Subject: US Military Group-Argentina (U)

1. (2) The US Ambassador to Argentina recently informed the Argentine Minister of Defense that the United States would reduce its military group's assigned strength from 20 to 13 to reduce US personnel exposure to terrorist activity. This reduction follows a previous drawdown from 29 to 20, which occurred in July 1974 for the same security reasons, and would be effected shortly after the COMUSMILGP was downgraded from a general officer to a colonel in order to comply with Public Law 94-11.

2. (1) The Argentine Air Force Commander and the Argentine Navy Deputy Commander for Policy and Strategy have taken serious exception to these reductions. (The newly appointed Argentine Army Commander's position is unknown.) The Argentine Air Force Commanding General has stated that he will be compelled to ask for total withdrawal of the US Air Force Mission if the current reduction is implemented. The currently authorized MILGP strength of 27 is based upon mission requirements, which have not changed. The "temporary" reduction to 20 personnel reduced mission capability significantly, particularly in the opinion of the Argentine military. To reduce MILGP strength to less than 50 percent of authorized strength degrades mission effectiveness to an unsatisfactory level. Furthermore, at a time when the Argentine military is growing more suspicious of Brazil's aspirations for greater military power, both conventional and nuclear, the contrast between the US military manning level in Brazil (40--with three general officers) and the reduction to 13 in Argentina may cause the Argentines to draw erroneous conclusions about overall US policy toward the two countries.

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3: (a) Duty in high-risk areas is a necessary and accepted condition of military service. While the seriousness of the security situation is appreciated, reducing military personnel from 20 to 13 will not markedly reduce the terrorist threat. It is useful to compare US actions in Guatemala following the murder of the MILGP commander and in Iran following the recent murder of two US personnel to US actions in Argentina. In both Guatemala and Iran, US MAAG personnel carried out their missions in the wake of actual political assassination of MAAG personnel. There were no personnel reductions as a result of those incidents. It should also be noted that reductions in US Embassy personnel in Argentina have not been of the same order of magnitude as those proposed for the MILGP, nor has the Ambassador found it necessary to curtail the assignment of dependents of remaining US military and civilian personnel.

4. (c) The Joint Chiefs of Staff are concerned that the US MILGP reductions will be perceived as a weakening of US resolve in the face of a threat. It could also erode good Service-to-Service relationships that have been valuable to the United States and that may be even more useful should the Argentine Armed Forces once again become more actively involved in governing the nation. Under these circumstances, the Joint Chiefs of Staff believe that it would be a serious mistake to carry out further reductions and that the US MILGP should be returned to its currently authorized military strength of 27.

5. (U) The Joint Chiefs of Staff request your support to preclude further erosion in US military presence in Argentina and to gain authorization for an early return to the authorized strength.

6. (U) The Joint Chiefs of Staff recommend that a memorandum, substantially like that contained in the Appendix, be forwarded to the Secretary of State.

## MEMORANDUM FOR THE SECRETARY OF STATE

Subject: US Military Group-Argentina (U) 4 1. As you know, US presence in Argentina was substantially 5 reduced last year in an attempt to reduce the threat by 6 terrorist groups to the security of US officials. As a part 7 of this effort, the number of military personnel assigned to 8 the US MILGP was temporarily reduced from 29 to 20 in July 1974. 4 Additionally, in April 1975, COMUSMILGP, Argentina, was downgraded 10 from a general officer to a colonel in order to comply with 11 Public Law 94-11. Recently, at the urging of the US Ambassador, 12 a further reduction of US MILGP personnel, from 20 to 13, was 13 directed. However, I have reevaluated the situation in light 14 of current developments and firmly believe that reduction of 15 the US MILGP to 13 will be counterproductive to US interests 16 in Argentina and will damage our ongoing efforts to renew 17 confidence in US resolve around the world. In addition, 18 the currently authorized MILGP strength of 27 is based upon 19 mission requirements, which have not changed. The "temporary" 20 reduction to 20 personnel reduced mission capability significantly 21 particularly in the opinion of the Argentine military. To .12 reduce MILGP strength to less than 50 percent of authorized 23 strength unquestionably degrades mission effectiveness to an 24 unsatisfactory level. Furthermore, at a time when the 25 Argentine military is growing more suspicious of Brazil's 26 27 aspirations for greater military power, both conventional and 28 nuclear, the contrast between the US military manning level in Brazil (40--including three general officers) and the reduction to  $\frac{29}{2}$ 30 13 (with no general officer) in Argentina may cause the 31 Argentines to draw erroneous conclusions about overall US policy toward the two countries.

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2. (e) The Argentine Minister of Defense has demonstrated	<u>1</u>
acceptance and understanding of the additional reduction in US	2
military presence in Argantina. However, this attitude is not	3
shared by other key Argentine military leaders. The Commanding	4
General of the Argentine Air Force, General Fauteric, who had	5
previously submitted a formal request for the restoration of the	<u>6</u>
vacant positions, has stated that this latest reduction would	<u>7</u>
compel him to request the withdrawal of the US Air Force Mission.	<u>8</u>
General Fautario cites the bilateral mission agreement between the	2
United States and Argentine, which this unilateral reduction	10
clearly violates. Articles 5 and 7 of the US-Argentina Mission	<u>11</u>
Agreement require that any variation in personnel strength in	12
the Mission must be "mutually agreed upon between the Department	<u>13</u>
of Air Force and the Ministry of Aeronautics." (It should be	14
remembered that General Fautario led the effort to retain the	15
US MILGP last year when the former Army commander had called	<u>16</u>
for its expulsion.) We would also anticipate negative	17
reactions to further reductions by the commanders of the	<u>18</u>
Argentine Army and Navy.	<u>19</u>
3. Therefore, I must conclude that the withdrawal of seven	<u>20</u>
additional US military members from Argentina at this time	<u>21</u>
would not serve the best interests of the United States. It is	22
in violation of our mission agreements with Argentina and	23
clearly places the continued presence of the US MILGP in	24
jeopardy at a time when Argentina's internal security situation	25

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and US interests warrant a continued US military presence. Furthermore, I believe we should consider filling the currently authorized 27 spaces in the near future. I would appreciate your assistance in reversing the reduction action now in progress and effecting a return to authorized manning levels.

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
