of evil," along with Iraq and North Korea. Taking advantage of bath foreign

assistance and the dual-use nature of WMD- and missile-related technologies, Iran has received help from entities in Russia, China, and North Korea for its missile program, and from entities in Russia and Pakistan for its nuclear program.

Iran continues to test missiles and has moved ahead with its civilian nuclear program, which many observers believe supports a covert nuclear weapons program. In March 2002, a CIA official testified to Congress that the United States would "most likely" face an intercontinental ballistic missile threat from Iran by 2015 possibly flight-testing an ICBM by 2010 with Russian or North Koreanhelp.

Iran's nuclear program has been the subject of intense scrutiny.

Although most concerns before 2003 focused on Russian cooperation with Iran on completing the Bushehr power reactors, recent revelations have focused concerns on the scope of Iran's uranium centrifuge enrichment program, its laser enrichment program, plutonium separation activities, and heavy water production-

The IAEA Board of Governors has stopped short of declaring from in violation of the NPT, although the United States has pushed strongly for such a declaration. However, the IAEA has reported numerous failures by Iran to disclose facilities and activities.

In late 2003, Iran agreed to suspend certain aspects of its nuclear program in exchange for promises by the European Union to facilitate nuclear cooperation. Iran also signed an Additional Protocol to a nuclear safeguards agreement in December 2003. One year later, however, Iran has not yet taken the legislative steps to ratify the Additional Protocol, and there have been significant gaps in implementing the suspension of enrichment and reprocessing activities.

The Subcommittee requests a briefing on DOD's assessment of Iran's nuclear weapon capabilities and a timeframe when DOD Intelligence believes Iran will acquires nuclear weapons. The Subcommittee asks that the briefing take place the week of November 13,2096.

I agree with General Bikenberry's comment that where the road ends the Taliban begins. We continue to place a high priority on creating a road network for Afghanistan that will promote commerce, create jobs, and improve governance and security through increased mobility. It has been just over two months since our last correspondence on this subject in August, and I want to provide you an update on our efforts to develop Afghanistan's road network.

Eighty percent, 1700 kilometers, of the 2200 kilometer Afghan Ring Road is now or will be completed by November 2006. The United States funded 715 kilometers, and other donors funded 985 kilometers. Progress on the remainder of the Ring Road is not yet assured. Construction on the 114 kilometer Japanese funded Kandahar to Geresk Ring Road segment has stalled. Spain and the Asian Development Bank are discussing funding and construction details for 267 kilometers of road in Faryab province. Another 122 kilometers of Ring Road in Badghis province is unfunded.

Japan's latest effort to restart construction on the Kandahar to Geresk segment just stalled again. I called Japanese Prime Minster's Chief Cabinet Secretary Shiozaki on October 12, to urge Japan to complete the road using the mobilized USAID contractor now active on the adjacent the Saudi Arabian funded segment. Secretary Rice will follow up during her visit to Tokyo.

Spain has begun work on its 57 kilometer segment but has not finalized all the construction details. The Asian Development Bank (ADB) is seeking bids for its 210 kilometer Paryab Province segment. The Department of State is seeking donors for the 122 kilometer Baghdis Province segment.

Six large feeder roads linking the Ring Road to Afghanistan's neighbors are planned. Four feeder roads are finished: two roads to Pakistan -- from Kandahar via Spin Boldak and from Jalalabad via Torkham; a road to Iran from Herat via

Eslam Qah-eh; and a road to Tajikistan from Pul-e Khumri via Konduz. India expects to complete construction on the ieeder road to Iran from Delaram via Zaranj in March 2009. The feeder road planned to Turkmenistan is unfunded.

The bulk of the proposed east to west road through the mountains which dominate the center of Afghanistan remains unfunded. Construction along the route would be costly. We believe the Embassy decision to place priority on secondary roads linking provincial capitals to the Ring Road and district capitals to province centers is correct. The Embassy has identified a need for an additional \$565 million in Fiscal Years 07 and 08 for secondary roads.


USAID has spent \$1.03 billion on road projects in Afghanistan. Other key donors include the European Union (\$100 million), Pakistan (\$40 million), and India (\$35 million), The World Bank and Asian Development Bank are providing \$360 million in concessional lending for roads. We are working to finalize our Strategic, reviewand anticipate seeking more money from Congress for roads.

