MEMORANDUM FOR THE SECRETARY OF DEFENSE

Subj: Waning US influence with Latin American Naval Officers  
Action Memorandum

1. ~~(S)~~ The U.S. Navy UNITAS exercise commander recently highlighted a concern that I share about our waning influence with the Latin Americans. During the operations with the eight maritime nations of South America, our commander observed a degradation in communications caused by the lack of English speaking ability. This evidence is symptomatic of a larger problem. Because of our inability to provide the equipment sought, the purchase of ships and aircraft from Europe has grown greatly. As a result, an increasing number of officers and men of the South American navies have gone to Europe to train and have become oriented towards the supplying European countries. We have an emerging generation of South American naval personnel who are culturally and politically attuned to Europe in contrast with the older leadership which was trained in the U.S. and remains very favorably disposed to the U.S.
2. ~~(S)~~ We must stop the erosion of U.S. influence with the Latin American military. Latin American naval leaders have asked our help in orienting their young officers back toward the close relationship with the US Navy which they had long had. This will require actions to provide for the training of Latin American military personnel. Also, we must improve our reliability as a supplier of spare parts and support materiel for the military hardware we may provide.
3. ~~(S)~~ Some progress has been made in rolling back restrictions. More has to be done. I recommend the following actions:
  - a. ~~(S)~~ Secure the Presidential certification necessary to allow Foreign Military Sales (FMS) to Argentina and Chile and make both countries eligible for the International Military Education and Training (IMET) Program.
  - b. ~~(S)~~ Work with the Congressional leadership to modify the Symington Amendment (Section 669 of the Foreign Assistance Cooperation Act of 1961) to reconcile Brazilian sensitivity to a perceived infringement on their national sovereignty. We need to provide a means by which Brazil can be eligible again for IMET.

c. ~~(U)~~ Obtain an amendment to the Arms Export Control Act, as proposed in the draft International Security and Development Act of 1982, to permit the exchange of students between U.S. and foreign war colleges on a reimbursement-in-kind basis. This action would greatly facilitate the participation by leading navies in the international courses at the Naval War College.

d. ~~(U)~~ Develop a Congressional proposal for the exchange of all training, range and exercise services with friendly foreign governments on a reciprocal basis. The ability to reimburse the U.S. with similar services as opposed to payment in cash will prove mutually beneficial.

4. ~~(U)~~ My staff is engaged in the study and pursuit of initiatives to restore closer US-Latin American naval ties. From time to time I would like to forward for your consideration other initiatives to achieve that goal.
