SUBJECT: Legal Restrictions on Security Assistance to Argentina and Chile.

(Nable A) to SecDef requesting that he urge SecState to initiate legislation to repeal the restrictions on security assistance programs for Chile and Argentina imposed by Section 620B of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended, and Section 406 of the International Security Assistance and Arms Export Control Act of 1976. A description of these restrictions, and the President's authority to waive them under Section 614 of the Foreign Assistance Act, is at Tab B.

(N) On 23 February, SecDef noted on the OJCS memorandum (Tab A) that he agreed with the proposal to seek repeal of the legislative restrictions. Also, on 23 February, an Interdepartmental Group (IG) chaired by Deputy Assistant Secretary of State Bushnell met to consider options for dealing with the restrictions on security assistance for Argentina. The 1G considered three options: Use the President's waiver authority to revive a security assistance relationship with Argentina; seek amendments to existing legislation which would ease the restrictions and move incrementally toward repeal; seek outright repeal of the restrictions. State and Defense agreed that the Administration should seek either amendment or repeal, with repeal the preferred option. The 16 further agreed that State Congressional Relations staff would consult with the staffs of the Inter-American Subcommittees of the House Foreign Affairs and Senate Foreign Relations Committees and gauge the likely receptivity of Congress to a repeal effort. The initiative on Argentina would then be included along with the other legislative initiatives incorporated in State's FY 82 Foreign Assistance Authorization Bill.

Chile was not discussed at this week's meeting, but is the topic of an IG meeting scheduled for early March. Current indications are that we may encounter more difficulty at State and on the Hill concerning Chile than on Argentina.

The Case for Repeal. The strategic South Atlantic lines of communication are now vulnerable to significantly improved Soviet naval capabilities, to include interdiction of important oil supply lines through the region. The Soviet naval presence in the region has increased dramatically, with port facilities available on the African west coast for their deployed forces. Given the current NATO force structure, there are an insufficient number of naval combatants to protect these lines of communication in any major war scenario. The vulnerability of the Panama Canal, as well as its size limitations, will also necessitate support from Chile and Argentina for any transfer of forces from the Pacific to the Office of the Secretary of Defense Chief, RDD, ESD, WHS

US is seen as being more forthcoming in specific areas of importance to Argentina and Chile. Friendly and cooperative strategically located nations such as Argentina and Chile could provide additional forces for combined, supportive military operations as well as safe haven, resupply, and maintenance facilities. As a result of US policy and legislation, the Chileans and Argentines have been forced to turn to other countries for equipment, training, doctrine, and tactics. While some cooperation, interoperability and standardization remain, additional exacerbating actions by the US or even inaction by the US will reduce possible Chilean and Argentine support for US objectives and interests. Improved relations would permit exchanges which could promote cooperation on mutual security issues, as well as other economic, scientific, and political interests.

Repeal of the Humphrey-Kennedy Amendment (Section 620B of the FAA of 1961) and the Kennedy Amendment (Section 406 of P.L. 94-320 of 1976) would remove the greatest irritants in US relations with Argentina and Chile and provide clear, unambigious signals of US desire to develop a balanced relationship with these major Latin American countries. The human rights situation in both countries which prompted the original legislation has changed dramatically, and today's reality would not appear to warrant such restrictions. As long as Argentina and Chile perceive that US policy is tied mainly to human rights objectives rather than security interests, the US will be viewed as an inconsistent and unreliable security partner.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE SECRETARY OF DEFENSE

Subject: Security Assistance Policy--Argentina/Chile (U)

- 1. (1) The Joint Chiefs of Staff recently proposed* a series of action recommendations to enhance US security interests in Latin America. One of the issues, legislative restrictions on security assistance for Argentina and Chile, must be highlighted early in this Administration because of the lengthy process involved in changing laws. It now appears both timely and prudent to reevaluate the efficacy of current law and policy.
- 2. The geo-strategic importance of the southern cone of South America and the politico-military influence wielded by Argentina and Chile dictate that US military and strategic interests in that area be addressed on a priority basis. These interests will be significantly enhanced if legislative action is taken to repeal those portions of the Foreigh assistance Act of 1961, as amended, and the International Security Assistance and Arms Export Control Act of 1976 that restrict security assistance programs for Argentina and Chile.
- 3. (*) Without question, significant political implications are involved in repealing the applicable laws and directives affecting US security assistance policies toward Argentina and Chile. However, the need for repeal is urgent. As a result of these laws and policies, US military relationships with Argentina and Chile have steadily deteriorated, with an attendant loss of influence and leverage with these and other South American governments. Chile and Argentina, as

well as other countries in the region, are beginning to define their national interests independently of the United The human rights conditions that led to the imposition of current US laws and policies have significantly improved over the past few years. Prolonging the existing situation will almost certainly make it more difficult to. rebuild advantageous security assistance and corollary military relationships. Both Argentina and Chile have immediate requirements for security assistance. If the United States will not meet those requirements, both countries will almost certainly acquire their military equipment and training from others. For example, Argentine officials have recently informed the United States that a \$3 billion Argentine Air Force modernization program decision must be made by June 1981; further, the Argentine Navy intends to make a decision in CY 1981 on the replacement of its aging maritime patrol aircraft. Both decisions will have sweeping effects on military preparedness, regional balance of power, and US-Argentina cooperation on security interests for the next 20 years. It is thus in the militarystrategic interest of the United States that it return to a more cooperative security assistance relationship with both countries.