When I visited Zabol Province during my last trip, the governor told me how much he appreciated the work of our military engineers in building a "feeder mad" that enabled farmers and merchants to access the Ring Road from their villages.

This critical link connected farmers and small businesses to the markets they need to improve their lives. More work must be done on these smaller roads.

I hope we will also keep pressure on NATO to include these smaller projects in the support that member nations provide to their **ISAF** forces in Afghanistan. For a small investment, we have seen great payback for the provincial governments and demonstrated to the Afghan people Karzai's promise of a better tomorrow.

I appreciate your continued support on these very important projects.

Dear Mr President,

Thanks for making yourself available at such a short notice. I will certainly make Sure I contact your office earlier next time.

Tupdated you briefly on Hand in Hand in Tamil Nadu. Our "Village Lifting Program" there deals with

- Self Help Groups (SHG) for enterprise- and job creation
- Bonded working children to school
- Medical Camps
- Citizens' Centres, libraries, IT-kiosks etc.
- Environmental programs (watershed management and waste collection and recycling)

The first program, the SHGs, is now covering 10 districts with about 20 Mill people. 130,000 women are organized in SHGs and 22,000 new enterprises are now up and running. The speed is accelerating and we are well underway to our target in Tamil Nadu of 1.5 million new jobs. Presently 35,000 women are trained and ready to start enterprises and we have got good funding from governmental- and private banks but also from the World Bank division, IFC. The rate of starting new companies is now 3-4,000/month. These are family companies but also some 70 medium sized companies up and running. We are proud the President of India recently awarded a bakery the price as the best SHG enterprise in India. The repayment rate among the new enterprises is 99.7%. It should be noted that the women that make these achievements are 85% illiterate, live below \$1/day and belong mainly to the groups Most Backward Caste, Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe. I believe the main reason for the success is our extensive training – not only in building of social capital and bank matters, but in entrepreneurship. We have some 300 of our 2,700 people (employees and volunteers) for business coaching of the new entrepreneurs.

A special program for adult literacy includes 30,000 women per year who go through our 90 day crash course to learn to read, write and do simple calculations.

Our experience in South Africa so far illustrates that the success story from Tamil Nadu can be transplanted. A few dozen Indians train the trainers in South Africa and South Africans also come to Tamil Nadu to be trained. We select some 2,000 aid workers from 200 NGOs in South Africa. Documentation (in Tamil and English) on different businesses is translated to local dialects in South Africa. Indian bankers train South African bankers in how to set up micro credit systems to cover the country etc.

The South African experience is important because something similar should be done in Afghanistan. I had a good discussion with the Afghan Minister of Finance. He was interested in the macro economic impact in South Africa. I explained to him that the expected government investment was \$200 Mill (\$125 Mill training and \$75 Mill subsidized loans). The expected loans from commercial banks to the enterprises are about \$1 billion (this is not money from the government). Finally the expected effect on National Income is about \$3 billion per year after 5 years. The tremendous return comes from unemployed people who get into productive work.

I was encouraged by your knowledge of and personal interest in the Job Creation Program in rural Afghanistan. You asked me, kindly, in what ways you could support the program and I said the following:

Donors

I have had positive and constructive discussions with the following institutions:

- a USAID
- o The World Bank_ .__.
 - Asian DevelopmentBank
 - Indian government (via Ambassador)

We have some other smaller potential donors, but I mention only these major 4. We very much appreciate if you can stress the importance of livelihood and of funding for job creation programs in the rural areas.

Cooperation with ministries

You mentioned that it could be useful if I next time gave a progress report together with the concerned ministries. The concerned ministries are: MRRD, Agriculture, Education, Commerce and Industry, and Finance. Your support for full cooperation with these ministries is appreciated.

Project leadership and follow UD

Afghan "ownership" and leadership is crucial. As you and I discussed, it should be a highly respected, executive and impatient person, who can work across the ministry boundaries. I mentioned that my favourite candidate would be Haneef Atmar since this project will be so important and irreversibly will change the rural and impoverished countryside. However, I understand the difficulties to pull him out of Education, which also is a very big job. Imentioned also Asif Rahimi with his background in the Solidarity Program. You mentioned also a name.

There should also be a team formed from the concerned ministries who together with the project leader and the Hand in Hand representative could give you a regular progress report – e.g. quarterly. You did not like the words Commission or Committee but maybe Executive Team would be more suitable. In any case, your personal involvement is very important for this cross-ministerial project.

Adult literacy and vocational training

These two training efforts are important and necessary components in the total Job Creation Program. Adult literacy is in the Education **Ministry and** vocational training in the Labour and Social Affairs Ministry. As Imentioned to you, it would be a clear advantage if both could be consolidated in the Education Ministry.

In the next month we will deliver a phased development of the Income Generation Program. The first phase will not be so big, maybe 1,000 villages, and then the program expands as we gain experience on Afghan soil. However, the first phase is not a pilot case or a trial. It is the beginning of a major program that shall deliver 2 Mill rural jobs in a 5-year period. It will not be allowed to fail because there is no other major alternative to economic growth, peace and security in the rural areas.

Again, I appreciate your personal involvement and support of this important program. I will keep you updated in the next few months through the communication channel via the Special Secretary to the President that you opened.

- This responds to your 10 October note asking if I have ever spoken to Nicholas Eberstadt to get him on board with what we are trying to do in North Korea.
- My staff and I have discussed U.S. policy toward North Korea with Mr. Eherstadt on numerous occasions. He also interacts with staff at the NSC, State, and the Office of the Vice President.
- We also contracted with the National Bureau of Asian Research for two Eberstadt-led projects on North Korea, including a seminar in Beijing that postulated to the Chinese the feasibility of replacing the current North Korean regime with a Deng Xiao Peng-type socialist state.
- Although his comments toward the end of the article at Tab A criticize the Administration for our handling of the U.S.-ROK Alliance and North Korea, his larger views typically reinforce our themes.

Pyongyang Phooey

By Nicholas Eberstadt

With Pyongyang's announcement that it intends to "conduct a nuclear test" to "bolster its war deterrent for self-defense," the world has been given yet another reminder of the North Korean game plan. Paradoxically, for all its preternatural secretiveness, the regime has been practically spelling out its nuclear objectives for years, and has all but telegraphed the steps it would take to achieve them. As it has patiently explained, nuclear weapons -- and the ballistic missiles necessary for delivering these into the U.S. heartland -- are instrumental to achieving three goals: shattering the U.S. security architecture in Northeast Asia; breaking the U.S. military alliance with South Korea; and pursuing the reunification of the peninsula on Pyongyang's terms. The latest nuclear gambit moves Kim Jong II's regime methodically closer to each of these goals. Scarcely less significant, the leadership sends a signal of confidence in its improbable contest against the American colossus.

North Korea has heen called a "rogue state" by some, a "terrorist state" by others, and fair enough -- hut while those terms carry opprobrium, they lack real descriptive content. The North is hetter understood as a "revisionist state" -- bitterly dissatisfied with the international environment it faces, and intent upon overturning that order. Its **main** grievances with the international system are: (1) the predominance and success of the capitalist world economy, particularly its global trade and financial arrangements, which are fundamentally incompatible with Pyongyang's Stalin-style economy; (2) the Northeast Asian security structure of military alliances built and maintained by its superpower enemy, the U.S.; and (3) the florescence of a prosperous, democratic South Korean state on the landmass that the Kim family claims the right to rule unconditionally.

These grievances are not merely aesthetic. Since each of these features of the international system places the survival of their own system in jeopardy. North Korea is exceedingly unlikely to be reconciled to them **through** "international dialogue." Making the world safe for Kim Jong II requires nothing less than upending the contemporary economic, political and military order in Northeast Asia -- preposterous as such an outcome may sound to South Korean, Japanese or American ears.

Nevertheless, North Korean policy is relentlessly focused on achieving just such an upending. The carefully chosen tools for the job are nuclear weapons and long-range ballistic missiles. The point of vulnerability -- the focus of these WMD -- is the U.S.-South Korea military alliance. By training missiles on **U.S.** territory, Pyongyang's goal of breaking the alliance would be promoted most efficiently -- and its objective of unconditional unification with South Korea would be directly advanced. Why? Because placing **U.S.** territory in North Korea's nuclear crosshairs inescapably undermines the credibility of American security guarantees in a time of crisis on the Korean peninsula. If **U.S.** policy makers were deemed unwilling to expose Seattle in order to honor commitments to Seoul, the security alliance would be worthless, America's unparalleled military might notwithstanding.