4. (S) In view of the above, request that you confer with the Secretary of State and urge that he initiate legislation to repeal the restrictions imposed by Section 620B of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 and Section 406 of the International Security Assistance and Arms Export Control Act of 1976. Both the near-term problem of the Argentine aircraft purchase and the broader issue of restricted sales must be addressed. Additionally it is requested that you in concert with the Secretary of State, ask the President to immediately remove any administrative limitations currently preventing the transfer of previously purchased defense articles and services.

SUBJECT: Legal Restraints on Security Assistance to Argentina

and Chile

This responds to your request for the identification of statutory prohibitions on security assistance (military assistance, grant training, FMS cash sales, and FMS credits), and the export of defense articles and services on a direct commercial basis by U.S. private firms to Argentina and Chile. This memorandum also notes the recently expanded authority of the President to waive such prohibitions.

1. Chile

Sec. 406 (a) of the International Security Assistance and Arms Export Control Act of 1976 (P.L. 94-329, approved June 30, 1976) provides:

- "(1) No military assistance, no assistance under chapter 4 of part II, no assistance under under chapter 6 of part III, and no military education and training may be furnished under the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 for Chile; and no credits (including participations in credits) may be extended and no loan may be guaranteed under the Arms Export Control Act with respect to Chile. No deliveries of any such assistance, credits, or cuaranties may be made to Chile on or after the date of enactment of this section.
- "(2) No sales (including cash sales) may be made and no export license may be issued under the Arms Export Control Act with respect to Chile on or after the date of enactment of this section."

(22 USC 2370 note.)

Il. Argentina

Sec. 620B of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended (added by the International Security Assistance Act of 1977, approved on August 4, 1977) provides:

"Sec. 620B. Prohibition Against Assistance and Sales to Argentina. -- After September 30, 1978 --

(1) no assistance may be furnished under chapter 2, 4, 5, or 6 of part II of this Act to Argentina:

- (2) no credits (including participation in credits) may be extended and no loan may be guaranteed under the Arms Export Control Act with respect to Argentina;
- (3) no sales of ôefense articles or services may be made under the Arms Export Control Act to Argentina; and
- (4) no export licenses may be issued under section 38 of the Arms Export Control Act to or for the Government of Argentina."

(22 USC 2372.)

Section 108(b) of the International Security and Development Cooperation Act of 1980 (PL 96-533 approved on December 16, 1980) provides:

In addition, the President shall study whether 620B of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 should be amended in order to allow the issuance of licenses under section 38 of the Arms Export Control Act for the export of (1) communications and electronics equipment with a direct civilian application; (2) transport, utility, or training helicopters with a direct civilian application; (3) propeller-driven transport, utility, or training aircraft; (4) trucks and vehicles with a direct civilian application; or (5) defense services related to any of the items described in clauses (1) through (4). The Fresident shall report the results of this study to the Congress within 120 days after the date of enactment of this Act."

III. Presidential Waiver Authority

Sec. 117 of the International Security and Development Cooperation Act of 1980 (PL 96-533, approved on December 16, 1980) amended section 614(a) of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 to read as follows:

"Sec. 614. Special Authorities -- (a)(1) The President may authorize the furnishing of assistance under this Act without regard to any provision of this Act, the Arms Export Control Act, any law relating to receipts and credits accruing to the United States,

and any Act authorizing or appropriating funds for use under this Act, in furtherance of any of the purposes of this Act, when the President determines, and so notifies in writing the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate, that to do so is important to the security interests of the United States.

- "(2) The President may make sales, extend credit, and issue guaranties under the Arms Export Control Act, without regard to any provision of this Act, the Arms Export Control Act, any law relating to receipts and credits accruing to the United States, and any Act authorizing or appropriating funds for use under the Arms Export Control Act, in furtherance of any of the purposes of such Act, when the President determines, and so notifies in writing the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate, that to do so is vital to the national security interests of the United States.
 - "(3) Before exercising the authority granted in this subsection, the President shall consult with, and shall provide a written policy justification to, the Committee on Foreign Affairs and the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Poreign Relations and the Committee on Appropriations of the Senate.
 - "(4) The authority of this subsection may not be used to authorize the use of more than \$250,000,000 of funds made available for use under this Act or the Arms Export Control Act, or the use of more than \$100,000,000 of foreign currencies accruing under this Act or any other law, in any fiscal year. Not more than \$50,000,000 of the funds available under this subsection may be allocated to any one country in any fiscal year, unless such country is a victim of active Communist or Communist-supported aggression.

Page determined to be Unclassified Reviewed Chief, RDD, WHS IAW EO 13526, Section 3.5 Date: "(5) The authority of this section may not be used to waive the limitations on transfers contained in section 610(a) of this Act.".

(22 USC 2364.)

The prohibitions contained against grant training, FMS cash sales, and FMS credits to Argentina and Chile may be waived by the President pursuant to Section 614(a) of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended, subject to the ceiling limitations on grant training and FMS credits as stated in paragraph (4) of Section 614(a), supra.