For over half a century, Pyongyanghas endured the reality of U.S.-imposed "deterrence." For Kim Jong II, the geopolitical keys to the kingdom lie in deterring the deterrer -- and North Korea's otherwise puzzling and bellicose behavior should be regarded through the prism of this long-term project.

The seemingly stalled six-partytalks, for example, are actually not stalled at all: North Korea's missile

and nuclear weapons programs have apparently been progressing quite nicely during the three-plus years of conferencing. There is an eerie similarity between the "conference diplomacy" involving North Korea today and earlier episodes of "conference diplomacy" in Europe between World Wars I and II. While the particulars are obviously different -- Germany was the strongest state in its region, while North Korea is the weakest -- the dynamics are almost exactly the same: The status quo powers want to talk; the revisionist powers want to arm -- and both parties get their wish.

When North Korea launched its missiles in July, the move was judged in many quarters to be impetuous, even irrational. In fact, it was coolly calculated, displaying the regime's confidence that it could manage subsequent international events while pushing its game up to a potentially much more dangerous level.

Even so, Pyongyang could not have known how much its own project -- inflaming the U.S.-South Korea military alliance -- would be abetted by the hapless Roh Moo Hyun government. In the immediate aftermath of the launches, South Korea's President Roh studiously avoided criticism of North Korea -- and instead harshly scolded the Japanese for (among other things) bringing the matter before the U.N., averring that Tokyo's actions could "lead to a critical situation in the peace over Northeast Asia"! The Roh administration also stated that its multibillion dollar joint-venture scheme within North Korea, the Kaesong Industrial Complex, should be insulated against any political fallout from the missile episode. It continued the subsidies for the project and insisted that North Korean products "made in Kaesong" should receive privileged treatment in the pending U.S.-South Korea Free Trade Agreement.

Most portentously of all, Mr. Roh fixated on switching wartime operational control (Opcon) of the U.S-South Korea combined forces command from U.S. to South Korean hands. It seemed to matter little to him that many military specialists in South Korea itself -- including a large number of retired generals and former ministers of national defense -- went on record to warn that the South's forces were not prepared for such a transition, and that readiness might suffer. The true reasoning hehind Mr. Rohs adamant Opcon lobbying may have been revealed by one of his advisers at a public seminar in Seoul last month. He argued that South Korea's control of troops during wartime is critical to maintain security on the peninsula as it prevents the U.S.military from unilaterally conducting military operations in the case of an emergency on the peninsula.

Opcon, in other words, was a proxy for the Roh government's distrust of its U.S. ally -- a feeling evidently so powerful that it could not be restrained even under the pressure of North Korea's missile tests. In the light of such official South Korean reactions, Pyongyang made its own calculations about the risks and henefits in moving its agenda on to nuclear tests.

If the flower children in charge of South Korean national security policy these days have acquitted themselves poorly, the record of the self-proclaimedgrownups who took charge of Washington's policies in 2001 does not look that much better. Passive-aggressive in the face of North Korean brinkmanship, irritable and reactive in the face of mounting frictions in the relationship with Seoul, the Bush administration's main achievement date in "alliance management" seems to have been the drawdown of **U.S.** forces in South Korea, with more in store. It is not even clear that our statesmen understand the stakes of the game they are embroiled in. All this, of course, will hardly dissuade Pyongyang from pressing the U.S.-South Korea alliance ever barder.

With his latest nuclear gambit, Kim Jong II has just reset the clock on the U.S.-South Korean military alliance, moving the hands palpably closer to midnight. If we listen closely, we can hear the ticking.







 care for acute injury to assessments of all who have returned.
- The picture that emerges from this overall evaluation of our deployed forces both during and after deployments is that the health effects of deployments are less, and the health status better than most in the public are lead to believe.
- Over 50% of wounded return to duty within 72 hours.
- 91-93% of returning service members rate their health as good or very good immediately after coming home, and even after three to six 6 months at home, the number is 80-85%.
- TAB A contains a summary of the major data elements and a related tabular fact sheet.
- TAB B consists of detailed briefing sluces about the same data elements.

- Medical Air Transports Out of Theater: Total of 34,886 to date. 19 percent are for battle injuries, 22 pecent for non-battle injuries, and 59 percent for disease.
- Diseases and Non-Battle Injuries (DNBI): Most remain in theater. On average, about 4 percent of service members seek care for DNBI each week, a rate lower than any previous conflict.
- Amputations: 721 service members. 91 percent from OEF and OIF. 9 percent from elsewhere. Of the total, 69 percent suffered the loss of a limb or full hand or foot; the others lost fingers or toes.
- Traumatic Brain Injuries: 1,349 service members, CEF: 4 percent, OIF: 96 percent. Of these, 64 percent were assessed as mild Traumatic Brain Injuries (past-concussive syndrome).
- Post-Deployment Health Assessment (DD Form 2796): Fielded in 2003. Almost one million service members have been assessed. Primary purpose: optimize the opportunity for redeploying service members to get follow-up medical care for any health problems or concerns they may have. 20 percent have been referred fa. follow-up. Of those referred, over 85 percent have been seen by a health care provider in a military clinic or the purchased care network within six months of that referral.
- Pat-Deployment Health Re-Assessment (DD Form 2900): Fielded m 2005.

 Service members are screened 3-6 months following their return from a deployment Purpose: Identify health problems that may have ansen since the post-deployment assessment. Of the 98,777 individuals reassessed to date, 24 percent have been referred for further evaluation.
- Medical Holding: This term refers to service members not assigned to their regular duties or units while they are undergoing medical care, rehabilitation, or medical evaluation board (MEB) and physical evaluation board (PEB) procedures. The 6406 Service members on medical hold as of I September, 2006 are not limited to veterans of the Clobal. War on Terrorism (GWOT).
- Medical Evaluation Board Completions: Data are not cumulative but reflect the
 most recent one-month period. Data pertains to service members who completed a
 MEB and were referred to a PEE for possible separation from the military because of
 a disqualifying medical condition. There are currently 1157 undergoing the MEB and
 224 undergoing the PEB process. These data are not restricted to veterans of the







Post-deployment Health Assessment Key Results - Cumulative January 1 2003 - August 21, 2006





Spitzer Misquotes Secretary Rumsfeld

Carlton Spitzer's Sept. 1 column, which discussed Secretary Rumsfeld's recent address to the American Legion National Convention, was inaccurate.

Mr. Spitzer wrote that Secretary Rumsfeld claimed "critics of the administration's policies 'weaken the ability of free societies to persevere."

Defending Strategy In Iraq

SIR – You assert that difficulties in Iraq can be explained by errors such as "disbanding Iraq's army [and] committing too few American troops", which you claim are the fault of Donald Rumsfeld, America's secretary of defence ("Five years on", September 2nd). A few facts are in order. Although officially disbanded in May 2003 by coalition officials in Iraq, the Iraqi military had already largely disbanded itself by then. As the commander of the top division in the Iraqi Republican Guard explained: "I started the war with 13,000 soldiers. By the time we had orders to pull back to Baghdad, I had less than 2,000; by the time we were in position in Baghdad, I had less than 1,000. Every day the desertions increased."

It is also incorrect to suggest that Mr Rumsfeld opposed sending more troops to Iraq. The secretary has regularly asked General John Abizaid, who took command of the mission in the summer of 2003, if he had all the necessary resources, and, if not, what more was required to carry out a successful campaign. Commanders in the field have consistently said that they need more intelligence and Iraqi forces, not American troops. General Tommy Franks. General Abizaid's predecessor, told the Senate in July 2003, when he was still in command in Iraq, that: "There has been [the] suggestion that perhaps there should be more troops. And in fact, I can tell you...that if more troops are necessary, this secretary'sgoing to say yes." Reliance on the counsel and advice of experts continues today.

Charles Madigan's September 5, 2006 column, which discussed Secretary Rumsfeld's address to the American Legion National Convention last week, was misleading and prevented your readers from gaining an accurate summary of the Secretary's remarks.

Madigan wrote, "[Rumsfeld] suggested opponents of the war are suffering some kind of 'moral and intellectual confusion' and somehow have forgotten the lessons of history. When a database search of America's leading newspapers turns up literally 10 times as many mentions of one of the soldiers who has been punished for misconduct at Abu Ghraib than the mentions of Sergeant First Class Paul Ray Smith, the first recipient of the Medal of Honor in the Global War on Terror, something is seriously wrong.
